REPORT RELIEF PROGRAMS

In the wake of last Wednesday's tornado, various Northern Indiana communities are "pitching in" to help the victims clean up and start over. The Culver Community Churches, acting independently as well as in their group capacity, have set several programs in motion to aid those in need.

The Emmanuel United Methodist Church has been designated as a collection point for food and clothing. The offering at Friday's Community Good Friday Service at Emmanuel will be donated to tornado victims.

In addition, individual churches are helping out. Two of the families involved in the storm's destruction are members of Culver's Grace United Church of Christ. The congregation is planning a "money shower" and a kitchen shower to help replace items lost in the storm. Special offerings during Holy Week at Wesley United Methodist Church will be donated

to assist tornado victims.

Other community groups are helping out, too. Last week, cadets and coeds from the Culver Academies helped clear rubble from the fields around Rochester, and today, April 11th, The Future Farmers of America group at Culver Community High School is sponsoring a group of students to help clear the fields as well. CCHS Principal Donald French is asking that students who wish to join the clean-up group obtain written permission from parents before joining the group. Mr. Larry McCollough, FFA sponsor, will accompany the group. The CCHS Student Council has set up a box in the high school to receive donations of money or other items from students. The Tippecanoe Fire Department and a Mentone church group have also contributed to assisting tornado victims in Talma, where it is reported that money and manpower to help clean up are especially needed.

"GOD'S TROMBONES" AT CMA NEXT THURSDAY

The Playward Bus Theatre Company of Philadelphia will present "God's Trombones" in Eppley Auditorium on the Culver Academies campus next Thursday, April 18th, at 7:30 p.m. Preferred seats at \$3.00 and general admission tickets at \$2.00 may be purchased at the door for the final performance in Culver's Concert Theater Series.

Producer-director Jim Mapp founded the company in the heart of Philadelphia's ghetto in 1965. Playward Bus has received acclaim for its production of "Othello," "The Death of Bessie Smith," "African Heaven" and numerous others in addition to the current production of "God's Trombones."

Author James Weldon Johnson, in writing "God's Trombones," thought of the human voice as a trombone because of the wide tonal range of the instrument. His volume of verse has become a classic work of Afro-American literature.

The work is Johnson's tribute to the Negro folk preacher. It captures the imagery, the rhythm, the inspiration and the dignity of the untaught preacher without using dialect. Carl Sandburg called it "a skilled and worthy book, the cunning rhythms, the graphic language, the figure of speech, join in a work that is the realm of art."

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DOG OWNERS ADVISED OF STATE STATUTES

The Culver Police Department wishes to remind all dog owners that dogs are to be confined or accompanied by the owner at all times; wearing a tag at all times; and immunized against rabies. The owner is responsible for all damages suffered as a result of neglecting these requirements, and the dog is subject to being impounded or shot. Numerous complaints of dogs running in packs in town necessitate strict enforcement of the state statutes regarding dogs. They are listed in part below.

16-204 (3798). If any dog shall be found roaming over the country unattended by his master or owner or his owner's agent, it shall be lawful to kill such dog. (Acts 1897, ch. 119, §14, p. 178)

16-206 (3710) Any person owning or harboring any female dog, who shall allow such female dog to run at large during any period of rutting or when in heat, shall be fined not less than five, nor more than twenty dollars.

10-218 It shall be unlawful for any person to harbor any dog which is over the age of six months and which dog is not immunized against rabies. (Fine for violation up to \$50.00) (Acts 1957, ch. 340, §1, p. 999)

16-323 It shall be unlawful for any person to keep, harbor, board, feed or permit any dog to stay about his, her or their premises if such dog does not have a tag attached to the collar worn by such dog, as provided in this act. (16-317—16-333). Fine: \$5-25. (Acts 1937, ch. 133, §7, p. 766).

16-329 It shall be unlawful for any person to own, harbor or keep any dog which is more than six months old that does not at all times wear a collar with the metal tag attached thereto as herein provided...Fine up to \$25. (Acts 1937, ch. 133, §13, p. 766).

The Police Department reminds dog owners that use of the tranquilizing capture gun does not insure that the animal will not be ill or possibly even die, since lethal dosage depends on the weight of the dog. State statutes and local ordinances will be enforced in Culver, as unconfined dogs have become a serious problem.

Dog tags may still be purchased at the Clerk's office at the Town Hall.

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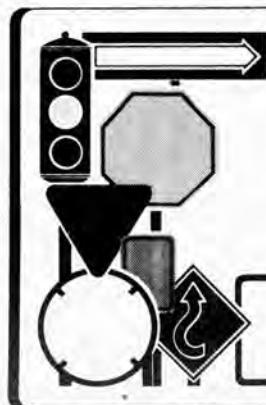
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MAXINKUCKEE'S OWN "TITANIC"

STRANGE APPARITION ON LAKE

Up from the depths of the North Atlantic and onto the waters of Lake Maxinkuckee comes the Titanic. Just 62 years to the day after it sank, a scale model of the ship will begin its maiden voyage April 15th. Since it is a much smaller ship, a shorter voyage is anticipated.

Designer-builder Anthony G. "Tony" Bult states, "Due to compartment layout and inherent watertight integrity, this vessel is considered truly unsinkable." Curiously, this theory of "unsinkability" was maintained by the builders of the original Titanic.

Tony Bult, for as long as he can remember, was fascinated by the fact and fiction surrounding the April 15, 1912, sinking of the British liner in the North Atlantic after a tragic collision with an iceberg. His fascination motivated him to begin a scale replica.

Working with no plans, only pictures and drawings from old newspapers and magazines, and using scrap pine wood, he painstakingly drew his own plans and began to "reconstruct" the ship. It was to be slightly less than five feet in length and ten pounds in weight. Education and the pursuit of a teaching career, however, caused the uncompleted vessel to be put aside for many years.

In 1961, at the age of 16, he started the project at home in Switzerland. He was not able to spend much time on it until recently because he went on to attend Culver Military Academy as a cadet, graduated, went to college, graduated, and then returned to Culver in 1972 to join the faculty as a tactical officer, English instructor, and advisor to the model club, which he created on campus.

Last year Bult visited his parents and brought the uncompleted "Titanic" to Culver

and worked on it in his spare time at the hobby shop. Bult's replica-in-miniature had its "shakedown cruise" this winter and was considered "fit for sea" in late March. The new Titanic is once again ready to take its fateful voyage, only this time on the charted courses of Lake Maxinkuckee.

Powered by three electric motors and remotely controlled by a four-channel radio mechanism, the new Titanic will be navigated from the shore. Bult will be, in fact, the captain, chief engineer and helmsman while standing safely on solid ground at Culver's Naval Building.

Culver cadets will be involved with Bult in planning and making a movie about the "true" story of the Titanic. Scenes will depict the maiden voyage and will involve one radio-controlled "iceberg," also a product of Bult's imagination and skill. The little ship will re-run the course of oceanic history, but, according to Bult, the new movie will "tell it the way it was without the considerable embellishment in previous accounts."

The movie, produced exclusively on the Culver campus and Lake Maxinkuckee, will be of epic proportions, and, again according to Bult, "will be accomplished without a budget." He indicated, "If the Titanic and the iceberg should miss each other on the first pass, we intend to steer the iceberg and perhaps become involved in a motion picture first - an iceberg chasing a ship!"

What if the Titanic should sink again? "No chance," says Bult. "Although a Styrofoam iceberg would be hard pressed to sink this ship, I'd be out of my mind to try to wreck it after 13 years of work."
