



Application for permit must be accompanied by a site plan drawn to scale, showing dimensions of lot, existing structures, and proposed construction. Setbacks should be shown

The application should be made at least five days prior to proposed date of beginning construction and should be made to the Culver Building Commissioner, Thomas K. Walker, 302 Lake Shore Drive, Culver, telephone 842-2035. Walker may be contacted during the hours of 8 a.m. and noon, 1 p.m. and 5 p.m. Monday through Saturday. One the permit is purchased (\$5 or \$10 fee determined by type of construction), it should be conted at the site of conpostecion, in plain view. The applicable zoning ordinance does provide for penalty in case of violation.
