Indians Defeat **Argos And Lose** To North Judson

Phil White, in cooperation with the Civil Aeronautics and Space Administration, launched a grand slam home run that failed to get into orbit, but otherwise accomplished its mission. Countdown started at 6 on Wednesday, June 29, as the Culver varsity baseball team hosted the Argos Dragons.

Brian Lindvall pitched the game for Culver, and gave up six hits and a walk.

Determined to pick up a win, the tribe stanted scoring in the second inning, when Brian Lindvall was advanced around on singles by Phil White and Terry Clifton.

Argos matched the tribe with one in the next inning, as the right fielder singled and made it around on an error and a single.

Shortstop Steve McCombs led off with a long triple in the third. and scrambld in shortly thereafter on a passed ball. But things were just getting started for the Indians, as Stu Lowry singled and stole second, and Terry Gentry advanced Stu to third on a single and likewise stole second. Brian Lindvall loaded up the bases with a walk, and three minutes later was sitting in the dugout, as Phil White put the ball on the track and the opposing pitcher on the bench with a home run.

Somewhat awed by the whole thing, Argos failed to score again until the last inning, when they brought in one more run. Culver. however, scored three times in the last three innings, to bring the final score to 9-2. Catcher Stu Lowry hit a bases-empty home run in the fourth, and Steve McCombs scrambled in again on a wild pitch in the sixth inning. Later on in the sixth, Brian Lindvall helped Phil White drive in his fifth run of the game, as he crossed home on a single by White.

The Indians were overwhelmed by North Judson on Friday, July 1, as they played the game under the lights at the North Judson field. The final score was 8-0. making Culver's record now four wins to 12 losses.

Terry Gentry pitched a hard game, but was no match for the Judson bats. He gave up 12 hits and a walk.

The Indians posed a threat in the first inning as Steve Mc-Combs, Terry Gentry, and Brian Lindvall loaded up the bases, but failed to score. North Judson smashed two triples and three singles in the bottom of the stanza, to bring in four runs.

Walter Johnson **New President Of School Board**

Walter Johnson, Culver, was elected president of the Board of Trustees of the Cuiver Community Schools Corporation at the annusi meeting of the school board held this week. He succeeds Woodee McGlothin of Aubbeenaubbee Township.

Other officers elected are Thomas Russell, Aubbeenaubbee Township, vice-president, and Everett Dowd, North Bend Township, secretary. Dr. Oscar Wesson, Culver, was re-elected treasurer. Retiring president McGlothin is the other member of the five-man board.

The school board was advised by Attorney George Stevens that barring unforeseen circumstances the architects plans for the new high school building should receive final approval by the State School House Planning Commission within the next few days. Legal notice to bidders will be advertised as soon as plans are okayed. James Rennard of M-W, Inc., is the architect for the new high school building.

In other business the school board was advised that proposals for the conversion of the heating system for the Culver high school and elementary school were being drafted by Charles Lumm, Consulting Engineer of South Bend. The project will involve recommendations concerning the brick stack, use of fuel and recommended conversion.

Bus drivers Charles Singleton. North Bend Township, and Lorrin Shaffer, Aubbeenaubbee Township, appeared before the board to seek an upward revision of the bus driver rates established by the board at their June 20th meeting. Charles Jones, Aubbee-naubbee Township had also requested a review of the rates.

After the study of rates paid to bus drivers in neighboring school corporations, the Culver board set rates for drivers of school owned busses at \$9.00 a day for routes involving total mileage of 40 miles a day, \$9.50 for over 40 miles; and to driver owned bus chassis the rate was set at \$.20 per mile up to 40 miles plus \$9.00 or a total of \$17.00 per day.

Following a review of requests and the salary rates, the board concluded that the newly established Culver rates were equal to and in most cases higher than those paid in comparable schools and that the established rates would stand. The board also instructed the Superintendent to review applications to fill vacancies existing on three bus routes.

The board approved plans for the investment of the June cumulative building fund tax receipts. Short term U. S. Government bills will be purchased. In other matters the school trustees sanctioned the recommendation and plan for employing a school nurse on a full time rather than half time basis. Mrs. Connie Ervin is the school nurse. Art will be offered at Aubbeenaubbee School next term with Mrs. Martha Ogden teaching there half days. Mrs. Ogden was the art instructor at Lincoln Junior high school at Plymouth this past year. Ray Gangloff has been appointed industrial arts teacher at Culver high school. Culver administrative officials are seeking to fill staff vacancies in Spanish and Industrial Arts.

Town Board Pledges Help In Enforcing Laws

The Culver Town Board has agreed to enlist all available help to improve law enforcement in Culver while investigating the possibility of a night Marshal.

Police Chief Donald Mikesell said McCarty was arrested on an affidavit signed by several neighbors for disorderly conduct. He was arrested at 5 a.m.
