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## Town Board Topics

For the first time since the present town board took office last January, the meeting last Monday evening, Aug. 17, was quiet, orderly, free from unwarranted interruptions and unnecessary arguments. The board members moved from one item to another quickly, dispensing with each one in an efficient manner. It was evident the members and the clerk were well versed with all the details concerning each problem as it was brought to the board's attention.

The board, discussing the painting of the town hall and the city street garage, came to the conclusion the cost would be under the required amount necessary to put up for bids. They ordered the work done and a contract was awarded to Howard Warner to do the job.

The board discussed the collection of sewage services. Basing their action on legislation passed by the General Assembly during the 1961 Legislature, the board took the following action: With each sewage bill, a copy of the 1961 law will be included, which will give sewage users information regarding the payment of sewage charges and the steps the board will take to collect them.

The board, backed by the 1961 law, will give due notice of delinquent sewage charges, which have gone unpaid after 30 days from date of billing. After this notice has been mailed to the sewage customer, the board will inform the sewage user that the city water will be cut off from the consumer. This notice must be mailed at least ten days prior to the date of water shutoff. This action was taken in lieu of placing the sewage charges as a tax lien against the property. In the later procedure, it takes over two years before the funds are returned to the town treasury. By enforcing the action granted by the 1961 law, the delinquencies can be cleared up in a few months and the sewage department have use of the needed funds.

The proposed ordinance concerning the burning of garbage and trash inside the Culver town limits was again taken under advisement. State fire regulations as to the burning of trash as it will effect the ordinance is to be discussed with Fire Chief Dave Burns and Chief of Police Don Mikesell, before the board will make a final writing of the ordinance. Such an ordinance has so many details which concern many conditions that the board has been investigating every condition and situation in order to come up with an ordinance that will be worthwhile and enforceable.

The petition concerning the vacating of certain alleys was read and accepted by the board. The legal notice can be found in this week's issue of The Citizen. The board will pass on the petition at their meeting on Tuesday, Sept. 8, 1964. The regular meeting date would be Monday, Sept. 7, but because that date is a legal holiday, the meeting was moved forward to Tuesday, Sept. 8.

The board now has a list of all the dog owners in the city of Culver as recorded by the township assessor. Notices will be sent to all dog owners requesting the payment of the Culver City Dog Tax. The city tax is \$1.00 for a male dog or a spayed female; \$3.00

## Marshall County Towns Show Tax Increases

The Town of LaPaz will have  
the lowest tax rate and the Town  
of Bourbon will have the highest,  
with the City of Plymouth show-  
ing the greatest increase if the  
proposed tax levies as shown in  
the budgets for 1965 remain the  
same after county and state tax  
boards review the proposed bud-  
gets.

The Town of Bourbon's pro-  
posed tax rate for 1965 is \$2.79,  
the highest in Marshall County.  
The town of LaPaz proposed tax  
rate of \$0.94 is down 54 cents  
from the present rate of \$1.48.  
The City of Plymouth proposed  
tax rate is up \$0.583 making a  
total of \$2.30. All cities and  
towns of Marshall County show  
an increase over the 1964 tax  
rate with the exception of LaPaz.

The total budget for Bourbon  
for 1965 is \$57,060. Part of the  
increase in the Bourbon budget  
is because of a \$1 cumulative  
sewer fund.

Rates of other towns in Mar-  
shall County are Bremen, \$2.14,  
an increase of 50 cents; Argos,  
\$1.87, an increase of 19.5 cents;  
and Culver, \$1.246, an increase  
of 7.6 cents.

Of the townships in Marshall  
County, Center will have the  
highest civil rate of 34 cents.  
The biggest increase is in the  
rate of Tippecanoe Township, 18  
cents. Tippecanoe's total rate will  
be 31 cents and Center's 34-cent  
rate is an increase of 4 cents.

Proposed rates of other town-  
ships in Marshall County for  
1965 are: Green, 30 cents, the  
same as last year; West, 26.3  
cents, a decrease of 19.7 cents;  
Bourbon, 24.2 cents, an increase  
of 1.2 cents; Walnut, 23.5 cents,  
a decrease of 3.5 cents; Polk,  
21.6 cents, a decrease of 9.4  
cents; Union, 20 cents, an in-  
crease of 5 cents; German, 18  
cents, an increase of 1 cent; and  
North, 13 cents, a decrease of 6  
cents.

The tax rates have been based  
on last year's property valuation.  
With the new valuations, the  
proposed tax rates should show  
a decrease.

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

He had also served in posts in Jamestown, Rockville, Terre Haute and in Plymouth where


he was pastor from 1948 to 1954.

## Bloodmobile At Rochester On August 26

The Fulton County Bloodmobile has scheduled a visit to Rochester on Wednesday, Aug. 26. The unit will be at the American Legion Home in Rochester on that date from 10 a.m. until 4 p.m.

A severe summer shortage of blood necessitates the special efforts of all Fulton County residents to help meet their respective blood quotas.

Aubbeenaubbee Township has a quota of eight pints of blood, with Mrs. Gilbert Corbett as chairman.

Richland Township also has a quota of eight pints of blood. Mrs. Leo Kendall is serving as chairman for this township.

Union Township must meet a quota of 18 pints of blood and Mrs. Marie Nicholas is working as chairman for this area.

The August 26th visit of the Bloodmobile will furnish the last opportunity for Fulton County residents to donate blood until December 11. Enough time has passed since the May 15 date of the last Bloodmobile visit that donors may again donate this life-saving commodity.

James Zimmerman, Fulton County Bloodmobile chairman, announces that anyone in good

health, between the ages of 18 and 60, and weighing 100 pounds or more may donate blood. Parental consent is required for donors between 18 and 21 years of age, unless they are married.

An urgent appeal is made to all eligible residents of the above stated area to mark August 26 on their calendar and donate blood at that time.

## SOCIAL SECURITY IS AN INSURANCE PROGRAM

Charles E. Burke, District Manager of the South Bend, Ind., Social Security office, stated today that social security is an insurance program, and that certain requirements must be met before payments can be made. An example of this are the requirements for qualifying under the disability provisions of the law. One is that the disabled person must have worked under social security at least 5 years out of the 10 years before he became disabled and his condition must be severe enough to prevent him from doing substantial work.

Upon becoming disabled, no one should wait more than six months before getting in touch with the social security office. There is a six month waiting period before benefits can be paid, but this doesn't mean that the disabled person must wait that long before applying for benefits. A good idea is to apply about four months after becoming disabled.

Vocational Rehabilitation is an important part of the disability program. It is the hope of the government that many disabled workers can be rehabilitated and returned to normal, productive lives. To encourage and help disabled workers return to earning a living, the law provides vocational training for those able to learn a new occupation within their capabilities. Benefits can be continued for as long as 12 months while the disabled person, newly trained, tries out his ability to work.

If disability benefits are stopped because the claimant is able to return to work and later on he again becomes unable to work, benefits can be resumed immediately if the second period of disability is within 5 years of the end of the first period.

If you know someone who is seriously disabled, suggest to him that he call, write, or visit his South Bend, Ind. social security office without delay.



# Babson Discusses Advice For Young Investors

## Build Savings, Then Invest

From time to time the younger element among my readers write in asking advice about how to get started on an investment program. Hence, I would like to devote this column to this group who are just starting out to build their future. Readers who are further along in years may also find this column useful in assisting their children and grandchildren to start out on a firm footing financially.

### First Things First

I earnestly beseech young people to use their heads and not their emotions in financial matters. My first principle, therefore, is to establish a firm foundation before embarking on building an investment program. This means acquiring adequate insurance protection for your family in case an accident or illness should result in your untimely death. My general recommendation is "straight" life insurance without the expensive frills.

Of course, home ownership should be an early consideration. I urgently advise young people not to overextend themselves by buying a home beyond their means. They should, however, endeavor to locate in a good and growing community so that their home can be a real asset in years to come.

### Build Up Reserves

Sad to say, too many young people are overanxious to acquire a fortune. In their haste, they make a few purchases of stocks

without first building up a nest egg of savings. Hence when some unforeseen emergency arises, they find they must part with their investments either at a loss or before the maximum profit potential is realized.

My second principle, therefore, is to carefully build up a savings fund as a reserve against a rainy day. Many young people today find it hard to save anything, but sensible budgeting and steadfast resistance against indiscriminate spending can produce surprising results. A gradual but persistent accumulation of savings, moreover, will provide you with funds to pick up good stocks when the market is low. Most investors could achieve greater investment gains if only they had the patience to store up reserves to invest when bargains appear.

### Earning A Living

In times such as this, when the stock market has had a prolonged rise, it is easy for investors to expect quick and large profits. All too often the stock market is viewed as a medium for supplementing one's income. I cannot stress enough that your livelihood and the foundation for financial independence lie in the building of a good career which will produce a higher level of income over the years.

By and large, the wealthy people I have met in my lifetime did not build their fortunes by speculating in the stock market. Rather, they speculated on themselves, either by working hard in their own business or by making themselves more valuable to their employers. As their earning capacity grew, they were able to channel their surplus funds into wise investments and thus compound their financial progress.

### Investing Versus Trading

Most readers lack the training,

experience, temperament, and time to make a success of trading in the stock market. On a short-swing basis, it is difficult to spot the turning points of the market and of individual stocks and to "pick winners". The average investor attempting to trade the market will more often than not find himself kicking up a lot of dust but making little real progress. Certainly, buying on margin and selling short are not for the average investor!

My advice, therefore, is to adopt the long-range approach and put your hard-earned money to work by investing in sound growing industries and companies. This especially applies to young investors, who have the advantage of a long life span ahead of them. They should allow time and the growth of the economy to work for them. By gradually purchasing a few shares of stocks now and again, particularly when the market is flat on its back, it is possible to build up a portfolio which can eventually show satisfactory growth. This requires patience, persistence, and courage, but the rewards are well worth the effort.



## In 1912 The Culver Comics Brought Baseball Fame To Culver

"Rufus, Rastus Johnson Brown" What You Goin' To Do When The Rent Comes 'Round, etc., triggered one of the most eventful bush-league baseball games ever held in Northern Indiana back in 1912.

The Culver Comics played the Bourbon Athletic Club which Bourbon won 9 to 6.

This writer, at the age of 14, was the official scorer and he consulted the files of the Bourbon News-Mirror to refreshen his memory.

Ed River, the genial druggist at Bourbon had window cards printed that read: "Rufus, Rastus Johnson Brown, the Culver Comics are coming to Bourbon Town" and it drew a crowd of 400 horses and buggies and Overland, Maxwell and Ford automobiles and their occupants, the like of which was never equaled before or since.

Both teams had exceptional baseball players, who played just for the fun of it. The all-Negro Comics were outfitted by J. P. Walters, who owned and operated the Palmer House on Lake Maxinkuckee. These superb players of whom three still live in Culver are Charles Dickerson, former head waiter at the Culver Military Academy dining hall, Roy "Sheep" Scott, still active as a baseball expert and former widely known umpire and employee of the Academy, and Luther Whitted, many years an employee of the Claypool Hotel in Indianapolis. He was a pitcher whom "Sheep" Scott thinks would, if he was pitching today, be in the Big Leagues. He had a pitch in those days known as a

"Curly" Rhodes, ss; Fred Hunter, 2b; "Snowball" Morrical, rf; Kerr, lf; Jones, 2b, and Mike Eby, p. Culver — "Sheep" Scott, 3b; Lyons, ss; Coleman Jackson, c; Charles Dickerson, p and 3b; Dave Whitted p and 3b; Luther Whitted, 1b and rf; Wade, 2b; Moore, lf; Fentress, cf. The game was played Sept. 5, 1912. Vern Snyder of Bourbon was the sole umpire and "Sheep" still claims that "we was robbed."

Anyway the record doesn't exactly bear this out because Eby, the Bourbon pitcher, struck out seven while Dickerson issued 6 bases on balls before relieved in the 5th inning by Dave Whitted, who evidently did even worse and was replaced by Wade. Hunter and Rhodes got two hits apiece for Bourbon.

Coleman Jackson, the Comic catcher, was the center of attraction. He was stocky, fearless, quick as lightning and reminded this writer of Roy Campanella, the wonderful Brooklyn Dodgers catcher of a later era. His great sense of humor helped a lot when it came to "jockeying" the batters.

"Rufus, Rastus Johnson Brown," was a song written by Andrew B. Sterling and Harry Von Tilzer. Von Tilzer was a native of Indianapolis and the writer of more than a hundred lyrics of popular songs.

Bert Williams, the Negro comic and pantomimist sang this song in the Ziegfield Follies in 1911 and it was one of the hits of the show. Williams died in 1922 in Harlem, New York City, and Mr. Kyle reported his funeral for the old New York Tribune before joining the Hearst organization.
