School Board Meeting Produces Few Results

Culver - Culver's School Board met for nearly four hours Monday night at the Monterey Elementary School, but many items on the agenda were tabled for future discussion.

The board and approximately 100 in the audience heard Harry Davis' request that member Paul Snyder and Supt. William Mills resign. Davis is from North Bend Township.

Later, Pat Weaver, Monterey, asked that Paul Davidson and Marvin Good resign from the board. Davis stated that he felt North Bend was sold out and that they would pull out of the corporation if it came to a vote in 1980. He also brought up the issue that the Aubee School was closed when it was in less need of repairs than the other buildings in the corporation, he felt.

Davidson made a motion that the Aubee School be reopened and the vote was 4-3 against reopening. Board President Howard Hildebrand, members Phil

Mallory, Peggy Clark and Snyder voted against, while Davidson, Good and Don Keller voted in favor.

Two members of the audience, Don Taylor and Harry Oliverius, North Bend Township, spoke from the floor to say they were not in agreement with Davis' views and were in support of the Culver Community School system.

It was voted on to appoint Mills as negotiator for the corporation, but Mills later declined the position. George Miller, Jr. High Principal, was last year's negotiator and received a fee of \$1,850. Davidson had suggested a fee of \$100 per session with a maximum payment of \$1,000 for a negotiator and it was voted on to accept this figure.

In other action the board: --accepted the bid of architect, Dick Miller of Elkhart, for repair of the high school roof.

--approved the school calendar submitted by discussion teams.

--approved the change of

meeting place for the next board meeting.

The next meeting will be held at 7:30 p.m. in the Administration Building at Culver on February 19. The first meeting in March will be held at the Aubee Fire House.

--decided that some long range planning should be made at the March meeting concerning building repairs and the entire school system, including discussion on the reopening of the Aubee School.

--heard a report from Hildebrand stating that he was not going to vote one side or the other, but would vote favorably on any issue that he felt was best for the corporation and the children.

--heard Mills express congratulations to the Girl's Varsity Basketball Team for winning the Bi-County Championship, to the Sectional Wrestling winners and to the Boy's 7th and 8th grade basketball teams for their Culver Tourney wins.

JOHN M. HARTLEY TO SERVE AS READER

Culver - Mr. John M. Hartley, acting chairman of the Culver Academies' fine arts department and holder of the schools' prestigious Carter Family Chair of English, has been invited to serve as featured reader at ceremonies celebrating the fiftieth anniversary of the dedication of the famous Bok Singing Tower in the Mountin Lake Sanctuary at Lake Wales, Florida.

Hartley, an annual participant in the Tower's traditional Christmas Eve pageants from 1968-77 will join Singing Tower carillonneur Milford Myhre, former carillonneur at Culver from 1956-1967, in a program of readings and music commemorating the opening of this beautiful, 128-acre botanical retreat in 1929, when Edward W. Bok made formal presentation of his musical 'Taj Majal' to the American public at ceremonies attended then by President Calvin Coolidge.

Fifty years later, a grandson of the founder, Derek Bok, president of Harvard University, will deliver the golden anniversary address. Florida governor Robert Graham will also attend commemoration ceremonies. Called by some the 'Taj Majal of America,' the Bok sanctuary is a unique destination along Florida's tourist trail, located in inland Florida east of St. Petersburg midway between the Gulf of Mexico and the Atlantic Ocean.

Rising out of a grove of palm trees and mirrored in a large, man-made reflecting pool, surrounded by 128 acres of carefully landscaped trees, shrubs, and

flowers, the Singing Tower itself stands 205 feet above ground and measures 51 feet wide at the base and 37 feet at the top. It is constructed of Georgian marble and conquina stone, which is of the same color and texture as that of the Indian masterpiece itself.

No tourists are allowed at the top of the spire because it exists primarily as a memorial and a house for the giant carillon. This 53 bell conglomerate includes units of widely varying size, weighing from 17 pounds to 13 tons each.

Splendid carillon recitals are offered free of charge daily at the Tower, which was conceived by its founder as a retreat designed "simply to preach the gospel and the influence of beauty... a restful, quiet, beautiful spot where visitors may feel, as the sign at the entrance declares by an extract from John Burroughs: 'I come here to find myself. It is so easy to get lost in the world.'"

Edward Bok arrived in America from Holland at the age of six. His abilities eventually took him into the publishing field and won him both acclaim and riches.

His fame can primarily as editor of the Ladies Home Journal. But he had other journalistic and monetary successes, as well, and became, eventually, a philanthropist of considerable generosity. Moreover, he was a man of great patriotism who wanted to express tangible his love for America, a country in which he had been able to rise from immigrants camp to multi-millionaire.

Thus, he conceived and established the Bok Singing Tower and sanctuary in 1929, which Culver's John M. Hartley helped celebrate on the first day of February.

The main topic for FFA members at Culver High School at the present time is "Power for Agriculture." They started the new year with a unit on small engines. Then they demonstrated the use of small engines in forestry by taking trips to area farms and using two cycle engines in cutting wood. Several members also use small engines to power automatic hydraulic wood splitters.

Later, they plan to study the use of small engine applications for garden tractors and lawn mowers. Safety is strongly emphasized in each of these units.

The school has provided test equipment for diagnosing various problems with gasoline engines. The wide-ranging applications of petroleum - powered equipment on modern farms offers a real challenge to youth. Students find it exciting to diagnose problems with test equipment and repair engines.

The Ford Motor Company has provided a diesel engine which advanced students will use for demonstrations. Also several advanced students will make major repairs on tractors used on their own farms.

A very special activity will be a field trip to the National Farm Machinery Show at Louisville, Kentucky on February 17. FFA members will see displays of

550 farm equipment and forestry manufacturers which will be under the cover of 13 acres of building space at the Kentucky State Fairgrounds. In addition to the many applications of power for agriculture, they will also explore the many careers in the design, sales, and service of agricultural

mechanization.

The Culver FFA thanks many local residents who purchased firewood from them to help pay the cost of this trip, the school administration for their support, and the parents who will stay at home and do the chores that day.

PUBLISHER'S PINION



The "Letter to the Editor" in last week's newspaper about the publication needing an "intellectual resurrection" caused a great amount of discussion among the staff and management. Reactions ranged from a joke to an angry response.

An explanation of the operation and procedures in your hometown newspaper should help to put the purpose and goals of the publication in the proper perspective.

The Culver office has a full-time managing editor and the Argos office a part-time managing editor. These two editors are responsible for reporting the weekly happenings of the community. They enlist the help of others to report club news, school event, church happenings, etc. since they personally could not be everywhere at once. They both do a very good job considering the time available. They both have journalism-oriented backgrounds.

To better assist the news reporting procedures, the Culver office telephone is tied directly with the editor's personal telephone and the Argos office has a message recorder. Thus, news can be

reported at any hour of the day or night.

An advertising sales person spends all day Monday calling on advertisers in Culver and working with their promotion needs. A sales person calls on Argos advertisers on Tuesday morning.

The amount of time spent in covering the news is directly related to the amount of advertising from each community. Culver, being a larger community (1,900 population versus 1,500 population, plus an approx. 1,000 increase in the summer months) receives a greater amount of concentration for both news and advertising. This method of the advertising revenue dictating the amount of news coverage is the standard business procedure for a community newspaper.

The news and advertising is then transferred to the central office where the news is set in column formation and the ads are set to the customer's specifications. The newspaper is then put into a newspaper format. Since Culver and Argos each have separate front pages, but dual interior pages, care is taken to place news of each community on each page.

The large metropolitan newspapers have a large staff, each specializing in particular areas such as court, society, sports, etc. These generally are journalism graduates with several years of study in story content, grammar, and readability. The community weekly newspaper staff, on the other hand, is expected to be a very versatile. One minute they might be taking a classified advertisement, then writing an obituary, then taking a picture (another specialized area in the big city), then attending a meeting, then opening the morning mail, and so on.

The purpose of the hometown newspaper is threefold: To report the weekly events of the community - most of which are not reported in any other publication; To tell the subscribers about business sales and special promotions through advertisements; and to make enough revenue so that the local newspaper is able to stay alive. If we are doing a good job accomplishing these three goals, we would not have time to worry about "intellectual resurrections."

CULVER STUDIES SITES FOR GARAGE

Culver - Culver and Union Township officials in special session Tuesday picked five alternate sites as possible locations for a garage to house their ambulance and back up unit but reached no decision. Cost factors involved for each site, will be considered March 7.
