Funeral Services Today For Mrs. Delila Smeltzer

Mrs. Delila Evaline Smeltzer, age 80, of 321 W. Madison St., Culver, died early Monday morning, Dec. 25, at Parkview Hospital, Plymouth, where she had been a patient for 20 days. She had been ill for three years.

Born in Hamilton County Aug. 29, 1881, she was married to Harry A. Smeltzer on Dec. 18, 1901. They made their home in Hamilton County until 1924 when they came to Culver to reside. Mrs. Smeltzer was a member of the Church of the Brethren.

Surviving with her husband are one son, Raymond W. Smeltzer, Winamac; three daughters, Mrs. Anna Mae Cultice and Mrs. Marie Cultice both of Culver and Mrs. Ruth Miller of South Bend. There are eight grandchildren and 15 great grandchildren.

Funeral services were held at 2 p.m. today at the Easterday Funeral Home in Culver. Rev. Homer Kiracofe, pastor of the Plymouth Church of the Brethren, was assisted by Rev. Eldon Morehouse, pastor of the Union Church of the Brethren. Burial was at the Culver Masonic Cemetery.

Fires Damage Two Area Homes Last Week

Culver Firemen were called to the Frank Fisher home at 504 East Shore Drive at 8:15 p.m. Thursday where fire of undetermined origin caused damage estimated at \$1,039.

Firemen said the blaze started in the store room and they were able to confine it to the one room, but minor smoke damage was done to the other rooms.

The house is owned by the Culver Military Academy and Mr. Fisher is the caretaker for the Academy Apartments.

Another fire at 7:25 a.m. Friday destroyed a clothes dryer in the Guy Flosenzler, Sr., residence on West 14th road four miles north of Culver.

Mrs. Flosenzler called the Culver Fire Department when she smelled smoke. Upon investigation she found that the clothes dryer was on fire. She awakened her four-year-old daughter and rushed outside. The house was quickly filled with smoke.

Minor smoke damage was caused to the house but the dryer was destroyed. Firemen said that Mrs. Flosenzler had put a bed spread in the dryer shortly before the fire occurred.

Christmas Volume Of Mail Greater Than Last Year

Fine Job Done At Post Office

The staff of the local Post Office certainly deserves great praise for the speed and efficiency with which they handled the voluminous Christmas mail the past month.

Postmaster E. Wayne Mattox reports that approximately 5,000 more letter size cancellations were made this year, in the 15-day period preceding Christmas, than were made last year when the estimated total of letter and greeting cards was 120,000.

During the period from Dec. 1 to Dec. 24, a total of 444,100 pieces of mail, incoming and outgoing, were handled by the regular staff with only one additional helper.

The regular staff consists of Wayne Mattox, postmaster; Harold Fitterling, assistant postmaster; William Washburn, Ernest "Bus" Carter, and Jerry Jones, clerks; Larry Lowry and James Jones, city carriers; Roger Wise, clerk-carrier; Hall Wilson, Route 1 carrier; Dean Manchester, substitute Route 1 carrier; Ronald Mackey, Route 2 carrier; Ray Houghton, substitute Route 2 carrier; and Earl Eckman and Norman Scruggs, custodians. The assistant Christmas clerk was David Middleton.

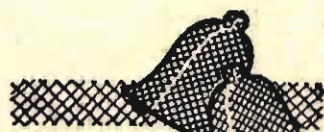

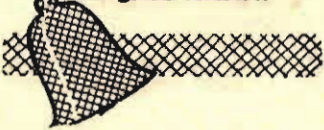

James Green died Wednesday evening at 8 o'clock after being seriously ill for some time.

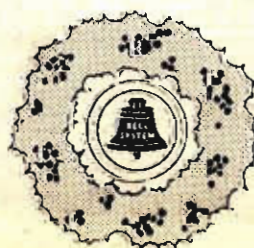
