## Indians Defeat Argos And Lose To North Judson

Phil White, in cooperation with the Civil Aeronautics and Space Administration, launched a grand slam home run that failed to get into orbit, but otherwise accomplished its mission. Countdown started at 6 on Wednesday, June 29, as the Culver varsity baseball team hosted the Argos Dragons.

Brian Lindvall pitched the game for Culver, and gave up six hits and a walk.

Determined to pick up a win, the tribe started scoring in the second inning, when Brian Lindvall was advanced around on singles by Phil White and Terry Clifton.

Argos matched the tribe with one in the next inning, as the right fielder singled and made it around on an error and a single.

Shortstop Steve McCombs led off with a long triple in the third, and scrambled in shortly thereafter on a passed ball. But things were just getting started for the Indians, as Stu Lowry singled and stole second, and Terry Gentry advanced Stu to third on a single and likewise stole second. Brian Lindvall loaded up the bases with a walk, and three minutes later was sitting in the dugout, as Phil White put the ball on the track and the opposing pitcher on the bench with a home run.

Somewhat awed by the whole thing, Argos failed to score again until the last inning, when they brought in one more run. Culver, however, scored three times in the last three innings, to bring the final score to 9-2. Catcher Stu Lowry hit a bases-empty home run in the fourth, and Steve McCombs scrambled in again on a wild pitch in the sixth inning. Later on in the sixth, Brian Lindvall helped Phil White drive in his fifth run of the game, as he crossed home on a single by White.

The Indians were overwhelmed by North Judson on Friday, July 1, as they played the game under the lights at the North Judson field. The final score was 8-0, making Culver's record now four wins to 12 losses.

Terry Gentry pitched a hard game, but was no match for the Judson bats. He gave up 12 hits and a walk.

The Indians posed a threat in the first inning as Steve McCombs, Terry Gentry, and Brian Lindvall loaded up the bases, but failed to score. North Judson smashed two triples and three singles in the bottom of the stanza, to bring in four runs.

North Judson scored twice in the fifth inning, as the shortstop singled and made the other 270 yards when the first baseman homered after him. Their remaining two runs came in the sixth inning when a triple by the catcher knocked across a runner, and the catcher advanced home on a double by the center fielder.

The tribe threatened to score in the sixth and seventh innings when they loaded up the bases in succession. But the runners could not be hit in, and died on base.

Ruhnow will appear at a later date in the court of J. P. Fütterling on charges of disregarding a stop sign and making an improper start.

The Board has asked Chief Mikesell to crack down on all traffic violators and bicycle riders are warned that night riders must equip their bikes with lighting to comply with the State law.

Lot owners are also being asked to cut weeds on their vacant lots.

## Walter Johnson New President Of School Board

Walter Johnson, Culver, was elected president of the Board of Trustees of the Culver Community Schools Corporation at the annual meeting of the school board held this week. He succeeds Woodie McGlothlin of Aubbeenaubee Township.

Other officers elected are Thomas Russell, Aubbeenaubee Township, vice-president, and Everett Dowd, North Bend Township, secretary. Dr. Oscar Wesson, Culver, was re-elected treasurer. Retiring president McGlothlin is the other member of the five-man board.

The school board was advised by Attorney George Stevens that barring unforeseen circumstances the architects plans for the new high school building should receive final approval by the State School House Planning Commission within the next few days. Legal notice to bidders will be advertised as soon as plans are okayed. James Rennard of M-W, Inc., is the architect for the new high school building.

In other business the school board was advised that proposals for the conversion of the heating system for the Culver high school and elementary school were being drafted by Charles Lumm, Consulting Engineer of South Bend. The project will involve recommendations concerning the brick stack, use of fuel and recommended conversion.

Bus drivers Charles Singleton, North Bend Township, and Lorrin Shaffer, Aubbeenaubee Township, appeared before the board to seek an upward revision of the bus driver rates established by the board at their June 20th meeting. Charles Jones, Aubbeenaubee Township had also requested a review of the rates.

After the study of rates paid to bus drivers in neighboring school corporations, the Culver board set rates for drivers of school owned busses at \$9.00 a day for routes involving total mileage of 40 miles a day, \$9.50 for over 40 miles; and to driver owned bus chassis the rate was set at \$.20 per mile up to 40 miles plus \$9.00 or a total of \$17.00 per day.

Following a review of requests and the salary rates, the board concluded that the newly established Culver rates were equal to and in most cases higher than those paid in comparable schools and that the established rates would stand. The board also instructed the Superintendent to review applications to fill vacancies existing on three bus routes.

The board approved plans for the investment of the June cumulative building fund tax receipts. Short term U. S. Government bills will be purchased. In other matters the school trustees sanctioned the recommendation and plan for employing a school nurse on a full time rather than half time basis. Mrs. Connie Ervin is the school nurse.

Art will be offered at Aubbeenaubee School next term with Mrs. Martha Ogden teaching there half days. Mrs. Ogden was the art instructor at Lincoln Junior high school at Plymouth this past year. Ray Gangloff has been appointed industrial arts teacher at Culver high school. Culver administrative officials are seeking to fill staff vacancies in Spanish and Industrial Arts.

## HIS GREATEST HIT: *Inspired by a night in Morocco!*

FROM the minaret of a Moslem mosque a Moham-medan priest was calling the faithful to worship. His wailing voice entranced the visitor, Cole Porter. He couldn't rest until his musical genius had transformed it into one of the world's most famous songs—the haunting *Night and Day*!

It was soon followed by other hit songs: *Begin The Beguine*, *It's DeLvely*, *What Is This Thing Called Love*, *You're The Top*, *Anything Goes*, *I've Got You Under My Skin*, *Friendship*, *Don't Fence Me In*, *So In Love*, *Wunderbar*, *I Love Paris*, and so many more.

Porter wrote his first song, *The Bobolink Waltz*, when he was 10 years old—and he never stopped. Today, he is considered one of the most talented composers America has ever had. He is immortal.
