Paul H. Stayton, Age 51, Dies Of Heart Attack

Paul H. Stayton, 51, of near Leiters Ford, died of a heart attack in the Pulaski County Memorial Hospital, Winamac, at 12:45 p.m. Thursday, Nov. 17. Mr. Stayton, self employed in the excavating business, was stricken while at work and taken to his home prior to entering the hospital at 11:30 a.m.

Mr. Stayton served with the Sea Bees in World War II, and was a member of the Methodist Church at Leiters Ford, The Masonic Lodge at Kewanna, the Scottish Rite of South Bend, and the Moose Lodge in Rochester.

Born Dec. 23, 1914, near Leiters Ford, Mr. Stayton had spent his entire life in the vicinity. His father, Fred L. Stayton, lives in Leiters Ford. On Oct. 21, 1956, he married Ruby Beauchamp Reinhold, who survives.

Other survivors include a step-daughter, Mrs. Wayne Hissong of Leiters Ford; four stepsons, Stanley Reinhold of Culver, Jack Reinhold of Rochester, Donald Reinhold of Knox and Ronald Reinhold of Leiters Ford; nine step-grandchildren; two brothers, Ralph Stayton, clerk of the Fulton County Circuit Court, and Guy Stayton, both of Leiters Ford; a sister, Mrs. Robert (Ethel) Shirk, of Phoenix, Ariz.

Services were held at 2:30 p.m. Sunday in the Methodist Church, Leiters Ford, with the pastor, Rev. Norris King, officiating. Burial followed in the Odd Fellows Cemetery, Monterey.

The Foster and Good Funeral Home, Rochester, was in charge of arrangements, where the Masonic Lodge of Kewanna conducted ritualistic ceremonies at 8 p.m. Saturday.

Mrs. J. J. Williams Of Leiters Ford Dies At Age 77

Mrs. Jeanette Williams, 77, of Leiters Ford, died at 10:59 p.m. Friday at Woodlawn Hospital, Rochester. In failing health for five years, she was admitted to the hospital on Thursday.

Born near Leiters Ford May 6, 1889, Mrs. Williams was the daughter of James T. and Barbara Leiters Campbell. She was married in Chicago Feb. 22, 1921, to Jesse D. Williams, who survives. She had resided most of her life in the Leiters Ford community, where she was a member of the Methodist Church and the Rebekah Lodge for over 50 years. For many years she was a correspondent for The Culver Citizen.

Surviving with the husband are two brothers, Hugh H. Campbell, Leiters Ford, and Fred Campbell, Route 3, Rochester; two half-sisters, Mrs. Milton (Alma) Wilson and Mrs. John (Edna) Mangold, both of Hammond, and nieces and nephews. A sister and a brother preceded her in death.

Last rites were held at 2 p.m. Monday at the Foster and Good Funeral Home at Rochester with the Rev. Norris King, pastor of the Leiters Ford Methodist Church, officiating. Burial was in the Leiters Ford I.O.O.F. Cemetery.

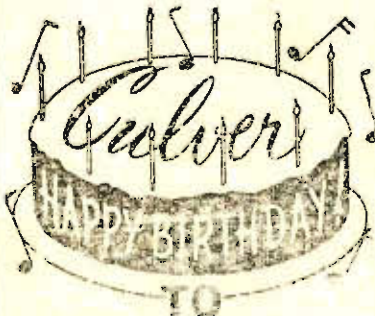
While at the Academy, he will be schooled in the sciences and amenities as well as professional subjects such as seamanship and navigation.

Town Board President Announces Newly Appointed Park And Recreation Board

Wilfred C. Craft, President of the Town Board of Trustees has announced the appointments made to the newly formed Park and Recreation Board.

Much interest has been shown by the various Civic and Fraternal Organizations of the Town in the establishment of such a Board and an Ordinance Establishing a Park and Recreation Board for the Town of Culver was approved and passed by the Town Board at their regular meeting on November 7th.

Appointments made to this Board are as follows: To serve for one year, Mrs. James Piersol; for two years, Rev. Carl Baker; for three years, Mrs. Clarence Bair and for four years, Latham Lawson.

In accordance with the Ordinance there are still to be appointed two ex-officio members, one to be selected by the Culver-Union Township Library Board from its membership and one by the Culver Community School

National Honor Society Requirements Changed At Culver High School

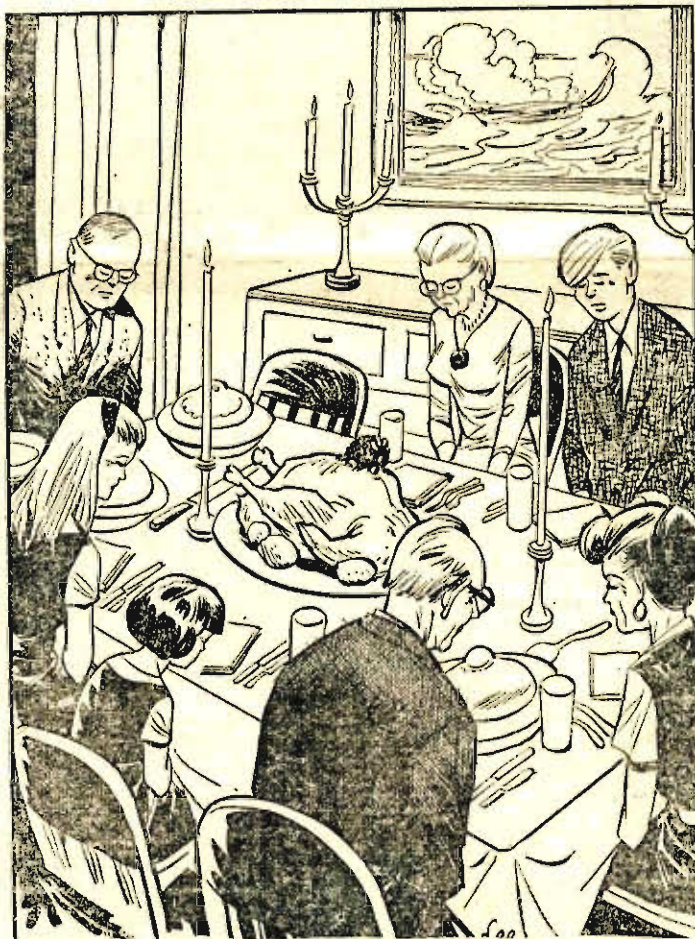
The Culver High School National Honor Society members have decided to amend their constitution. For Sophomores to be eligible they previously had to have an 8.000 or B average. Due to the fact that when students enter NHS they are on probation and members are allowed only one probation, when their grades fall below 8.000 they are disqualified and must drop out.

By raising the average for Sophomores to 8.500, they will have a half-point fluctuation, and a better chance of remaining a member. The average for any Junior or Senior eligible for NHS will be 8.000.

The other requirements — character, leadership, and service — will remain the same, although this year they will play a more important part in a member's entrance.

One of the first items of business was the vote to give \$500 toward new band uniforms, after a letter was read from Mr. Robert Rust, Superintendent of Culver Community Schools, requesting assistance from community organizations. In view of the fact that some \$7200 will ultimately be needed for this purpose, the hope was expressed that Tri Kappa's gift would serve as a kick-off toward reaching the final goal.

Mrs. George Ogden reported on current art shows in progress, including one by DePauw faculty and students now showing at Country Manor, on Highway 31, south of South Bend.

The Mental Health Committee was granted permission to send a special Christmas remembrance to the Chapter's adopted patient at Beatty Memorial Hospital, Westville. Those members who did not bring gifts for Beatty to the meeting were reminded to leave them at Trone's, together with ribbon and paper for wrapping, not later than Dec. 1.

The Chapter accepted the responsibility for selling Indiana Sesquicentennial memorial wall-hangings in the form of a colorful state map with historical spots noted. Larger than tea towels, they are Irish linen, bearing the dates 1816-1966, and will sell for \$2.25. A portion of the profit for such sales will revert to the State and County historical societies.

An estimate of \$452 was accepted for the construction of a new table and six stools to complete the furnishings of the Junior Section at the Culver Public Library.

Mrs. Jack Easterday has been appointed pecan chairman and has this season's fresh pecans on hand and for sale. Although a crop shortage in the South resulted in increased cost, it was decided to keep prices consistent with former years to accommodate regular and valued customers.

The meeting was concluded with a silent auction involving the remnants of the Christmas in August Bazaar, affording members an opportunity for bargains and netting the fund an additional \$74.

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR



Editor, THE CITIZEN:

National Retarded Children's Week is being observed here and all over the country this week through Thanksgiving Day. Because help is still needed to facilitate better programs and facilities for the retarded, I would like the public to know why this help is needed.

Mental Retardation means incomplete mental development. The brain, because of injury or lack of development never reaches full growth. The retarded child is not able to learn as much as other children and it takes him longer to learn what he can.

Retarded children vary from the few who require 24-hour nursing care to the many who can go to school, and be helped to become employable and relatively independent. But if the retarded child is to develop to the highest degree possible, he must have special educational and training opportunities.

A child who will be mentally retarded is born some place in the United States every five minutes. There are hundreds of causes which result in 126,000 mentally retarded children being born every year. Now we can control a very few. Medical science has learned how to detect and prevent brain injuries arising from the RH blood factor, complicated birth delivery, a metabolic disorder known as (P.K.U.) phenylketonuria, high fever and some other factors. We have successful measles vaccines which can eradicate measles and the possible aftereffect of measles encephalitis (Brain inflammation).

To take any giant steps forward in conquering this handicap, research in mental retardation must be intensified and tremendously expanded. There was a time, not too long ago, when mental retardation was considered hopeless. We know now that Retarded children can be helped. To provide the special services needed and to carry on the research dedicated to overcoming a condition which strikes more children than any other handicap, please continue to give your generous support.

License Branch Will Accept Reservations

Marshall County residents who wish to retain the same license plate number they had this year may do so by applying now at the Plymouth Auto License Branch and paying for their plates plus \$1.00 reservation fee. All numbers will be held for previous holders until December 10, 1966.

Applicants MUST bring their "B" copy of the paid Personal Property tax receipt, and their container card from their car or title. No plates can be reserved without a paid Personal Property tax receipt.

After December 10 any number not reserved will be open and can be reserved by anyone requesting that number, whether they have previously held that number or not.

Also, the application MUST be personally signed by the applicant whose name appears on the registration. If these applications are mailed to the branch the notary is not required. If more than one name shows on the registration, only one signature is required.

No reserved plates can be released from the license branch until such number is up for sale. Therefore, it is requested that all applicants have their plates mailed to them.

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Culver Indians Lose To LaSalle By 77-65 Score Second Quarter Proves Fatal

South Bend LaSalle's hefty Lions rebounded their way past a game Culver quintet to score their first victory by a 77 to 65 score.

The Indians, led by Paul Hatten's rebounding, kept the taller Lions running in the first stanza. The South Bend club only held a one point lead at this point. The only reason the Lions had this was because they dominated their own offensive backboard, sometimes getting three or four tips at the basket at one time.

LaSalle, trying to surprise the Tribe, came out in the second quarter with a zone press. After the Indians drove through the press for an easy basket and some freethrows, LaSalle went back into a sticky man-to-man defense. The tribe immediately went cold, hitting only two baskets out of 12 attempts. Freethrows were the only factor that kept the Indians within 20 points of the hot shooting Lions.

The Indians came back strong in the third period, closing the gap to five points with three minutes to play. The two ballclubs exchanged baskets for two minutes, but LaSalle hit two quick ones and ended the quarter leading 54 to 45.

Again the Indians fought back to within five points, but failed to score for about a minute giving LaSalle a chance to build up a 12 point lead. The waning minutes were played exchanging baskets, leaving LaSalle with a 77 to 65 victory.

"You guys cannot make 25 errors against a good team like this and expect to win!" Coach Crossley said to the team in the dressing room after the game. This was the game in a nutshell. The Tribe will be faced by many good teams in the weeks to come and must cut in half the number of errors they made last weekend if they expect to win many games.

Paul Hatten led the Tribe's scoring again with 27 tallies. George Jewell added 18 makers to the Indians' losing cause. Al Frazier, Lyle Wamsley, and Joe Kagel added 20, 21, and 23 points respectively to LaSalle's total.

LaSalle also won the "B" game with a score of 57 to 35.
