Wayne W. Flag Dies Following Auto Accident

Wayne W. Flag, age 55, of 430 College Ave., Culver, died at 8:39 p.m. Saturday at Parkview Hospital in Plymouth after being injured in a one-car accident at 6 p.m. Saturday on State Road 17, near State Road 8.

Mr. Flag, owner of the Mayflower Tavern at Plymouth, was northbound, over a mile north of Burr Oak, when the accident occurred. Police reported Flag swerved his car to avoid hitting a car approaching the highway from the side and had to swerve his car again to avoid a head-on collision with a southbound car on the highway. His car went out of control and rolled over several times.

Following an autopsy, Dr. James O. Coursey, Jr., Marshall County Coroner, said Flag died as a result of severe internal injuries sustained in the accident. Robert Baldwin, Indiana State Trooper, and Dale Dodson, Deputy Sheriff, investigated the accident. Investigations are being continued.

Five unidentified girls, reportedly riding in the third car, witnessed the accident, which took place on the crest of a hill. Flag's car was a total loss.

Mr. Flag was born July 9, 1909, in Union Township, Marshall County, to Miner and Anna Flag and lived in Culver all his life. He was married June 11, 1938, to Amy Small who survives.

He is also survived by his mother of Culver; a son, Richard L. Flag of Redwood City, Calif.; a foster daughter, Mrs. Max Nemeth of South Bend; two brothers, Cleve of Mishawaka and Glenn of Culver; five sisters, Mrs. Roscoe (Dorothy) Overmyer of Rochester, Mrs. O. C. (Freda) Gibbons of Rochester, Mrs. Morton (Mary) Freese of LaPorte, Mrs. George (Fran) Babcock of Culver, and Miss Bessie Plagg of Culver; and two grandchildren. One sister preceded him in death.

Mr. Plagg was a member of the Eagles and Moose Lodges, the Fathers Auxiliary of the VFW, and the Plymouth Chamber of Commerce.

Services were conducted at the VanGilder Funeral Home in Plymouth at 2 p.m. on Tuesday with Rev. James Campbell, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church in Plymouth, officiating. Burial was made in the Culver Masonic Cemetery.

MONDAY, MAY 3, IS LAST DAY TO FILE TAX EXEMPTIONS

This year, for the first time, an office has been set up in the hallway of the courthouse at Plymouth to expedite the handling of filing tax exemptions according to Glendyn C. Albright, Marshall County Auditor. The period for filing these exemptions will end on Monday, May 3.

Government Inspection At CMA April 23

A team of U. S. Army officers will supervise the annual government inspection of military science facilities at Culver Military Academy on Friday, April 23.

The inspecting team of four officers and one enlisted man is headed by Lt. Col. George A. Murray, professor of military science at Western Michigan University, Kalamazoo.

Culver is one of a group of secondary schools listed in the "honor" category by the Department of the Army. This designation means that it has an Army detachment on its campus in full charge of the ROTC program. Culver's detachment of four officers and six enlisted men is headed by Lt. Col. William D. Scruggs.

Under Col. Murray's direction, the team will inspect classrooms and other military science facilities. The Academy's corps of 874 cadets will participate in a general review at 10:45 a.m. in the Riding Hall, and at 1:30 p.m. the inspecting team will witness demonstrations by the Honor Guard, Lancer Platoon, and Four-Gun Drill, all honor military organizations.

Eighth National Library Week Begins Sunday

Other creditable performances were turned in by Charlie Poor in the two dashes, Phil Scruggs in the half mile (his time was only 2 seconds off the school record), and Paul Hatten in the mile.

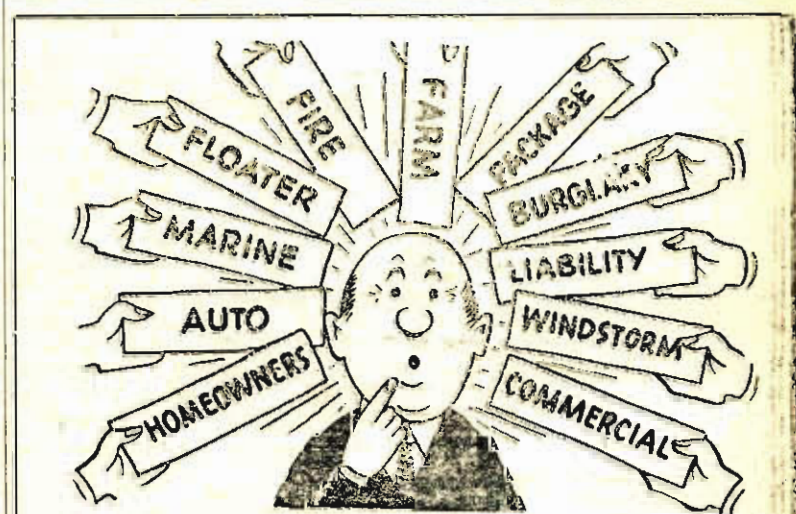

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Dr. Paul Elmen To Be Guest Speaker At C.M.A. Chapel

Dr. Paul H. Elmen, associate professor of moral theology and Christian ethics at Seabury-Western Seminary, Evanston, Ill., will deliver a guest sermon during 10:30 a.m. chapel services Sunday, April 25, at Culver Military Academy.

Dr. Elmen is widely known as a lecturer, and is the author of numerous articles and reviews as well as the book "The Restoration of Meaning to Contemporary Life." He will discuss many of the subjects on which he has written during an open house for Culver students and faculty at the home of the Rev. Allen F. Bray, III, Academy chaplain, from 2 to 4 p.m. Sunday.

The son of a congregational minister, Dr. Elmen became supply pastor at Covenant Congregational Church, Lowell, Mass., in 1939. He was previously graduated from Northwestern University and was at Harvard studying for his doctorate in English literature at the time he served the Lowell church.

Dr. Elmen served as an Army chaplain during World War II, after which he returned to Harvard to complete his doctorate. He taught at Northwestern University for nine years, was granted a Ford Fellowship to Union Theological Seminary, New York, and, in 1954 was confirmed in the Episcopal church. After being ordained deacon and priest in 1956, he joined the faculty of Seabury-Western and assumed full-time teaching duties in 1958.
