

Editorial

A popular current pitch of presidential adversaries suggests that Mr. Ford should ground Air Force One, put foreign affairs on a back burner and give persistent priority attention to recession and inflation until these woes are whipped.

With this go urgings of drastic and immediate executive action, heavy-handed controls and sundry other governmental remedies.

The glib pitch has a certain superficial appeal, but it's a good thing President Ford refuses to be significantly influenced. He has chosen instead to face economic realities, one of which - while humbling - is that Presidents have far less capacity to influence the economy than the public has been led to believe.

Godfrey Sperling Jr., Christian Science Monitor political expert, explained this well in a recent column.

"The President thinks that in many ways the American public has come to expect too much from its chief executive," Sperling wrote. "He believes that ever since Franklin D. Roosevelt, a myth has sprung up, fed by political rhetoric coming from both parties, that a President is something of a superman who can deliver miracles. He thinks the myth goes far beyond the fact."

So do we. We do believe, of course, that a President can contribute significantly to economic recovery and diminished inflation, primarily by displaying wise, prudent and inspiring leadership.

But overall, the entire executive branch can only have limited affect on the nation's massive and infinitely complex economy, or on inflation born of many causes.

Moreover, past sad experience preaches all too painfully the unwisdom of from-the-hip governmental shotgunning at big complicated problems. Usually the problems are worsened by multiplied confusion, or we get cures with worse side effects than the original ailment. We hope that Sperling's summarized conclusion is correct. "The President clearly is not bowing to his critics - at least not at this time."

It's good that he isn't!

The passed resolution reads as follows:

WHEREAS, W.O. Osborn has, over the past several years, made substantial contributions through

his time, effort, and generosity to the Town of Culver and the citizens thereof; and

WHEREAS the Board of Trustees of the Town of Culver desire to recognize W.O. Osborn for his many contributions to the Town of Culver,

resolved that

Town of Culver now designate February 1, 1975, as W.O. Osborn Day in the Town of

Culver, Marshall County. Indiana, and

By saving the life of a Martian warrior he uncovers the location of the secret Valley of Life. This is the start of a strange and frightening real journey.




PATROL CAR ARRIVING SOON
