## Mayor Allen Of South Bend To Address Lincoln Day Group In Culver



Lloyd M. Allen, two-term Republican mayor of South Bend, will address Marshall county's annual Lincoln Day Banquet Tuesday, February 27.

The gala GOP affair is slated for 6:30 p.m. at the Culver Inn, according to county Republican chairman Bill Gee.

Dr. Otis R. Bowen, Speaker of the Indiana House of Representatives and candidate for the nomination for governor, will be an honored guest and also speak at the banquet.

The Blue Notes, a group of singing cadets from Culver Military Academy, will perform a musical tribute during the program, Gee announced.

Before becoming South Bend's mayor, Allen served as city judge and was known as "a judge who is fair, but hard, if you're wrong." He stopped a bail bond racket, improved the probation system, initiated a driver training school, introduced an improved docket system, and pioneered sentencing young traffic offenders to an eight-hour driver instruction course.

A Navy flier during World War I, Allen is holder of the Distinguished Flying Cross and the Air Medal with two gold stars.

## Resusci Annie Comes To Town

For four evenings and Saturday afternoon during the week beginning Monday, March 4, in the lounge of the State Exchange Bank, men and women of the Culver Community will have an opportunity to receive practical instruction in mouth to mouth resuscitation and external chest massage, otherwise referred to as cardiac resuscitation.

The manikin, known as Resusci Annie, will be demonstrated by members of the Culver Chapter of the Tri Kappa Society with Dr. Joseph Howard acting as a medical consultant. A program of instruction believed to be vital to the whole community has been scheduled as follows:

## Culver Community School Corporation

Installation of ceilings in Section C of the new unified high school building at Culver is expected to get underway soon, it was indicated in a construction report to the Board of School Trustees at their regular meeting this week.

It was indicated that the schedule will provide for the installation of ceilings in two rooms each week and this will mean that it will be possible to heat these rooms for workmen.

Preliminary work on the south drive was started this past week. The roof over the mechanical area is progressing rapidly and the installation of mechanical equipment is moving along on schedule. Replacement of large areas of roof damaged by inclement weather in Section C area was reported.

Contract to Melvin Doty, for driving school bus was approved by the school board. Mr. Doty has taken over the route driven by Clem Keller, Jr.

The recommendations that Valerie Hite, Junior High School, Girls' P. E. and Health, and Helen Heiser, Elementary Teacher, be assigned for the 1968-69 school year were approved, as was the assignment of Helen Masters, Secretary.

Tri Kappa has indicated an interest in providing a painting for the new unified high school, it was reported. ## Tax Receipts Necessary For License Plates

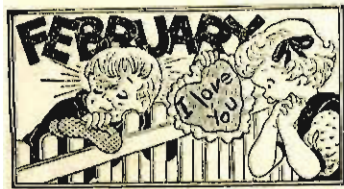
Harold Roush of the Marshall County Assessors office states that if you do not have a paid tax receipt from Marshall County for 1966 personal property taxes paid in 1967, it will be necessary for you to get a clearance at the Court House before obtaining your 1968 auto license plates.

If you have paid personal property taxes in another county in 1967, please bring that tax receipt to the assessors; we will need the duplicate number before we can issue the clearance needed.

If you were a resident of Marshall County in 1966 and had no personal property assessed to you, it will be necessary for you too, to obtain a clearance form.

If your tax receipt has a different name than on your auto registration, you will also need a clearance form.

The above is in regard to personal property only, not real estate taxes.
