### CULVER SCHOOL BOARD MEETS

Culver - The Culver School board met Monday night at the auditorium and accepted the bids by Ingwalk Johnson Roofing of Plymouth for the repair of the high school roof at a cost of \$112,000.

They also approved advertising for bids on converting to total energy to NIPSCO at the high school.

Approval was given to advertise to use \$25,000 from the cumulative building fund for the high school track for resurfacing. It was thought that it would not cost that much and only the funds needed would be used.

Member Margaret Clark made a motion that the meetings no longer be rotated to different locations

in the corporation. This was defeated 4 to 3. Board president Howard Hildebrand, member Paul Davidson, Don Keller and Marvin Good voted against while members Paul Snyder Jr., Mrs. Clark and Phil Mallory voted for.

Hildebrand suggested that Good bring the bills for his legal fees to the next meeting so that whether or not the school corporation will pay these fees may be resolved.

The board will meet in executive session at the administrative building at 7:30 p.m. on Monday, July 30th, to discuss the administrative salary and review the budget.

The next regular meeting will be held Monday, August 6th at 7:30 p.m. at the Montrey Elementary School.

Lions Club member, Art Birk, reports that there are three other young people visiting Culver, another from Sweden, one from Finland and one from Peru.

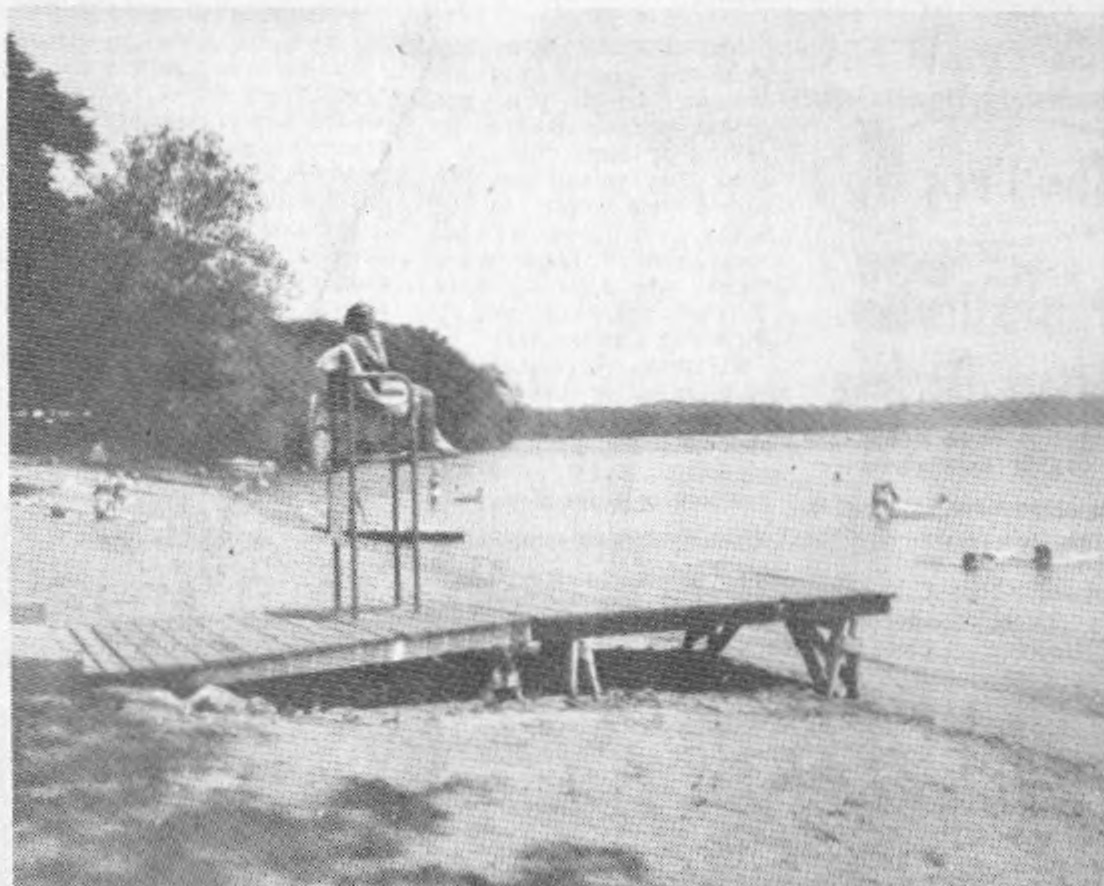
## David Mahler Takes First With Angus Steer

## BUILDING PERMITS NEEDED

Culver - The Culver Plan Commission reminds residents in and around Culver that a building permit must be purchased prior to beginning construction.

Application for permit must be accompanied by a site plan drawn to scale, showing dimensions of lot, existing structures, and proposed construction. Setbacks should be shown also.

The application should be made at least five days prior to proposed date of beginning construction and should be made to the Culver Building Commissioner, Thomas K. Walker, 302 Lake Shore Drive, Culver, telephone 842-2035. Walker may be contacted during the hours of 8 a.m. and noon, 1 p.m. and 5 p.m. Monday through Saturday. One the permit is purchased (\$5 or \$10 fee determined by type of construction), it should be posted at the site of construction, in plain view. The applicable zoning ordinance does provide for penalty in case of violation.

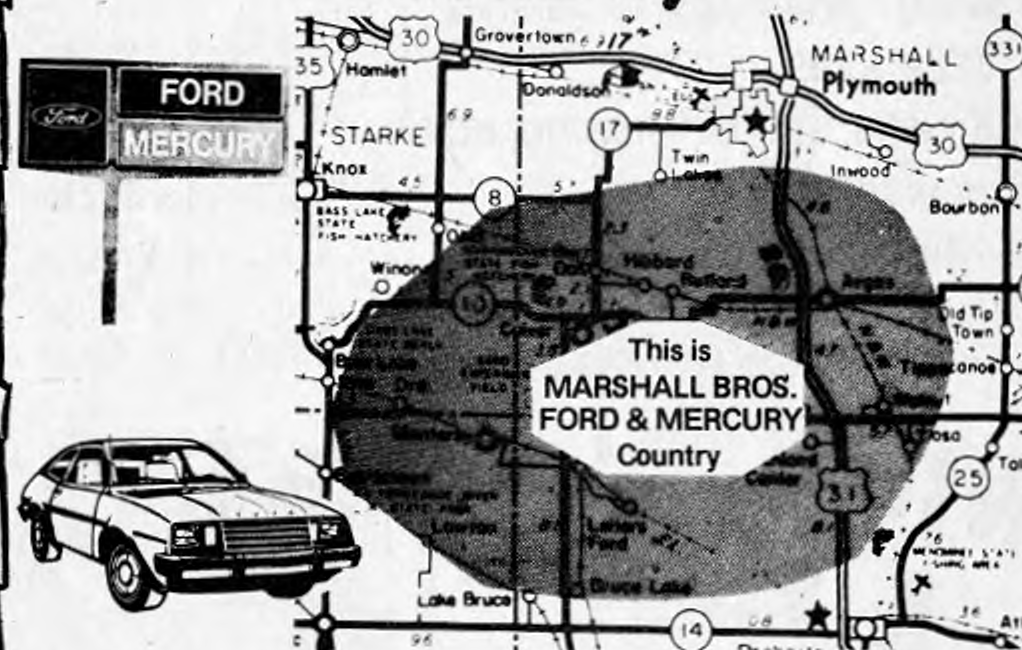

Culver - Far out in the rural area between Monterey and Winamac, energy experts can find how one enterprising FFA member is helping to provide a partial answer to the world's energy shortage.

Mike Loehmer, along with his father, Ralph Loehmer, and other members of his family are building a new dairy barn. One of the problems is how to supply heat to keep expensive dairy equipment from freezing in winter and keeping the building comfortable for attendants.

Since these features are being put in the building as it is being built, the additional cost for the collecting and storage equipment is minimal. A wood heating stove will be installed to provide heat on days when there is not sufficient heat from the sun.

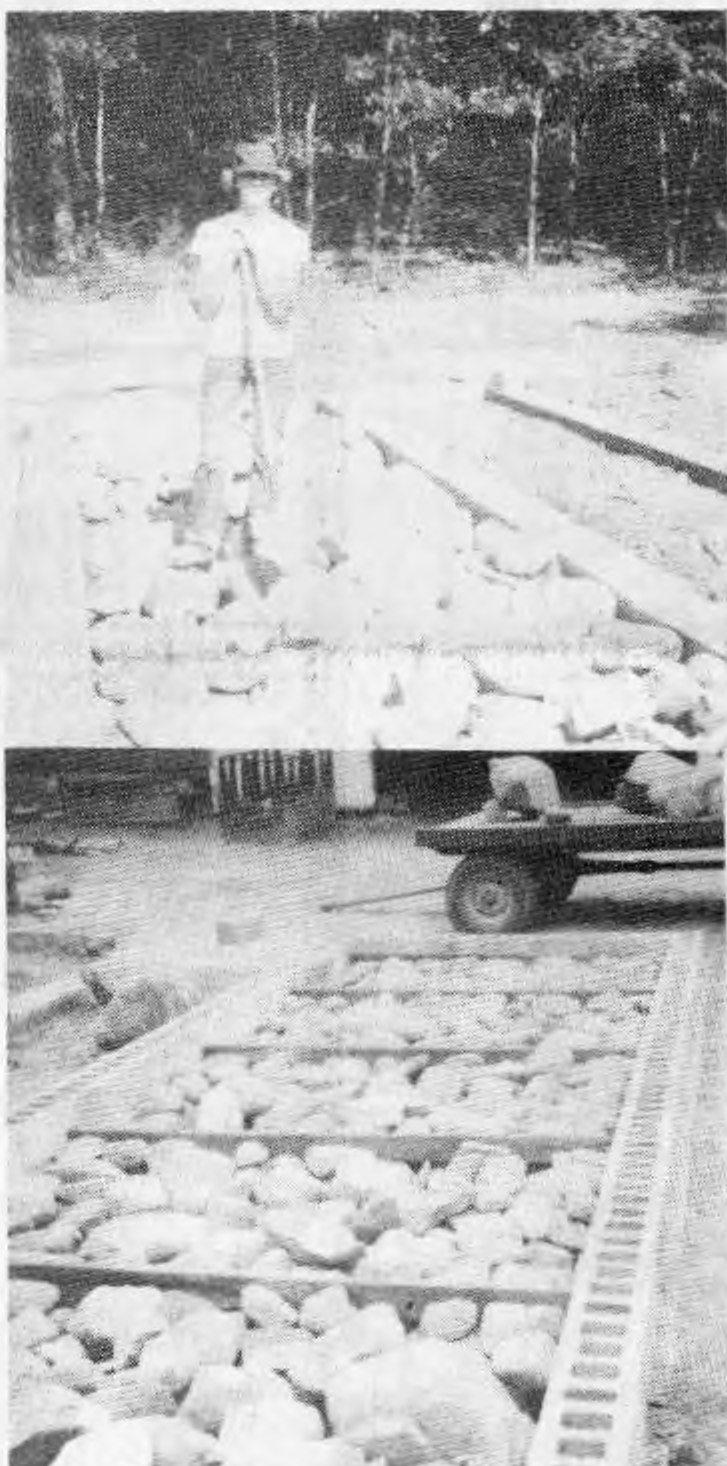
