## Show features young cast, energetic dance numbers

CULVER — The Maxinkuckee Players will be presenting their latest show, "Crazy for You" this Friday at Culver Community High School. First-time director Lenore Jones said that this year, audiences can expect a high energy production full of dancing, humor, and romance.

"This is probably more dancing than we have ever done before," said Jones, who has been involved with the Maxinkuckee Players as an actress in previous years. "We have three choreographers that have taught the kids dancing — ballroom and tap. No one has complained about the extra practices, and they are dancing their

hearts out."

The show is set in the 1930s, and lead character Bobby Child (played by Gregg Underwood of Bass Lake) has a problem. All Bobby wants is to sing and dance, but his overbearing mother wants him to take over the family business of banking. Bobby travels from his world in New York to Deadrock, Nevada at his mother's request in order to foreclose a theatre there. He meets a roadblock when he falls in love with the theatre owner's daughter, Polly Baker (played by Kathy Overmyer of Bremen).

"(My character) is the only girl living in Deadrock, Nevada," said Overmyer. "She's really just a hard working girl, then she falls in love (with Bobby Child)."

"Crazy for You" is Overmyer's twelfth show with the Maxinkuckee Players, and she said that the dancing was one of the biggest challenges.

"We as a theater group have never attempted a show with this much dancing in it," said Overmyer.

Underwood, on his third show with the Maxinkuckee Players, said that the dancing was "a challenge and a half." He was in the unique position of playing the lead role of an aspiring dancer without any previous dance training. Underwood rose to the part, however, and praised his fellow cast members for also meeting the challenge.

## AHS annual meeting

Local Indians and present-day representations thereof took center stage at the annual meeting of the Antiquarian and Historical Society of Culver, where Culver-based author Marcia Adams discussed her recent book, "Glowing Fire" and Dick Zimmerman, longtime director of Indian Lore at Culver's Woodcraft Camp — as well as author of a new book chronicling the 100-year history of the camp — spoke.

After a brief organizational meeting, Adams opened her talk with a reference to the Antiquarians' museum, the Center for Culver History, which the library

board voted out the building as of Oct., 2013.

"Sometimes you miss the forest for the trees," said Adams of the decision. "It's a bit teary to talk about."

Adams discussed the research she undertook for her book, which included the stories of the Potawatomi and Miami tribes, as well as the early European settlers.

"The more I read from documents and internet sources," she noted, "the more I listened to sources of Indian and white disagreements, the more I came to understand the basis for the disagreements

## Should Culver drill an extra well?

Water was a topic of some discussion at last week's Culver town council meeting, which isn't entirely surprising given the drought-affected conditions in the area this summer.

Audience member Tom Kearns raised the question of whether or not Culver should consider drilling an additional well to serve as a backup to existing pumps, which he noted are currently running 22 hours a day and at over 100 percent capacity.

"If one goes down," he said, "you have a problem."

Audience member Ralph Winters noted he and town manager David Schoeff had briefly conversed about the topic of a new well field and treatment plant for Culver recently. He said TIF district monies might be available for such a project through the Culver Redevelopment Commission, something to continue to examine.

Schoeff said he could speak with Peerless Midwest, the company the town has been using for repairs at its treatment plant, to get some pricing, though he noted such a project would likely cost at least \$50,000. He also asked if council was interested in an addi-

tional well using the same water source, or a new well drawing from a separate aquifer; council member Lynn Overmyer suggested deferring to Peerless on that question.

In his town manager's report, Schoeff also discussed the town's ongoing request for residents to conserve water. Though recent rainfall has helped the situation, he said, "until the heat settles down and we get a bunch more rain, people are still using water abundantly (for watering lawns and the like)."

In other matters, the council approved town attorney Jim Clevenger drawing up legislation designating the entire town park as a non-smoking area, at the request of park superintendent Kelly Young.

Young noted many people thought the Indiana smoking ban enacted last month included all of the park, but she said she researched the matter and learned smoking is currently banned only inside buildings and within eight feet of their entrances. Though she acknowledged making the park as a whole smoke-free would be difficult to police, she said she felt most park visitors would comply if signs were

# Young Farmers donate to Argos Fire

ARGOS — Culver Young Farmers recently donated a Liberty Rescue Tube to the Argos Fire Department, after firefighters and some of the Young Farmers took a class on grain rescue sponsored by Purdue University in February.

The tube comes apart in four pieces, and can be wrapped around a person trapped in grain.

“A lot of us are farmers, and we need (the tube) in our community in case someone gets trapped,” said Culver Young Farmers advisor Mike Jones. “We decided Argos would be a

central location for Marshall County.”

“It’s something that I think is a big advantage to have because you don’t know when (an accident) is going to happen,” said Argos firefighter Tucker Thayer. “If you have somebody trapped, the tube is four pieces that are like semi circles. You can put the pieces around them, and get them out of the grain. There have been other things (for this situation) but I think the tube is by far the easiest and the best.”

Argos fire chief Mark Dean said the tube works by taking the pressure of the corn away so the individual trapped can be pulled out.

“I hope we never need to use it,

but there’s always that chance,” said Dean. “There could be a need, and it’s important to know how to extricate if that ever arises.”

Dean said he is not aware of another rescue tube in Marshall County, and said that the Argos Fire Department will assist other county departments with a grain rescue if such a scenario were to occur.

Jones said that the \$3,000 needed to purchase the rescue tube was raised by the members of the Culver Young Farmers group. Group members solicited donations from agricultural businesses, banks, and insurance companies around the county.

“We were able to recruit a lot of high school kids this year that are in it to win it — they are here one hundred percent,” said Underwood.

He said that the young cast — about half are teenagers — is not typical for a Maxinkuckee Players presentation, but that they needed young people to fill the dance parts.

“We’ve got high school students, we’ve got college students, and we’ve got

adults,” said Jones of the cast. “We (also) have names that will be recognized as Maxinkuckee Players, like Dan Adams, who has been here since the group’s inception in the 1980s.”

One highlight of the show, said Jones, will be a prop — a car built by cast member Brian Liechty.

“(The car) is a loose rendition of a late 1920s Lincoln,” said Liechty, who estimates the prop took him between 80 and 100 hours

to create. “I built it one board at a time,” continued Liechty. “It has an electric lift inside of it, so I built the lift first and then built the car around the lift.”

Liechty also plays Bela Zangler, a Hungarian producer of Rockette-style shows featuring dancers dubbed Zangler’s Follies.

“I get to be somebody other than me — how many times do you get to be Hungarian?” said Liechty. “I like this character.”

Liechty believes that audiences will appreciate the dry wit and one-liners in the show.

“There are many one-line gags and (displays of) physical comedy,” said Liechty.

“Crazy for You” opened Friday at 7:30 p.m. Other shows are: August 3 at 7:30 p.m., August 4 at 7:30 p.m., and August 5 at 4 p.m. All performances are in the Culver Community High School Auditorium. Tickets are sold at the door for \$10 for adults and \$5 for children. erected, and the number of cigarette butt litter would decrease as well.

The council also voted to bring grant writer Shannon McLeod to a meeting in the near future to discuss conducting an income survey of Culver, a necessary step in securing any grant funding for a new comprehensive plan for the town. Ralph Winters noted Culver's plan commission and CRC both voted to proceed with the plan, and the CRC has offered to help pay for its creation, but more funding will be needed.

Council member Bill Githens noted the council already voted to conduct an income survey, but was waiting for better timing than summer to conduct it. He added McLeod suggested, at her last visit, a door-to-door survey would be ideal.

Schoeff said he discussed the matter with McLeod a few weeks ago. And while the cost of the income survey makes it “about a \$3,000 gamble,” if the survey isn't conducted, obtaining grant funding for the comprehensive plan is impossible.

Schoeff also explained to the council that recent testing of Culver's large meters led to the discovery that the meter at Miller's Merry Manor nursing home in Culver has only been operating at half capacity. The facility's bills will likely double in coming months, he said, noting sometimes failure of water meters can be a gradual process, as appears to be the case here.

Council also approved \$6,824 for purchase of a golf cart for town use, as well as routine insurance claims of \$9,339 to cover fire department trucks and equipment, and \$40,473 to cover the town's property liability and other requirements.

Githens noted he, council member Ginny Munroe, and utilities manager Bob Porter would meet with Jeff Kutch, head of Culver Academies Facilities department, later that week to discuss the school's water and sewer rates, at the request of head of schools John Buxton. He emphasized no formal decisions would be made, and the meeting is partly to discuss concerns that the school might construct its own sewer plant under certain circumstances, which would spell a significant revenue loss for Culver.

Council president Sally Ricciardi said town clerk

is the misunderstanding of cultures. She called the word “research” “a small word for a monumental task,” and described “sifting and sorting through material that would satisfy truth, but also a story of fiction.”

Adams said sometimes the women of the two races first communicated in areas of taking care of their families and other needs. She said she remembered reading a children’s book using the metaphor of an invisible string for the love a mother has for her child.

“I used the idea (in the book) of an invisible link tying the Indian to the settler,” she explained, pointing out areas such as Indian agronomy which enhanced life for settlers.

The book is a sequel to Adams’ first children and young adult-aimed book, “Alexia: a Lake Maxinkuckee Girl, 1885.” She said the last installment in the planned trilogy relating Alexia’s story is due out in December. The protagonist, she said, is by then in her 30s and the tale begins in Lake Maxinkuckee, but includes a train, a murder, and mystery and intrigue.

Zimmerman began his talk by referring to himself less as an author than an editor, “calling things from the past to put into a history of the Woodcraft camp.”

Indian Lore director since 1964 and a member of the camp staff for

61 years now, Zimmerman noted Indian lore has been part of the Woodcraft program since its debut in 1912, though in earlier years the Indian content was “very minor,” he said.

“Three of the greatest people in the out-of-doors were involved in the founding of Woodcraft,” said Zimmerman. “Including Sir Arthur Baden Powell. (Culver Military Academy superintendent) Col. Gignilliat thought it would be a great thing to bring into existence a new, younger program. Baden Powell went on to become an icon in the Boy Scouts; he was a founder.”

He said Ernest Thompson Seton, “acknowledged as a leader in scouting, visited the camp several times between 1915 and 1931 “and instructed the boys.”

He added Daniel Carter Beard, the first camp director, had also been a famous scout leader.

“How the three of them got connected in Culver is amazing,” he said.

Beard, according to Zimmerman, “always believed in council fires. He felt at least once a week the boys should get together and experience it. The Indian program was a very minor element. You’d have maybe a story or a dance demonstration, but as the years progressed, scouting took a

lower position and the Indian part of the program took a greater position.”

Woodcrafters were “absolutely fascinated by Indians,” Zimmerman said, adding common misperceptions about them neglect the fact that Indian people were, “like us,” not all good or all bad.

Zimmerman himself took over the Indian lore program from Maj. Ed Myers. He said the program benefited from the willingness of camp directors like Pete Trone and Fred Lane — both in the audience at the meeting — to try new things.

Council fire staff show Indian dance as authentically as possible, Zimmerman explained, though historically actual Indian dances would have lasted from dusk to dawn.

This year saw a renovation in the viewing stands at the council ring, he added, since the county had condemned them as unsafe.

A staff of five instructors teach dance, and two teach Indian crafts. Twelve to 14 students come at a time for one or two periods to learn, he said.

Zimmerman said he felt “privileged” to be the first “outsider” — that is, non year-round resident, chosen to be Lake Fest parade marshal this year.



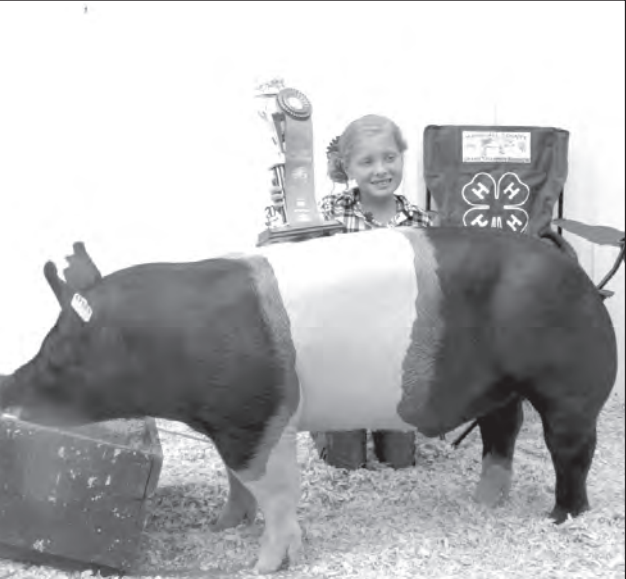

## Putting Help from Zach Johnson

**By Bruce Rearick**  
**Director of the Pete Dye Golf Trail**

If you are looking for a putting stroke that shows you a full release of the putter, Zach is your man. If you watch his stroke, you see Zach uses his right arm and hand to swing the putter forward. At times the left arm stops moving, but because the right wrist is soft the right arm keeps moving and finishes the stroke.

This release of the putter is a natural reaction to his “hands back” set up. His left wrist is already in a cupped position at set up, making it easy for the right arm to take over in the stroke and allowing the left wrist to collapse to make room, without influencing the position of the face relative to the target or the path of

the putter. Try this. Set up with your right hand only on the putter and hit a few putts. After awhile you will notice that you start to stroke the ball with less bend in your right wrist to improve the strike. The arm swings rather than the forearm pushing. Now without taking your right hand off the club match your left hand and arm to the right arm. This is Zach’s set up.

Where this soft left wrist becomes a problem is when a player is in a more “conventional” flat wrist position. When the wrist goes from flat to cupped it flips the putter up, causing you to hit it on the bottom of the face and almost always with the face twisting closed in the process. With any player I work with that uses a right arm stroke, I suggest a soft left wrist.

What I love most about Zach’s stroke is that it is totally contrary to the method suggested by many “ball roll” specialists. Mr. Breed are you out there? I watched the tournament on and off for all four days and I never once heard the announcers talk about the “poor” roll Zach puts on the ball. Rather than hitting up on the ball he actually uses the loft of the putter and his right hand to lift the ball to start the putt and it rolls out from there. On fast greens or downhill putts this gives him the added advantage of using the loft of the putter to soften the hit and control the speed.

More than any other technique, this method mimics the feel of an underhand toss to the ball to the hole and is much easier to replicate than it looks.
