1965 Graduates Compete

Through the cooperation of the community and The Culver Inn, the annual Tri Kappa Benefit Card Party, which was held at The Inn on Thursday, Feb. 11, and sponsored by the Tri Kappa Sorority, has provided funds whereby Tri Kappa will be able to award nursing scholarships to three 1965 Culver High School graduates.

TWO LOCAL GIRLS WIN RATINGS AT PURDUE

Cheryl Kay Dillon, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. A. Judson Dillon, Route 2, Culver, and Roberta Lou Easterday, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Everett Easterday, 366 N. Ohio St., Culver, were included in the list of 1,205 Purdue University students who won distinguished student ratings during their fall semester study.

The list compiled by Registrar Nelson M. Parkhurst showed 293 of the distinguished students won straight A averages for the semester; nine of these were enrolled at one of Purdue's regional campuses.

For distinguished rating, a student must have a grade average of at least 3.5 points out of a possible 4.0, must get at least 14 hours academic credit in the semester and have no grade below C (4 points). The rating is given only to undergraduate students.

Board Discusses New Equipment, Town Salaries

The prospect of securing a new and more efficient piece of sewer cleaning equipment at a cost less than would be required to restore the existing machine was presented to Culver Town Board members at their regular Monday night meeting.

Verl McFeely told the board that Trojan Tool Equipment Co., Indianapolis, has offered a Model SCPS-4 Flexible Sectional "SewerRoder" to the town for \$665 and trade of the existing O'Brien Continuous Rodder now in use. The "SewerRoder" has been used as a demonstrator for the past six months but will carry the regular one-year warranty and is a more flexible unit than the O'Brien model.

Board members Edgar Shaw, Wilfred Craft and Theodore Ervin asked McFeely to arrange for a demonstration of the unit before a final decision is made. The O'Brien model now owned by the town is in need of replacement parts which would cost more than the quoted trade-in price.

In other business, President Ervin reported additional progress in the program to improve the operation at the sewage treatment plant. A representative of Chicago Pump Co. was on hand two days last week to instruct the Culver operator, Alvin Triplet, in operation. In addition, the board filed a progress report letter with the State Stream Pollution Board, and received a visit from a State Board of Health representative, who indicated his satisfaction with the progress.

Dr. Ronald C. Williams was an interested visitor at the board meeting, and raised the question of adequate pay for town employees, stating that pay rates in Culver should be in line with those of similar size communities in order to ensure the best possible public service. President Ervin replied that, in the term of the present board, salaries of all town employees had been reviewed and increased in keeping with duties performed and longevity of service. He said the subject of board members salaries had not been discussed and no increases were contemplated.

In other business, the board accepted the proposal of the State Exchange Bank of Culver as depository of public funds for the civil town for a new two-year period.

AUTO LICENSE BRANCH TO REMAIN OPEN FEBRUARY 22

The Marshall County Auto License Branch 116 at Plymouth will remain open on Feb. 22. However, the Court House will be closed on that date. Anyone wishing to purchase plates on that date must have their "B" copy of their personal property tax receipt or if they have never paid personal or poll tax in Marshall County they must obtain their clearance from the Assessor's office before the 22nd of Feb.

Saturday, Feb. 27 is the last day to purchase license plates before the deadline of Feb. 28, 1965 plates must be displayed by March 1st. The local branch will remain open through the noon hour and all day on Saturday during the month of February, according to Rosemary Bergman, manager of Indiana Auto License Branch 116.

Services were held at 2 p.m. Saturday, Feb. 13, at the Easter-day-Bowine Funeral Home in Culver with the Rev. R. J. Mueller, pastor of the Culver Trinity Lutheran Church, officiating. Burial was made in the North Bend Cemetery, located in North Bend Township, Starke County.

Federal Income Tax Returns

Your Federal income tax return is not complete until you have signed it, reminds District Director James E. Daly, of the Internal Revenue Service. Many Federal tax returns are still being received unsigned, he said.

"While we assume that failure to sign is just an oversight, we cannot process such returns and must set them aside for special handling," Mr. Daly says. This is especially disadvantageous to the taxpayer who expects a refund, because an unsigned return automatically delays any refund, whether check or savings bond.

Mr. Daly urged taxpayers to double-check their returns for signatures before mailing. One signature is required for a single person; two for a married couple filing jointly. The signature should be written in the same way that the name is printed at the top of the return. Or, as he put it, "Print at the top, sign at the bottom."

March 1, 1965, is a deadline

for Federal excise tax deposits. Manufacturers, retailers, and others who are liable for more than \$100 in excise taxes for January must deposit such taxes no later than March 1, at a Federal Reserve Bank directly or through an authorized commercial bank. Form 537 should accompany the deposit. Detailed information on this subject is available upon request from the Internal Revenue Service.

General Spivey Receives Coveted Scouting Award

Major General Delmar T. Spivey, superintendent of Culver Military Academy, has been awarded the coveted Silver Antelope award by the Boy Scouts of America.

The award, given last Wednesday, Feb. 10, during special honors ceremonies at the Academy, is presented for distinguished service and noteworthy contribution "of exceptional character" to boyhood. It is the highest award that can be made by a Scouting region.

Former Indiana Gov. Henry F. Schricker, himself a winner of the Silver Antelope, joined with other dignitaries in honoring General Spivey. He flanked the Academy superintendent as the award was presented by Frank W. Braden, top executive for Region 7, and Dr. George Plain, South Bend surgeon and an official of the Tri-Valley Council. General Spivey was nominated by Braden's region, whose 750,000 Scouts and their leaders in four states comprise the largest area of Scouting in the world.

Introductory remarks signaling out General Spivey for the award were made by Doctor Plain, who said:

"General Spivey has long provided enthusiastic support and leadership in the cause of Scouting in the Tri-Valley Council for Indiana, across the nation as ex-

ecutive board member and vice president of his council, and through the training of youth at Culver Military Academy. General Spivey benefited from his own experience as a Scout in Gainesville, N. C., and in sharing with his son in later years the achievement of Eagle rank for his son.

"Under his leadership, the Academy has given full and wholehearted cooperation in making facilities available for all types of Scouting functions. It is for these and other reasons that we pay tribute to General Spivey on this occasion."

The Academy, in addition to making its campus available for several large Scouting functions, has its own sponsored Explorer Troop and offers a full Scouting program to boys attending the Woodcraft Camp during the summer.
