Nickel Plate To Stop Passenger Service May 9

According to an announcement posted at the Nickel Plate Railroad station in Knox, the final passenger train service through Knox will be made on Sunday, May 9.

At present there are two passenger trains through Knox, Train No. 5, "The City of Chicago," a westbound, and Train No. 6, "The City of Cleveland," which is an eastbound passenger train. The trains operate between Chicago and Buffalo, N.Y.

Station agent Clarence French will continue on the job at the Knox station serving car load freight for Brems, Hibbard, and Knox. The discontinuance of passenger trains will have some effect on the delivery of some newspapers coming into Knox. However, mail service, railway express, and small freight service was discontinued some time ago.

This May 9 cutoff will mean no passenger service from Chicago, eastward to Hammond, Gary, Valparaiso, Knox, Hibbard, South Ellettsville, or Fort Wayne in Indiana, and points in Ohio and New York. It also means no westward service from Buffalo, N.Y., to Chicago.

Persons wishing to contest the discontinuance of service on the Nickel Plate Railroad may protest to the Interstate Commerce Commission at Washington, D.C., at least 15 days prior to the May 9 passenger cutoff.

The actions of the 1965 General Assembly as viewed through the eyes of a freshman senator were presented to the Culver Chamber of Commerce at its regular monthly meeting on Monday noon at the Culver Inn. The guest speaker was State Sen. Will Erwin of Bourbon.

Erwin mentioned the following as having special significance either for their political overtones or impact on citizen rights and responsibilities:

Gov. Branigan's backing-off on his campaign pledge for Homestead Exemption on the advice of his tax advisors who ruled it impractical.

Repeal of the Right-to-Work Law which had already lost its effectiveness through conflicting legal interpretations.

Civil Rights and Capital Punishment.

Erwin said that while he has long championed civil rights for all citizens, he felt the solution of the problem of civil rights for some cannot come from encroaching on the civil rights of others.

He reviewed the various positions on capital punishment and told of many hours of pondering which preceded his vote for the repeal of capital punishment.

Erwin was introduced by Norm Kelly, program chairman. Before the address, President Bob Taylor presided at a brief business meeting at which members voted to:

(1) Join with Jaycees and the Town of Culver in a "Clean-up, Fix-up" campaign to be conducted early in May.

(2) Close their business places on Good Friday from 12 to 2 p.m.

(3) Approved for printing the annual Calendar of Special Events for a fourth year — a popular listing of events of the summer months in Culver and on Lake Maxinkuckee.

(4) Approved a \$40 appropriation to finance the trip of the Culver representative to Girls' State.

The Marshall County Sheriff's Department, the Culver Police Department and the Marshall County Coroner investigated, and the body was taken to the Easterday-Bonine Funeral Home, where an autopsy was performed. The exact cause of death was not made available for publication, although death was due to natural causes.

Mrs. Clyde Resseguie of South Bend is Director of the school, with Mrs. Ted Strang in charge of arrangements at the local church.

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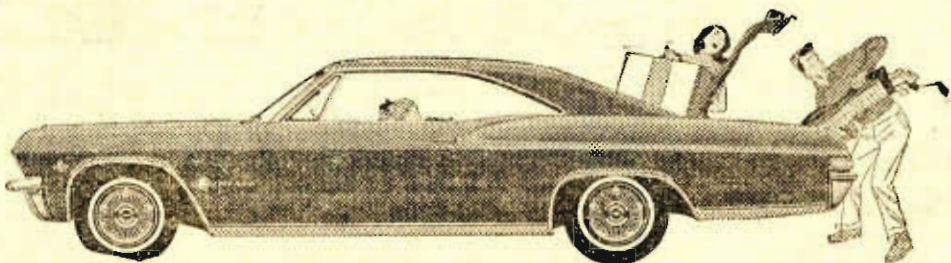
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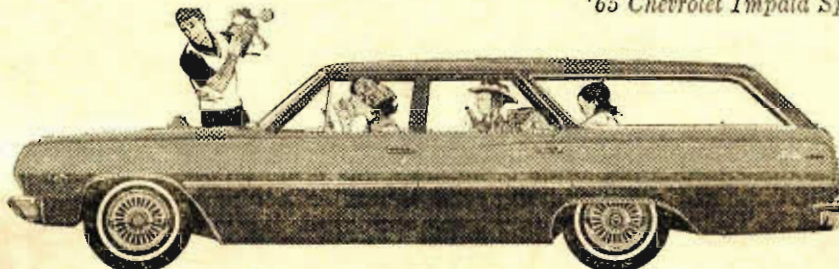

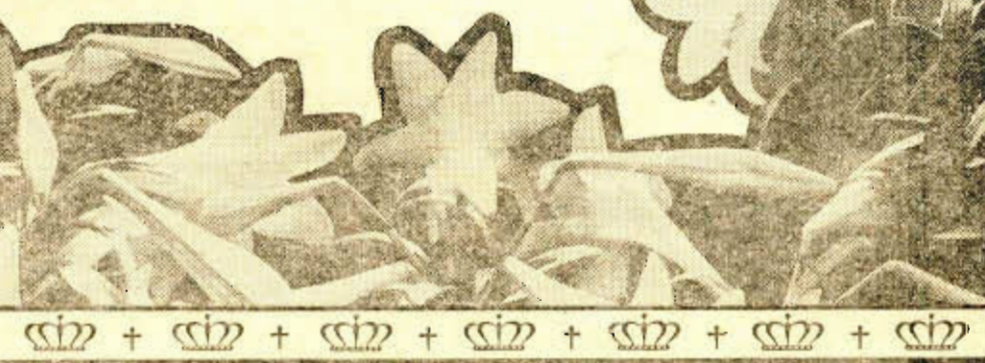

Army ROTC Scholarship Program

The Department of the Army today announced a college ROTC scholarship program beginning in September 1965, which will provide financial assistance to 1,000 qualified students. The Army ROTC Program is conducted in 247 colleges and universities throughout the country for the first time this year in view of the importance of the ROTC program to the Army.

Authorized by the recently enacted Public Law 88-647, the ROTC Vitalization Act of 1964, four-year scholarships will be awarded to 400 students and two-year scholarships will be awarded to 600 students. Four-year scholarships will be granted to individuals who are entering college for the first time. Two-year scholarships will be awarded to selected college students completing the second year of the Four-year Army ROTC program.

The Army will pay these students \$50 a month plus their tuition, textbooks and laboratory fees for attendance at colleges with four-year ROTC programs. Payment of \$50 a month will be made from the date the scholarships begin until graduation, to include summer months except for one six-week summer training camp where the student will be paid at the rate of \$120.60 per month, plus transportation.

Applications must be made during April and postmarked not later than May 1, 1965. Students applying for the two-year scholarship program will do so with the Professor of Military Science at their present college or university. Those applying for the four-year scholarship program will do so with the Commanding General of the Army area in which they reside, as explained below. Final selections will be made by the Department of the Army. Applicants will be notified during July as to whether or not they have been selected.

Upon graduation from college and the successful completion of their Army ROTC studies, the scholarship students are required to accept if offered either a regular or reserve commission as a Second Lieutenant and to serve at least four years on active duty with the Army.

To be eligible for these scholarships, an applicant must be a male U.S. citizen who meets the prescribed physical standards. He must also enlist in the Army Reserve for six years at the time he accepts the scholarship.

The four-year applicant must be between 17 and 21 years of age on June 30, 1965. The two-year applicant must be under 23 years of age on June 30, 1965, and must be a cadet in good standing in the second year of his Army ROTC training.

Applicants for a four-year scholarship may attend any school for which he qualifies and which offers the four-year Army ROTC course. He must pursue a course of study leading to a Baccalaureate Degree.

For the two-year scholarship, detailed instructions and application forms may be obtained from the student's Professor of Military Science.

For the four-year scholarship applicant, detailed instructions and application forms may be obtained in this area by writing to The Commanding General, Fifth United States Army, ATTN: ALFGC-RC, 1660 East Hyde Park Boulevard, Chicago, Ill. 60615. Individuals residing in overseas command areas should apply to The Commanding General of the Army Overseas Command in which they reside.

Richmond Entries Win 60-Mile CMA Canoe Race

The weather may not have been the best, but Culver Military Academy has labeled its second and largest 60-mile race a success.

For the second straight year, outdoor enthusiasts entered in the Academy race were drenched by April showers, but William Garrison, the Culver history instructor who heads the event, says the rain didn't dampen the enthusiasm of 81 teams from three states.

"I would certainly say the race was a success," said Garrison.

"These people aren't much bothered by the weather. They take it in their stride."

The 60-mile race started Saturday at noon from Leiters Ford and ended early Sunday afternoon at Buffalo. The canoeists stayed overnight at Beason Park and started out in early morning rains Sunday. Of the 81 teams that started, only five failed to finish, including several crews that lost canoes. One Michigan team watched as a new Fiberglas canoe swamped and sunk in the Tippecanoe. It had not been recovered by Sunday night.

The Academy turned the entry fees into prizes, and the biggest ones went to out-of-town residents. Marv Witters and B. J. Williams, Richmond, Ind., won over 65 other entries in the cruising class competition. They finished 11 minutes ahead of their nearest rivals. Culver residents, Carl F. Foust and David Bigley, came in in fifth place in the cruising division. The racing class

was won by Lynn Tuttle and Gus Carlson, St. Charles, Ill., the team of Emma Freeman and Jean Tuerek, Cincinnati, won the women's division, and another Cincinnati crew of Carol Henry and Walter Quandt took the mixed division.
