## Large Crows Enjoys Culver Festival Days

Culver - Culver's Festival Days and Sidewalk Sale Days brought more than 6,000 people to town. At 9 a.m. on Saturday the 2nd Annual Maxinkuckee Lake Run, sponsored by the Culver IOOF and Adidas Shoe Co. was held with 180 participants running the 15 kilometer (9.3 miles) around Lake Maxinkuckee.

Winner of this event was 20-year-old Charlie Fox of Plymouth whose time was 50 min. 32 sec. Second over all was Keith Geiselman, 17, of Munster, 52 min. 02 sec.; third, Andy Borders, New Castle, 52 min. 27 sec. and fourth, Mark Lisak, North Manchester, 52 min. 53 sec.

The winner in the women's division was Peggy Quinn of Bremen, 74 min. 15 sec. and first place for the Junior High division went to 14-year-old Tim Deering of Union Mills with 65 min. 44 sec. Plaques were awarded to the first five place winners in various divisions and certificates for 6th place. Each runner received a Maxinkuckee Lake Run T-shirt. The three top winners received large framed plaques and Adidas Shoes.

The Kiddie Parade started at 10:00 a.m. and ended at Hooks Drugs where all marchers received free ice cream bars. Winners in the parade were: Bicycles, Jennifer VanHorn, 1st; Katherine Rakich, 2nd and Todd Tusing, 3rd. In tricycles Erin Earls, 1st; Donny Huhn, 2nd; and Darcy Lyman, 3rd. Megan Shepard and Beckham Miller tied for first in the clown division with honorable mention going to Karen Bonize and Debbie Cihak, who rode a tandem bike and led the parade. First in costumes went to Michelle Sims, Craig and Chad Stevenson, 2nd and Sean Elli, 3rd. In the pet division Bobby Stevenson got 1st, Shawna Lowry, 2nd and Jeff Westafer, 3rd. The parade was sponsored by the Maxinkuckee Junior Woman's Club and co-chaired by Martha Miller and Jolene Westafer.

It was estimated that more than 2,000 were fed at the Lions Club Corn Roast. All the corn on the cob and hamburgers you could eat were available to diners at the Beach Park. The meal was cooked and served by Lions Club members and wives.

Following the meal, keys to the city were presented to youths visiting in the area from foreign countries.

Presenting them for the Chamber of Commerce were its president, Ron Tusing and past president, Jack Keldenich. The young people are Ismo Rauvola, from Eurajoki, Finland who stayed with the Tom Christner family; Masayoshi Hara from Mitoyo-gun, Japan and Annabelle Iriarte, Lima, Peru who both visited at the Dale Long residence; Monica Cederberg, Sweden who stayed with the Art Birk family; Agneta Nilsson, Sweden at the Larry Berger residence and Lena Nilsson, Sweden who stayed with the Lance Overmyer family. Agneta and Nilsson are twin sisters.

A big hit this year was the performances by Vashit and her Belly Dance Troupe. Crowds lined Main Street while the troupe delighted the audience with their routines at 1 and 3 p.m. Dancers were Mary Stewart VanMele (Vashit), Ruby Wilton, Marie Pynaert, Laura Skarich, Leanne Botka and Debbie Pyneart all from South Bend; Cindy Dittmire and Sophie Pavolka, LaPorte; Marilyn Kelley and Mary Louise Krieg from Culver.

The elephant ear sales by the Music Boosters was very successful as were the pretzel sales by the Rainbow Girls and the bake sale by the Eagle Auxiliary. The Culver Boy Scouts also sold Snow Cones almost faster than they could make them. The day was hot and the snow cones were popular.

The town was crowded both Friday and Saturday as merchants put their merchandise out on the sidewalks for Sidewalk Sale Days. Everyone seemed to enjoy Culver Festival and Sidewalk Sale Days as we can now look forward to the event in 1980.

## Shirt Shed To Establish Plant At Culver

Culver - A group of Culver town officials, including members of the Town Board, Dan Adams, David Baker and Jean Williams, the President of the Plan Commission, Sue Flora, the President of the Chamber of Commerce, Ron Tusing, plus Rick Chambers of Lake Realty and John Deery of the State Exchange Bank, visited the Shirt Shed Inc., plant at Wabash last week to learn more about the planned establishment of a new plant at Culver.

The firm is in the process of purchasing six acres of land north of Mill Street across from the new Street Garage. The present owners, Everett E. and Catherine Easterday have petitioned the Plan Commission to rezone this land from Suburban "S" to Light Industrial "M-1". A public hearing will be held in the Culver Town Hall on Tuesday, August 14 at 7:30 p.m.

The company's main business is printing by a process of heat transfer all types of slogans and pictures on tee-shirts; however it has a complete printwear program which includes

such items as infants' wear, toddler and juvenile, men's and boys' and girls and ladies' wear. It produces over 7,000 dozen heat transfer garments daily.

The firm started just six years ago and has had to continually expand its plant size to handle the tremendous increase in demand for its products. The President of the firm, Jim Moore, stated that his firm needs an additional plant and has selected Culver as a location partly because of his familiarity with the area when he worked with the Ben Franklin stores.

Bill Hensley, the Executive Vice President, has been in Culver making arrangements for the last few months. It is expected that the plant will initially hire between 100 and 150 employees, many of whom will be females. The company has received an excellent response to its advertisements requesting applications for positions. If growth continues as expected, the number of employees may exceed 250.

The Culver group noted that the Wabash plant is an attractive building, having a

wooden front for its offices attached to the typical steel frame building. The Shirt Shed plans to construct a similar attractive building at Culver. It hopes to have an operating plant by November of this year.

Shirt Shed has had fine relations with the city of Wabash as evidenced by its being selected as Honored Industry of 1979 by the Wabash Chamber of Commerce.

The Culver Town Board was informed that the firm will pay for extending the sewer and water lines and that the plant will not use a great deal of water.

The firm hopes to purchase Industrial Revenue Bonds to help finance the construction of the Culver plant. The Culver Town Board, which has been considering the establishment of an Economic Development Commission to attract industry to Culver, has directed the Town Attorney to initiate the procedures necessary for the formation of such a Commission. Revenue Bonds can then be purchased at a lower interest rate but there is no liability incurred by the Town or the Commission in anyway.

### MAIL DURING VACATION

Argos - Contacting your post office about holding or forwarding mail before leaving on vacation will turn out to be time well spent. Postmaster Francis Coplen reminded residents of Argos recently.

"Letting mail or news-letters overflow a mailbox literally advertises that a house or apartment is empty and unguarded," Postmaster Coplen said, "and amounts to an open invitation to burglars."

The postmaster suggested that householders ask a friend or neighbor to empty their mailbox daily when they're going to be gone for a relatively short time, have the post office hold the mail as long as 30 days, or have it forwarded to a vacation address.

The postmaster also offered some other tips for vacationers:

--Buy enough stamps or post cards and other correspondence before leaving on vacation.

--Remember to use the right amount of postage--ten cents for post cards and 15 cents for letters that weigh one ounce or less. For letters that weigh more than one ounce the additional postage is 13 cents an ounce.

--Make sure that you deposit mail where it is most frequently picked up: when possible, at post offices or in downtown, business district collection boxes.
