Baker of Culver; and nine grandchildren.

Services will be held at 2 p.m. today, May 12, at the Burr Oak Church of God, where she was a member, with the pastor, Rev. Ellsworth Routsen, officiating. Burial will be made in the Burr Oak Cemetery.

Canoe Regatta On Lake Maxinkuckee Saturday, May 13

Canoeists will be converging on Lake Maxinkuckee Saturday, May 13, for Culver Military Academy's second annual canoe regatta.

The Academy will supply canoes, kayaks, paddles and life jackets in an attempt to promote the sport among beginners as well as experienced amateurs. Trial heats will begin at 8:30, and races will be paddled until about 5:30 p.m.

Half-mile races are scheduled for single canoe and kayak, two-man canoe, mixed doubles and war canoes. Other events include a 200-yard two-man slalom, jousting, a one-mile C-4 or four-man canoe race, and two 2-mile events called the Redskin Scramble for Sawyer canoes and Grumman and Old Towns.

William P. Garrison, founder of the race and its four-year-old sister, the Tippecanoe River Marathon, said that the contests will be relatively short "so that the emphasis can be on having fun and introducing the sport to novices. The Olympic philosophy of stressing the individual effort rather than the team will prevail."

Garrison added, "Canoeing is not only a great sport for the young, but it has a lifetime carry-over. The Olympic Committee is beating the bushes for canoeists and are aiming for 1972. This is probably the easiest sport in which to break into the Olympic level."

MARINE PHIL SCRUGGS SAVES BUDDY FROM OCEAN DEATH

Pfc. Phillip Scruggs, son of Mr. and Mrs. N. M. Scruggs, 311 S. Main St., who is attending DelMar College at the Marine Corp Recruiting Depot at San Diego, Calif., was credited with saving the life of another Marine on Friday, May 5, while swimming in the Pacific Ocean, near their Marine base, according to the telephone conversation Mrs. Scruggs had with her son.

It seems a group of Marines were on the beach and this nameless Marine, Mrs. Scruggs neglected to obtain his name, went in swimming ahead of the others. Phil noticed that his fellow-Marine wasn't in sight, so he went into the water to look for him and found that he was caught in the strong undercurrent of the ocean. Phillip had fortunately had a course in life saving at the Culver Military Academy Summer School which enabled him to save his buddy, as well as himself.

The Marine was brought back upon the beach and the other Marines helped to revive him.

Rev. James M Strauss of Memphis, Tenn., will conduct special youth meetings at the Culver

Bible Church located at 718 S. Main St. from May 14 to 19 at 7:30 p.m.

Highlighted on each program will be a singspiration, audience participation contest, Scripture illustrated by "black light" oil-painted Bible scenes. Rev. Strauss brings his audience pictures from mountains, forest, and jungles, pointing out analogies between the natural and spiritual worlds. Skilled in the use of Gospel magic to illustrate Bible truths, he uses sleight-of-hand both to attract and instruct the youth and adults.

Mr. Strauss represents the Youth Gospel Crusade, Inc. of Westboro, Wis., a missionary organization dedicated to the giving of the Gospel to the unreached, and serving churches of all evangelical denominations from coast to coast.

Personal Property Tax Assessment Forms Due May 15

SLEEPING WELL

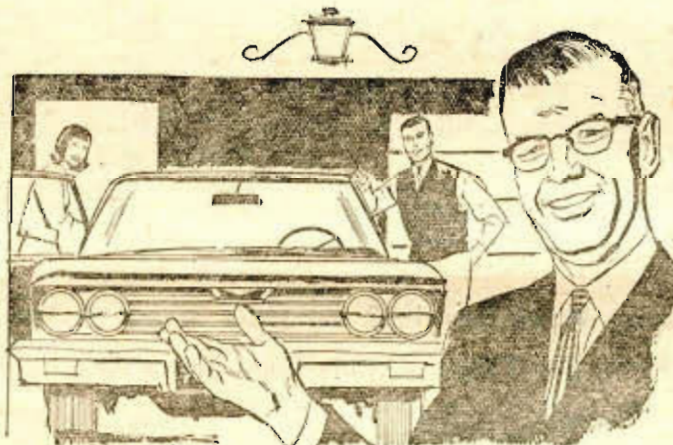
WHY not sleep comfy?

Many people have the notion that is healthy to sleep cold. When they retire, they open wide the windows, regardless of the temperature outside, and then crawl under a mound of covers. People are just as well off when they sleep in a warm room with fewer covers.

During sleep, many functions of the body are slowed down and the body can use all the help it can get in the way of normal surroundings. The body temperature is reduced during sleep as is the activity of the heat-regulating system. The pulse is slower, blood pressure lower and the rate of breathing is slower during sleep. Although the function of digestion continues, there is a reduction in the rate of metabolism.

Fresh air enthusiasts are likely to open windows at night. There are others who close all windows to keep out the night air, which they consider unwholesome. It is important to have some air circulating in the room while sleeping, and opening a window a small distance usually should suffice.

One of the few functions of the body that is particularly active during sleep is that of sweat secretion. Sleeping under the weight of many covers to keep warm adds to the amount of perspiration excreted while asleep.

BIRTHMARKS

A BIRTHMARK on a baby often causes much consternation to the parents.

A birthmark seldom causes trouble, except when it remains as a blemish to cause future embarrassment. Strawberry marks or raspberry marks are elevated red or purplish areas which vary in size from a fraction of an inch to two inches in diameter. The discoloration is due to excessive minute blood vessels in an area or to an unusual distribution of skin coloring.

Considerable diversity of opinion exists regarding treatment of birthmarks. Several methods are used for the removal of unsightly blemishes depending on type, size and location. Carbon dioxide snow, electric cautery, x-rays, skin-grafting and tattooing have all been applied with more or less success.

Many physicians have observed the tendency for strawberry marks in infants to disappear of their own accord. A recent study of 100 cases of strawberry marks on infants disclosed that 97% completely disappeared or faded to a point almost invisible.

This spontaneous disappearing type of mark grows rapidly during the first three to six months of life, then stops and begins to fade. Removal or covering of a birthmark that permanently blemishes a face brings relief from a disturbing awareness of the mark.

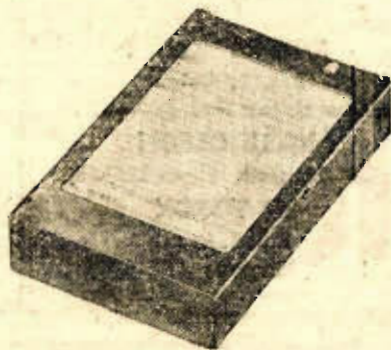

Law Day, 1967

On May 1, I was very honored to be a member of the group which represented Marshall County at ceremonies in Indianapolis commemorating Law Day. The day's program was sponsored and planned by the Indiana State Bar Association, and it was very educational and very enjoyable.

The day's program began in the Indiana Statehouse. The group of 150-or-so students and their sponsoring lawyers gathered in the Supreme Court chambers to hear a mock argument before the Court. The case that was argued was Gideon v. Wainwright, and it concerned an accused person's right to have counsel appointed by the court if he, the accused, was charged with a felony and was too poor to pay a lawyer. The case was originally argued before the U.S. Supreme Court, and its presentation before our group was spirited and informative.

After the courtroom session concluded we went to the Indiana Teachers Association building, across the street from the Statehouse, for the noon luncheon. The Liberty Bell Award, presented each year to a citizen who exemplifies the highest ideals of citizenship and patriotism, this year went to Dr. J. Bowers. Year before last, when a call was made for physicians to serve in Vietnam, Dr. Bowers left his private practice and his family to give 16 months of service to the people of that war-torn country. Dr. Bowers' acceptance speech was straightforward and very challenging.

The main speaker at the luncheon, though, was the new dean of the Indiana University Law School, Dean Fred Harvey. Dean Harvey spoke to us on civil disobedience, a very appropriate topic for Law Day. His speech was very scholarly, and it seemed to me to show the fine logic so necessary for a career in law.

After the luncheon session, Judge Rakestraw (a former member of the Indiana Supreme Court) took us three students back to the Statehouse. We visited the Senate and House chambers, and saw the Governor's office; then we went to the Municipal Building to see some of the Marion County courts. We were, of course, limited by time, and after we visited the Municipal Building we returned to Marshall County.

I would like to thank Tom Huff, president of the Marshall County Bar Association, and Judge Rakestraw, of Rochester, for making it possible for me to participate in the Law Day program. I would like to especially thank Judge Rakestraw for personally introducing us to his former colleagues who are on the Supreme Court. Considering everything, I had a very enjoyable and worthwhile experience on Law Day, 1967.

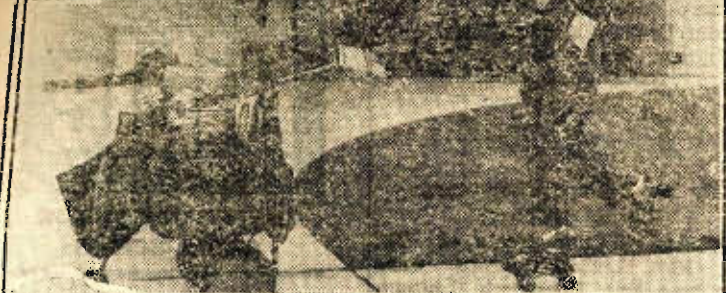
