CCHS Announces Orientation Schedule

Culver - CCHS announces the preschool orientation schedule for all students and the varsity practice schedule for football, cross country, tennis and volleyball.

The Guidance Office will be open to finalize schedules during regular school hours beginning on Monday, August 13. All students are required to attend an orientation session before they are

eligible to attend classes or pay book fees. To prove the most efficient use of time for students and school personnel the following orientation schedule is established.

Grade 12 - Monday, 9:00 a.m. on August 20.
Grade 11 - Monday, 1:00 p.m. on August 20.
Grade 10 - Tuesday, 9:00 a.m. on August 21.
Grade 9 - Tuesday, 1:00 p.m. on August 21.
Make-up (all grades) - Wednesday 9:00 a.m. on August 22.

All sessions are held in the auditorium. Sessions will start promptly and late arrivals must wait until another session convenes. The agenda of each session will be appropriate to that particular group. After the session is complete those who participated and whose schedules are completed may pay their book fees.

All sessions are open to parents who might wish to attend. All students attending CCHS for the first time are reminded that a physical examination form, completed by a physician, is required. You may get appropriate forms and information at the principal's office.

Tennis, Monday, August 13, at 10 a.m.
Volleyball, Wednesday, August 15 at 8 a.m.

All athletes report at the high school for their respective practices. Remember that you shall present a completed IHSAA physical examination form before you may practice. IMPORTANT ISSUES TABLED AT SCHOOL BOARD MEETING

Culver - The state of the Aubbee school building, at Leifers Ford is still undecided and the same holds true concerning the payment of Marvin Goods \$6,800 legal fee. Both items were tabled at the Monday night school board meeting in the Monterey Elementary School gym.

Although several options concerning the building were offered by Facilities Committee, it was felt that another meeting was necessary to discuss those and narrow it down to a final recommendation.

Board president Bud Hildebrand said he had contacted two attorneys on his own concerning the payment of Goods legal fees by the corporation.

Hildebrand said "from my conversation with the attorneys I feel we would be letting ourselves open for a law suit if we paid the bill."

Member Peggy Clark said she thought that this would be setting a precedent and any board member could seek private council and expect the corporation to pay the bill.

Member Don Keller moved that the bill be paid, but Hildebrand denied the motion. Both items will appear on the agenda for the meeting on Thursday, August 30, at 8 p.m. at the Fire House in Leifers Ford. There will be no meeting the first Monday in September since it falls on Labor Day.

When it came time to approve the use of \$25,000 from the cumulative building fund for repairs,

resurfacing and switching to metric at the high school track, Harold Burton of Aubbeenaubee Township presented petitions against this use of funds.

At the end of the meeting a short recess was called while Supt. William S. Mills called the school board attorney Thomas Mulligan to find out if the board could vote on the issue. After reconvening Mills stated that Mulligan said it was possible for the board to approve the appropriation and include the petition among the information presented to the state tax board.

It was approved with a 4 to 3 vote with Hildebrand, Mrs. Clark, Phil Mallory, and Paul Snyder, voting for and Keller, Paul Davidson and Good voting against.

A bid was open on the cost of converting electric service at the high school from total energy to NIPSCO. The only one submitted was from Bob's Electric of Argos at a cost of \$15,196.00. The corporation will readvertise for bids, since it was felt that the figure was too high.

In other action the board:

- approved teachers and bus drivers contracts and also approved adoption of the state handbook for the 1979-80 school years.

-heard an interesting informative report by teachers Margaret Jewel and Rita Lawson about their attendance at a conference for teaching gifted and talented children. Mrs. Jewel stated they stressed creative thinking, she also said that 19 percent of drop outs are gifted children and more of the mentally retarded graduate from high school.

-approved to advertise the 1980 school budget with a

vote of 6 to 1. Keller casted the dissenting vote explaining that he had not had a chance to see the budget.

Superintendent Mills said Culver Community School Corporation should be proud of two new programs this year. The Building and Trades course offered and the Remedial Reading Course offered in the high school. He said "our teaching staff is one of the finest ever and I think its going to be a good school year."

According to David Trotter, county Extension agent-youth, the goals of the schools are to encourage a greater appreciation for the State of Indiana and develop leadership qualities. The schools will also introduce delegates to new career opportunities and provide new insight into government, culture and human relations.



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ARGOS
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REDINGER REUNION

Argos - Seventy-eight Redinger cousins met at the old Redinger Homestead at route 1, Argos belonging to Mr. and Mrs. Charles Redinger. This 1650 acre farm has been in the family for 132 years.

Also attending was one child, Harley Redinger and his wife, of the ancestor, Charles A. Redinger. He and his wife, Mary Ritenour Redinger, were the common ancestor of all 80 attending.

It was decided to meet at the same place next year on the first Sunday in August. Ward Redinger was selected president and his wife, Virginia as secretary-treasurer.

Those attending were from Warsaw, Syracuse, Fort Wayne, Rochester, St. Joe, Wabash, Liberty, South Bend, Argos, Francisville, and Etna Green, and Detroit, Michigan.

Bicycle Fatalities Higher In Rural Areas

Argos - During 1977, there were 1,792 bicycle accidents in Indiana. These accidents resulted in 25 fatalities and 1,678 injuries. In 1975 and 1976, more bicycle fatalities were recorded in rural areas than in urban areas. Urban areas, however, accounted for a larger percentage of personal injury accidents.

Indiana's bicycling population is following the national trend of more adults riding two wheelers. Unfortunately, cyclists aged 10 to 19 years old are involved in over one half of all bicycle fatalities and injuries. This may be due to the fact that young adults tend to ride bicycles more frequently than other age groups, or it may be due to the type of cycling that is done (more on street and higher risk area riding.)

It was reported several days ago that the oil producing countries of the middle east were planning to cut back on oil production to keep the prices high. It seems the oil consuming nations of the world are cutting back their usage. Thus, the middle east oil people must cut back production - the old supply and demand economic theory.

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Argos School Budget Approved

Argos - At a special meeting last evening the Argos Community Schools Board of School Trustees approved a tentative 1980 budget for advertising. The proposed tax rate is \$4.121 as compared to the present rate of \$3.75 for each \$100 assessed valuation.

The overall rate is made up of the following rates:

General Fund, \$2.817 as compared to the present \$2.923; Debt Service, 6.9 as compared to the present 7.7 cents; Cumulative Building Fund of 75 cents which is unchanged; and a rate of \$4.85 for the new Transportation Fund.

The tentative budget as approved is based on the \$100 assessed valuation. A

much higher evaluation is expected for 1979 because of reappraisal. Consequently the rates as advertised will probably be decreased substantially before final approval.

In other business the Board accepted resignations from the following: Sandra Keeney, teacher aide;

Deborah Mouglin, elementary teacher; Margo DeMont, elementary teacher; and Doug Ulery, business education and physical education teacher.

The board approved teaching contracts for the following: Helen Slemmons, junior high English; Rockie Levi, French and Spanish; Beth Ann Banks, elementary teacher and varsity volleyball coach; Ellen C. Helmreich, elementary teacher and varsity girls

track coach. A contract was also approved for David Stults to serve as a school bus driver. A teacher is still needed to teach business education and physical education classes.

Argos School Lunch Policy

Argos - The Argos Community Schools, today announced its policy for fee and reduced price meals and free milk for children served in school under the Federal Child Nutrition Program.

Low-income school officials have adopted the following family size income criteria for determining eligibility:

Family income scale for determining eligibility for free meals and free milk and for reduced price meals, 1979-1980.

Family (Household Size A. For Free Meals and Free Milk must be at or below figure listed.

B. For reduced price meals must be at or between figure listed.

Each additional family member, 1,450, 2,260.

Children from families whose income is within the levels shown are eligible for free meals and milk or reduced price meals. In addition, families not meeting these criteria but with other unusual expenses due to unusually high medical expenses, shelter costs in excess of 30 percent of income, special education expenses due to mental or physical condition of a child and disaster or casualty losses are urged to apply.

Application forms are being sent to all homes in a letter or notice to parents. Additional copies are available at the principal's office in each school. The information provided on the application is confidential and will be used only for purpose of determining eligibility. Application may be submitted anytime during the school year.

A simple statement of income and family size is required, plus a signed certification by the parent or guardian that the information provided is correct.

In certain cases, foster children are also eligible for these benefits and milk or

reduced price meals. If a family has such children living with them and wished to receive such meals and milk for them it should contact the school.

Under the provisions of the schools policy, Gerald M. Hess, Superintendent of Schools, 440 North First Street, Argos, will review applications and determine eligibility. If a parent is dissatisfied with the ruling of the official, he may wish to discuss the decision with the determining official on an informal basis.

BREATH OF LIFE CAMPAIGN COMING TO ARGOS

Argos - The Breath of Life Campaign, an annual appeal for funds to help children with cystic fibrosis and other lung damaging diseases, begins in Argos on September 8-15, according to the Indiana Chapter of the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation.
"The Breath of Life Campaign raises vital funds for research to find a cure for cystic fibrosis. It also supports clinical care and education programs which lengthen the lives of all children who struggle to breathe with life threatening pulmonary disease," says Beth Dunham, chairman of the appeal.

Contributions collected in Argos from Sept. 8 through 15 will help millions of American Children.

Cystic Fibrosis is an inherited disease that attacks the lungs and digestive

system. One out of every 1,600 babies is born with the disease, having inherited the gene for CF from each of their parents, who are carriers.

One of every 20 persons, or 10 million Americans, are unknowing and symptomless carriers of the gene for CF, which may be passed to their children.

There is no cure for CF, but early diagnosis and specialized medical treatment is lengthening and improving the lives of affected children and young adults.

Signs of this lung damaging disease are recurrent wheezing, persistent coughing, excessive mucus, pneumonia more than once, and enlargement of fingertips. Cystic fibrosis signs may also include salty taste of the skin, persistent bulky diarrhea and nasal polyps. A child with one or more of these signs should be examined immediately.
