Pre-School Round-Up Set For April

Plans for the 1973 Pre-School Round-Up in the Culver Community Schools Corporation are being finalized for parents of pre-kindergarten pupils and pre-first grade pupils who have not attended Kindergarten. Parents of kindergarten and first grade students who have not attended school this year and who are eligible to enter school in August, 1973, residing in Tippecanoe Township, may register students at the Monterey School between 10:00 and 11:00 A.M., Tuesday, April 10, 1973. Registration will take place for Aubteenabbee Township students between 1:00 and 2:00 p.m. at the Aubteenabbee School the same day, Tuesday, April 10, 1973.

Culver, Union Township and North Bend Township parents may register kindergarten and first grade pupils between the hours of 9:00 and 11:00 a.m., 1:00 and 3:00 p.m. and 6:30 and 7:30 p.m. on Thursday, April 12, 1973.

Please come to the main Elementary School entrance. All regular kindergarten classes will meet as usual on the above dates.

Pupils who have reached the age of five on or before August 31 are eligible to enter kindergarten and those age six on or before August 31 are eligible for grade one. Parents must bring birth certificates for each child.

School personnel will discuss health requirements as they refer to TB tests, physical examinations, immunizations, etc. and the school program in general.

ORDINANCE NO. 223

An Ordinance Regulating Parking in The Town of Culver, Indiana

Section 1. BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE INCORPORATED TOWN OF CULVER, MARSHALL COUNTY, INDIANA, that Ordinance No. 179, passed on the 18th day of May, 1964, is hereby repealed and that Ordinance No. 220, passed on the 4th day of December, 1972, is hereby repealed.

Section 2. BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED that when appropriate signs are erected it shall be unlawful to park any vehicle at any time on the following streets and parts of streets in said Town:

a. On both sides of Lake Shore Drive from Forest Place on the South to College Avenue on the North.

b. On the North side of Lake Shore Drive from School Street on the East to a point One Hundred (100) feet West of the West line of School Street.

c. On the West side of Ohio Street from Lake Shore Drive on the North to Washington Street on the South; from Jefferson Street on the North to Madison Street on the South, and from Washington Street on the North to a point Two Hundred (200) feet South of the South line of Washington Street.

d. On the West side of School from Lake Shore Drive on the South to a point Five Hundred Seventy-four (574) feet North of the North line of Lake Shore Drive.

e. On the South side of Jefferson Street from Ohio Street on the West to a point Thirty (30) feet East of the East line of Ohio Street.

f. On both sides of South Main Street from Mill Street on the North to Davis Street on the South.

g. On the South side of College Avenue from School Street on the West to Lake Shore Drive on the East.

h. On the East side of Liberty Street from Lake Shore Drive to Academy Road.

i. On the East side of Forest Place from Lake Shore Drive to Academy Road.

Section 3. BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED that when appropri-

ate signs have been erected it shall be unlawful to park any truck or tractor at any time on a Forty (40) foot zone on the West side of State Street beginning at a point One Hundred Seventy (170) feet North of the North line of Lake Shore Drive and continuing North Forty (40) feet.

Section 4. BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED that when appropriate signs have been erected it shall be unlawful to park any vehicle for more than five (5) minutes between the hours of 8:00 o'clock A.M. to 6:00 o'clock P.M. on Mondays through Saturdays on any of the following indicated zones:

a. A Twenty-one foot zone beginning on the West side of Main Street Fifty-five (55) feet South of Jefferson Street and continuing South Twenty-one (21) feet.

b. A Twenty-one (21) foot zone on the East side of Main Street Seventy-five (75) feet South of Jefferson Street and continuing South Twenty-one (21) feet.

c. A Twenty-one (21) foot zone beginning on the East side of Main Street Fifteen (15) feet North of Jefferson Street and continuing North Twenty-one (21) feet.

Section 5. BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED that when appropriate signs have been erected it shall be unlawful to park any time for more than five (5) minutes on a Twenty-one (21) foot zone on the North side of Lake Shore Drive, beginning One Hundred Thirty-nine (139) feet West of Liberty Street and continuing West Twenty-one (21) feet.

Section 6. BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED that unless another penalty is expressly provided by law, any person violating any provisions of this Ordinance shall be fined the sum of Two Dollars (\$2.00). Said fines or fine may be paid to the Town Marshal, his deputy or deputies, without additional costs of any kind if voluntarily paid at the time of making arrest, in which event such police officer shall give a receipt. The Town Marshal shall be provided duplicate serially numbered receipt forms, and shall receipt for the same to the Clerk-Treasurer, the original receipt to be furnished to violators, and the duplicate returned to the Clerk-Treasurer with the fine collected, such Town Marshal to account to the Clerk-Treasurer at the end of each week for all receipts issued and fines so collected. Any penalties so collected shall become a part of the General Fund of said Town. The Town Marshal shall also be provided in duplicate, suitable serially numbered forms for notifying violators to appear and answer charges of violating any of the provisions hereof.

Section 7. If any parts of part of this Ordinance are, for any reason held to be invalid, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this Ordinance.

Section 8. All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

This Ordinance shall take effect and be in full force after its passage and publication according to law.

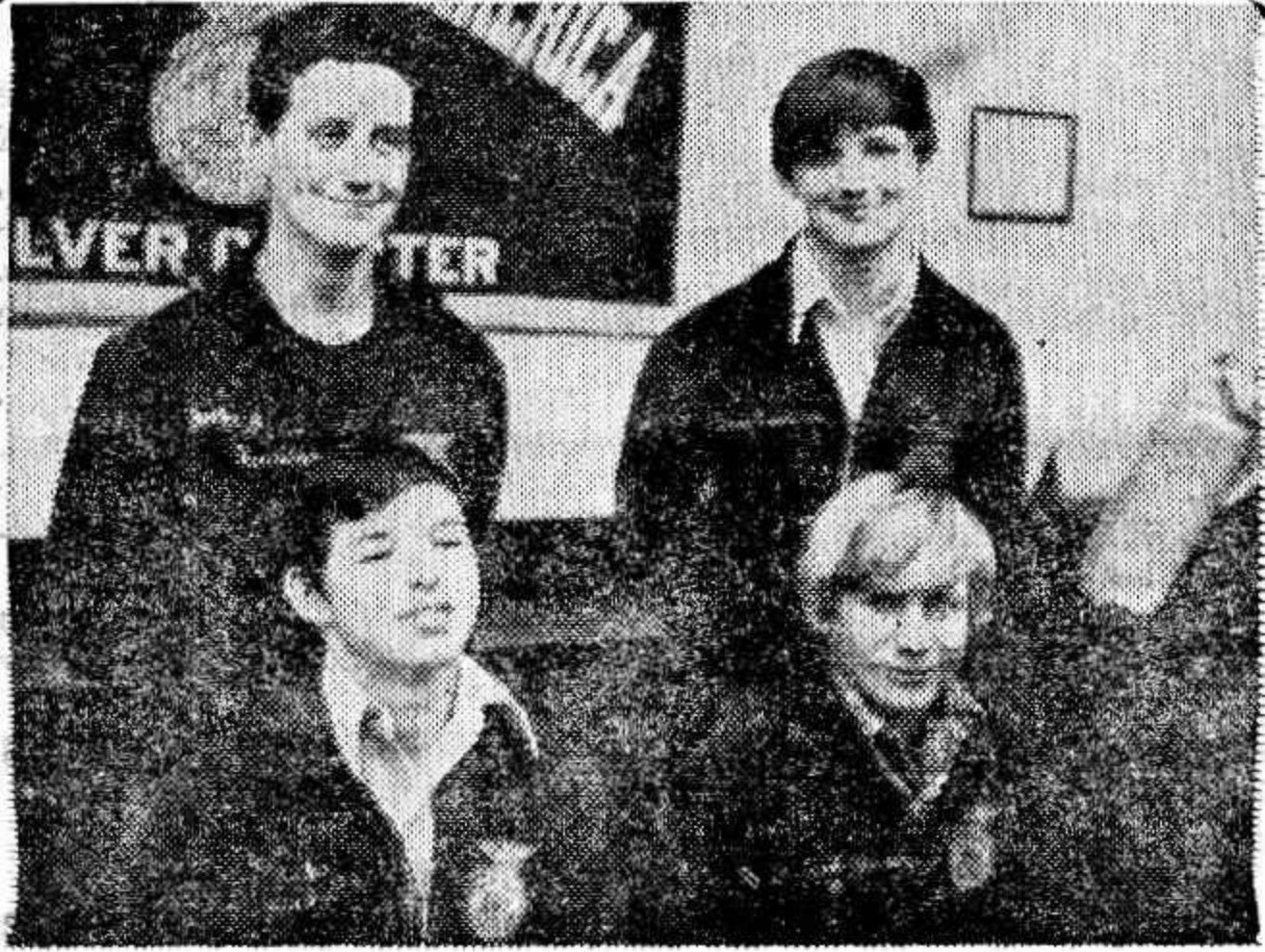
