A new, artistic banner will replace those positioned on street poles around Culver this summer after a community-wide, all-ages contest wrapped up earlier this month.

Jane Musselman-West of Culver created a banner depicting Lake Maxinkuckee under moonlight, complete with fireworks in the sky and Culver Academies' famous RH Ledbetter boat at sail.

#### Stellar visit **By Jeff Kenney**

Citizen editor Most residents are likely aware by now that the Town of Culver has been named as one of three finalists for the Indiana Stellar Communities designation in the category of communities under 6,000 in population. Readers of The Culver Citizen are also aware of priority projects whose funding would immensely benefit from the designation (detailed later in this article), and that a site visit by the state's evaluation team is slated for Thurs., July 21, from 9 a.m. to noon.

Culver's town council and town manager Jonathan Leist, however, are aiming to inform community members of specifics in ways they can help the town achieve Stellar designation. Towards that end, council president Ginny Munroe spearheaded a recent distribution campaign around town with pertinent information, including:

Taking care of your own property by mowing grass, picking up any waste, and helping the town put its best foot forward to make a great first impression for the site visit:

Showing community pride and support by posting a sign in your yard or window the week of July 21. He Stellar campaign's slogan is, "Culver to the Max!" Signs will be available at town hall the week of July 5. Those owning a business may put a sign up or write a message the day of the visit for the committee to see.

Meeting the Culver Stellar committee in the town park Tuesday, July 19 for a "Clean up the Park" day, from 9 to 11:30 a.m. (meet

Musselman-West is married to Rich West, manager of the Culver Cove Resort in Culver; she notes the family has owned a residence in Culver for the past 15 years. residing here for the past six, and that their daughter and son-in-law, as well as grandchildren, live here now.

"We've loved being here every minute," she says. "It's just a nice atmosphere and people are so friendly...people do a lot of work for the community."

Town manager Jonathan Leist affirms the new banner will be displayed for the next several years, and the 35 to 40 renditions of it should be mounted in time for the July 21 site visit by the Indiana Stellar Communities committee. The banner contest, in fact, was partly initiated in conjunction with Culver's efforts to attain the Stellar designation, for which it is one of three finalists state-wide, and which will garner significant financial support for toplisted town projects including entry-level housing, a bike and pedestrian trail, and a new park, among others.

Musselman-West's entry is the overall winner of the contest, though a winter-time winner by Mikaylah Beem is also planned for fabrication and distribution during

## Culver's Pederson, basketball legend statewide, beyond, passes away

Culver, the State of Indiana, and Tulane University lost a beloved resident and basketball legend June 15 with the death of Ralph Pederson.

Pederson, born March 20, 1927, was a 1945 graduate of Culver High School, where he was a three-year letter winner and (in his senior year) team captain of the Culver Indians, legendary during the period, which included his playing prowess during an unbeaten year in 1944. The team reached the semi-state finals as well and lost only 14 games against their 64-game win during a three-year period.

Pederson, inducted into the Indiana Basketball Hall of Fame in 2001, was coached by another Hall of Famer, Paul Underwood, while at Culver.

Pederson was also a Tulane Hall of Fame member, having played there under Cliff Wells from 1948-1952 and serving as freshman basketball coach and recruiting coordinator under Wells from 1957-1962. He left Tulane only briefly to become assistant coach to Bob Vanatta at the University of Missouri from 1962-1964, and was lured back to Tulane and became head basketball coach from 1964 to 1971. Pedersen spent the next 11 years, 19721983, as assistant athletic director where he was responsible for fundraising for Tulane Athletics, a new department.

One of Pedersen's proudest achievements, according to his obituary, was signing the first African-American, Harold Sylvester, to a full athletic scholarship to play at Tulane and in the SEC. He also coached four All-Americans during his tenure at Tulane, was inducted into the Tulane Hall of Fame in 1993, and inducted into the Indiana Basketball Hall of Fame in 2003. He was a Life Member of Naismith Basketball Hall of Fame.

Pederson was preceded in death by his wife, Barbara Pedersen and is survived by his son, Craig Pedersen (wife Shelli Pedersen); daughter, Karen Clapp (husband Gregg Clapp); four grandchildren; and six great-grandchildren.

Visitation and funeral for Pederson took place June 17 and 18, respectively, at the

the CAVS service Club, BIRD, the Culver Beard Club, the town-wide cleanup, Blessings in a Backpack, Camp WeCan, Salvation Army, the Logan Nose-On, frequent volunteering with the Culver Lions Club, and too many academic honors to mention individually, though Bess did note Becker was a seven-time athletic letter recipient and leader in the CYCO service club, Spanish Club, and Journalism program at CCHS, among others.

Bess quoted another past CCHS student, Cameron Turney, in saying that, "Although (CCHS) produces no shortage of accomplished graduates, (Becker) stands apart as the most dedicated, enthusiastic public servant (whose) first priority is helping members of the community achieve their goals.

Barbara Winters, joining Bess at the podium, also discussed the Barbara Winters Award for Excellence, established 13 years ago when she retired as a longtime teacher at CCHS and her husband, Ralph, sought to honor her service with an appropriate gift. Noting she herself attended college on a scholarship, Barbara Winters said her husband chose the ongoing scholarship award as her gift.

Winters noted she chose to honor Becker as the recipient of the award in addition to the club itself designating him one of its two honorees. Becker said he hoped to begin a career in the animation field in Austin, Texas, adding that for the next few years of his life he would be "living in cartoons. "I want to thank everyone here so much," he added. "It helps so much.'

Providing input on the Stellar Investment Plan and participating in the process, including following the Culver Stellar Communities Information Page on Facebook to learn more about the projects. Residents are encouraged to think about what investments the town should make to help grow its population, increase its assessed value, and improve area median income, and help town leaders work to achieve those goals.

Key Stellar Communities projects in Culver in-

#### clude the Sandhill Farm entry-level housing project, which seeks to add 24 new rental units and 20 townhouses or duplexes for economic mid-level occupants; the Lake Maxinkuckee pedestrian and bike trail connecting the lake, downtown, and Culver Academies; major update and renovation to the park's beach lodge; widening and straightening the West Jefferson Street gateway, and adding street lights and sidewalks. Additional projects could include adding sidewalks for pedestrian access to State Road 10's business corridor; creation of a public park on vacant

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land adjacent to Culver Comm. Schools; improved access to and programming centering on Lake Maxinkuckee.

"Stellar Community Designation would be a tremendous recognition for the town as it would help put a spotlight on Culver and help us continue to attract new investment from private and public sources," notes the letter. "We believe that the recognition and investment provided by the state will also help attract new private investment into our community based off the effect the award has had on other communities in the state.'

youth was happily spent on Lake Manitou, where his parents owned rental cottages and - over the years - other businesses, including a restaurant, a meat processing plant, and a boat dealership.

At the meeting, Julie Berndt's contract was renewed for two years (although as middle and high school assistant principal), as was CES principal Erin Proskey's. The latter will retain her pay and benefits but work more days per year in the position, reported WKVI.

Interim superintendent Chuck Kitchell's contract was renewed for one year, though he explained he plans to retire at the end of the next school year (one year from this time) and so has no plans to seek the permanent superintendent position. That post was left open last December when Dr. Vickie McGuire announced her resignation, and the school board, according to Kitchell, preferred not to conduct an intensive search for a replacement at the time Kitchell's former position as director of operations and elementary assistant principal had remained unfilled when he stepped into the superintendent position.

## **Enjoy food**

"Enjoy Food. Not too much. Mostly Plants."

Michael Pollan stated those words a decade ago, knowing that it will always be good advice for every person, in every country on the globe, even though McDonald's

ety, we are so interested in food. We spend lots of

money on it, we post pictures and recipes, and we often get frustrated with the results that it produces in our bodies. We even invest ridiculous amounts of cash on every conceivable gadget that tracks what we eat and drink. One of the most astonishing gadgets is one called the Pavlock Model, which is a self-administered device that zaps you with high voltage if you get too close to fried food, or if

you go over your allotted amount of calories. We all need motivation, but this seems to go past civilized reasoning. Research shows that ALL diets work if we stick with them. The problem is that few people have the perseverance to hang in there long enough to see results, nor do we exercise sustainably, which often times covers for our poor diets because we simply burn off the excess.

Enjoying food is very important. Food is pleasurable, especially when we dine with good company, and take time to savor the meal. For most of us, food is also plentiful, which often turns our blessings into a curse. We simply overeat, or eat products that are detrimental to us. A little meat won't kill you, though it's better approached as a side dish than as a main. Once upon a time, food was all we could eat, but today there are lots of edible food like substances in the supermarket that sound good, but really have little nutrition.

These products of food science often come in packages with health claims, which reminds me that if the manufacture has to write these claims on the package, it's a good indication that it's not really the kind of substance you want to eat on a regular basis- (Go-Gurt? Healthy Heart Strawberry Vanilla Breakfast Bar? Circle Shaped Processed Sausage Patties?) Especially avoid products containing ingredients that are unpronounceable, have over eight ingredients, or are high in high-fructose corn syrup. They are all indicators that the product is highly processed.

A healthy rule of thumb is to have 80 percent of your diet be whole (one ingredient) foods. Whole foods basically look like what they start out being: eggs, bananas, nuts, spinach. Taken a step further, whole foods are even better for you when they are not cooked. Nutrients begin to disappear when heat is applied through cooking. So, even if you are eating good foods, cooking them greatly reduces the value. Obviously, some plants need cooked. If so, try grilling or steaming.

Nuts and seeds are perfect sources of protein, and do not need to be prepared. Lean meats, are fine once in a while, but as stated earlier, as a side, rather than the main course.

"Eat Less" may be the most unwelcome advice of all, but indeed it is a message that needs communicated. Eating less has many advantages, including disease prevention, lean muscle- mass, and the overall good feeling that many of us crave. I hate feeling full, even though at times I do indulge in more food than I should eat. We have so much abundance. Back to the 80 percent rule: Eat until you are about 80 percent full, and then stop. Feeling POWERFUL rather than FAT AND FULL is a much better way to live and be happy.

Enjoy food. Not too much. Mostly plants.
