GOOD NEWS FOR FISHERMEN.

With the assistance of our congressman, Hon. A. L. Blich and Prof. B. W. Everman, U. S. ichthyologist, the Maxinkuckee Lake Association has been able to procure a very large quantity of fish fry for planting in the lake this spring. A. C. Capron, President of the Association has just received notice from the commissioner of fisheries, Washington, D. C., that a number of tons of pike-perch fry and a car load of well-eyed pike fry will be delivered here as soon as the spring distribution begins, and he is making preparations to receive and plant all that may come. The only expense of getting the fishes is the payment of freight for a part of the distance from the U. S. hatchery and every fisherman around the lake is expected to "chip in" and make up the necessary sum. The Indianapolis, Logansport and Peru sport-men have been notified and undoubtedly they will make up a part of the amount. Henry Speyer, the secretary of the association will receive all donations from people here. Now don't be backward Mr. Good Fisherman, you know you like to catch 'salmon' in the deep water of the lake, and this is the way to keep up the supply.

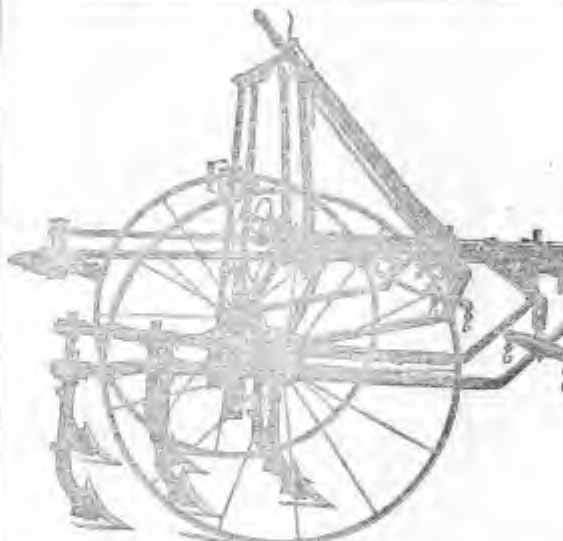

GETTING AT IT
Senators Give Up Stagnant Program and Go to Work.
Washington, Feb. 26.—The House yesterday adopted the conference report on the army appropriation bill and sent the bill to the president. The bill to establish a union station in this city also was finally passed; the house adopting its amendments to reduce the amount to be given to the Pennsylvania and Baltimore & Ohio railroads from \$1,000,000 each, as fixed by the law.
