Bishop Mallett To Visit St. Thomas' **Episcopal Church**



New Year's Day


New Year's Day is the first day of the calendar year. It is celebrated as a holiday in almost every country. Generally, church services are held, with parties before or after them. New Year's Day is a time of galety in the Orient. Homes a re decorated, and friends give each other gifts. In Europe, the day is celebrated

by family parties, the giving of gifts, and visiting with friends. In the United States, people attend church, go to the theater, or to various places of entertain-ment. Partles are held on New Year's Eve to "watch the old year out." At one time formal calls were made on New Year's Day, but this is no longer a general custom. Many persons hold "open house" on the afternoon or evening of New Year's Day. Their friends come to call, and refreshments are sometimes served. This custom is an informal way of continuing the formal calls which persons once made.

In ancient Rome, the first day of the year was given over to honoring Janus, the god of gates and doors and of beginnings and endings. The month of January was named after this god. Janus had two faces, and looked both ahead and backward. Romans gave each other presents on New Year's Day. Roman senators received flowers and fruits and sometimes beautiful materials from persons who wanted favors, Roman merchants carried this custom of giving gifts as far east as Persia, which is now Iran. There the ancient Iranians, or Persians, followed the custom giving eggs to their friends. Since an egg hatches into life, this custom meant much the same as turning over a new leaf" at the

beginning of a new year. New Year's Day became a holy day in the Christian Church in A. D. 487 when it was declared the Feast of the Circumcision. At first, parties were not allowed on this day because the pagans had followed that custom. The opening of the new year has been celebrated on many different days different countries. These days celebrated have included Christ-mas Day, Easter Day, March 1, and March 25, which is the time of the Feast of Annunciation.

Jan, 1 became generally recog-nized as New Year's Day in the 1500's when the Gregorian Calendar was introduced. The Julian Calendar places the first day of the year 13 days later, on Jan. 14. The Jewish New Year, a feast day, is celebrated about the time of the autumnal equinox, in late The Chinese September. used the Luwar Calendar for about 4,000 years. This is based on the waxing and waning of the moon. Today the Chinese use the Gre-gorian Calendar. Both the Chinese and Japanese people now celebrate New Year's Day on Jan. 1.
