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Chamber, Lions honor outstanding citizens

Chamber recognizes Tompos, Miller's, Bonines Lions award Overmyer, Damore

CULVER—Culver's Chamber of Commerce last week held its annual awards dinner honoring several members of the Chamber and Culver community. The Jan. 22 dinner meeting, held at the Marmont Grille, recognized stalwarts in three categories: volunteer of the year, business of the year, and the lifetime achievement award.

In the absence of Chamber president Mike Stallings, first vice president of the Chamber

and Hands of Marshall County (of which he is co-founder), St. Joseph Regional Medical Center development committee, and a United Health Services committee member. "He has a lot of great personal attributes, a lot of high energy...he is involved in this community because he loves it, and he does a phenomenal job," said Fassett.

After accepting the award and singling out his wife, Cheryl — who attended the dinner as well -- for her support and assis-

CULVER--Culver's Lions Club honored two local citizens last Wednesday with a dinner and ceremony, an annual event for the group in past decades. At the Jan. 23 event, Lions president Mike Overmyer introduced the winner of the Community Service Award, Original Rootbeer Stand owner Mark Damore, by describing Damore's Chicago roots as the "son of a man who worked without regard for exhaustion."

Damore, said Overmyer, attended Northern Illinois University on a full scholarship for his gymnastics excellence before focusing his talents on Original Chicago Produce Inc., a company he still runs over 30 years later.

Damore wed his wife Becky in 1978 and the couple had one son, named after his father. Eventually the couple bought a house on the west shore of Lake Maxinkuckee (in 1998) and finally moved here permanently in 2002, said Overmyer. "From day one it was a safe bet that if you needed a donation of any kind, Mark Damore would be there to help," Overmyer added.

Damore purchased Eby's drive in in Culver, changed the name to the Original Root Beer stand, and enhanced the business with a physical makeover and menu additions. "It would be very difficult to find an event in Culver that the root-beer stand has not sponsored on some level," noted Overmyer. "Mark would not have it any other way."

Overmyer went on to describe some of Damore's local efforts: running the fireworks campaign for Culver's Lake Fest (and personally pulling the fireworks barges out on the lake), sponsoring the Lake Fest parade, raising funds or donating food to the Marshall County Humane Society, Culver After Prom, the fireman's gold outing, Monterey fire dept., St. Anne's church, Culver library's summer reading program, Kiwanis golf outings, Culver Academies, and Culver Elementary school, among others. "Generosity is an attitude that not enough people in this world embrace, but Mark Damore and the Original Rootbeer Stand have made a habit of extending the spirit of giving to the town of Culver,"



said Overmyer.

Damore, accepting the award, thanked the Lions and generated a cheerful response by adding that he would like to become a member of the group. "You guys do a lot of things that I don't even know about," he said.

Former Culver school nurse Sharon Coffee introduced — to thunderous applause — the Lions' Club Citizen of the Year, Janet Overmyer, who retired last October after more than 35 years as secretary at Culver Elementary School. After describing her early years working with Overmyer at the school (where Overmyer began as a cook, Coffee explained), Coffee praised her longtime coworker and friend. "She helped thousands of kids. She had to give out pills, band-aids, and change pants when I wasn't there, and she continued to do that...she's been a good gal, a good employee, and a good friend. She deserves (this award)."

Janet Overmyer, who was joined by her husband Rich and two of the couple's sons at the dinner, expressed her gratitude for the award and addressed the audience with a humorous quip. "I knew I'd been (at the school) too long when I said to Benjamin Short, 'I used to babysit with your mother,' and he said no, it was his grandmother!"

CES principal Chuck Kitchell, also in attendance, praised Overmyer for "the number of kids' lives that she's been a part of, the number of hugs that she gives and gets. It really was remarkable to watch her work with the kids. It really is thousands of people that she's touched. She's sorely missed at the school."

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CES readers celebrate success with ice cream

Culver--Top readers at Culver Elementary School on Jan. 18 were treated to a buffet of ice cream, part of the new READ (Reading Encourages Adventures and Dreams) program launched this year at the school to replace the former JOG program in place for the past 10 years, said kindergarten teacher Janna VanDePutte, who created the READ program.

VanDePutte noted that the new program is not cumulative, which allows student readers to attain reading goals in later grading periods, even if they missed those goals earlier in the year. The program also offers more frequent rewards for readers, such as the ice cream party, rather than forcing younger students to wait all year for the end-of-year reward, a stretch that can often lose the attention

of students.

VanDePutte noted that each grade level sets its own reading criteria, but that her job involved creating themes for each nine weeks: Mystery Madness took place earlier this year, January Chillout culminated in the ice cream party, and the third grading period will be marked by a Rain Forest theme, which will also involve nature expert Rick Glassman's visit to the school on March 14. A "Literacy Luau" will wrap things up just before the end of the school year. VanDePutte noted that the school had 335 students eligible for the ice cream party, out of the school population of around 500. "So our numbers are good," she said, also noting that CES principal Chuck Kitchell has been "very sup-

portive" of the program.

She also noted that Culver's Tri Kappa donates to the program each year, adding to the Parent-Teacher Organization funds that offset the cost of the program. "Tri Kappa always donated ice cream toppings to us; it's one of the things they do in their January meeting," VanDePutte explained. "They give us \$450 and then donate the ice cream toppings...we used 30 gallons of ice cream, 18 pounds of chocolate syrup, 12 pounds of strawberry syrup, a case of whipped cream, and 12 bags of mini M&Ms (for the party)."

"The whole purpose of the reading program is to get them to read beyond the school day," she added. "It's supposed to be mostly at home."

School performance detailed in annual report

CULVER -- The Indiana Dept. of Education has released its annual school performance reports listing statistics pertaining to a variety of aspects of the state's school corporations.

Of those results, Culver Community School superintendent Brad Schuldt was most encouraged by results at Culver Elementary school. "I believe in every category but one in all testing from grades three through six — and we're now adding a science component in one grade -- we went up. That's a real positive thing for us. Even if you go on up into the seventh and ninth grades, our math scores seem to be improving."

ISTEP math scores rose at Culver Elementary by several percentage points, with grade three rising from 67 percent in the 2006-07 school year to 81 percent this year. Grade four

rose from 73 to 75, Grade five from 79 to 89, grade seven from 74 to 84, and grade nine from 69 to 74. In most of these cases, Culver scores were higher than the state average.

Math scores fluctuated in many grades at Culver High School and in science and language arts areas in all of the corporation's schools. Some scores — such as grades seven, eight, and 10 in language arts — went up from last year's scores, but remained below state standards. "We definitely have some things to work on," Schuldt said. "One of the things we have to always deal with at Culver Community is that, with a smaller number of kids in each grade level -- in particular at Monterey -- one student can cause great fluctuation in our overall results."

"We have to look at long term trends. Frankly, we spend a lot more time looking at each stu-

Academy's Holbrook nominated for Oscar award

Congratulations are in order for Culver Military grad Hal Holbrook ('42) on earning his first Academy Award nomination after spending more than 50 years performing on stage, screen and television. He is being recognized in the Best Supporting Actor category for his performance in the film, "Into the Wild."

Holbrook was involved in theater and track at Culver, to which he returned (among other years) in 1962 to perform his famous "Mark Twain Tonight" stage show. The Academy's Vedette newspaper that year observed Holbrook as he "wandered through campus Saturday afternoon before the performance and chatted over coffee in the Shack...there was no mistaking inward independence: vital, eager, enthusiastic, and with a twinkle in the eye that showed even through the Mark Twain disguise" and described an incident during Holbrook's cadet years in which he "climbed in the ventilating system in South (Barrack) and made his way down the hall pausing at several rooms to (make) moan noises and scare the daylights out of some sleepy cadets."

Holbrook will turn 83 next month. The Oscars are scheduled for Sunday, Feb. 24.

Council considers department priorities

Culver - The first order of business for the Culver town council was a public hearing on a revision to the Culver zoning ordinance. Proposed by the plan commission, the ordinance will mandate that it is the responsibility of each land owner to insure that any portion of precipitation that flows over the ground surface be contained or channeled to an appropriate ditch or stream.

Russ Mason, building commissioner, endorsed the approval and emphasized that it would apply to new construction. The council suspended the rules and approved the amendment on all three readings of the ordinance.

A lease purchase agreement was authorized to replace the 1992 vactor truck at a cost of \$252,000. Doheny, Lapaz, Ind., said the 2007 model should be delivered within the next 90 days and agreed to maintain the present vactor truck at no charge until the delivery of the new vehicle. A \$15,000 trade-in allowance was given.

Department priorities were the major discussion item. Tim McCarty said the doors on the EMS garage were ready for replacement and asked that the council allow the expenditure of the \$3,929 encumbered from 2007 budget. He reported that there are two new driver trainees who will plan to take the EMS certification classes. In a meeting with Sean McDermott, town manager, additional EMS priorities are a new ambulance, a revision of the pay scale for EMS personnel and additional training opportunities. Missy Systma, EMS director, is a licensed instructor who can train

personnel in other departments as first responders McDermott reported.

Police, fire and EMS all will require additional 800 megahertz radios. Each department has one at the present time as a result Culver’s share of the distribution of 75 radios given Marshall County by FEMA. Marshall County hopes to have all emergency personnel on the 800 system by summer, but McDermott noted this is a costly conversion. The cost to the police department alone would be \$20,000. Council member, Lynn Overmyer, said that grant opportunities existed with the Marshall County Community Foundation and suggested that emergency personnel apply as a group for a grant.

McDermott also reported that the tower presently located at the Culver street garage was deemed not suitable to support the 800 system and a new tower would probably be located in Starke County.

Continuing department priorities for 2008, the police department asked consideration of purchasing a new car, remodeling their outdated office facilities, a defibrillator, a new emergency generator for the town hall, and computer updates.

The fire department also requested a defibrillator, cross training with EMS personnel, revising fire rates, radio to activate the sirens, a third siren for the north end of town, and a dry hydrant to be installed at the end of the lake. They also requested permission to complete phase two of the fire station renovation.

Water and sewer department

requirements include a garage at the sewer plant, a replacement of the reed beds, a dump truck, jetting the sanitary sewers and additional fire hydrants.

Clerk, Casey Howard, gave her year-end report and priority list for 2008. She noted that due to a number of repairs including the street department’s roof, EMS roof, town hall repairs, sidewalk program, there was \$565,000 spent which resulted in budgeting more than was received from the property tax distribution of 80 percent. She noted there was approximately \$200,000 outstanding.

Her priority list for 2008 includes updating the antiquated telephone system in town hall that would cost approximately \$20,000 to \$30,000. She also would like to update the accounting system. The present system allows only a two-year

accumulation of data that is not enough for the state board of accounts requirements. An update would also allow her office to accept credit and debit card payments and on-line payments of utility bills. There would be a small premium paid for convenience of using a credit/debit card she noted. Howard is also beginning to gather information needed for the 2010 census.

Town attorney, Ron Gifford, reported that Umbaugh was completing the fiscal plan required for the annexation of the Long Point area. He also noted that the Culver Redevelopment Committee had closed on their TIF2 bond issue of \$350,000.

The information will be submitted to Ice Miller for completion of the bond issue. A full

year-end report will be given by the CRC at the next scheduled council meeting.

Park superintendent, Kelly Young, said the park’s five-year plan had been completed through regular monthly meetings with public input. The plan has been approved by the DNR through 2012. Property on SR 10 has been included in the plan as well as the completion of Vandalia Village, a park playground area that is being developed. Young noted that the plans for the playground were developed with the input of several hundred children.

McDermott will attend a four-day seminar for NIMS training. He also reported that a repair was needed for the old heater at the street garage. The cost of the repair is \$2,100. A plan for inspections of the local restaurants’ grease traps is scheduled for February, he noted.

In other business, the council appointed Ed Pinder, Jr., to the Culver park board to replace Doreen Albert, who declined reappointment. They also granted permission to Gladie’s Deli to construct an awning over the sidewalk area.

In response to a concern from an audience member about the erosion of the shoulder at the outlet bridge on W. Shore, Ralph Winters, board president, said that issue of solving the problem was compounded by the fact that although W. Shore Drive is maintained by the town, the bridges are the responsibility of Marshall County. Note was taken of the fact that the east shoulder of the bridge area had eroded to the pavement.

dent individually than an overall grade level score. Our goal is to have each student individually show improvement.”

Other facts and figures in the report: student enrollment has stayed steady in recent years, and is listed at 1,110 this year. Attendance rates at Culver’s

schools remained fairly consistent in recent years, and generally within a percentage point of the state average. While not yet listed for the 2007-08 school year, last year’s percentage of students in gifted and talented programs was 15. Speaking at Culver’s Kiwanis club on Jan. 24, Schuldt pointed out

that Culver’s demographics are affected by drawing from four Indiana counties for its student populace, many of which include students from lower socioeconomic backgrounds. Students receiving free or reduced lunches or textbooks at Culver make up 54 percent of the overall populace, compared

to 43 percent in Plymouth, 51 percent in Knox, and 25 percent in Bremen.

The blizzard, a candy bar, and a prayer Culver's Warrick recalls brush with death in the blizzard of '78

Undoubtedly the most dramatic Culver story from the blizzard of January, 1978 was the harrowing tale of Tim Warrick and Pete Salvadore, who nearly died while trapped in a car during the storm. Tim, presently in Christchurch, New Zealand, was kind enough to write out his memories of the incident for publication in the Citizen. His account, edited for space, follows below.

Pete Salvadore was Associate Director of Admissions and I was serving as Summer Schools Admissions Officer for Culver. On Weds. (Jan. 26), we loaded the Academy car, an older Ford Country Squire station wagon for West Lafayette. It was starting to snow when we held the Culver meeting at the Purdue University Campus. Pete was anxious to be back home because Pat, his wife, was alone with (their) newborn, Cas, and his older brother Andy.

The road was slick and full of snow by the time we reached an s-curve south of Brookston, Indiana. We came upon a Lincoln off the west side of the road and stopped to pick up the driver, Clarence Jackman from Chalmers, Indiana. We were about one and a half miles north of Brookston when the road became impassable. We were traveling slow, trying to stay on the road when we ran into a large snow drift. The wind was up to one hundred miles an hour, and the temperature was dropping to 16 degrees. The snow was heavy and blowing from the west, parallel to the ground.

We tried for a brief time to back and push the car out and back down the road. That didn't work, and we were stuck well into the snow. We knew that we couldn't run the engine very long because of the carbon monoxide risk once the exhaust pipe was covered by snow, so we turned off the engine, planning to start it again every hour for about five minutes to warm the car and listen on the radio for the news.

Once we turned off the engine we were never able to start it again. We listened to the news for a few minutes every hour, and heard that the Indiana National Guard had been called out to help people stranded on Interstate 65 North of Lafayette. The radio announcer described convoys of guardsmen following tracked vehicles, picking up truck drivers and travelers along the Interstate highway.

With that news we thought it would be just a matter of a few hours until we too would be rescued.

Pete and I had not dressed for a blizzard but for our duties as admissions officers: sport coats, ties, loafers and light coats. With the temp dropping and the wind increasing, we needed to stay warm. We (used) the Culver Banners in our Admissions case to drape our heads, and gave the Culver flag to Clarence Jackman to use as his cover. As the night wore on and we realized the engine would not restart. Pete and I placed out feet in each others arm pits...it worked, and our feet stayed warm.

Every half hour we asked Clarence Jackman in the back seat: "How you doing, Clarence?" Each time he replied: "Hanging in there!" But softer and quieter each time. Around sunrise on Thursday morning the battery died and we no longer heard the encouraging reports of...rescue parties.

We...waited throughout the day for rescue. We were hungry, but all we had was Pete's "Chunky" candy bar. We decided to save it until the bitter end. By now the frost on the inside of the wind shield was over a half inch thick. The snow had blown into the car and was up to the bottom of the dashboard and the front seat. On exhale our breath would rise to the top of the car and then crinkle back down as snow flakes.

It was bitter cold and hypothermia started to set in as the

darkness of Thursday night arrived. Hypothermia sets in and you shiver uncontrollably. Even though your mind tells your body to stop and stay still, the body tries to create warmth to maintain core temperature by movement.

As we sat for the night, our second, it did not appear we would be rescued. We shivered, and rubbed our hands and feet to try and stay warm. At the darkest time, the greatest fear was to be the last man alive in the car. Sitting there with two dead, frozen bodies would be tough.

The prayers started, all learned at Riverview School from Miss Rogers, my second grade teacher.

At home in Culver, Pat Salvadore awoke to find here husband had not returned. She and friends on the faculty started to make calls. Fred Adams, of the State Exchange Bank, offered to hire a helicopter to search for us. Bill Taber, at the Culver News Agency, was busy on his ham radio talking to people all over the state to encourage them to look for us.

When Friday morning arrived, we knew we had survived the worst part of the storm. We also knew we would not be able to survive another night. About 10:00 am, the sky started to lighten. By 2:30 PM, we knew we had to get out, while there was still light. (Then) we heard a faint sound, like the buzzing of a chain saw. The sound grew louder and both Pete and I pushed on the driver's side front door to try and get out.

Just as the door opened, a snowmobile passed, just two feet from the door. The driver, a young man about 15 or 16 years old stopped the machine abruptly. He had been taking medicine to a child in need north toward Chalmers. He could not believe there was a car under the snow drifts and was more surprised when he saw the three of us stranded inside.

He called for help...and about an hour later, three older snowmobilers showed up and helped us onto the backs of their machines. They took us out to the south over snow drifts over twelve and fourteen feet tall. We arrived by snow mobile at the home of Lillian Breisler, whose daughter and son-in-law were coordinating the community response to the blizzard. They had a nurse there. She checked each of us out and proclaimed us fairly fit for the conditions we had faced. They filled us with warm tomato soup.

About an hour later, a reporter from the Lafayette Journal Courier called for the story. We made the front page of the Sunday edition of the Lafayette paper with a headline stating: "Men survive 42 hours trapped in Blizzard."

Lillian Breisler...prepared a tremendous meal complete with red eye gravy. After dinner, Pete pulled out the "Chunky" candy bar and placed it on the table. I guess we had never really reached the bitter end.

What really mattered was that we were home, safe and warm. The people of Brookston, including Lillian Breisler, her entire family and all of the snowmobilers deserve the real recognition, along with Bill Taber, Fred Adams and all of the people who looked for us.

The lesson we learned is that we should never travel without a CB Radio (now of course a cell phone) plus extra blankets, sleeping bags, coats, hats and gloves. A number ten can, with a few survival candles and some matches can provide a good warming stove while stranded. For years, I always traveled with a survival kit in the trunk of the car. But now, I recommend that when the blizzard arrives, take shelter at home or with your friends, and wait it out until the worst passes. Help your friends and strangers, as we were helped, in grateful recognition of our prayers. Be safe, and stay out of the snow!

PLYMOUTH —Culver Community's wrestling team finished ninth in the Plymouth Sectional Tournament team championship Saturday.

Triton and Culver Community each won a sectional championship, as Trojan junior Blake Hoffer improved to an impressive 36-1 mark at 145, and Cavalier senior Jesse Good earned his 30th win of the season at 119 pounds. Bremen had three wrestlers advance to the final four, but was unable to earn a championship for the day. Leyva and Lewis steal show at Lakeville

LAKEVILLE — LaVille honored its girls basketball seniors Saturday night.

However, Culver Community seniors Tiffany Leyva and Reannon Lewis — with significant assistance from freshman Patrice McBee — stole the show in a 36-28 Northern State Conference win over the Lancers at Dale E. Cox Gymnasium.

Leyva added eight points off the bench, including three buckets in the second quarter when Culver held LaVille scoreless to take a 15-8 lead into the intermission.

"Leyva was a sparkplug off the bench," Faulkner said. "She was upset with the way she played against West Central Thursday. She just let that fire her up. Her defense led to some offensive baskets. If she can be that sparkplug for us, more power to her."

"That's a senior stepping up," she added. "We need our seniors to lead us and both did that tonight. I'm proud of them."

Lewis — Culver's other senior — drilled the Cavs' only deep ball of the night to put the visitors up 25-18 with 4:55 left in the game. Culver led by no fewer than five points the rest of the night.

"(Lewis) stepped out there and stuck us with that 3," LaVille head coach Kevin McCullough said. "Give her credit; that was a big shot."

Defensively, Culver's 2-3 zone held the Lancers to 9 of 39 — 23 percent — from the field and a miserable 1 of 13 from 3-point territory.

Even with the Cavs' zone venturing far out on the wings, the long-armed McBee protected the middle, and Culver kept the Lancers bottled up on the perimeter most of the game.

"We seriously worked on defending against LaVille's offense a good 50 minutes of practice," Faulkner said. "We knew what they were going to do and we knew what we had to do to counter.
