Dies Following **Auto Accident**

Wayne W. Flagg, age 55, of 430 College Ave., Culver, died at 8:39 p.m. Saturday at Parkview Hospital in Plymouth after being injured in a one-car accident at 6 p.m. Saturday on State Road 17, near State Road S.

Mr. Flagg, owner of the Mayflower Tavern at Plymouth, was northbound, over a mile north of Burr Oak, when the accident occurred. Police reported Flagg swerved his car to avoid hitting a car approaching the highway from the side and had to swerve his car again to avoid a head-on collision with a southbound car on the highway. His car went out of control and rolled over several times.

Following an autopsy, Dr. James O. Coursey, Jr., Marshall County Coroner, said Flagg died as a result of severe internal injuries sustained in the accident. Robert Baldwin, Indiana State Trooper, and Dale Dodson, Deputy Sheriff, investigated the accident. Investigations are being contin-

Five unidentified girls, reportedly riding in the third car, witnessed the accident, which took place on the crest of a hill. Flagg's car was a total loss.

Mr. Flagg was born July 9, 1909, in Union Township, Marshall County, to Miner and Anna Flagg and lived in Culver all his life. He was married June 11, 1938, to Amy Small who survives.







After being ordained deacon and priest in 1956. he joined the faculty of Scabury-Western and assumed full-time teaching duties in 1858.




