"HOOSIER AT LARGE"

This Chesterton Man Fished His Way Into Big-Time Vaudeville

A HALF-CENTURY AGO, Iowa farm-boy Granville Pierson, nursed a youthful yearning to become a lawyer.

Although that goal eluded him, the fascination-filled alternate route he pursued, still sets Granville's eyes a-twin-kling as he reflects on his 64 lively years.

He's been a Marine, vaudeville star, newspaper employee, car salesman, and restaurant owner.

And, as he nears the customary retirement age, Granville has no thought of putting himself to pasture. Instead, he's characteristically concocting still another livelihood — commercial fishing!

Pierson, who knew Edgar Bergen before Charlie McCarthy did, is the bright-eyed, white-haired owner of a cozy, quiet Chesterton cafe.

CHESTERTON in Porter County is a friendly town — and Granville is among its friendliest inhabitants. Like most one-time troupers, he's ready to reminisce at the drop of a cue.

"How did a would-be barrister get into show business?" I wondered.

"I fished my way in," Granville chuckled.

"AS A MARINE in 1917, I was stationed at Quantico, Va. Whenever I could, I went fishing on the Potomac or Chesapeake Bay. I became friends with a fellow fisherman, Army Captain Jack Beardmore. He was a Chicago hotel superintendent, but wanted something more adventurous."

Their talks turned to vaudeville and before their military paths parted the pair had decided to form a post-war comedy magic act.

In 1919, civilian Pierson went to Chicago, looked up Beardmore — and off they went!

For eight years their act — which spoofed such master magic makers of the day as Blackstone, Houdini, and Herman the Great — was a show-stopper.

Billed as "Fayette and Company" (Beardmore's wife was the third member) they played theaters in every U.S. town of more than 30,000 population — and many smaller.

THE ACT WAS BOOKED by the Alexander Pantages Circuit, the Junior Orpheum Western Vaudeville Circuit, the Bert Levy Circuit, the Keith Proctor Family Time Circuit and Gus Sun Tabloids Shows.

They performed with such greats as Bert Wheeler, Eddie Cantor, George Jessel, Pat Grady.

Tom Benbrook head basketball coach at Culver during the past two seasons, has accepted a similar post as baseball and basketball mentor at Akron High School in Fulton County. It was announced last Thursday.

Over a two-year period Benbrook's Culver teams won 20 and lost 23 games, meanwhile compiling a 15-5 record in intra-county competition.

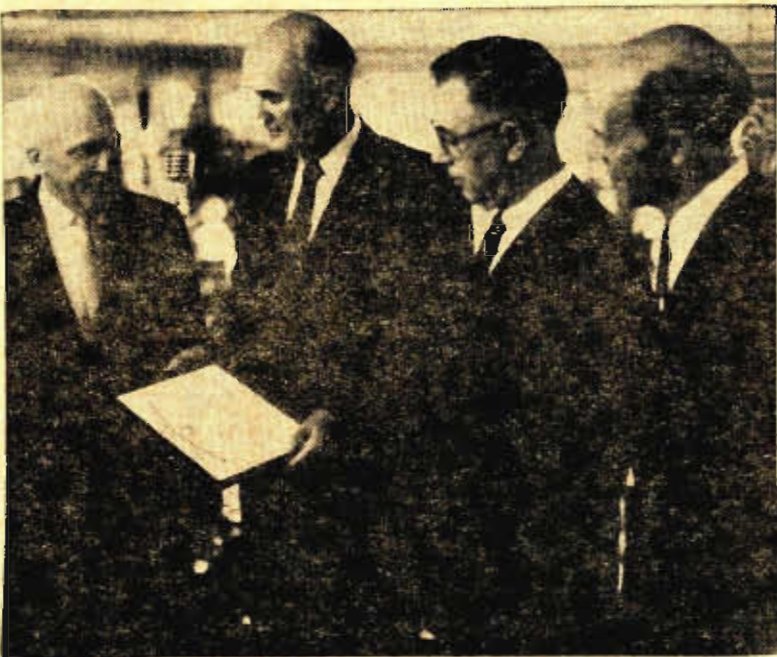
The Indians won 10 and lost 11 during the recent campaign.

Before becoming the Indians' chieftain, Benbrook capped an outstanding prep and college career by playing a year of AAU basketball with a team out of Albion, Mich., and then by piloting Honeyville in LaGrange County to a 19-2 record.

A graduate of New Albany High School and Bowling Green University in Ohio, he performed on New Albany's state finalist team in 1952.

Benbrook will spend the summer giving swimming lessons in Culver and with his wife and two children will move to Akron next fall.

Golden Anniversary

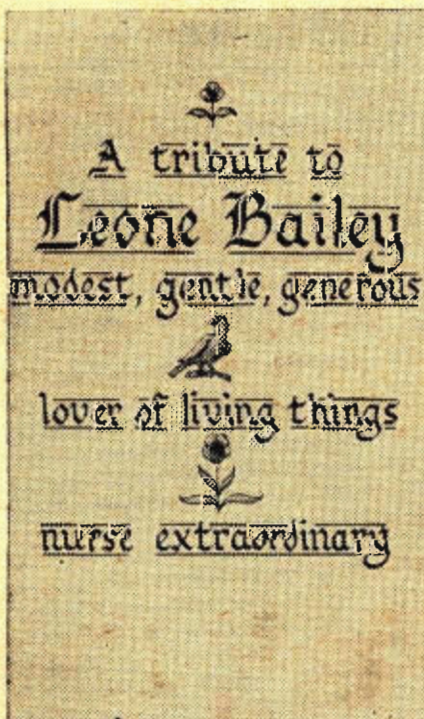

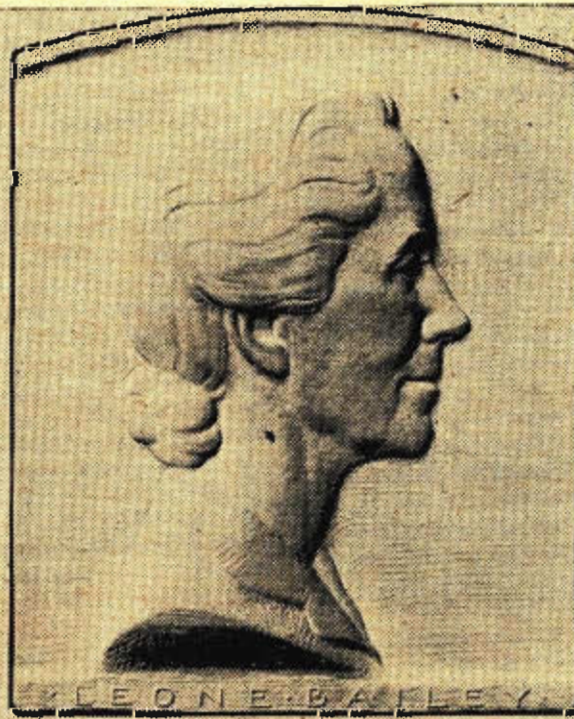

Complete 5-Day Program Listed

Culver Military Academy will begin annual "June Week" festivities Friday, June 2, marking the end of the academic year.

The five-day schedule includes military exhibitions, Baccalaureate and Commencement exercises, and the final parade of their Culver careers for 205 graduating seniors. The candidates for graduation are from 28 states and six foreign countries.

Expected on campus Friday are the first of hundreds of parents and guests. There will also be a host of visiting alumni from 12 classes who are observing quinquennial reunions.

Highlighting the "June Week" observance will be addresses by two distinguished speakers.

Dr. William Graham Cole, president of Lake Forest (Ill.) College, will deliver the Commencement address during a convocation in the Eugene C. Eppley Auditorium at 10:45 a.m., Monday, June 5. Cum Laude exercises and the award of honors will be held at that time.

Baccalaureate
Sunday, June 4, the Rev. Dr. John Oliver Nelson, Professor of Christian vocation at Yale University Divinity School, will speak during two services at Memorial Chapel. The first will be a 9:30 a.m. service for undergraduates and their guests while the 11 a.m. Baccalaureate service will be for seniors, their guests, alumni, and faculty.

"Wonderful Town"
"Wonderful Town," the Broadway musical being presented by Theater '61 and featuring Tommye Lou Glaze, Miss Indiana, will be given both Friday and Saturday evenings, June 2 and 3.

Highlighting the Saturday performance at 8:15 p.m. will be the presentation of the Charles C. Mather Plaque. The plaque, to be placed in the Green Room of Eppley Auditorium, honors Dr. Charles C. Mather, retired chairman of the English Department and former drama coach. The presentation will be made by a Culver alumnus, producer-writer H. Oliver Rea, and expresses the gratitude of Dr. Mather's former students for his long devotion to the theater.

Organ Recital
Other highlights include: an organ recital by Alexander B. 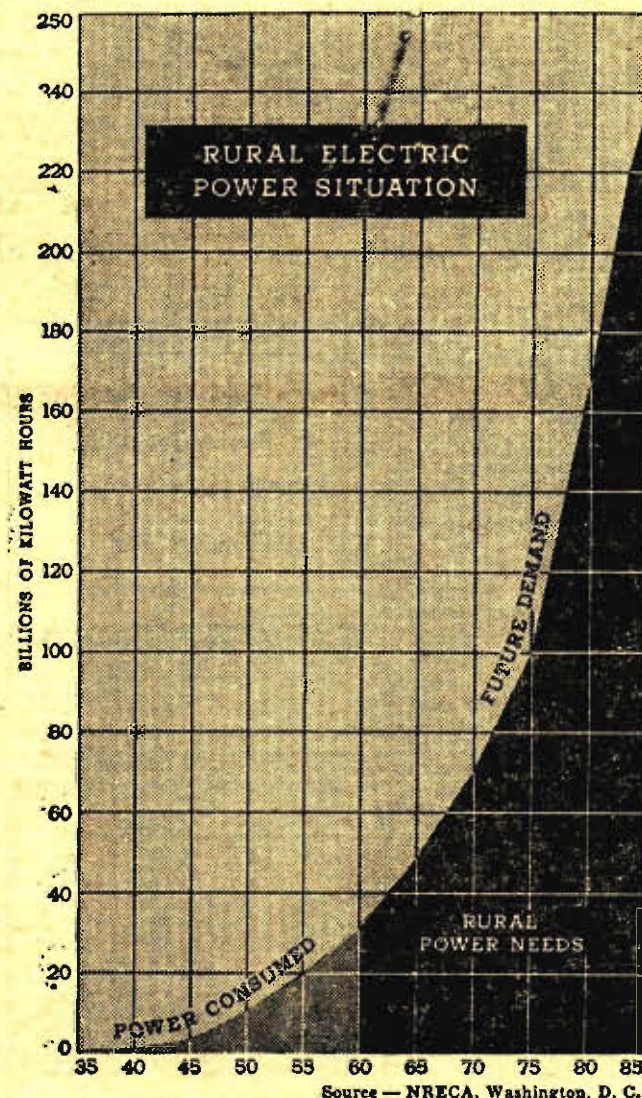

Baccalaureate Service At CMA Sunday Morning



REV. DR. JOHN O. NELSON

The Rev. Dr. John O. Nelson, professor of Christian vocation at Yale University Divinity School, will speak on the topic "From Confusion to Simplicity" when he delivers the Baccalaureate address Sunday, June 4, at Culver Military Academy.

Dr. Nelson will point out to 205 graduating seniors, their parents, faculty, and guests, that "the great task of this generation is to get past its confusion to the point where it can see things whole again."

"This is possible," Dr. Nelson believes. "In our view of the universe and what it means, our work in our occupation, and the temper of our life in the daily round of experience."

Dr. Nelson will deliver his sermon at two services, the first at 9:30 a.m. when he speaks to undergraduates, their parents and guests, and to the seniors, their parents, faculty and alumni at 10:45 a.m. Baccalaureate service.

As professor of Christian vocation at Yale, Dr. Nelson deals with mission of both ministers and laymen. Serving also as field work director, he counsels 400 graduate students in their training jobs during the seminary course.

Dr. Nelson is currently chairman of Association Press, the publishing wing of the Y.M.C.A.; University Christian Mission, the student evangelism program of the National Council of Churches; the Church Peace Mission, Wider City Parish in New Haven, Conn., and Kirkridge, the nationally known retreat center in Pennsylvania.

A native of Pittsburgh, Dr. Nelson graduated magna cum laude from Princeton University. He studied at the University of Edinburgh in Scotland, McCormick Seminary in Chicago, Westminster College, and Yale University. His doctorate was awarded by Yale. Dr. Nelson is the author of seven books.

Who Controls The Hospitals?

There are more than 6,000 voluntary, non-profit hospitals in this country. Who runs them? The public!



Community hospitals were once just pest-houses for contagious disease victims. The president of the nation's first voluntary hospital was Benjamin Franklin who, in 1751, helped his friend, Dr. Thomas Bond, obtain a charter from the Crown.

Ever since, when a community has needed a hospital, its citizens have organized to raise funds, oversee construction and appoint a Board of Trustees or Governors. These trustees, serving without pay, must devote considerable time to their responsible positions. They must see that the hospital gives the best service at the lowest possible cost.



Hospital boards usually number 8 to 15 people, elected periodically. Each member contributes his own special skills. The contractor may check the plans for a new wing; the banker serve on the finance committee. Board members sometimes serve as Blue Cross trustees too. Blue Cross is the only health pre-payment plan that is also governed by the public on a completely voluntary, non-profit basis.

Dr. W. G. Cole To Speak At CMA Commencement



DR. WILLIAM G. COLE

Dr. William Graham Cole, president of Lake Forest (Ill.) College, will deliver the Commencement address to 205 graduating seniors at Culver Military Academy at 11 a.m. Monday, June 5.

Prior to his appointment as president of Lake Forest in Sept. 1960, Dr. Cole served for three years as dean of freshmen at Williams College, Williamstown, Mass.

Dr. Cole is a graduate of Mount Herman School and received his Bachelor of Arts from Columbia University in 1940. He received the degree of Bachelor of Divinity from Union Theological Seminary in 1943 and the degree of Doctor of Philosophy from Columbia University in 1954.

For three years between 1943 and 1946, Dr. Cole was assistant minister to the Presbyterian Church of the Covenant in Cleveland, and was chaplain and lecturer in Biblical literature at Western Reserve University during the same time. In the summer of 1946 he was visiting chaplain at Stanford University and later that year was appointed counselor to Protestant students at Columbia University.

Dr. Cole served as chaplain and assistant professor of religion and Biblical literature at Smith College from 1946 to 1952, prior to joining the faculty of Williams College as chaplain and associate professor of religion. In 1955 he was named Cluett Professor of Religion and chairman of the department.

Dr. Cole is the author of two books published in 1954 and 1959, and is a Fellow of the National Council on Religion in Higher Education.

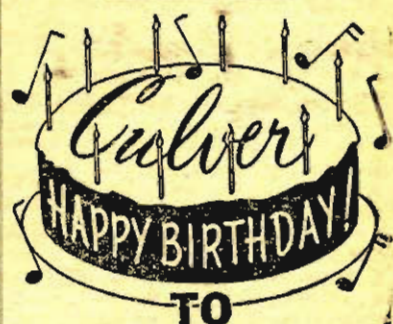

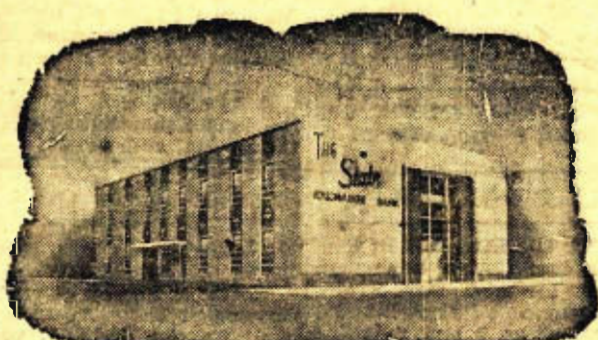

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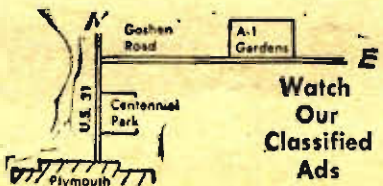
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
