School Function Revisions Conform With Curfew Law

In an effort to effect a more clear understanding of the enforcement of the curfew law, the Culver Town Board of Trustees explains that Culver is conforming to the State of Indiana 11:00 p.m. curfew requirement for those under the age of 18.

Local school officials in cooperation with the Town will make revisions in evening scheduled school functions in order to conform to the requirement.

There are few exceptions to the curfew requirement which states that after 11:00 p.m. an under age youth shall be in the company of his parents or legal guardian only. According to the Sheriff's department of Marshall County, there are no exceptions and the rule applies on weekends as well as during the week.

Actually the curfew rule affects only a few, but for those few who do in too many instances disregard the regulation, then the parent should understand, according to police officials, "Our practice will be to issue a warning on the first offense, on the second, the offender will be held", the Culver police said.

Kathy DeWitt Named "Co-ed" Correspondent

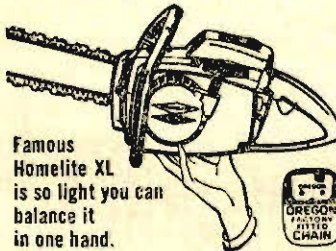

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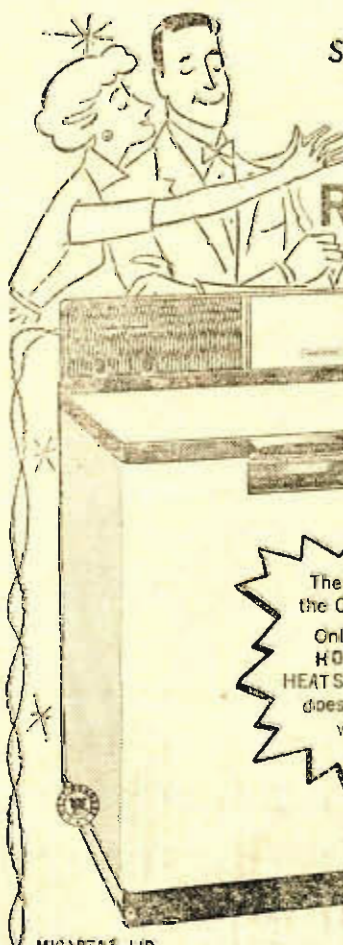

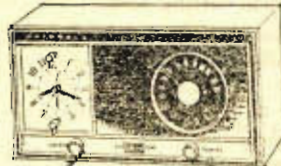

Indiana Bell Rates To Be Reduced Jan. 1

Indiana Bell rates will be reduced more than \$1 million a year beginning Jan. 1, the Public Service Commission of Indiana announced today.

Chairman Merton Stanley said the reduction was determined in meetings between company officials and the three commissioners -- Phillip Bayt, Patrick Clancy and Stanley -- and was brought about by a transfer of plant and revenue requirements from intrastate to interstate.

The rate changes will lower charges for two-party residential telephone service, color phones, volume control phones, foreign exchange service and constructing telephone plant to remote locations.

Telephone users also will benefit from a change in the timing allowance on intrastate long distance calls and the calling allowance on measured business service.

The joint action of the Commission and Indiana Bell will result in the company's fifth major rate reduction in four years and will save telephone users in 132 exchanges an estimated \$1,075,000 annually. Reductions in monthly charges will be effective with billing periods on and after Jan. 1.

Almost 140,000 Bell customers will realize savings from 15, 20 and 25-cent reductions in the monthly rate for residence service on two-party lines. The amount varies by exchange rate classifications, which are based on the size of local calling areas.

Monthly rates for two-party residential service in urban areas now range from \$3.65 to \$5.50. The new range will be from \$3.50 to \$5.25.

The 25-cent reduction will apply in the 17 Bell exchanges in the Indianapolis metropolitan area; the 20-cent reduction in the Anderson, Chesterfield, Evansville, Gaston, Jeffersonville, Middletown, Muncie, New Albany, Osceola, South Bend-Mishawaka and Yorktown exchanges; and the 15-cent reduction in 100 smaller exchanges.

Two-party rates will not be changed in Culver, where charges already are below the standard rate classifications.

The one-time charge for a color phone will be reduced from \$9 to \$2 for phones with no or one key and from \$12 to \$3 for multi-key phones. The latter usually are used by businessmen.

A special charge for volume control phones, which amplify conversations for handicapped persons, will be reduced from \$1.25 to 50 cents monthly.

Long distance charges will be reduced approximately \$286,000 a year by a change in the intrastate timing allowance on calls handled by operators. This allowance -- an interval for which the telephone user is not charged to

compensate for the time it takes an operator to disconnect -- will be increased from five to 15 seconds.

Construction charges to provide regular service to remotely-located telephone users will be eliminated on public right-of-way and on the first 1,000 feet of private right-of-way. This change accommodates population growth in suburban areas.

The calling allowance on measured business service will be increased -- to permit 100 outward calls monthly, instead of 80, without additional charge -- and the mileage rate for foreign exchange service will be reduced from \$4 to \$3.50 monthly per airline mile. The latter service permits local dialing to a distant phone beyond

the local calling area.

Indiana Bell's basic monthly rates for residential customers were reduced in 1964, and long distance charges for all customers were reduced in 1962, 1963 and 1965.

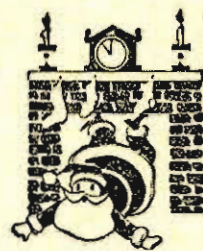
