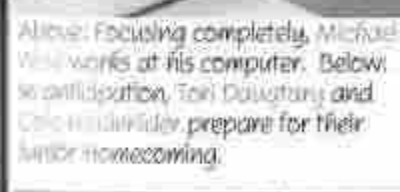

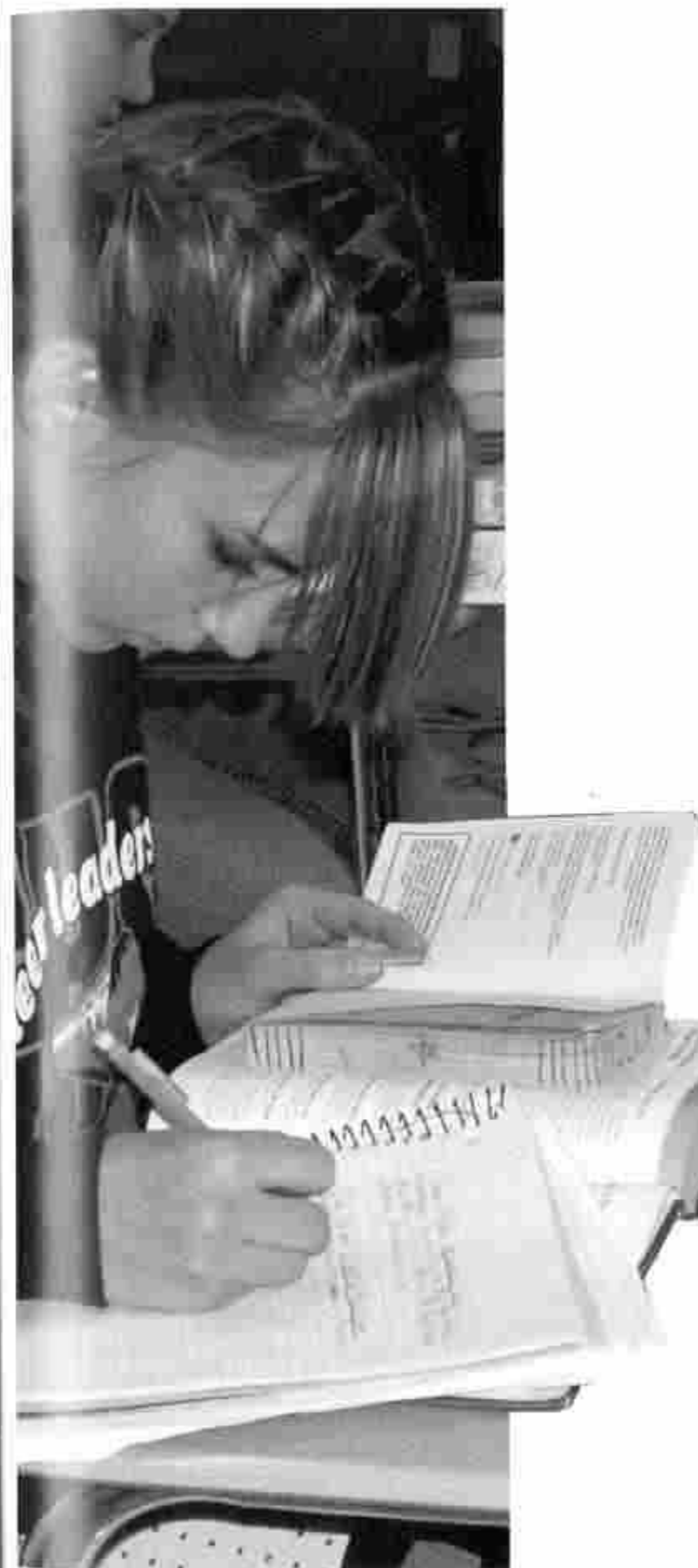

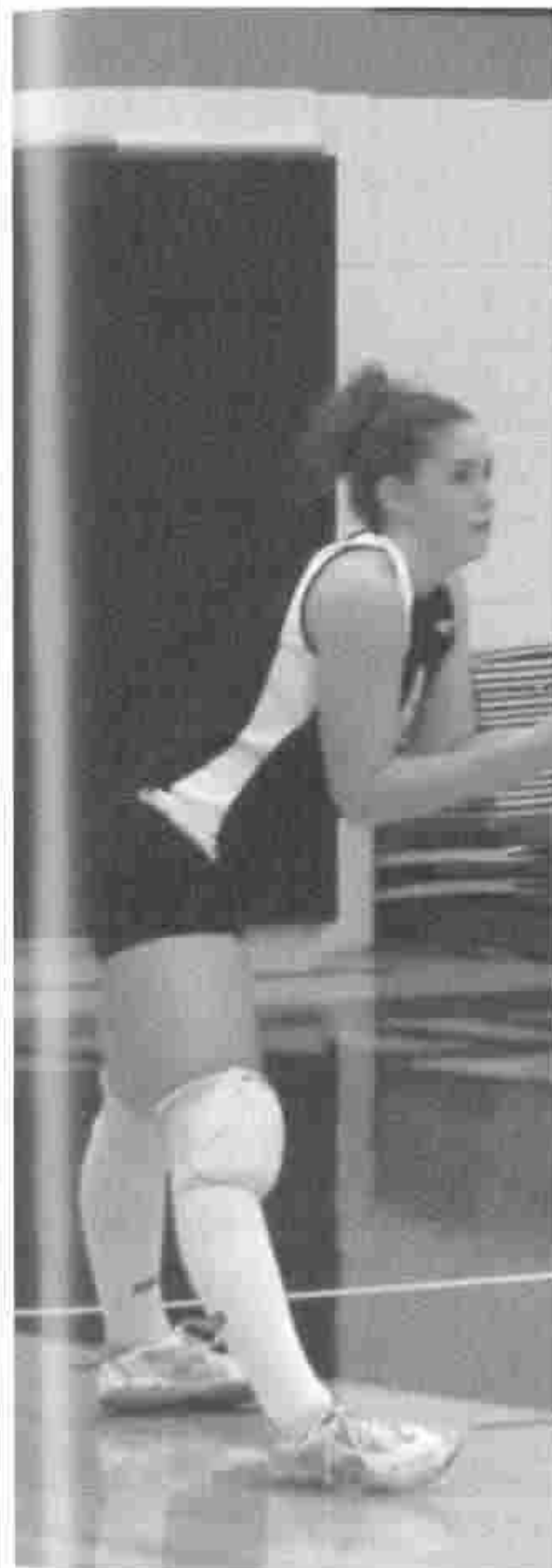

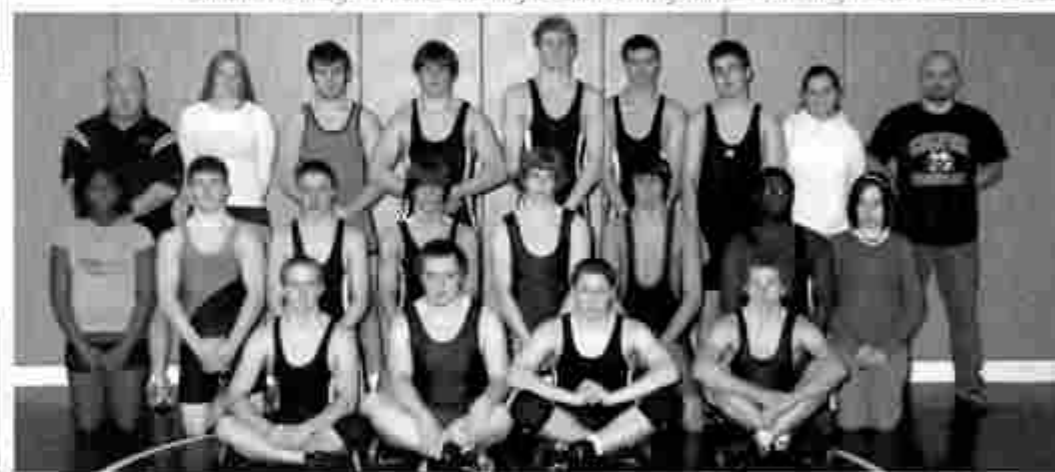

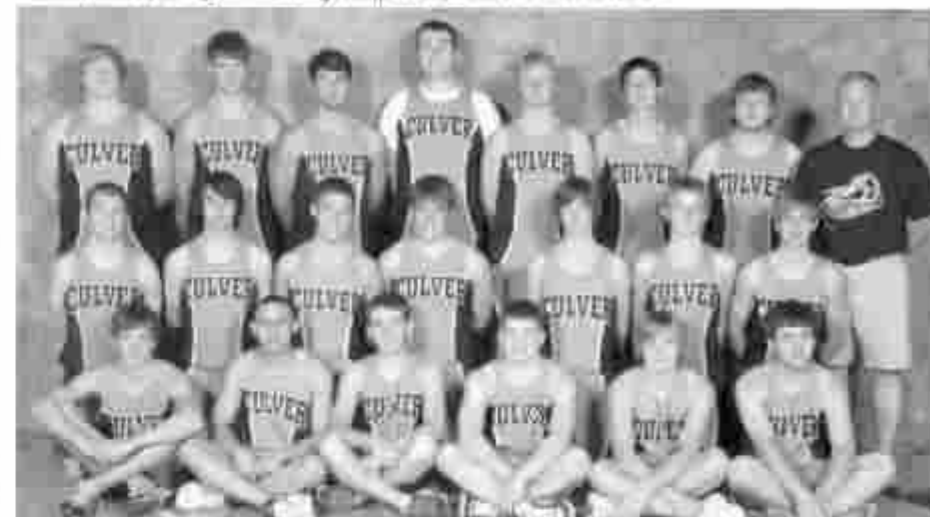

The band participated in many school-related activities. They played two concerts, participated in contest, and they played football and basketball games. Although that's not all the band did. The band also did activities outside of school.

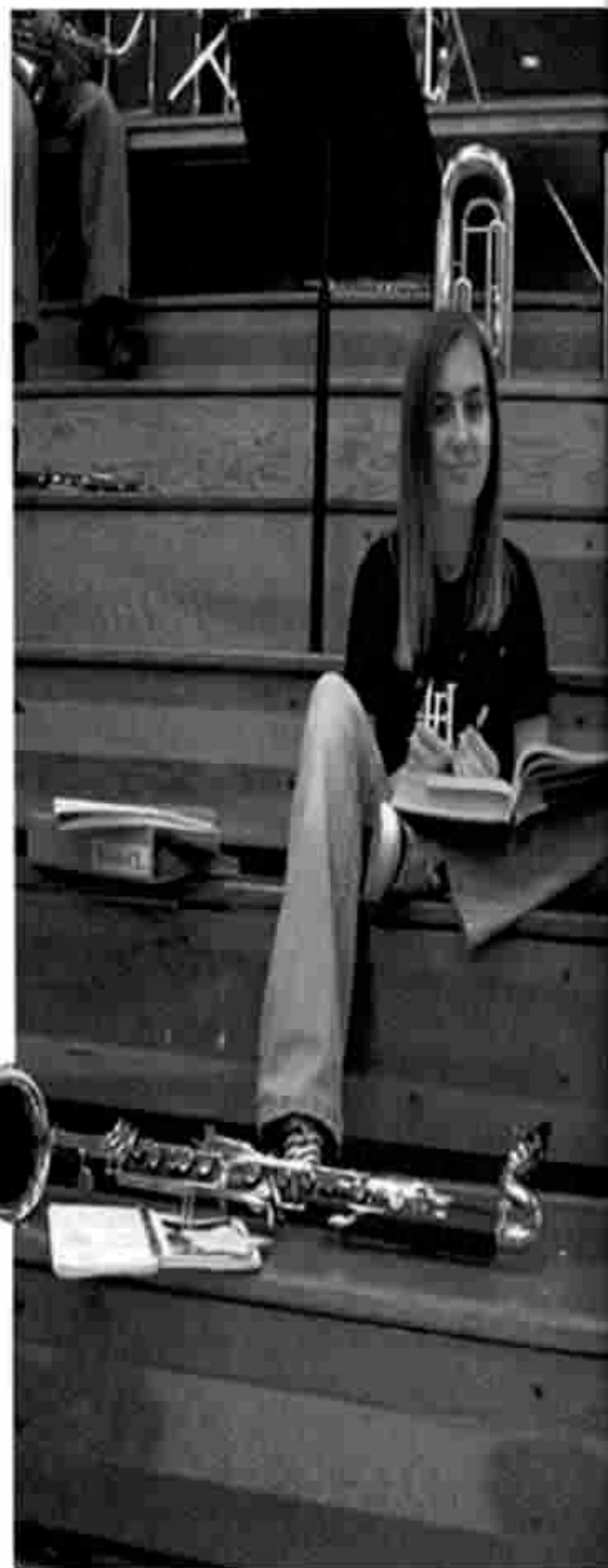

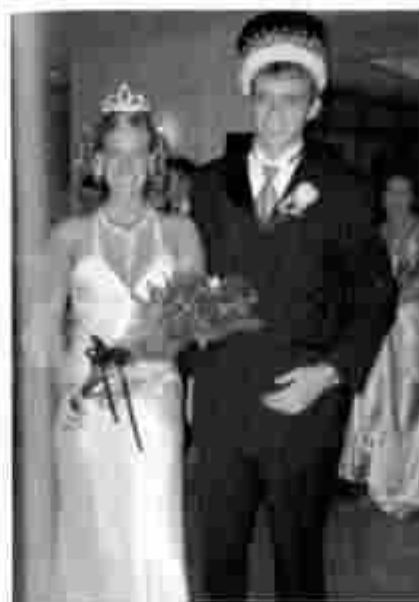
# Continuous Memories


