854 Students Enroll For Fall Term At CMA

Formal opening of the seventieth academic year at Culver Military Academy will be marked Sunday, Sept. 15, during special religious services in Memorial Chapel.

An academic procession of 113 members of the faculty and administrative staff will highlight the 10:30 services to be conducted by the Rev. Allen F. Bray, III, Academy chaplain.

Classes began Tuesday, Sept. 10, for 854 students enrolled in the college preparatory school. Enrolled this year are 271 new boys, and there are 549 students returning from last year to continue Culver's position as the largest boys' boarding school of its type in the nation. In addition, there are 34 day students.

Prior to the opening of classes Tuesday, new students and enter officers were on campus for a week of indoctrination classes.

School Officials Urge Kindergarten Registration

The first week of school resulted in an enrollment of 227 pupils in Grades 1-12 at Aubbeenaubee School and 941 at Culver for a total of 1168 enrolled in the two schools of the Culver Community Schools Corporation. Approximately seventy additional pupils of North Bend Township are enrolled at Knox, and two Seniors are enrolled at Monterey. This would indicate a total number of resident pupils of approximately 1240.

Anticipating a kindergarten enrollment too large for the usual division into two sections, school officials had planned to divide the kindergarten into four sections, with the pupils to have only one semester of work. At present the total number of kindergarten pupils enrolled for the 1963-64 term would make it possible to divide the group into two sections. This would enable each section to have a full year of kindergarten. With this possibility in mind, Culver's elementary principal, Shelton Kaiser, is attempting to determine the total number of pupils that would attend kindergarten this year if each section could have a full year instead of one semester. School officials therefore would like to have any parents with children eligible for this year's kindergarten to register these pupils this week if the parents plan to have such children attend at any time during this school term. Such additional registrations must be made with Mr. Kaiser this week. If the total 1963-64 registration would indicate that only two sections would be needed, it may be possible for kindergarten pupils to have a full-year's program. A child must have been five years of age before September first to be eligible. In order to determine whether the total group can be divided into two sections on a full-year basis, the school officials must set the deadline for kindergarten registration for the 1963-64 term as Friday, September 13th. No additional registrations would be received after that date if a decision is made to operate on a full-year basis.

Aubbeenaubee totals by grades are as follows, with last year's totals in parentheses: Grades 1-6, 113 (124); Grades 7-8, 40 (36); Grades 9-12, 74 (74); totals, 227 (234).

Culver School totals by grades are as follows: Grades 1-6, 513 (509); Grades 7-8, 163 (140); Grades 9-12, 265 (237); totals, 941 (886).

The totals for the two schools indicate enrollments for different grade levels as follows: Grades 1-6, 626 (633); Grades 7-8, 203 (170); Grades 9-12, 339 (311); totals 1-12, 1168 (1126).

Aubbeenaubee School total for Grades 1-12 of 227 shows a decrease of seven pupils from a year ago. Culver's total of 941 indicates an increase of 35 over last year's initial enrollment.

The Home, the Fraternity's major benevolent project, provides residence for destitute aged members of the Eastern Star and Masons, their widows and orphans.

A formal program, beginning at 1:30 p.m., will be presented. This will include a band concert by the Sahara Grotto Band of Indianapolis and songs by the Rite Notes, a quartet from Scottish Rite Cathedral in Indianapolis.

The program also features presentations by members of Job's Daughters, Rainbow Girls and DeMolay Boys from throughout the state.

The Grand Master of Masons in Indiana, Judge Arthur A. Osburn of Marion, has issued an invitation to all Masons to attend and bring their friends. Non-Masons are cordially invited according to Judge Osburn.

Since the Masonic Home received its first guest in October, 1916, more than 4,000 Masons, their wives, widows and orphans have found refuge at the establishment which is located on 320 acres at the south side of the City of Franklin. More than 450 men, women and children now live at the Home, including some 200 patients in the Home Hospital.

The Home is owned by the Grand Lodge F.&A.M. of Indiana. It is administered strictly as a charitable institution by a 14-member Board of Directors. Roy O. Turner, Jr., is the Home Superintendent. Lowell C. Stanley is the administrative assistant while William G. Hibbs, M.D., is the medical director of the Hospital.
