The Future Farmers will place Census posters in banks, supermarkets, farm equipment dealers, and other places in their respective communities.

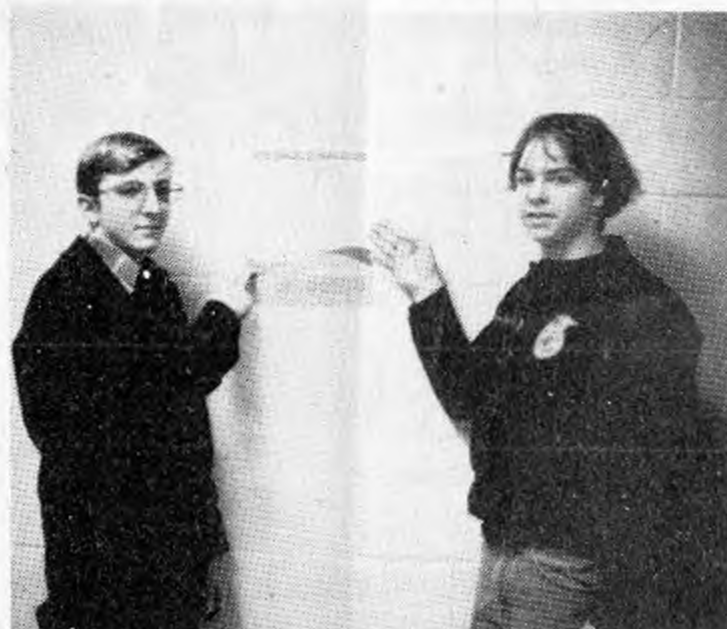
The posters urge all farmers to return the census forms by February 15. The census is valuable to private

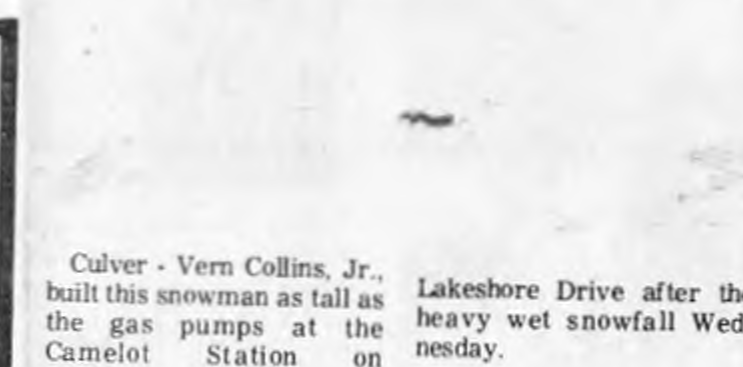

PUBLISHER'S 'PINION



It was one year ago this past weekend that the local newspaper could not be delivered because of the January Blizzard of 1978. The newspaper was printed in the middle of the week but could not be delivered until the following Monday or Tuesday. The entire area was at a standstill. School was dismissed, mail not delivered, factories shutdown and grocery stores cleaned out of milk and bread. Snowmobiles delivered fuel oil and food to rural residents unable to dig out.

The same type of blizzard was predicted this year for late January or early February. More snowmobiles are now in operation and 4-wheel drive vehicles are in front of almost every home.

The main question - Are we prepared?

The approximate 7 inches of snow last week caused near-panic once again. Grocery stores immediately sold out of bread and milk. Everyone was trying to be prepared for the worst.

Bare shelves in the grocery store can be almost catastrophic to a large family with small children. When this

family gets to the store for food, they find that bread and milk are gone because everyone panicked.

If you are concerned about being isolated because of snow, take a few extra minutes next time you are at the grocery store and purchase a few extra gallons of milk and extra loaves of bread. Freeze the bread for later use. Replace the milk as a grocery store changes its shelves. Put the old to the front and the fresh to the back. This might seem like a lot of trouble, but think of the family with an infant who might need the milk and can't get it.

Think of your neighbor next time panic enters your mind.

Don't forget that January and February are the slowest months of the year for the local merchants. Please purchase everything in your hometown as much as possible. Since the local merchant is your friend and neighbor, he deserves your support.

ARGOS REMEMBER WHEN

Argos - News from the Argos Reflector dated Thursday, February 24, 1927.

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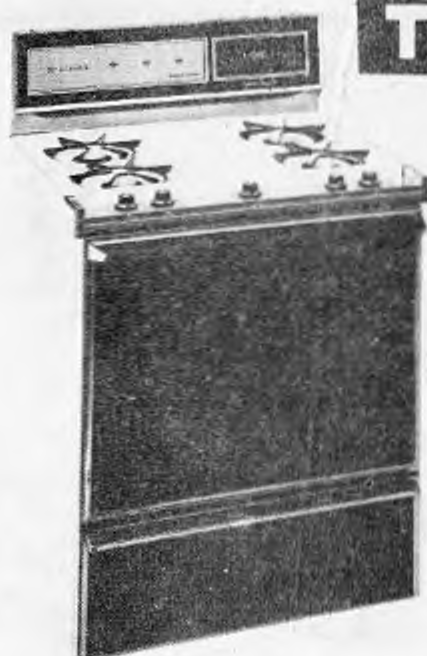

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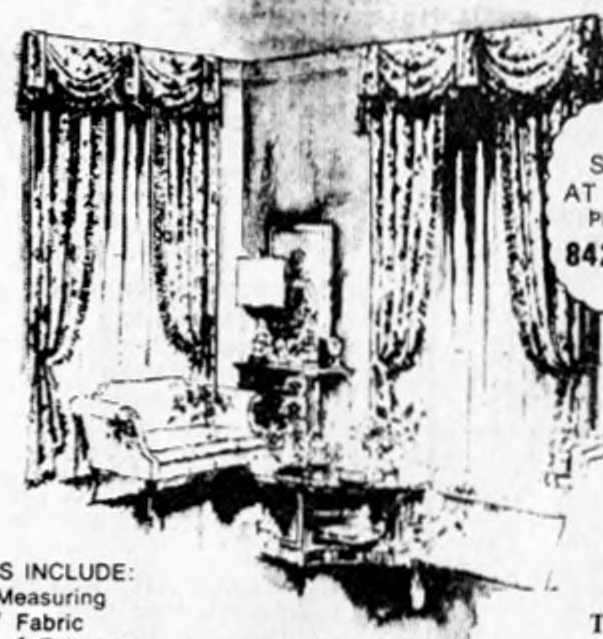
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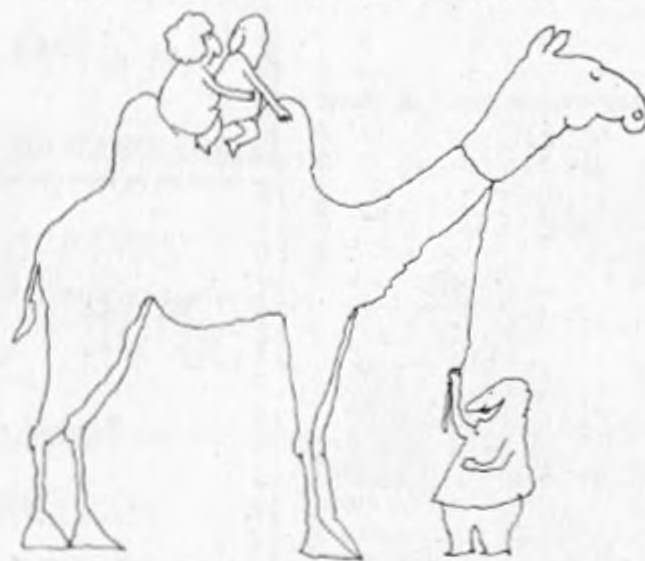

REP. ED COOK ANNOUNCES LEGISLATIVE INITIATIVES

Indianapolis - Rep. Ed. Cook (D-Plymouth) announced today that he is sponsoring a number of bills for consideration in the First Session of the 101st Indiana General Assembly. His two major legislative initiatives are HB 1108 and HB 1383.

The one, HB 1108, deletes the provisions that ties legislative salaries to the governor's salary and places an \$8,000 annual limit on legislative salaries.

"At a time when the public has been asked to hold the line on wage demands to combat inflation, we, legislators, must set an example not by increasing our own salaries."

This bill will make legislators more accountable. I hope it will receive serious consideration by my colleagues in the General Assembly," Rep. Cook said.

The other, HB 1383, concerns proof of financial responsibility and accident reporting by motorists. The bill requires an additional \$20 fee for reissuance of a license plate, registration certificate, or driver's license if the police have had to retrieve it when suspended for failure of financial responsibility, and it permits the impoundment of a non-Indiana resident's motor vehicle if a motorist

fails to comply with proof of the financial responsibility requirement. The bill also provides a maximum fine of \$10,000 for driving while one's license registration certificate, or plate is suspended for failure to provide financial responsibility and increases the minimum property damage required before an accident must be reported from \$100 to \$200.

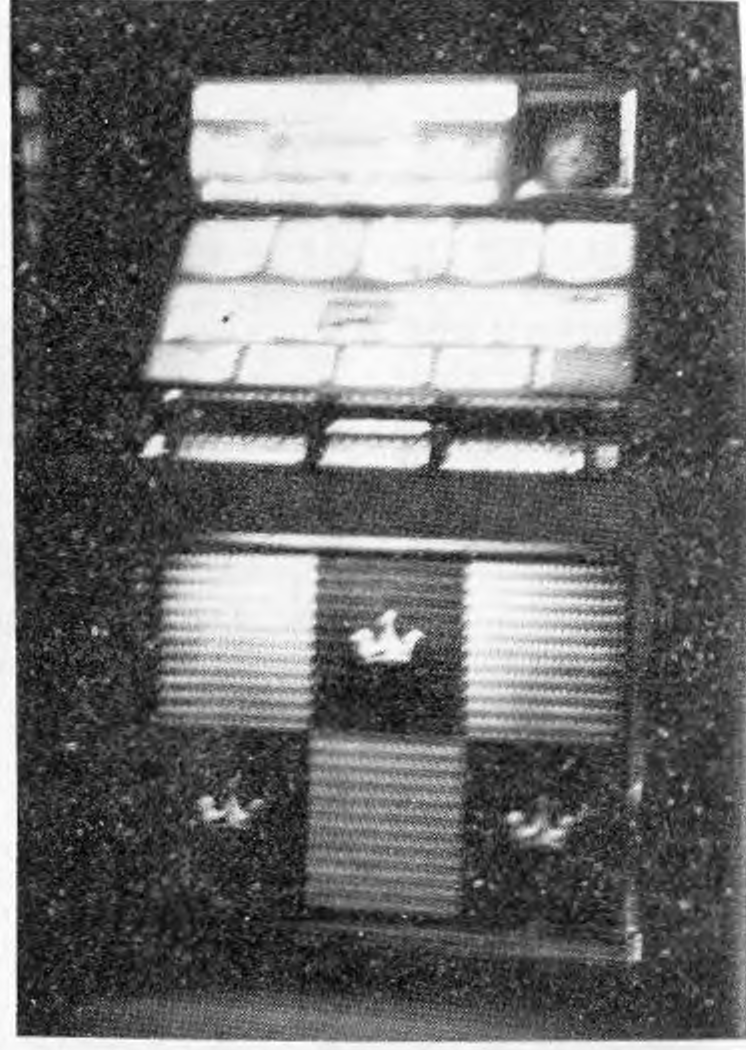

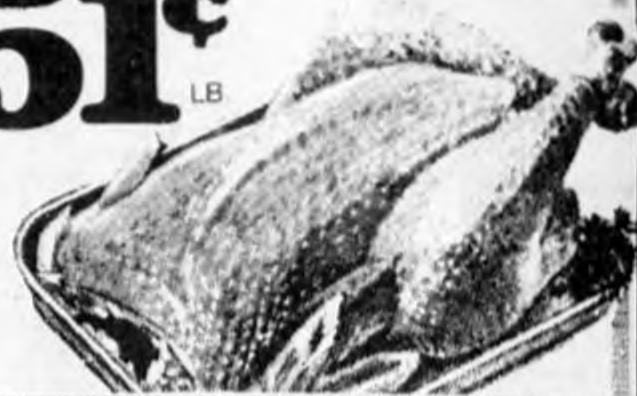
