## Culver School Appointments Announced

Three appointments to staff positions in the Culver Community Schools and one advancement were announced by Robert Rust, Superintendent, here this week. John R. Hayes has been named principal, Culver High School; Charles Downing, Administrative Assistant; A. Judson Dillon, Guidance; and Ruth Shanks, Guidance, part time.

As principal of Culver High School, Mr. Hayes succeeds Charles Bernhardt who has resigned to accept a Ball State University Graduate Fellowship. A native of Crawfordsville, Mr. Hayes, has been a member of the staff at Frontier High School (Brookston, Indiana) for thirteen years and principal there the past ten years.

A graduate of Wabash College, he received his master's degree at Purdue where he had continued further graduate studies. In the U.S. Army from 1950 through 1952, he has been professionally associated with N.E.A., I.S.T.A., F.C.T.A., N.A.S.S.P., and I.A.J.-H.S.P. He is a member of the F. & A.M. No. 66, Post 256, American Legion, and the Presbyterian Church. Mr. and Mrs. Hayes, parents of a son, age 7, will move to Culver this summer.

Mr. Downing comes to Culver from Mapleton, Colorado, where he has served in a school administrative capacity. Assigned to purchasing, transportation and Federal programs in his new post here, he will begin work next month on a part time basis until he completes graduate studies at Purdue, August 16. Jerome Friedrich, who last month had accepted the Administrative Assistantship, asked to be relieved of his acceptance notice because of personal circumstances. His request was granted.

Mr. Downing is a graduate of the University of Denver and Purdue University. In addition he completed further studies at Purdue and Carnegie Institute of Technology.

He taught in the Espanola, N.M. Schools for four years, principal of Aztec, N.M. School for nine years, and he has been associated with the Mapleton School, Denver, Colorado, since 1962.

He is a member of the San Juan F. & A.M., the United Presbyterian Church, N.E.A., C.E.A., and he is president of the Colorado Boy Counselors' Assn. Mrs. Downing is secretary of the school district at Mapleton.

Mr. Dillon, well known in this locality, is a graduate of Culver High School. For the past five years he has been a member of the teaching staff of the South Bend City Schools, and for the past two years he has been on the John Adams High School staff. As Guidance instructor at Culver, he succeeds Jack Miller, who goes to Shields High School, Seymour, Indiana, in August.

Mr. Dillon has completed both undergraduate and graduate work at Purdue University. He is attending graduate school there this summer. He is a member of the I.S.T.A., N.E.A., S.B.-C.E.A., Henry H. Culver Chapter, F. & A.M., and is president of the Consistory, Grace United Church of Christ. He and Mrs. Dillon are parents of two daughters and a son, all honor graduates of Culver High School.

## Miss Clara Stahl Dies Suddenly At Age 78

Miss Clara R. Stahl, 78, 424 Forest Place, Culver, died at 7:30 p.m. Wednesday, June 14, at Memorial Hospital, South Bend, Ind. She became ill while having lunch at a South Bend restaurant earlier in the day, and was taken to the hospital.

Miss Stahl was born on March 16, 1889, in Culver, to Louis F. and Anna C. (Wolfram) Stahl. She was a Certified Public Accountant and lived in Chicago prior to her retirement nearly 12 years ago. Since that time, she has resided with her two sisters, Misses Edna C. and Osie M. Stahl, in Culver. She was a member of the Culver Grace United Church of Christ, and the Emily Jane Culver Chapter, Order of Eastern Star.

Following graduation, Phi Beta Kappa, from the University of Michigan, Miss Stahl spent several years working in Eastern colleges.

In Chicago, she lived over 20 years at Hull House where she was closely associated with Miss Jane Addams, founder of that noted settlement house.

Miss Stahl received her certificate as a Certified Public Accountant in Illinois, the second woman to become a CPA in that state.

Other survivors include a sister-in-law and several nieces and nephews in the West.

Funeral services were held at 2 p.m. on Sunday, June 18, at the Culver Grace United Church of Christ with the pastor, Rev. Harold Hohman, officiating. Burial was made in the Zion Cemetery, southwest of Culver.

The Easterday-Bonine Funeral Home, Culver, was in charge of the arrangements.

Miss Shanks, member of the Culver staff for the past sixteen years as an instructor in commerce, will assist in guidance, grades 7 - 12, on a part time basis. She taught in the West Township High School for eight years before coming to Culver. Miss Shanks has served as Sunshine Society sponsor at Culver for several years.

She holds both the Bachelor's and Master's degrees from Indiana University. President of the Culver City Club, she has been actively associated in the Business and Professional Womens' Club, Federated Clubs, and as an officer of the I.S.T.A., and N.E.A., on local, state and national levels. She was president of the local Classroom Teachers' Association in 1966-67.

## Park Board Appoints Director, Announces Swimming Lessons

The Culver Board of Parks and Recreation has appointed Miss Mildred Brickey as Water Front Director for the Town Park. Miss Brickey is an honor graduate of Ft. Hays Kansas State College and is fully accredited by the National Red Cross to direct water safety and teach swimming. She was a member of many campus organizations and was listed in Who's Who Among Students in American Universities and Colleges. She is already on the job and will serve until Labor Day.

David Kelly is now completing training at the Red Cross Aquatic School. Upon his return the town will have two full-time, qualified water front workers. Randy Wakefield serves as part-time life guard, working on weekends and holidays. Schedules are arranged so that all three workers are on duty during weekends and holidays.

Swimming lessons will be offered in two sessions, June 26-July 28 and July 31-Sept. 1. Children attending public school will be excused from the final lessons of the second session. The schedule will be:

BEGINNERS, age 3-6, 9 A.M. Monday, Wednesday, and Friday. ADVANCED BEGINNERS, age 7-9, 10 A.M. Monday, Wednesday, and Friday.

INTERMEDIATE, age 10-12, 11 A.M. Monday, Wednesday, and Friday.

JUNIOR LIFE SAVING, age 12 and finished 7th grade, 9 A.M. Tuesday and Thursday.

SENIOR LIFE SAVING, age 16 and finished grade 10, 10:30 A.M. Tuesday and Thursday.

Classes will meet at the west life guard stand at the announced hour for their class. Children will finally be placed in their proper class on the basis of ability as well as age. Parents are urged to register their children by June 24 for the 1st session. There will be no charge for the lessons. Registration blanks may be obtained from any of the life guards.

## Tippecanoe Twp. To Be Annexed To Culver Schools

Tippecanoe Township of Pulaski County will be annexed to the Culver Community Schools according to substantially identical resolutions adopted by the Board of School Trustees of the Pulaski County School Corporation and the Culver Community Schools Corporation in meetings at Winamac and Culver, respectively, this week.

The action follows several months of study and discussion. Legal steps to disannex Tippecanoe Township, Pulaski County, from the Pulaski School Corporation and to annex it to the Culver School District are being taken this week.

The adopted resolutions point out that the entire territory of Tippecanoe Township is involved. The annexation will become effective August 1, 1967, or on the 31st day following the second of two publications of the notice as required by law.

The agreement provides that Culver will accept upon transfer, in event pupils so desire, those students who reside in Harrison Township and/or Franklin Township, Pulaski County, and who will be in their eleventh and twelfth year of school and have attended the High School at Monterey. This will continue for a period of two years, with Pulaski County honoring and paying transfers so requested.

Culver, in the agreement, has agreed to grant transfers to those who request such transfers for the 1967-68 school year for an area described as Sections 30 and 31 and parts of Sections 29 and 32, on an individual basis. The resolutions provide that the surviving corporation will take title to the school property in Tippecanoe Township, and it shall assume bonded indebtedness originating from the former Tippecanoe Township School and the Tippecanoe Civil Aid Bonds.

The mutual agreement provides for the pro-rating of income from taxes and state distribution based upon percentage ratios of existing valuation and the average daily attendance. Book rental arrangement will be carried out through the Pulaski County School Corporation for a period of two years.

Signing the resolution for the respective School Boards were Walter Johnson, President, Culver Community School Board of Trustees, and Leo Siemens, President, Pulaski County School Board. Charles Brucker, Trustee, Tippecanoe Township, is a member of the Pulaski County School Board.

"If the annexation should be realized, High School will be conducted at Monterey for the next year or until such a time as the new unified high school building, now under construction near Culver is completed," Robert Rust, Culver Superintendent, said.

When and if the new corporation becomes a reality, steps will be taken to provide for representation from Tippecanoe Township on the Culver Community School Board.

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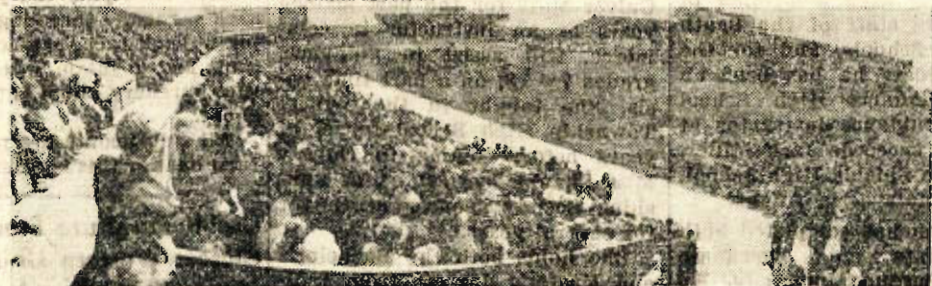

## Notice of Adoption of Annexation Resolution by School Corporations

Notice is hereby given that on the 19th day of June, 1967, the Board of School Trustees of Pulaski County School Corporation, and the Board of School Trustees of Culver Community Schools Corporation passed substantially identical annexation resolutions pursuant to the power granted by the Acts of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana, being Acts of 1963, Chapter 296, providing that that portion of the area within the geographical boundaries of Pulaski County School Corporation of Pulaski County, Indiana, that is known and recorded as Tippecanoe Township, Pulaski County, Indiana, should be and subject to the effective date of the annexation herein resolved, annexed and merged into Culver Community Schools Corporation and that from and after the effective date of the annexation such portion of the area within the geographical boundaries of Pulaski County School Corporation, known and recorded as Tippecanoe Township, Pulaski County, Indiana, would no longer be a part of Pulaski County School Corporation but would become a part of the Culver Community Schools Corporation. The sections of the resolution complying with the provision of the state above referred to read as follows:

### SECTION 2.

The area which will be lost to Pulaski County School Corporation and which will be annexed by Culver Community Schools Corporation is comprised of the entire territory of and has the same boundaries as the geographic and political territory known as Tippecanoe Township, Pulaski County, Indiana.

### SECTION 3.

This annexation shall become effective on the 1st day of August, 1967, or on the 31st day following the second of the two (2) publications of notice required by said Act, whichever is later.

### SECTION 4.

When this annexation becomes effective Pulaski County School Corporation shall have no further jurisdiction over the school children residing in the area annexed and that portion of the territory hereinabove described and heretofore embraced within the jurisdiction of Pulaski County School Corporation shall cease and said territory hereinabove described shall become a constituent part of Culver Community Schools Corporation as above described. As a part of said annexation it is understood that the annexing corporation shall be responsible for all resident school children of said area being annexed. That in addition thereto the Culver Community Schools Corporation has agreed that it will accept upon transfer, in the event the pupils so desire, those students who reside in Harrison Township and/or Franklin Township, Pulaski County, Indiana, and who will be in their eleventh or twelfth year of school and who have heretofore been attending the school at Monterey, Indiana, and that said annexing corporation will furnish transportation for such students from Harrison and Franklin Townships from the respective township lines to the high school the pupils will be attending. That this will continue for a period of two (2) years and at the end of said two-year period Culver Community Schools Corporation will be under no obligation to accept transfers of students from Harrison Township and Franklin Township, Pulaski County, Indiana, and that all transfers will then be dealt with on an individual basis. For such two (2) years, Pulaski County School Corporation agrees that it will honor and pay transfers so requested by the students so residing in Harrison Township and/or Franklin Township, Pulaski County, Indiana, and who come within the category as above described and who request transfers to the Culver Community Schools Corporation.

### SECTION 5.

Assets and Liabilities shall upon the effective date of this annexation be divided as follows:

1. The annexing corporation shall take title to all the school property located in Tippecanoe Township consisting of real estate, buildings, contents and buses shown on a schedule now on file in the Office of each School Superintendent. The consideration being the assumption by the acquiring corporation of the debts originating from the School Township of Tippecanoe, to-wit, the outstanding bonds, and the terms and conditions of this Resolution for the education of the children.
2. Public records indicating assessed valuation of all taxable property situated within the territory of the Pulaski County School Corporation reveal that 10.5% of such property is located in Tippecanoe Township. The acquiring school corporation shall receive a sum equal to 10.5% of 5/12 of all property taxes assessed in 1966 and payable in 1967 for the benefit of Pulaski County School Corporation. By compromise it has been agreed that the taxpayers of Tippecanoe Township have an interest in the present working balance of Pulaski County School Corporation in the sum of \$7,000.00 which said sum shall be paid to the acquiring corporation by Pulaski County School Corporation. The acquiring school corporation shall receive the unexpended balance of taxes collected in 1967 and appropriated for the payment of the bonds and interest being assumed by the terms of the Resolution. At least 2/3 of the amount estimated to be due the acquiring corporation shall be paid to it on or before October 1, 1967, with final settlement as soon after the Pulaski County School Corporation receives its December draw as possible.
3. All state distribution of school funds to Pulaski County School Corporation, the formula for which has heretofore been approved for 1967, shall be pro-rated as of the effective date of the annexation. This shall be done on a basis of 14.5% of five twelfths of the state funds so received during the entire year 1967, it having been determined from public records of the A. D. A. (Average Daily Attendance) that this represents the proportionate share of the average daily attendance of those students being educated in the Monterey School. Since this proportion will change for the school year of 1967-68 an adjustment will be made for the last 5/12 of the year based upon the A. D. A. Formula for the ensuing school year as it applies to the relationship between the A. D. A. for Pulaski County School Corporation and the A. D. A. for the Monterey School, for pupils from Pulaski County, Indiana. Such adjustment to be made as soon as figures are available. Approximately 2/3 of the amount estimated to be due the acquiring corporation shall be paid

it on or before October 1, 1967, and the balance as near December 31, 1967, as the figures are available.

4. The book rental arrangements of the Pulaski County School Corporation, while an extra-curricular school activity, will be handled pursuant to an agreement reduced to writing, a copy of which is on file in the office of the Superintendents of each of the two corporations as hereinafter set out.

5. Current operating expenses and/or indebtedness shall be pro-rated as of the effective date of the annexation by the annexing corporation assuming (1) all expenses of the real and personal property coming to the annexing corporation, and (2) all contractual obligations that would apply to the physical property coming to the annexing corporation and the education of the children attending schools of the annexing corporation. Such annexing corporation agrees to grant transfers to those who request such transfers for the school year 1967-68 for the area included in Sections 30, 31 and that part of Sections 29 and 32 west of the blacktop road all in Township 31 North, Range 1 West, on an individual basis.

6. The annexing corporation shall assume all bonded indebtedness which originated from the former School Township of Tippecanoe and the Tippecanoe Civil Aid School Bonds, together with the accrued interest thereon and as part of the consideration shall receive the unexpended balance of taxes collected and appropriated for the payment of principal and interest as specified in Section 5 (2) herein.

7. The local 1967 taxes, payable in 1968, for the Tippecanoe Township area and the State Distribution of School Funds for 1968 for the Tippecanoe Township area shall be made to Culver Community Schools Corporation.

8. In consideration of the acquisition of property and assets by Culver Community Schools Corporation, said corporation shall be responsible for the proper education of the children of the area comprising Tippecanoe Township, Pulaski County, and the right and obligation to determine and develop the educational facilities for the area.

9. A schedule of assets, liabilities and supporting documents are on file and may be examined in the offices of the Superintendent of Culver Community Schools Corporation and in the office of the Superintendent of Pulaski County School Corporation in Culver and Winamac, respectively.

RESOLVED this 19th day of June, 1967.

The Statute provides that the right of remonstrance exists as set out in the statute and that a statement notifying interested parties of the right to remonstrate shall be set out in the notice. The procedure remonstrators must follow is set out in the statute above referred to.

The annexation shall take effect within thirty (30) days after the second publication of the notice or at the time provided in the resolution, whichever is later, unless within such period a remonstrance is filed as provided by the statute.

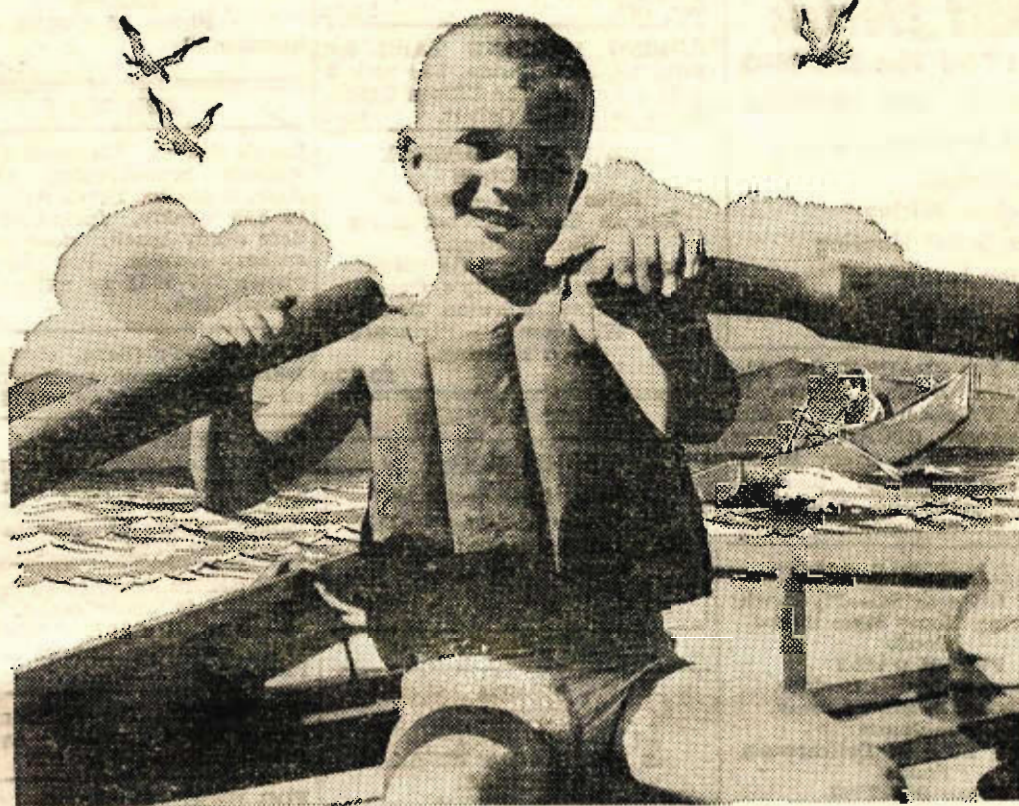

## Brief History Of The Christian Science Church

Christian Science traces its beginnings to a spiritual healing experienced by Mary Baker Eddy in 1866 in Lynn, Mass. Turning to the Bible as her only hope, she found herself suddenly recovered from severe injuries received in a fall.

In 1875, after several more years of searching and testing, she completed a book called "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures." Christian Scientists use it as their denominational textbook in connection with their study of the Bible and their application of basic Christian insights to every aspect of existence.

Four years after publication of the book, a group of students voted to organize a church that would "reinstat primitive Christianity and its lost element of healing."

A Church Manual, written by Mrs. Eddy, was first issued in 1895 to provide a basic framework of church government and guidelines for the continued expansion of the movement. Included are provisions for branch churches, publishing activities, and a five-member Board of Directors to administer affairs of The Mother Church, The First Church of Christ, Scientist, in Boston, Mass.

Each branch church is democratically self-governed, elects its own Readers to conduct services, maintains its own Christian Science Reading Room in the community, and sponsors public lectures. Many churches also participate in work at prisons, mental hospitals, and other institutions.

Today, there are 3300 of these branch churches and societies in existence. This includes 2700 in the United States; several hundred throughout Europe; nearly 200 more in Canada, Australia and New Zealand; 35 in Latin America; and more than 50 others in Ghana, Nigeria, Zambia, South Africa, India, Japan, Indonesia, and other nations of Africa and Asia.

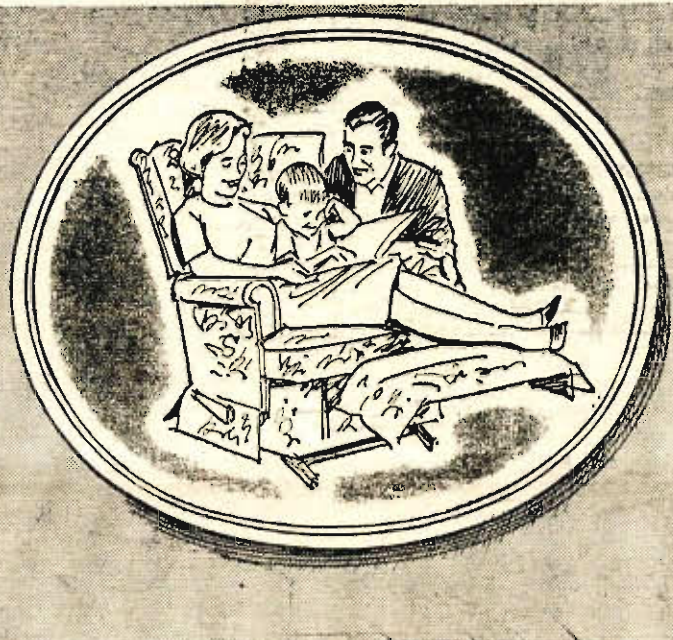

# Let's Go Boating

by Chuck Stearns  
 ("Fastest Man on Water Skis" set the world record at 119.52 mph on water skis. Has been Mens National and World Champion)

"How does it feel to water ski at 119.52 mph?"

"Weren't you afraid of getting hurt?"

These are the questions so often asked of me as holder of the World Speed Record on Water Skis.

I can say without hesitation that it has been the greatest thrill I have ever known. Yes, I thought about the possibility of getting hurt, and remembering the guys before me who tried for the speed record and were hurt made it even harder. But you just have to make up your mind that you could get hurt. The chances of injury are very great at those speeds. I've taken some spills, but so far I've been lucky enough not to break anything, except my heart a few times when I lost.

With the exception of daredevils, water skiing is a very safe sport. Skiers who ski for fun and competition skiers seldom get hurt at normal speeds. Most accidents are entirely unnecessary and could have been avoided.

To insure a safe and happy introduction to the fun world of water skiing, it isn't necessary that you have professional instruction. You will get by without lessons if you will always remember a few very important rules.

1. Always ski with people who already know how to ski. Every skiing party should include at least three persons: 1) the skier 2) the driver -- it's important that he be experienced as it takes special know-how to tow a water skier 3) an observer who has enough experience to be able to tell when a skier is in trouble and to know what to do.

Of equal importance is good equipment: 1) a jacket that won't come apart under impact and will give you good flotation, 2) a strong ski line, about 75 ft. long, with a good, standard handle, 3) good skis with snug, tight bindings and no sharp objects that might cause injury.

Select a place where the water is calm; not too much wind and not too many boats. If you remember the safety rules I mentioned you aren't likely to have trouble.

I've been skiing for about 13 years. After one year of very hard skiing, I started competition skiing. But as a professional instructor and owner of a ski school, I can honestly recommend that it is much better to have two years of good experience before going into competition.

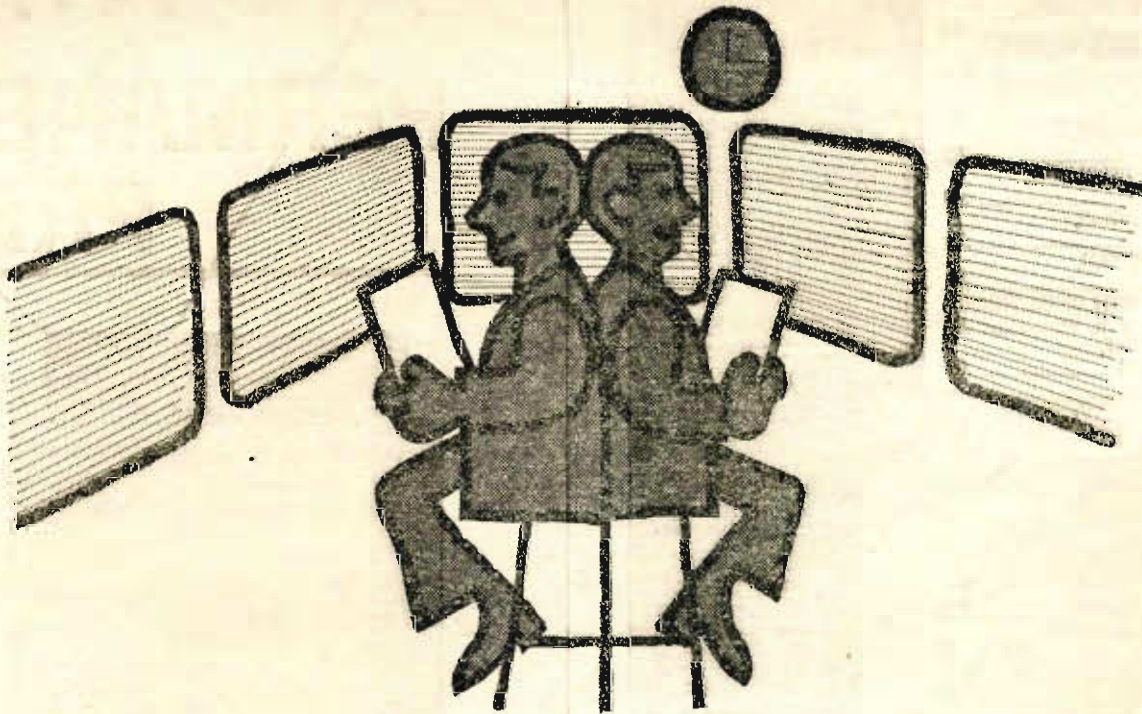

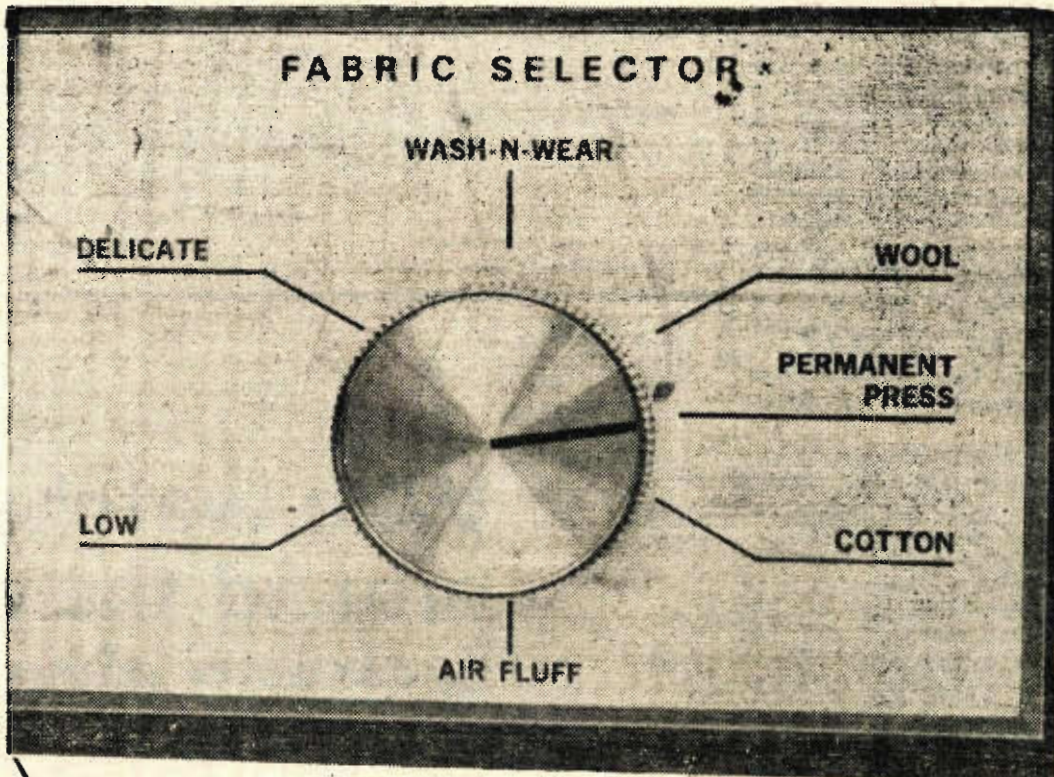

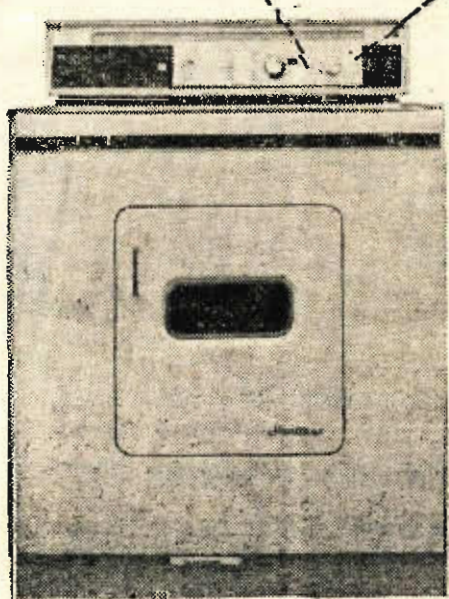
