## Culver School Corp. To Annex Small Area

The Culver Community Schools Corporation, which includes four townships in four different counties, may annex part of another township into the corporation.

Culver Community Schools Corporation is currently made up of Union Township, in Marshall County; Aubbeenaubbee Township, in Fulton County; North Bend Township, in Starke County; and Tippecanoe Township, in Pulaski County. Both the board of trustees of Culver Community Schools and the board of trustees of the Eastern Pulaski Community School Corporation, have adopted resolutions that would shift the part of Franklin Township, Pulaski County, east of the Tippecanoe River from the Eastern Pulaski School Corporation to the Culver Community Schools Corporation. If no remonstrances are filed, the change is expected to take place on March 1, 1973.

Superintendent of schools A. F. Allen, Culver, said the change would affect a small area of land where only two or three families live, and where there currently are only two children of school age.

Both attend Culver schools but have not been paying tuition. Allen said that when he attempted to correct the situation and collect tuition, Eastern Pulaski officials suggested that the boundary line of the two corporations be changed. Allen said he thought the proposed change was an amiable one and no opposition was expected.

Allen added that for the Eastern Pulaski School Corporation to provide bus service for the two pupils, it would have had to run a bus into Culver school territory. He said because of the small area of land, no changes were planned for the makeup of the school board if the part of Franklin Township becomes a part of the Culver schools.

## Revenue Sharing Funds Received By Union Twp.

The Union Township trustee and advisory board received on December 14, a sum of \$1489.00 and on January 9 \$1429.00 from the U.S. Treasury. These amounts represent revenue sharing for the periods January 1 to June 30, 1972, and July 1 to December 31, 1972.

The funds were invested in savings certificates at the State Exchange Bank. Considerations for use of these funds are being given by the township advisory board and trustee.

According to recent word from the Indiana State Board of Accounts, these funds must be used within 24 months from dates of receipt of funds, and may be used for "high priority expenditures" such as public safety, health, recreation, libraries and social services, subject to further regulations and opinions from the office of revenue sharing.

The 1973 dog tax for Culver is now due through March 1 and may be paid at the Clerk's office. A dog tag will be issued to each dog and the price will remain the same as last year's:

\$1.00 for each male or spayed female

3:00 for each unspayed female

\$5.00 for each additional dog

The Culver Police Department wishes to remind everyone concerned that any dogs running the streets will be picked up and put in the city pound. Their new tranquilizer gun will be used if necessary. These tags will be for your own protection so that they will be able to determine the owner of the dogs when they are picked up. A charge of \$3.00 will be charged for their release and the purchase of a 1973 dog tag will be required if they don't already have one. If unclaimed in 3 days, the dogs will be disposed of according to town ordinances.

the song "I Shall Not Pass Again This Way."

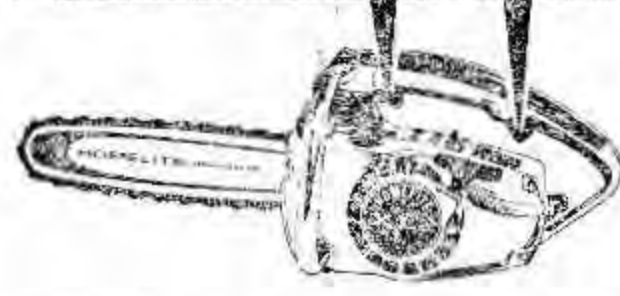

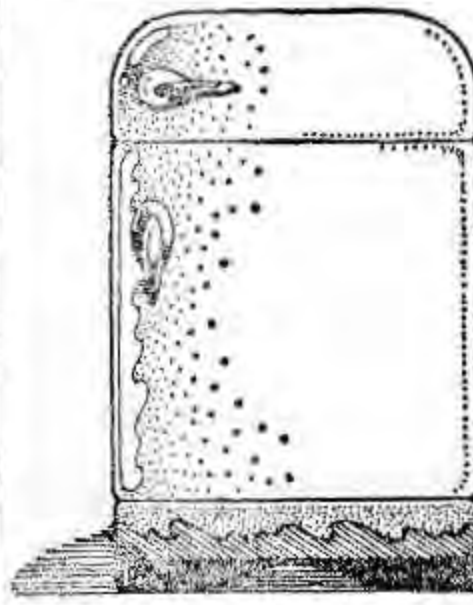

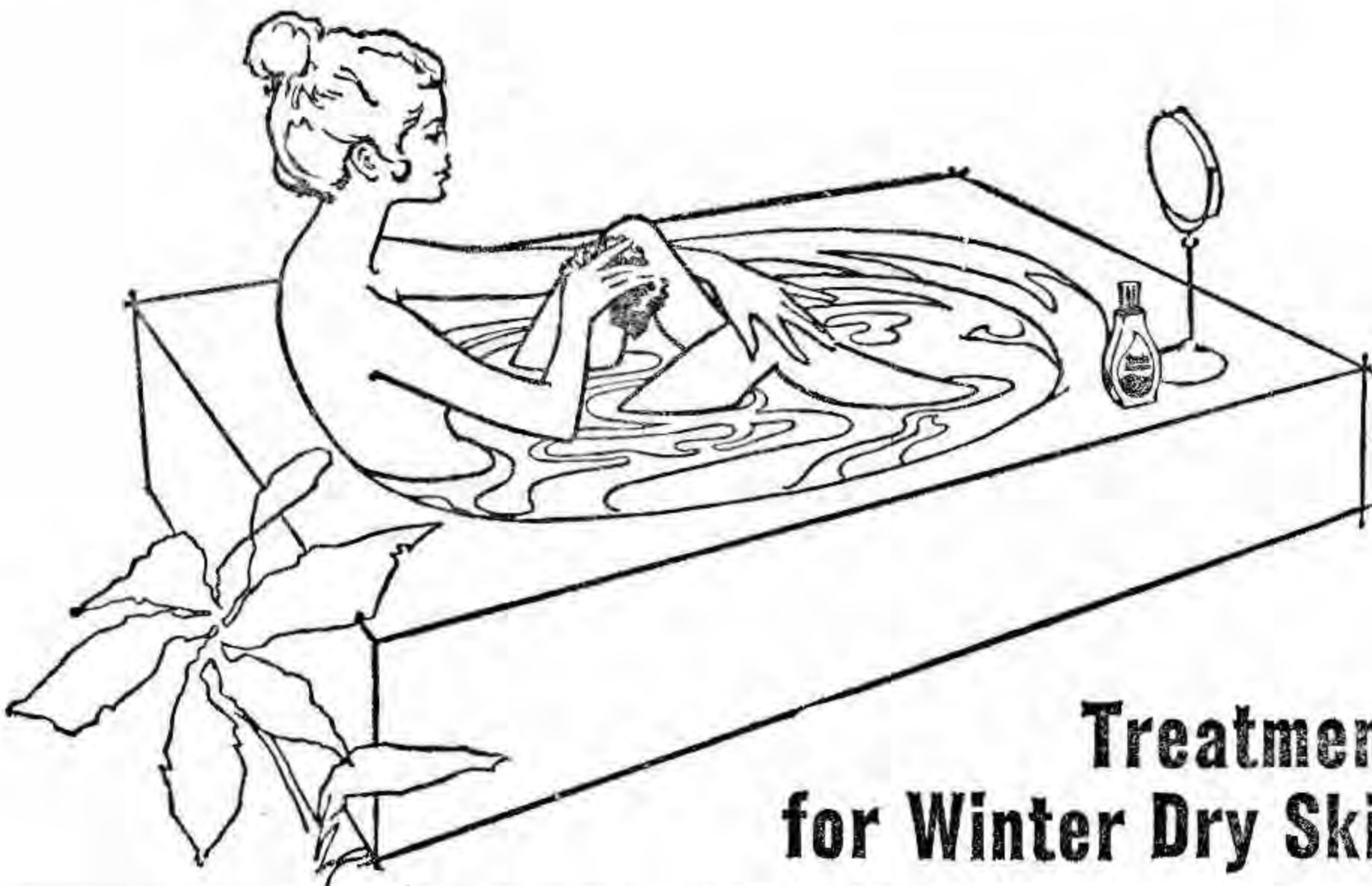
