Culver Free Fair Is Underway; Kiddies Day Set For Saturday

The second annual Free Street Fair, which opened Tuesday at the West College St. location, will continue through Saturday night under sponsorship of the local Jaycees. Week day hours are from 6:30 to 10:30 p.m. and 12 noon to 10:30 p.m. Saturday.

Highlight of the fair will be the drawing for a motorcycle, which will take place at 10 p.m. Saturday. Proceeds from this project will assist Jaycees in sponsoring the Little League baseball program for the remainder of the summer.

Local organizations who are sponsoring booths include Maxinkuckee Junior Woman's Club, which has a cake raffle; Firemen, a penny pitch; and Saddle Club, Bozo Dunking Clown.

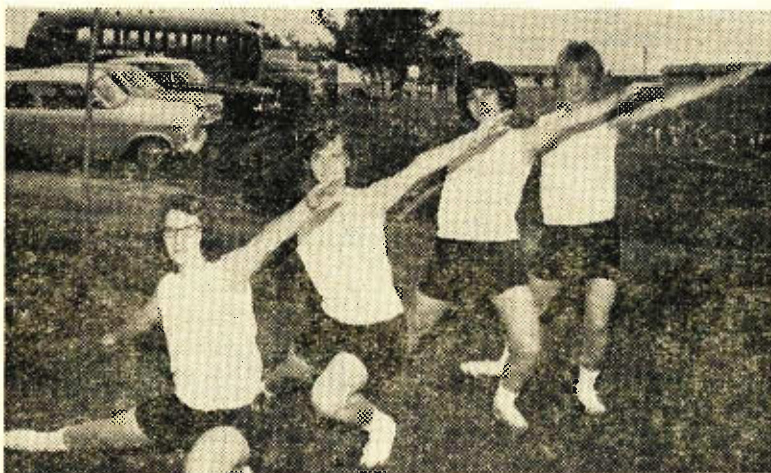
On Saturday from 12 noon to 6 p.m., Kiddies Day will be observed during which time ride tickets will be sold at half-price.

David Allen Curtis, State Road 17, has won The Culver Educational Foundation Scholarship to the Summer Naval School.

Rear Admiral John W. Bays, director of Culver Summer Schools, presented the scholarship which is given every three years to an outstanding boy in the Culver public schools.

Jaycees Ask Board To Retain Swimming Pool

Culver Jaycees, at their regular meeting last Thursday at the Beach Lodge, voted unanimously in favor of retaining the swimming pool in the new school building plans. Ed Amond, Jaycees spokesman, said President Ron McKee and a delegation of Jaycees plan to attend a forthcoming school board meeting and present a formal letter expressing the organization's stand on the matter.

Amond also announced that the club is endeavoring to secure a four-man committee from within its ranks to take over and supervise the summer Little League baseball program. If this is successful, the club indicated it would also provide financial assistance. Amond said any interested volunteer workers in the community should contact President McKee.

The Jaycees also announced they will ask the town to paint crosswalks and "slow" signs on Lake Shore Drive at the Town Park to facilitate children crossing the street at that location.

The club's annual dinner meeting for the installation of new officers has been set for Wednesday, June 30, at a place to be announced later. The club heard a report of final plans for the staging of the Street Fair which is now in progress.

DONALD HAND ATTENDS BALL STATE WORKSHOP

Little League Baseball Needs Adult Workers

Jaycees hope to launch a seven-week Little League baseball program in Culver starting the first week in July. Ron McKee, president of the sponsoring Jaycees, said today, but he said volunteer adult workers to help supervise the games are still needed.

Two of four positions on the four-man commission to supervise the activity have been filled, McKee reported. He said two vacancies still exist, and that additional manpower could be used in various jobs in connection with the project.

McKee said it will cost from \$150 to \$200 to sponsor the baseball program through the remainder of the summer, and it is hoped that the proceeds from the raffle of the grand prize at the Free Fair will meet this cost. McKee said additional information as to starting dates and instructions to the youngsters would be available next week.

Town Board Okays Purchase Of Riding Mower

The purchase of a riding mower for the maintenance of the Town Park and other town property was approved by the Town Board at its regular meeting on Monday night.

The board instructed Street Commissioner Don Mikesell to place the order for the purchase of a "Wheelhorse" 10-horsepower 36-inch mower from Snyder Motor Sales of Culver, at a price of \$675. The board indicated it would order a snow-blade attachment for the mower at a later date.

In other business, the board heard a report of the visit to Culver of the County Surveyor, who was called to survey several streets, alleys, and grades on which questions as to boundary lines have arisen in recent months.

The board heard a report on the mailing of letters to property owners who have been negligent in the cutting of weeds, and were told that in a couple of instances, the property owners had complied. The town is empowered to cut weeds where the property owner has not met his obligation, and then charge the cost of the work to the property.
