

THESE STORIES lured such throngs that Kelsey farm work was disrupted — so the stone man was hauled to Middlebury and exhibited in a vacant store.

For a small fee, of course! The old Elkhart Review's journalists weren't as gullible as the rest, however. They snooped skeptically and soon assembled a dos-sier of dubious facts, to wit:

1. For several weeks, a coffinlike box had reposed at the rear of Henry Sanger's pool hall in the nearby town of Bristol then mysteriously disappeared. (Continued on Page 5)



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



scientific achievements in 1923; when he joined the General Motors Research Corporation as a research chemist, While there, he contributed substantially to the development of the tetraethyl lead compound used in "Ethyl" gaso-Later he was transferred to the Ethyl Gasoline Corporation as research chemist.

Famed For His Research

In 1926, with Dr. Carroll A. Hochwelt, he organized the Thomas & Hochwalt Laboratories at Dayton, Ohio, which specialized in research work for industrial or-

ganizations.

Thomas & Hochwalt Laboratories were acquired by Monsanto Chemical Chemical Company in 1936, and Dr. Thomas became central research director of Monsanto. He joined Monsanto's board of directors in 1942 and was elected vice-president and a sember of the company's execu-tive committee in 1945.

Two years later he was elected executive vice-president and a member of the finance committee. He was elected vice chairman of the executive committee in 1948 and became its chairman the next year.

He was elected president of the company in 1951 and chairman of the board in 1960, Dr. Thomas continues to serve as a member of the company's finance and executive committees

Worked on Atomic Bomb During World War II, Dr. Tho-us was one of the principal scientists in the development of the atomic bomb. He was in charge of the final purification and metallurgy of one of the and metallargy of the of the bemb's elements, plutonium. In recognition of his wartime work in this field. Dr. Thomas was one of a group of scientists who re-clived the Medal of Merit from then Secretary of War Robert F. Patterson.

Dr. Thomas was one of the five co-authors of the 1946 "Re-port on the International Con-trol of Atomic Energy," prepared for the Secretary of State's Committee on Atomic Energy. The report, commonly known as the Acheson-Lilienthal Report, proposed a master plan for the international control of a tomic

energy, Since World War II, Dr. Thomas has been engaged in numercus other government activities. They include the chairmanship of the Scientific Manpower Advisory Committee of the National Security Resources Board, and con-sultant to the President's National Security Council. He is now a member of the Business Advisory Council of the Department of Commerce, and of President Eisenhower's Committee on Civilian National Honors.

Among the honors Dr. Thomas Treceived are the Perkin Medal, the highest award for achievement in American industrial chemistry, and the Priestly Medal. highest award of the American Chemical Society,

Dr. Thomas is a member of the American Chemical Society. He served as its president in 1948 and as its chairman of the board from 1950 to 1953.

He is a director of the Chem-strand Corporation, Plax Corporation, Southwestern Bell Telephone St. Louis Union Trust Co., First National Bank in St. Louis, and the Rand Corporation. He is also a trustee of the Cartogic Corporation of New York. A Phi Beta Kappa

Dr. Thomas is a member of the National Academy of Sciences, the American Philosophical Society, and a life member of both the Corporation of Massachusetts American Institute of Chemical Engineers. He is also a member of Phi Beta Kappa and Sigma Xi.

The St. Louis scientist is the author of many scientific papers and the holder of a number of U.S. and foreign patents, largely in the field of organic chemistry. A book he wrote, "Anhydrous Aluminum Chloride in Organic Chemistry," is a standard text in that field,

## Census Report Reveals Gains In School Enrollmen

During the 1950's, percenta increases in school enrollme were greatest among 5-year-ol and among persons 16 to 24 year of age, according to a report pu lished today by the Bureau of the Ceusus, U. S. Department of Cormerce. At ages 6 to 15, curoment rates were already qui high at the beginning of the de ade.

These findings, based on the Census Bureau's Current Popul tion Survey, indicate that mo and more 5-year-olds are being entered in kindergartens, the more 16- and 17-year-old youth are staying in high school unt graduation, and that there is growing appreciation of the valu of a college education.

Other highlights of the Censi Bureau report are summarized b low:

In October 1959, 44.3 persons 5 to 34 years old per cent of the civilian noninst tutional population of that ag were enrolled in school group or college. One year earlier, er rollment stood at 42,900,000, 6 54.8 per cent. In 1950, enrol ment was 30,276,000, or 44.2 pe cent.

tion of whites than nonwhite were enrolled in school in 1951 Differences between the colo groups were small at ages 6 to 1

but were greater at other ages.
Enrollment rates by age als
differed among regions of th
country, with the per cent of 5 and 6-year-olds attending kinder garten or elementary school low est in the South.

Although regional variations I enrollment rates were slight to children 7 to 13 years old, th differences stood out again ages 14 and over. In the Wes the proportions of youths any young adults enrolled was higher than in the other regions.

About 6 million children wen in junior high schools - some of

them in combined junior-senior high schools — in October 1953 Although nearly all enrolled 16-year-olds were in high school one out of ten students at age 17

in October was in college.

Private schools below the college level have been absorbing a relatively larger share of increasing enrollments than have publischools. The per cent of kinder

garten and elementary school pupils in private schools increased from 12.7 to 16.1 per cent be-tween 1954 and 1959. also per cent in private high schools rose from 8.8 per cent to 10.9 percent during the same period.
Male teachers are typically

younger than female teachers in public schools below the college level. Of 431,000 men teachers 52 per cent were under 35 in October 1959. Of 931,000 women 20-3n teachers, only 32 percent were under 35.
