KIDS! GET READY - P P & K THIS WEEKEND

PUNT, PASS & KICK THIS WEEKEND IN CULVER

This weekend may be the last chance before the snow flies for Culver young persons to participate in outdoor sports activities.

This weekend, local youngsters will be given the opportunity to "dust off" their footballs and loosen their throwing arms for the 1973 Punt, Pass & Kick competition.

This year the local level of PP&K will be co-sponsored by the Culver Jaycees in conjunction with participating Ford Dealers in the area.

PP&K, now in its 13th year, is co-sponsored by the National Football League and the Ford Dealers of America. Since it was started in 1961, the program has attracted more than 9,350,000 youngsters - and participation this year is expected to top the 1,200,000 mark.

Participants in the Punt, Pass & Kick program compete only against others their own age. Any youngster eight through 13 years of age, accompanied by a parent or guardian, may register to compete in PP&K at any participating Ford Dealer. There is no entrance fee and no body contact during

competition. No special equipment is needed and participation does not impair a youngster's amateur standing.

Scoring is based on accuracy and range with one point added for every foot of punting, passing, and kicking distance, and a point subtracted for every foot off a center line.

Twelve national finalists will compete for the National championships in their age group during the halftime of the Super Bowl Game in Houston, Texas January 13, 1974. Winners will have their names permanently enshrined in the Pro Football Hall of Fame in Canton, Ohio. Their trophies will be presented by Football Commissioner Pete Rozelle.

Registrations for this area's 13th annual Punt, Pass and Kick competition will remain open through September 28.

Competition begins at the Local level on September 29th and subsequently moves to Zone, District, Area, Divisional and National Levels.

Youngsters, accompanied by a parent or guardian, may register for PP&K at Van Horn Ford - Mercury in Culver.

STATE OF INDIANA MEDALS FOR SALE HERE

Fred Adams, executive vice-president of the State Exchange Bank with offices in Culver, Plymouth, and Argos, has announced that as a public service the bank is now offering for sale the Official State of Indiana American Revolution Bicentennial Medal.

The Indiana Bicentennial Commission authorized that the official medals be struck to celebrate the founding of the United States.

The medals are being sold by participating members of the Indiana Bankers Association on a non-profit basis.

The medal design was selected by the Commission with the assistance of the Indiana State Arts Commission. Many Indiana sculptors were considered and Mr. Hector Garcia, who is currently teaching at Fort Wayne Art Institute, was selected to create the dimensional models from which the medallions have been made. Suggested subject matter was developed by the Commission, much of which is included in the design.

The Indiana Bicentennial medal features the portrait of George Rogers Clark, the leading Revolutionary War figure in the Midwest. It also depicts a tulip tree blossom from the state tree, and a Virginia dogwood branch symbolizing the close ties of Indiana with the State of Virginia at the time of the Revolution. The reverse side shows the official seal of the State of Indiana.

The high-relief art medal has been struck in fine silver and antique bronze and will be available in two sizes: 2½ inch and 1½ inch in diameter. The total limited edition issue of the 2½ inch silver medal will be 2500 serially numbered pieces. Both of the antique bronze medals and the

Two Marshall County students attending ball State University are spending the autumn quarter in Great Britain working in British primary schools.

Debra June Martin, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William J. Martin, 302 Academy Drive, and Natalie Gay Wampler, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Lloyd C. Wampler, East Winfield, are among the 24 EXEL juniors (The Experimental Program for the Preparation of Teachers for Elementary Schools) who are currently studying in Britain.

Following a month of orientation at the University of London and the University of Keele, they will spend five weeks working full days in selected primary schools in Crewe, an industrial city where Rolls Royce automobiles are made, or at Alsager, a smaller community in the midlands where the major manufacturing is of ceramic articles for the plumbing trade.

After November 4 the students will be doing small group and individual travel. All will be back in Indiana for the beginning of the winter quarter.

Editorial

Safety Report

The cause of school safety progressed this week. At a joint meeting on Monday night, members of the town Board, the School Board, the Superintendent, the two Culver school principals, and four representatives of parents in the community met for over two hours to discuss the problems and possible solutions to some of the dangers noted in the last issue of the CITIZEN. All report that the atmosphere was positive, and that there was an obvious attempt on the part of each group to contribute to the co-ordination of a community-wide plan to eliminate hazards to school children.

The CITIZEN would like to commend these individuals for this effort, and urge action upon the different suggestions coming out of this meeting, as the groups hold their individual regular sessions in the coming weeks.

Other safety news is illustrated by the picture on the front page, showing the new crosswalk lines and sign at the high traffic corner on North Main Street.

There are still problems, such as the traffic hazard shown below where the street narrows on School Street beside the Elementary School. Here, the "No Parking" zone is shorter than the narrow portion of the road, and the congestion creates a hazard area during portions of the school day.

All in all, however, we feel that the individuals concerned are putting their personal feelings aside for the benefit of a creative solution to the problems we have in the area of child safety.

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Days Gone By...

Memories From Past CITIZENS

September 26, 1968

Preliminary enrollment figures for the Culver Community school corporation indicate a combined enrollment of 1597 which is an increase of thirty over the enrollment during the first week of school of the 1967 - 68 term.

Enrollment of the new unified high school is 499, Grades 9-12; the Junior High unit at Culver combined enrollment is 198; Culver Elementary is 615; Aubbeenaubbee, Grades K-8, 186; and Monterey, Grades K-8, 99.

Culver Military Academy opened its seventy-fifth academic year Tuesday (Sept. 17) to an enrollment of 834 students.

As of last week, Culver police calls are being handled directly by the Police department. 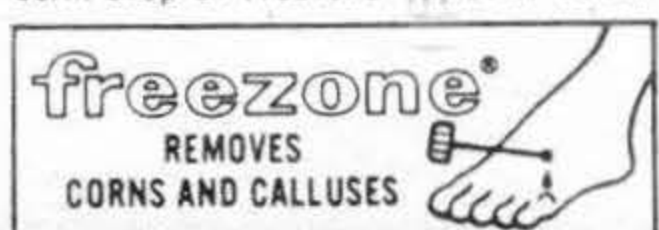

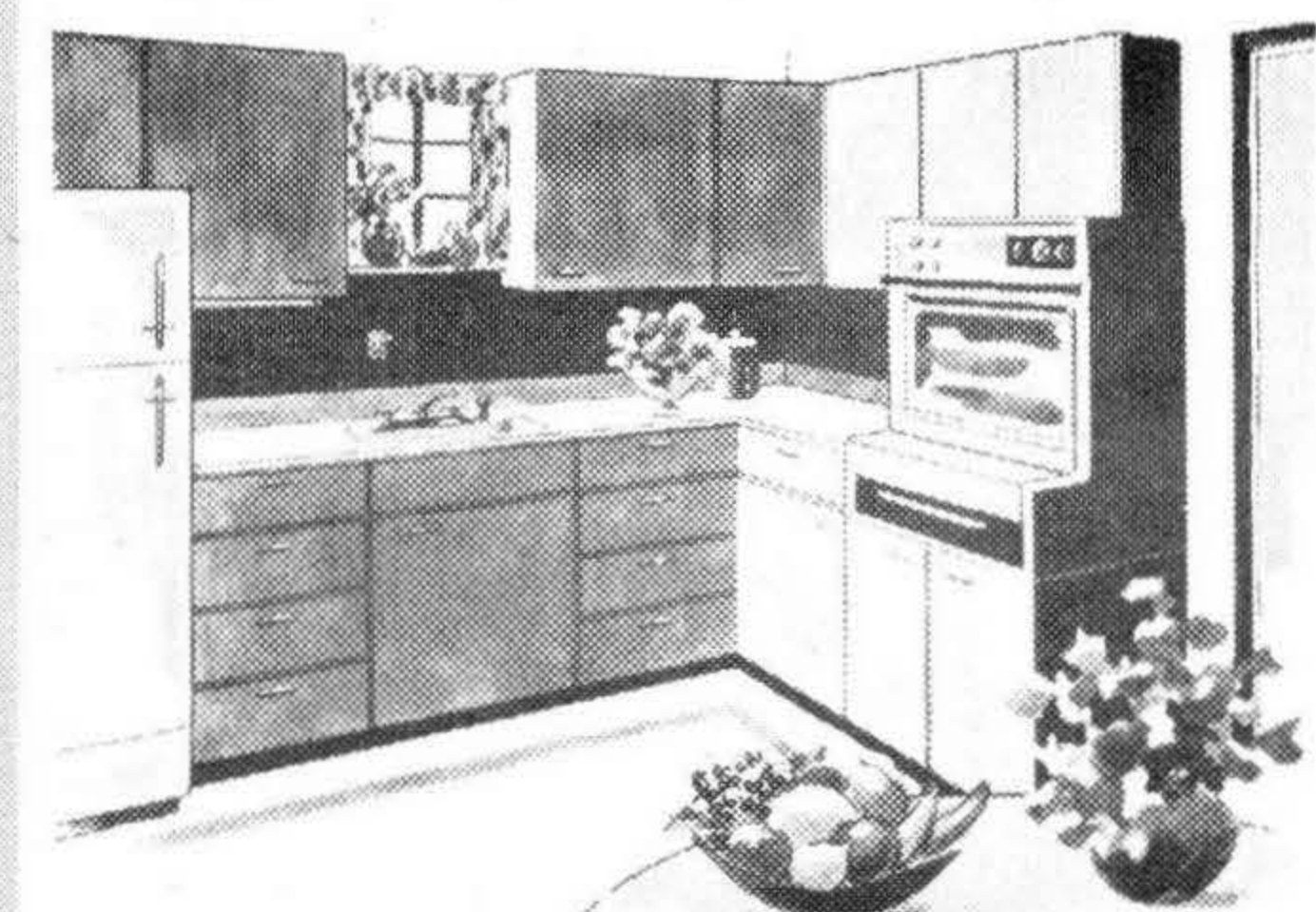

A "New Face" And A "New Place"

"Right above Mr. T's drugs, downtown" is the "new place" that our "new face" is now living. Mr. Stuart Levee, a recent graduate of ISU at Terre Haute, has now become a 'member of the team' on the high school faculty. Mr. Levee is now heading the all-new department of Pre-Vocational Education and took courses in emotionally disturbed, physically handicapped, and learning disabilities in order to achieve his teaching degree.

Says Mr. Levee of the new department: "I am striving to get the kids to do the required high school work plus finding them part-time jobs, not this year because of child labor laws, but next. I would like it to be similar to a co-op situation. With time and tolerance, a lot of these kids can receive their high school diplomas." Mr. Levee felt that the kids were adapting well to the high school environment, and that "as long as they function well disciplinary-wise, they can operate successfully in the high school. Academically is my concern."

Mr. Levee agreed that the student-teacher ratio is good, and commented "Maybe I only have ten students, but they are ten individual students with great variance in knowledge. Right now we are in the reading lab and no two kids have the same reading skill. Also, the kids are too dependent right now. They ask for help before they need it. I won't answer right away, but tell them to look again, and nine times out of ten, they catch the concept of their own accord."

Before I left, I asked Mr. Levee what he thought about Culver. His reaction: "This is a really typical town in southern Indiana. Small townish, and not as fast paced as South Bend, my hometown, but it's still not at a standstill. As far as the people go, they are awfully nice people."

I would like to close by welcoming Mr. Levee to both our town and school and by hoping the new department will grow and prosper under the fine guidance it now has!

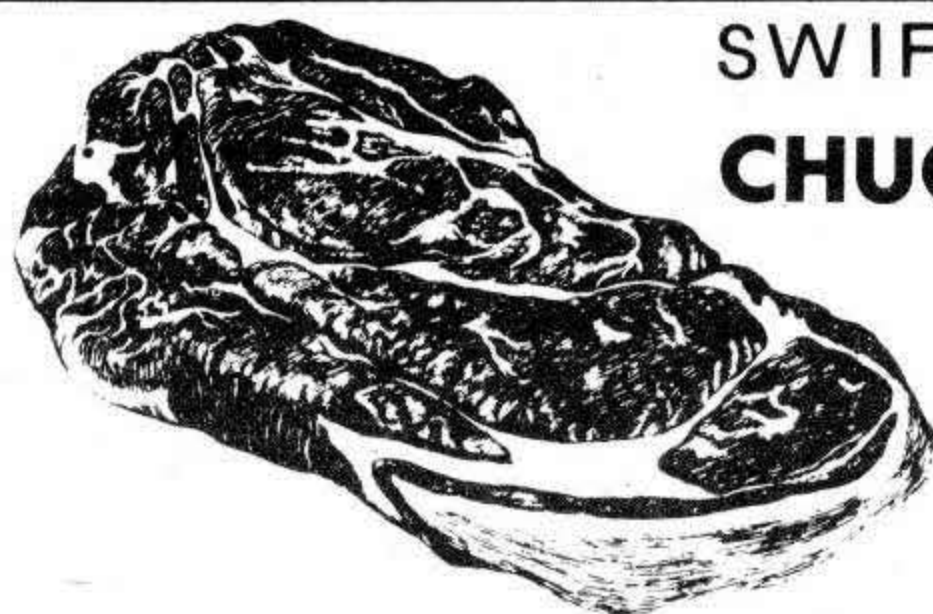
