Culver Indians Whip Bremen By Score Of 69-52

Big Crowd Sees Homecoming Rites

As a packed gymnasium resounded with each basket, Culver's Indians turned in their most impressive performance of the young season last Friday night, bumping off the visiting Bremen Lions, 69-52. A large crowd was on hand to see the Homecoming festivities and the crowning of Marilee Herrmann as Homecoming queen at Culver's second such annual event.

It was one of Coach Gene Crossley's finest hours as CHS mentor. His 1-3-1 zone defense used by the Tribe for the last three quarters, proved to be the decisive weapon, just as it did in last February's Sectional semi-final game between these two schools.

Trying to match the taller Lions with a man-for-man defense, the Indians fell behind at the outset, trailing 19-17 after one period. But when 6'0" junior Dave Lemar entered the game and began rebounding well, and when the Tribe switched to their zone, Bremen fell quickly behind. Senior Sam Lowry hit a flurry of field goals to spearhead the second quarter surge that ended with Culver holding a 35-25 halftime margin.

Bremen outscored the Indians by a single point in the third period, but the visitors could not keep up with Culver's blistering pace in the final stanza. With Lemar rebounding ferociously, and Lowry, Paul White, Ned Davis, and Jim Boswell getting key points, the Indians won going away.

Lowry led all scorers with 20 points, most coming on his outside jumper. Sam was also brilliant on defense, shutting off Junior Buzz Anglin and grabbing nine rebounds. Boswell and White, both playing near-perfect floor games in the backcourt, added 10 points apiece. 6'3" center Craig Roeder led the losers with 19, while Anglin and Terry Miller had 13 and 21, respectively.

The only sour note for the huge crowd was the heart-breaking loss inflicted upon Culver's hustling B-Team, 44-43, in overtime. The defeat ended Coach John Bottorff's winning streak at four, but the Panoses played a fine game even in defeat. Bruce Lindvall popped in 17 big points, 11 of them in the fourth and overtime periods. The slender sophomore has now tallied 45 points in three games, after missing the first two encounters.

Both the Tribe and the Baby Tribe now carry 4-1 records. The last CHS Varsity to have a comparable record at this stage of the season was the 1952-53 squad which won its first 12 games and at one time was ranked ninth in the state.

This weekend promises even better, more exciting action as Culver challenges Starke County's best teams on successive nights. Friday night's game is at Knox, and North Judson's Blue Jays visit Culver on Saturday night. "B" team games for both nights begin at 7:15. Culver time. Box score:

Purdue Survey Team Engaged By Culver Schools

The main subject of business at Monday evening's meeting of the Board of School Trustees of Culver Community Schools was the approval of a contract with Purdue University for the services of an educational survey team.

The survey to be conducted will be under the direction of Dr. A. T. Lindley, Coordinator of Special School Services for Purdue. A comprehensive study will include a study of and recommendations concerning:

1. The scope of the educational program.
2. The present and future pupil population.
3. The grade level organization of the school system.
4. An evaluation of existing school building facilities and the need for location and construction of new school building facilities.
5. The organization and administration of the pupil transportation program.
6. Financial resources and capital outlay financing.

Under Dr. Lindley's direction, members of the University staff who are specialists in various areas of the study will visit the school corporation and help evaluate the educational needs and facilities.

The School Board also checked the transfer statements and approved payments of transfer charges for pupils of the Culver Community Schools area who attended schools outside the corporation during the 1962-63 school term. The costs payable during December by the Culver Community Schools to the other corporations for such transfer pupils are as follows: To Rochester Community Schools, \$237.13; to Palaski County School Corporation, \$3,443.85; and to Knox-Center Schools, \$13,380.

Superintendent Frank McLane indicated that approximately \$15,000 of State Taxation Support was still due from the State to complete payment for the 1962-63 school term. This payment should be received during December. Unless the tax distributions of December taxes are made by the counties prior to Christmas, an advanced draw will be requested from the Marshall County Auditor to meet the transfer and salary payments to be made during December.

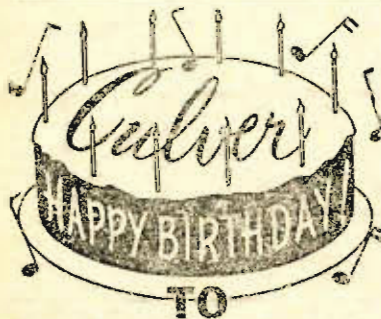
Boy Scouts To Begin Christmas Tree Sales

Postmaster Urges Early Mailing Of Cards, Packages

Postmaster E. Wayne Mattox said today, "Early mailing of all Christmas cards and gifts is the biggest single factor in getting all of the mail delivered before Christmas. Post Office facilities have been expanded, ample help will be available, and everything is being geared up to handle a record Christmas mail this year."

The entire Christmas mailing period is a big battle against time. Even though Christmas is 3 weeks away by the calendar, it's Christmas every day at the Post Office from now on.

The Postmaster advises, "Don't take chances on mailing poorly wrapped packages. Use sturdy corrugated mailing cartons, plenty of heavy wrapping paper and strong cord. Cartons containing several gift packages should be well stuffed with tissue or old newspapers to cushion the contents."

He said further, "If you have articles of unusual size or bulk, better check with the Post Office before attempting to mail them. The limits of size and weight of packages vary, depending on

where you mail your packages from."

Always send your Christmas cards by First Class mail, using the new five cent Christmas Tree stamps, and be sure your return name and address, including your ZIP Code number, is on each Christmas card envelope.

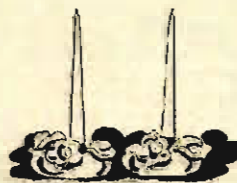
Before you mail your Christmas cards, secure free labels from the Post Office which read, "ALL FOR LOCAL DELIVERY" and "ALL FOR OUT OF TOWN DELIVERY", so that you can sort your cards into two bundles, with the addresses all facing one way, thus expediting delivery.

Send all Christmas mail going long distances before December 10th. Follow up promptly with cards and gifts for local delivery. Mail "Early and Often" for a merrier Christmas!

DIRECT MAIL TO SANTA NOW AVAILABLE

Postmaster Mattox has news for all of the small hopefuls. This year the Post Office has made arrangements for a "special delivery air mail" service direct to old Santa at the North Pole. Any letter addressed to SANTA CLAUS, NORTH POLE 99701, will receive this special service and will also be assured of an answer (if Santa can make out the return address).

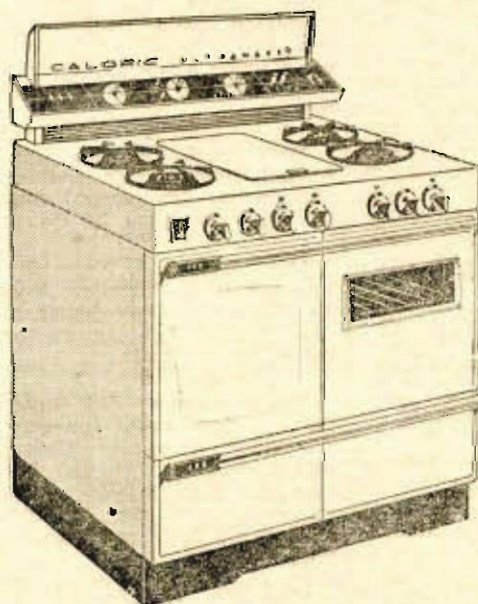

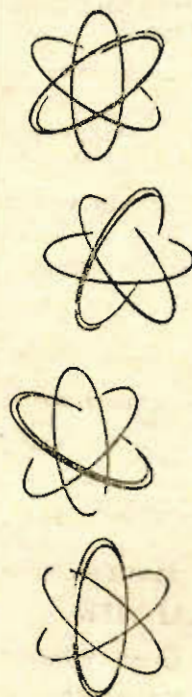

COUNTY HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT REPRESENTED AT ROAD SCHOOL

All county highway departments have made substantial progress in establishing the State's new cost records system and most have completed full installation of the system. Jean Hittle, Purdue University highway engineer, said Friday, Nov. 29, at a one-day area road school held at Knox.

Culver Emperor Lad Honey 4274586, a six-year-old, produced 20,142 pounds milk and 725 pounds butterfat in 313 days. Culver Gomar Leader Hettie 498-2962, a two-year-old, had 13,805 pounds milk and 600 pounds butterfat in 265 days. Both are owned by John A. Newman and Sons, Culver.

According to the national Holstein organization, the new production figures compare to an annual output of 7,211 pounds of milk and 270 pounds of butterfat by the average U. S. dairy cow.

Purdue University supervised the weighing and testing of the Holstein records as part of the breed's nation-wide herd testing programs.

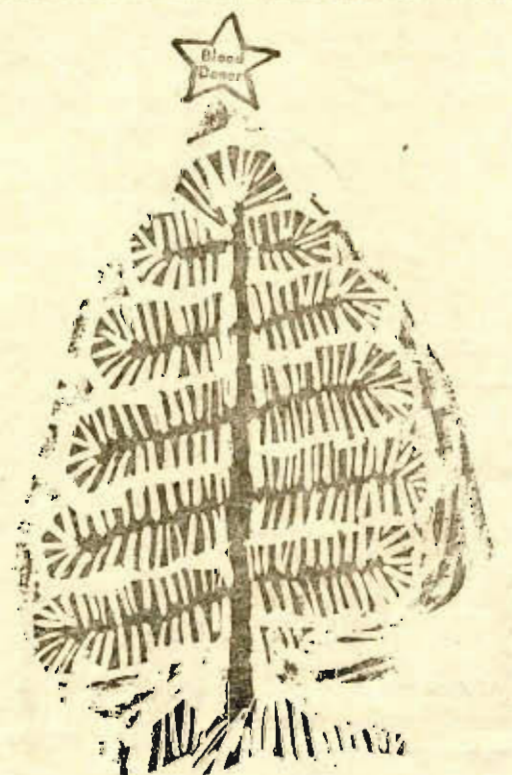

FARMERS LOOKING FOR A WORKABLE MILK PROGRAM

Officials of Pure Milk Association, largest supplier of milk for the Chicago milk market, emphasized here this week that most dairy farmers want Congress to enact Dairymen's Class I Base Plan legislation to cut down overproduction, improve producer prices, and minimize the need for government purchases of surplus dairy products.

The Association's board of directors, composed of 18 dairy farmers from Illinois, Indiana and Wisconsin, and management met Tuesday with congressmen from Wisconsin and Indiana and Wednesday with Illinois congressmen.

A. L. McWilliams, the Association's general manager, said that Senate passage of the voluntary Dairymen's Class I Base Plan bill sponsored by Senator Proxmire of Wisconsin has renewed the hopes of dairy farmers across the nation for a workable program giving them opportunity to hold production to market needs and improve their earnings.

He said the Proxmire bill and companion house bills by Congressman Poage of Texas and Congressman Westland of Washington would permit the establishment of a Class I Base Plan in any Federally regulated milk market when supported by two-thirds of the producers for the market.

Under the Dairymen's Class I Base Plan, dairy farmers producing for Federal order markets would receive a relatively high price for their share of the Class I or bottled milk market and a lower price for milk produced beyond the Class I needs.

Dairy farmers are uniting behind this type of program, McWilliams said, because it will work to the financial betterment of both Grade A and Grade B producers by reducing the heavy volume of milk now going into manufacturing channels.

The Dairymen's Class I Base Plan has resulted from a thorough study of the dairy surplus problem by dairy industry and other farm leaders who are convinced it will improve the economic position of dairy farmers and find acceptance with consumers by reducing the national taxload, McWilliams pointed out.

Civil Air Patrol Marks 22nd Anniversary

By THOMAS WALKER

Civil Air Patrol marked its 22nd anniversary on December 1. Culver is fortunate to have a unit of this hard working and dedicated group in our midst. Civil Air Patrol has etched a glowing record of patriotic public service to community and nation since it was founded in the dark days of World War II.

Then, the men and women of the Civil Air Patrol, licensed pilots and aircraft owners to patrol America's coastline. Our shipping lanes were being harassed by marauding enemy submarines, taking a fearful toll of American shipping. During the war years, CAP pilots flew 24 million miles on coastal patrol. Sighting enemy submarines, they either attacked with their tiny aircraft — CAP is credited with having bombed 57 U-boats — or radioed the Army or Navy to make the at-

tack. Twenty-six Civil Air Patrol members lost their lives in carrying out anti-submarine patrol duty.

Civil Air Patrol has not rested on that glowing record. In the intervening years, it has grown and developed into a highly organized, efficient and potent force for the emergency services relief role it now occupies. Cooperating with Civil Defense, the Federal Aviation Agency, state, county, and city government agencies, CAP today is an asset to any community. Its trained pilots stand ready to fly search and rescue missions on an instant's notice; its nationwide communications network of 14,000 radio stations has become a vital element in Civil Defense planning for survival and recovery in the event of national disaster, and its fleet of 4,300 light aircraft is an integral part of Civil Defense's recovery plans.

The federal government long ago recognized the value of this volunteer organization and when the requirements of the war years were ended, Congress insured its continued life by federally chartering CAP as a civilian nonprofit corporation in 1946

"to provide an organization for the development of aviation maintenance, of air supremacy, and aviation education and training." Two years later CAP was officially made a civilian auxiliary of the United States Air Forces by Congressional action.

The United States Air Force gave CAP two vital missions, assisting Air Rescue Service in search and rescue activities in the continental United States, and conducting an aerospace education program for youth. In both, CAP has excelled. Each year, CAP's pilots fly more than half the total flying hours expanded on search and rescue by USAF's Air Rescue Service.

CAP is unrivaled in its aerospace education program. It is not only conducting an intensive aerospace education program among the 47,000 boys and girls enrolled in the CAP cadet program, but has also developed an education workshop program for teachers which is conducted at colleges and universities during the summer months. The objective of workshop is to orient the public and private school teachers at the graduate level to the tremendous impact air and space vehicles have had on the world and to encourage the teachers to introduce aerospace course materials into the curriculum of their respective school. This year, some 15,000 teachers participated in the workshops. As a result, more schools across the country are enriching their curriculum with courses on aerospace and related space subject.

USAF has ringingly complimented CAP on the accomplishment of both these vital missions. We join the United States Air Force in saluting its civilian auxiliary on its 22nd anniversary. We are proud to have a CAP unit in our community.

Babson Discusses Modern Schools

Human Body Like Automation

Babson Park, Mass. — Everywhere I go I see spectacular new schools. I am reminded of the time my late cousin, the distinguished Major Elmer Babson, shocked the people of Gloucester about ten years ago by building a "modern" school.

New School Architecture

The local taxpayers immediately dubbed it the "New Factory," and they did not intend this as a compliment. But my cousin realized long before many of his contemporaries that the day of the old school house — built as an architectural addition to a city, with fancy columns and elaborate stone trimmings — was definitely over. He had a vision and the courage to make a radical change and to provide

space for the most efficient teaching conditions possible.

We are now in the day of "brain factories," — and rightly so. This is the time when every schoolhouse should be built as an efficient plant, with teachers being paid to be efficient managers, experts, and foremen. Even the more backward school committees and taxpayers are adopting this "factory" idea, with their cities and towns the better off for it. The hope of every community is its children, provided they are properly taught the right things. (I think some of the things taught today are silly and pointless. And too many of the new school buildings are wastefully fancy and expensive.)

Automation Here To Stay

Every day students hear talk about AUTOMATION. This is another way of saying "automatic factories." Raw materials are fed into one end and the finished products come out the other. Such factories are worth what it costs to construct them, because they will turn out the same volume of shoes, cloth, candy, etc., with 50 employees that factories used to produce with, say, 500.

Let me say here that automation depends almost entirely on electronics which I trust is being taught in all high schools by now. Electronics makes possible two key things: (1) the turning of a very faint electric current into a

powerful current, as illustrated by loud speakers and TV; and (2) the turning on or off of an electric current by light, sound, or temperature instead of by hand. This is seen in the "electric eye" which opens the door for you to go into the supermarket.

Our Own Personal Factories

I desire to point out to teachers, ministers, and parents that their young charges already possess the most wonderful "automatic factory" of them all. All young people should realize that they own and control such an efficient factory within their heads. Show them how — with a good working knowledge of reading, writing, and arithmetic — this brain can make every student healthy, prosperous, and happy.

Water, air, and proper foods are fed in as raw materials. These move along through conveyors and "cooking systems" not unlike those found within the most up-to-date electronic factory. The raw materials are magically changed into muscle and cultural "gifts." And there is far more. Students can turn an "electric knob" and find whether his or her automatic factory will produce physical force of the sort used by common labor, brain power such as that required by executives and other leaders, or a cultural product such as music, painting, and poetry.

Use Your Factory Fully

I think it is time for school committees to wake up, and to tell students to do likewise! Automation has already caught up with us. You have probably seen one of the more fascinating results of electronics: Cordless remote control. You can turn radios and TV sets on or off without getting up from your chair, with just a flash of light. Darkness can turn on your burglar light, daylight turn it off.

TV channels can be changed without wires or cords, commercials can be shut off. This power of remote control all students have had from babyhood on. But are they using it to best advantage? It should surely be one of the great responsibilities of the public schools and of the parents to teach students their capabilities in time for them to use them early and completely.
