At sail on Maxinkuckee ice

Elizabeth Jones Bernstein provided these photos of ice boating on Lake Maxinkuckee recently (before the recent thaw and re-freeze -- hence the snow on top of the ice). A number of Maxinkuckee Yacht Club (MYC) sailors carried on a tradition dating back at least a century, when the MYC hosted winter weekend ice boating gatherings on the lake (see page 4, this edition). Bernstein says she and husband Joe and his twin sons, Jason and Justin, "enjoyed ice boating so much last year that a few more sailors friends decided to get their own boats for this season so we could share the fun." Around 10 boats were on the ice the weekend these photos were taken. Culver Community Schools' new logo official

After months of planning and fund-raising, the leadership of a community-school collaborative committee introduced the new set of branding logos for Culver Community Schools to the school board at its Feb. 1 meeting.

Culver Community High School principal Brett Berndt projected the new bank of logos for the board and meeting attendees to see, with Berndt and volunteer Shelly Schrimsher discussing the details of the effort, which began over a year ago with the formation of community-oriented planning committees to help steer the school corporation forward.

As Schrimsher discussed with the Culver Citizen last

fall, the branding campaign was aimed at a more unified vision of the school corporation and more robust sense of school spirit and pride, while simultaneously hoping to help strengthen the school in an environment of regional competition for students and funding, given various school choice-oriented measures introduced by state legislation in recent years.

At the Feb. 1 meeting, Schrimsher initially displayed a slide consisting of the wide array of visual representations of the corporation's Cavalier mascot since its inception in 1968, pointing to the lack of consistency and recognizability they suggested.

She also said an online fund raising campaign to-

wards paying for design and licensing of the new logo brought in a total of \$6,284, which she said was the net amount not including the just over \$300 which went to the fundraising website, which she said should be considered advertising and marketing money well spent.

In all, 69 people donated to the effort, with just under 2,500 people viewing it and 553 sharing a link to it via social media. Donors, Schrimsher added, came from across the demographic spectrum and included CCSC alums (both local and otherwise),

individuals associated with Culver Academies, Lake Maxinkuckee area residents, and some Illinois residents as well.

Schrimsher pointed out

the "official," more formal logo for the corporation includes a shield graphic along with the cavalier emblem, something she said

Photographic legends' work exhibited at Culver gallery

Few who live in Culver during the winter can escape nature's adventure in monochrome, most evident in the dark silhouette of trees against an ice covered lake, over-hung with grey skies which, occasionally, mistily conceal the far shore. For some, spring could not come a moment too soon, but artists find the full palette of black, white, and grey to be magic and this is nowhere more evident than in black and white photography.

Over the next few months visitors to Culver will be able to experience this through a group of exhibitions organized by members of the Fine Arts Department at Culver Academies. Opening Saturday, February 20 at 3 p.m. in the Crisp Visual Art Center in the much awaited exhibition 3 American Photographers: Eudora Welty, Alfred Eisenstaedt, and Ansel Adams.

The three American photographers on exhibition at Culver have, most likely, never been exhibited together as a group. Each represents one of three aspects of American photography: documentary, journalism, and aesthetics.

Eudora Welty represents documentary photography. **See Exhibit page 3**

New hairstylist, colorist adds new horizons to Michelle's HQ

CULVER -- Michelle's Headquarters (at 114 N. Main Street in Culver) is locally owned by Michelle Tusing Allyn, a barber who focuses on men's hair. Allyn recently hired Angie Maroules upon the retirement of long-time hair stylist Susan Elizondo, who remains active in the Culver community.

Maroules has over 18 years of experience in the cosmetology industry, holding a business degree from the University of Wisconsin. Her path to becoming a professional hair stylist began with a recommendation from a friend.

"One of my great friends that I grew up with was a hair stylist," says Maroules, "and she basically gave me the idea. I was in college at the time and it would be a great way to

make extra money. I started working at a hair franchise in Wisconsin owned by the Kaminski Group. I worked as a stylist for a year then they promoted me to District Manager and I did that until 2003."

Throughout her career she has been trained by American Crew Academy

Training, Redkin, Sexy Hair concepts, Matrix, Scruples, Graham Web and Paul Mitchell. Part of her training was learning how to teach cosmetology students.

Maroules's connection to the Culver area is through

Berndt and Culver Elementary principal Erin Proskoy and the staff believed in.

She added there are three additional options of a "main mark" among the logos presented, which means those could be seen on "most everything" the school produces, depending on preference. Also displayed was an array of banners, helmets, and other items with various iterations of the logo affixed.

Berndt explained that the various logo options agreed upon by the committee were sent to the staff, faculty, and school board towards choice of a main logo. Of around 100 potential responders, 72 replied with their preferences, leading to what Berndt described as "a pretty close race between a couple of logos. The staff felt the shield would represent us best. As Shelly said, obviously we will utilize everything (from the available logo versions), but we thought since the staff said it, the shield would represent the corporation."

Board members expressed appreciation for the effort, with board member Mark Maes suggesting the logo can help build school spirit and "get the community involved."

"Good things are happening," he added.

Following official board approval of the new logos, by vote, a round of applause burst from the audience.

Interim superintendent of schools Chuck Kitchell thanked Schrimsher ("Despite the fact that (she) doesn't want any recognition"), to which she replied she did no more than any teacher in the corporation.

"I know how hard they work," she said.

Sale of former Monterey Elementary
Kitchell, discussing the potential sale of the former Monterey Elementary Building, said the property had been on the state's unused building list for two years, which frees up the board to do what it wishes with it. School attorney Jeff Houin said the school could sell property as excess property via a bidding process with sealed bids, or in an open meeting to the highest bidder. Once Kitchell affirmed no appraisal of the property had yet taken place, Houin advised one be conducted and the next step determined from there.

Active shooter policy

Proskoy, as school safety coordinator for the corporation, discussed changes to the corporation's crisis plan aimed at making sure the plan is "up to date and appropriate."

The main changes to the policy, said Proskoy, relate to ALICE (an acronym for Alert, Lockdown, Inform, Counter, and Evacuate) lock-down procedures.



shooter training planned for Feb. 5, noted Proskoy, who added an active shooter drill will take place later in the semester with students and teachers. Included in the drill will be the plan for each building to call the opposite building (such as the high school phoning the elementary and vice versa) to check on the safety of all.

The revised crisis plan was approved by the school board, with Wentzel commenting that, "It's a shame it has to come to that, but we have to be ready."

Board member Marina Cavazos concurred, adding, "Whatever will help to save somebody's life is awesome."

Other discussions, actions

Also discussed during the meeting were upcoming

school board elections, with four seats to be open on the fall ballot, including those currently held by Jim Wentzel, Ken VanDePutte, and Mark Maes (Maes' and Wentzel's seat-holders would take office in 2018, with the other two in January of 2017). Those interested in running for the seats should file by Aug. 26 at noon.

Berndt discussed plans for monies gleaned from the corporation's recent bond refinancing, which include new handrails in the high school gymnasium, important in relation to safety concerns, he said. Not only will removable railings be added, but coverage will increase to each individual section, though some cutting of benches will be needed in order to widen each row.

Kitchell said refurbishing of the high school's loading dock is also planned, which should ease the efforts of delivery vendors and make the area more handicapped accessible and safe as well.

Work is expected to take place during spring break, ahead of graduation in late May. Kitchell pointed out bond refinancing money can only be used for capital (building) projects.

Tabled until the next meeting was approval of the 2016-17 school calendar, whose details are somewhat complicated by the State scheduling PSAT testing on Oct. 19, during planned Fall Break for CCSC and many other corporations. Kitchell said it was expected the state will pay for the same testing Nov. 2, allowing the proposed calendar to proceed as expected, though superintendents are awaiting confirmation from the state.

Among staff changes announced was the retirement of Lynn Davis as a bus driver this spring and resignation of part-time cafeteria worker Kimberly Parker.

It was also noted the Feb. 15 board meeting had been rescheduled for Feb. 22.



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

tojournalist when Life magazine hired him to tell America's stories. The Eisenstaedt portfolio on exhibition was actually shot at Culver in 1939 for an article on Culver Military Academy, which was published in August of that year. Ansel Adams represents aesthetics and is, without a doubt, the most well-known and beloved of all American photographers. Adams' technical proficiency and patient artistic practice reflects a deep environmental awareness, a concern of numerous artists since the dawn of industrial age, and a continuation of the American landscape tradition.

Together these three photographers present a vision of mid-20th century America that is both diverse and alive,

Though Welty is most famous as an author, she learned the photographic process from her father, an amateur photographer, and documented rural Mississippi for the WPA. The Welty photographs on exhibition were shot between 1935 and 1942. Alfred Eisenstaedt represents journalism. He came to America in the mid-1930s and was already a noted pho-

truthful yet hopeful. The photo exhibit is free and open to the public on Sundays from 1 to 4:30 p.m. and Wednesdays from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. in the Deer-Zink Gallery of the Crisp Visual Arts Center on Academy Road. The exhibit is available by appointment by calling Robert Nowalk, curator of the Academies' collection, at 574-842-8278.

Those who come to see the 3 American Photographers exhibition before March 31 will also be able to view two other exhibitions of black and white photography in Culver. The first, beginning on the second floor of the Crisp Visual Art Center, is a small history of photography exhibition of thirty-five photographs representing over eleven processes, from an 1850 daguerreotype to an ink jet print from 2007. Installed as a teaching exhibition, the show continues in the hallway of the first floor and is accompanied by wall labels that explain the various processes involved.

The second exhibition, on the walls of the Culver Coffee Company, is Film Stills from The Royal Ballet, a series of 18 photographs from the 1950's motion picture The Royal Ballet. It includes images of premier ballerina, Dame Margot Fonteyn, by English photographer Cornel Lucas. The exhibition includes images from the Royal Ballet Company's repertoire of Swan Lake, Ondine, and Firebird, which were shot at the Royal Opera House in Covent Garden, England.

Yes, spring will come, but there is always something to see in Culver. So, bundle up and enjoy the art.

her husband, Jason Maroules, graduate of Culver Community High School and owner of Max Motors, a West Jefferson Street-based repair shop for automobiles, ATV's, diesel vehicles and motorcycles. The couple met in Wisconsin and was married one year later. They have four children, two of whom are adopted. The eldest two currently attend Indiana University. Mayh, nine years old, will be attending Culver Woodcraft Camp this summer and Mary will soon be celebrating her first birthday.

"My husband moved me here to Northern Indiana in 2003," Maroules explains. "I started as a general manager with 52 business units out of Indianapolis. I studied to be an educator for the cosmetology industry at the same time. I worked out of Indianapolis from 2003 through 2014... I left to help (my husband) open Max Motors and started with Michelle."

"I have never met a town so nice in my almost twenty years in the salon industry," she adds.

Maroules specializes in color. As a colorist her services include highlights and specialty colors such as umbré and balayage. For pool swimmers, and those who use water with high iron content, Maroules can do a Malibu treatment to remove chlorine and iron from ones hair. She can also do a treatment called a "reconstructor" for damaged hair that rebuilds the keratin.

She will work with any age from a child's first haircut on up. If a client is interested in donating their long locks, Maroules will send them to 'Wigs for Kids' a non-profit organization which gives wigs to kids in need. The organization works with hospitals such as Riley Children's Hospital out of

Indianapolis.

Maroules also handles hairstyles for ladies attending a special event such as prom or are in a wedding (recently she did 1950's hairstyles for those attending the Lakehouse Grilles 1950's themed New Years Eve party, and a Marshall County Dancing with Stars contestant).

In addition to hair services, Maroules is a professional make-up artist and can do facial waxing.

"At the end of the day I know I made everyone feel good," she says. "If you can have a job where it is basically all positives. I never leave having a bad day. Since I have been doing hair on my own and for me, it's such an uplifting day."

Michelle's Headquarters – which last fall celebrated 20 years in business – is open Tuesday through Saturday form 10 a.m. to 6 p.m., and Thursday until 8 p.m.



Munk, Walker Winslow Jr., and John Braden, all of Indianapolis (and many a veritable "who's who" of East Shore lake residents of the day). The background is the Maxinkuckee Inn (later the Culver Inn), at the Culver Military Academy campus. The Maxinkuckee Yacht Club, according to the Culver Citizen, sponsored weekly ice boat regattas during part of the winter at the time.

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
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
Culver Community's Rodriguez wins Rochester Regional title


each.
