The Culver Board of Parks and Recreation held their first public monthly meeting in the new high school on Thursday, May 8 with board members Latham Lawson, Mrs. Ronald Tusing, Mrs. James McCombs, Walter Johnson, and Jesse Sims attending. The sixth member, Arthur Hughes, was absent.

Ken Grether, park league commissioner, reported on plans for the summer baseball program.

The Board announces the hiring of the following people for positions in the park this summer: Lifeguards — Miss Duane, Cheryl Welsh, Steve Kelly; clerks — Patti McCombs, Bernadette Green, Kathy Long. There are still several positions to be filled before the park opens on Memorial Day.

Your Town Park is operated on a 14 week season from Memorial Day to Labor Day. The Board welcomes any constructive criticism or volunteer help to make the park more enjoyable to all and still return enough profit to help in the cost of operating it.

Season Passes For Town Beach Now On Sale

Persons in the town of Culver and Union Township will be required to purchase season passes of 25c per family to use the beach in the town park. Season passes will be non-transferable, to be used only by members of the family the pass is issued to. Other persons using the beach will pay 25c per person each day they use the beach. Family's outside of Union Township that are in the school district may buy a family pass for \$10.00.

The money received from these passes will be for the much needed repairs and upkeep that is needed to maintain our park.

Culver Boys Pick Colleges, Receive Scholarships

Szponar Selects Tulane!

Culver Community High School's outstanding basketball player, John Szponar, has accepted a "full-ride" scholarship to attend Tulane University.

Tulane is coached by Mr. Ralph Pedersen, formerly a high school cage standout and also head coach at Culver High School. Coach Pedersen recently visited the Szponar family, but was unable to be present for the official signing ceremonies.

Szponar visited the New Orleans, Louisiana, campus during his spring vacation break and was particularly impressed with the educational atmosphere and the basketball playing opportunities available there.

The much-sought-after COHS star was contacted by more than sixty colleges and universities. He narrowed his choices down to four (others were New Mexico, Indiana, and The Citadel) before selecting Tulane.

John will be joining some outstanding basketball talent on next year's "Green Wave" frosh team. He has already met one team member from Clearwater, Florida, 6-9, 240 lbs., Gene Bowdin.

John is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Leon Szponar, Route 4, Rochester.

Szponar paced the Cavaliers in total points, field goal percentage, average per game, rebounds and time played last season. He contributed an even 500 points to the cause, 20.8 per game average, grabbed 339 rebounds, hit .498 percentage of his shots from the floor and had a free throw percentage of .781.

He scored 492 points at Aubbeenaubee in his junior year for a 23.4 average, 351 points as a sophomore for 17.6 average and 108 as a freshman for a 7.0 point average. The credits of Szponar on honor teams over the years is a lengthy one as his career has been an outstanding one at both schools.

Rick Pugh of the Culver Community High School Cavaliers recently signed a letter of intent to receive a full athletic scholarship for basketball with The College Of The Ozarks.

Coach Vern Moser of the Clarksville, Arkansas, school recently scouted Pugh and was greatly impressed with his versatility and past performance. He plans to implement him into a guard position within his offensive system.

Pugh visited the Ozark campus one week end in April and was greatly impressed with the educational closeness and attention being offered. The school performs within the Arkansas Intercollegiate Conference and is affiliated with the N.A.I.A.

Rick is the son of Oscar L. Pugh, route 1, Monterey.

Pugh's senior record at Culver discloses a 19.3 scoring average as he totaled 462 points in the 24 games the Cavaliers played. He hit a fine .399 percentage of his shots from the floor and ranked very high with .783 percentage on free throws attempted, making 156 out of 199 tries.

Pugh carried a 24.0 average per game in 22 contests for Monterey in his junior year and carried a 8.2 average as a sophomore. His complete high school record was 1353 points score and an average of 17.5 per game. He totaled a .745 free throw shooting percentage in his three years of varsity ball. Pugh has been honored many times on honor teams throughout his final two years.

Teachers - Board Agree On New Pay Schedule

Salary negotiations between the Culver Classroom Teachers' Association and the School Board culminated this week in an agreement on a schedule, effective January 1, 1970, and providing for Baccalaureate trained teachers a salary of \$6,500 to \$8,540 in 12 years and those with Master's degrees, \$6,850 to \$10,810 in twenty-two years.

For those with an A. B. degree and 12 semester hours certified on the Master's degree, there is an added \$170 differential and, for those with the Master's degree in field, there is an added increment. The base last year was, A.B., \$6,500; and Master's degree, \$6,525.

Busdriver daily wage scales for 1969-70 are under study by the Culver Community Schools officials. Bids submitted at this week's regular meeting of the Board of School Trustees have been taken under advisement.

Bids for the 20 routes from \$9.50 to \$15 per day, and for the 5 shuttle routes, from \$4.00 to \$6.00 per day. Present rates of \$10 to \$11 per day for the regular routes and \$5 per day for the shuttle routes are in force.

In other business the Board approved teacher resignations of Emily Wilson, Ruth King, James Truelove, Margie Truelove, Emily Cleavenger, Mary Ann Daniels, and Jerry Wolfe.

Contracts or Intents to Employment of Stephen Vitosky, of Terre Haute, Indiana, High School English; Barbara Linhart, North Carolina, Elementary teacher; and Marilyn Coby, of Leiters Ford, Indiana, mathematics and chemistry.

Staff vacancies for the 1969-70 school year include: Culver, Kindergarten, two elementary, three Junior High School, and four high school vacancies including English, French, Home Economics and Library, and one K-8 administrator. At Aubbeenaubee School there is a vacancy for half time Kindergarten instruction and at Monterey for four elementary instructors.

A report of the Superintendent showed that more than 1,500 had attended the April 27th Dedication-Open House for the new high school.

A recent Audio testing program, involving 535 pupils by Mrs. Theodore Ervin, school nurse, indicates that 10 pupils showed a loss of hearing. Compared with the 1968 Audio test, the report shows the hearing of four pupils has improved during the year while 15 pupils remain the same or have grown worse.

Based upon needs and inspection reports, plans will be developed during the next two weeks for the summer maintenance of building and grounds and for buses.

Three Former "500" Pole Winners Try Again

When the battle for the pole position in this year's Indianapolis 500-Mile Race gets under way Saturday, three popular veterans who have earned that distinction on one or more previous occasions, will be among the outstanding contenders.

They are: A. J. Foyt, who set a new qualifying record of 161.233 miles an hour in 1965; Mario Andretti, who jumped the speed to 165.899 and then to 168.602 in 1966 and 1967, respectively, and Joe Leonard, who holds the present record of 171.559, set a year ago.

The winner of Saturday's speed battle for the No. 1 starting position can earn \$20,000 or more for his performance and several other veterans will be pushing the favorites to new records.

Gates to the grounds will be opened at 7 a.m. (Eastern Daylight Saving Time), with an admission charge of \$2 and all seats available on a first-come, first-served basis. The track will be available for practice at 9 o'clock and qualification attempts will get under way at 11 o'clock as determined by the luck of the draw on the previous evening.

Cash awards offered by the Speedway management for performance in the time trials total \$19,500. Six prizes, ranging downward from \$1,200 to \$200, will be paid on each of the four time trial days, and additional awards amounting to \$5,500 will go to the fastest 10 qualifiers regardless of the day on which they make their runs.

The pole-position winner also will receive a \$6,000 check and trophy from Sprite and a check

for \$1,000 from Union Oil in connection with that company's participation in the premiere of Universal Studio's full-length auto racing feature picture, "Winning."

If he's using products and/or equipment for which prize money has been posted by various accessory companies, the pole winner also can collect addi-

tional awards totalling as much as \$8,000.

Race entrants who fail to qualify Saturday will be given another opportunity between Noon and 6 p.m. on Sunday and again on May 24-25. Only the fastest 33 qualifiers, however, will be eligible for starting positions on Race Day behind the Chevrolet Camaro pace car.

It was okayed for practice Saturday, but rain entered the picture and the defending champ is getting a late start in skating down his car.

THE PRACTICE TIME FROM the first of May until the first day of qualifications, is very important. For the veterans who know the track, the driving isn't important as finding out the problems of the cars. Adjustments are made all the time trying to find what can be done to give it a little more speed. The new cars, which many of them are, need plenty of track time to work out the bugs and for the rookie or even second year men, running time is necessary not only to test the cars, but get the young drivers accustomed to the famed 2½ mile oval. Many of the veteran drivers help out the rookies in this case by passing the valuable experience on to the younger car jockeys.

EVER SINCE THE START

of practice, estimations of speeds up to 173 and even 175 have been made for the qualifications. This would be well above the 171 plus that Joe Leonard set last year in one of Andy Grantall's turbines. With only one turbine in the race, and apparently it is being passed up by the intended driver Jim McElreath, it will be a piston car to do it. The difference in the speed will be the new tires this year as 17 inch rubber is on all cars except the four wheel drive models.

THE FOUR WHEEL DRIVE is featured on 11 cars despite the fact that 1969 was ruled the last year for this innovation. This seems to be the safest drive as the cars supposedly have more control than do the two wheel drive models. However, the feeling must be that the wider tires offer as much as the four-wheel drive as the drivers themselves are saying 173 and 175. The cars are changing a little with the wider tires. The cockpits are not offset to the left, the center of gravity is being altered some also due to the extra traction of the tires to better arrange the car to the mechanics desires.

THE DIFFERENT CONCEPTS on the cars is interesting. Colin Chapman has come up with another "wedge" which is supposed to be the latest in design for the car. Dan Gueney and A. J. Foyt have changed their designs some and over all, the designs, tires, engines, superchargers, turbochargers, etc., have put a wide variety of equipment at the speedway.

He has also stated that he can hit 170 or higher in his higher roadster and if there was ever a driver everyone wished luck to, it is Hurtubise. It will be interesting to see the accomplishments this man can make in his "outdated" equipment. We join in wishing him luck.

SHOULD THE WEATHER-man give the speedway good weather Saturday, you can be sure they will be off and running. The battle for the pole should be fierce and it is a proven fact that starting up front somewhere is a definite advantage to a driver come Memorial Day. Whether or not new speed records are set on the first day of qualifying, you can be sure that plenty of cars will take the four lap ride to receive the checkered flag just to get up front. Most of the names are sure to be out and running this Saturday.

Schedules Set For Summer School Program

Formalization of previously approved Summer Programs for the Culver Community School district were outlined to the Board of School Trustees in their regular meeting held this week.

The Summer Driver Training course is set for June 9th to July 31st on a morning schedule. Sixty-two students have enrolled, according to A. J. Dillon, Guidance Director. John Hayes, high school principal, has indicated that plans call for the classroom phase of the instruction to be conducted during the first fifteen days for all students, with the driving part of the course to follow.

During this three week period, and for the convenience of students, shuttle bus routes will run each day from the schools at Aubbeenaubee, Monterey, and from Bass Lake to Culver where the class will be conducted.

Charles Byfield will conduct summer instruction in instrumental music, which will be available to students residing in Culver, and Union and North Townships. He will also direct the Senior Band in their summer activities. A 22-day summer instrumental instruction program at Monterey and Aubbeenaubee Schools will be under the direction of Clayton Moon.

The school district recreation

program will include school district organized varsity baseball at Culver under the direction of William Harris, possibly 13-15 year old's baseball, and a 10-day basketball clinic directed by David Huffman, assisted by William Garver and William Harris. The all-district clinic will begin June 9th.

A six-week general recreation program has been scheduled for Monterey and Aubbeenaubee Schools, according to supervisor John Nelson.

The summer program will include Title I, 17 day, June 9th to July 1st, morning sessions program for some 70 selected pupils of the elementary schools. Em-

phasis of the federally approved, 1969 project will stress development of skills and an enrichment program. The all-district program will involve four sections of North Bend and Union Townships and Culver pupils at the Culver Elementary School and one section each at Aubbeenaubee and Monterey Schools. Under the direction of Principal Shelton Kaiser, the program includes two educational trips. Criteria for evaluating the program has been developed and John Nelson will carry out the evaluation of both the Title I regular term and summer programs.

Postal Rates May Increase To Offset Deficit

An "inherited" postal deficit of \$1.2 billion is responsible for the prosal to raise the postage bill for the mailing of 1st, 2nd and 3rd class, Postmaster E. W. Mattox said today.

Mr. Mattox said he had been advised by Postmaster General Winton M. Blount in Washington 1970 deficit compelled President Nixon to seek the postage rate increases. Without higher rates the Department will be left with a staggering deficit that would become an added tax burden.

In addition to increasing the letter mail from 6 to 7 cents, as proposed by the Johnson Administration, President Nixon also asked that second and third class mailers help reduce the large postal deficit which would otherwise be paid by the taxpayers, the postmaster said.

For bulk third-class mail and most magazines and newspapers, the rates would be increased 16 percent to 20 percent above today's levels, he noted. These percentages include rate hikes already scheduled by previous action of Congress.

The President's recommended increases will reduce the 1970 postal deficit by more than \$600 million.





Kindergarten Class Completes Recipe Book

A fascinating, fully illustrated, 1969 edition of favorite recipes, and representing a compilation of favorite foods of the Culver Kindergarten pupils, may not be a best seller but the "Mothers' Day" issued "Cook Book" reveals a keen appreciation of the five-year-olds' tastes.

The recipe book, in two volumes, "A.M." morning class, and "P.M." afternoon class, includes some first hand verbal descriptions of how "Mom" does it.

Reproduced exactly as each has told of his or her favorite food, the book has been developed by Kindergarten instructors, including Linda Massa, Shirley Frettinger, and Esther McKinnis.

For example, one five-year-old has related how he believes his favorite chocolate cookies are made. He says, "Flour is in it — about 2 cups. Then put the chocolate chips in — about 8. I don't know if you put in milk or not. Then you stir it up and put it in a pan and bake it. Bake it 5 minutes at 8°."

Or take the observant formula for Strawberry Cake as related and which is published as follows: "Put six strawberries in a bowl. Then put 3 spoons of icing in too. The icing has 3 spoons of milk and 6 spoons of powder. Put in 2 spoons of sugar and 2 spoons of butter and then decorate it."

Then there is the delightful Pumpkin Pie recipe: "Take probably 2 inches of flour, put it in the sifter and sift it. Then put in the swifter. Let your sister sit. Take the flour over to a dish and add pumpkin to it." This chap goes on to say, "Put it in the oven. If it's black in the middle, it's done."

Enhancing the collection, each individual recipe carries a hand-drawn original illustration. Undoubtedly, the book will be a collectors' item, at least for mothers.

"LIABILITY FOR PETS"

We read daily in the newspapers about the unusual and bizarre pets some people keep in their homes; from a trained cheetah on a leash to a six-foot alligator in the bath tub. Many, if not most of us, have at one time or another kept some kind of pet. This week I will discuss some of the potential liabilities a person may be exposed to if these pets cause damage or injury to others.

The owner of an animal has a general duty of preventing the animal from injuring other persons or animals, or from damaging other persons' property. Generally speaking, he must not be negligent in his attempts at keeping his animal from such mischief. I mentioned before people are making pets of certain wild animals. If the animal is by its very nature vicious, or mischievous, or apt to cause injury or damage, then the owner may be liable regardless of any negligence on his part. This is called "absolute liability" in the law. The theory behind it is that if a person brings something on his property which is not naturally there, which he knows by its nature will cause mischief if it gets on his neighbor's property, then he must be prepared to make good any damages his neighbors may suffer if it does get on his neighbor's property.


A dog is not generally classified as a wild or vicious animal. However, whoever keeps a dog which he knows has a propensity to bite must keep him confined and, if he fails to do so, must respond in damages to someone bitten by the dog. If the owner does not know or has no way of knowing the dog is vicious, he would probably not be liable for injury caused by the dog. This is what people mean when they say that a dog is entitled to "one bite." They mean that after a dog has once bitten someone, the owner should know of his vicious propensities.

If dogs are running in a pack and together cause damage or injury each or any of the owners may be liable individually for the resulting damage or injury.

This refers to dogs running loose. You have a different responsibility for a dog kept on your premises. Generally speaking, you have no responsibility as a trespasser. However, if you have social guests in your home, you should at least warn them of the dogs propensities, and to be safe, if the dog will attack people without provocation, you should keep him away from your guests.

If you have a Homeowner's or Personal Liability insurance policy you will probably be protected from a loss resulting from the action of your pet. However, you should read the terms of


