SCHOOL BOARD

The Culver Community School Corporation board of school trustees met in a special session with the teachers' salary committee on May 29, 1973, to continue discussion on a 73-74 salary schedule. This marked the second session between the teacher's representatives and the school board on the 73-74 salary schedule. Following considerable discussion of mutual concern, a salary schedule agreement was made.

The new salary schedule will provide increases in salary of \$150 for a bachelors degree with no years of experience and will range up to \$480 at the top of the master's schedule.

Superintendent Allen emphasized that the increments had been increased at each step of the new salary schedule. He also stated that the number of years required to reach the top of the salary schedule was reduced from 22 to 20 years. These factors make added improvement in the salary schedule.

The board agreed to grant non-instructional employees a five per cent increase in salary.

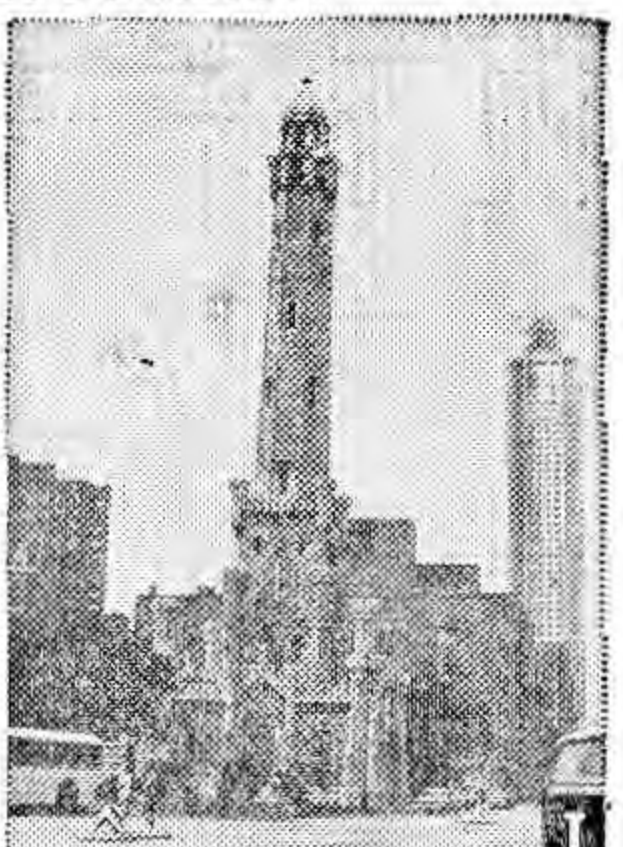

BUILDING A BETTER WORLD
A LANDMARK DECISION

A major achievement in American civil engineering, Chesbrough's Chicago Water Supply System has been designated a National Historic Civil Engineering Landmark by the American Society of Civil Engineers.



The system, which includes the famed Chicago Water Tower and the Chicago Avenue Pumping Station, was constructed between 1864-1869 to obtain a safe potable water supply for the citizens of Chicago. It also was the first major system to utilize offshore intake systems. Its subaqueous tunnel was a pioneering project in American civil engineering history.

The Chicago Water Supply System as we know it today—made up of intake cribs located far out in Lake Michigan, large intake tunnels carrying the water from the cribs to filtration plants and pumping stations on shore, and an extensive system of cast iron distribution mains—had its real beginning in 1869 with the completion, under Ellis S. Chesbrough's direction, of the two-mile crib, the two-mile tunnel, the Chicago Avenue Pumping Station and the Water Tower.

The tunnel was designed to supply water for one million inhabitants at the rate of 50 gallons per day for each person; the average quantity used at that time. Chesbrough's tunnel extended 10,567 feet out under Lake

Michigan and was lined to a finished diameter of five feet. Work on the land shaft began in March 1864, and continued day and night with an average progress of 12 feet per day. The pumping station and water tower were completed in 1869, only two years before the great Chicago fire. During the fire, the fireproof water tower stood in the heart of the conflagration and remained one of the few buildings to withstand the blaze.

In designating the Chicago Water Supply System as a National Historic Civil Engineering Landmark, the American Society of Civil Engineers paid particular homage to its designer, Ellis S. Chesbrough, who also served as president of the Society in 1878, the oldest national professional engineering society in the U.S.

Return bread to oven and bake 2 to 3 minutes longer, or until glaze is set. Remove from pans and cool on wire racks.

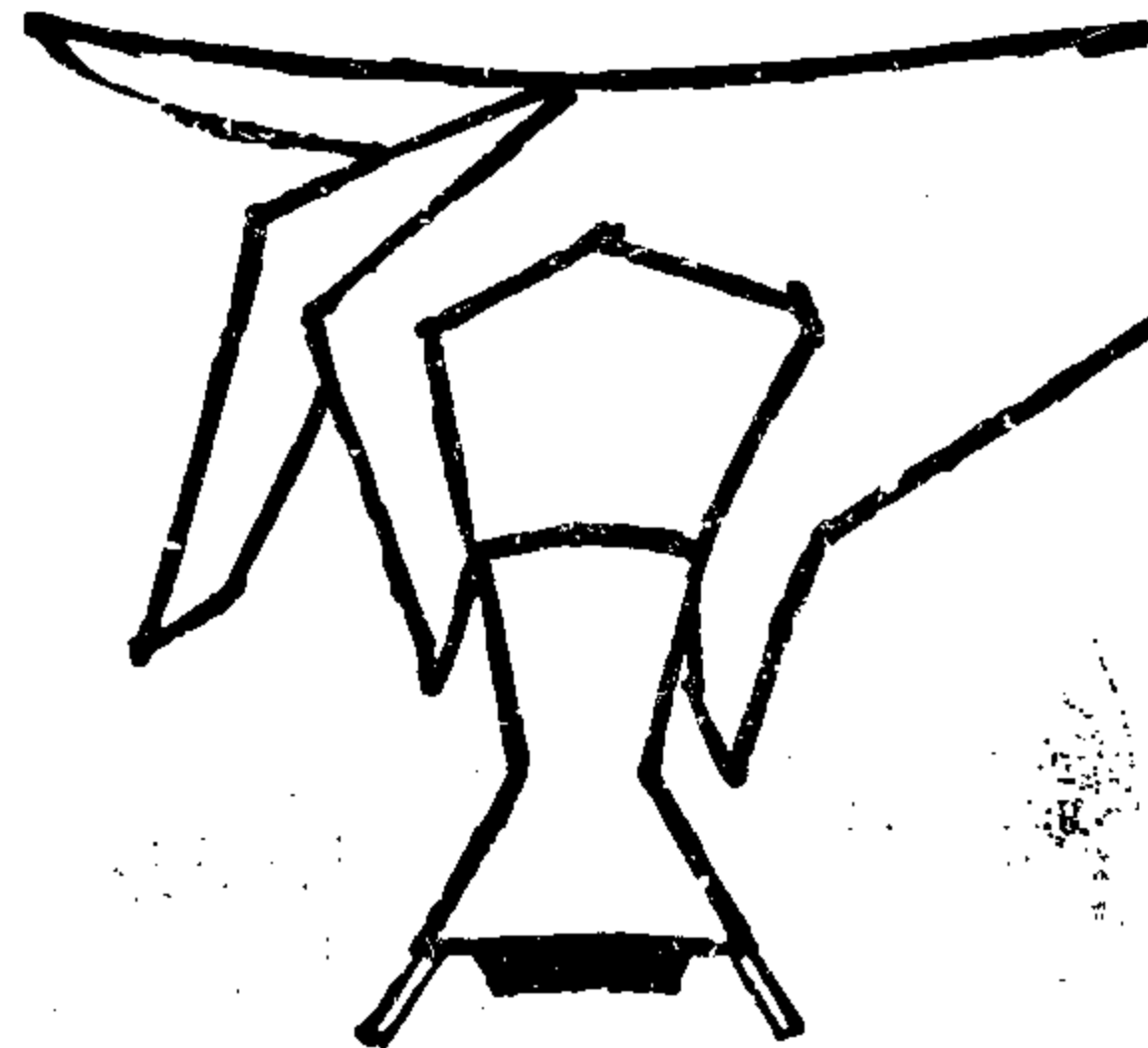

LINEBACKER'S BREAKFAST SOUFFLE
6-8 slices bacon 1/2 tsp. salt
2 Tbsps. bacon grease 1/2 cup milk
2 Tbsps. flour 3 eggs, separated
1 large ripe Chiquita banana, mashed
Fry bacon until crisp; chop and reserve. In medium saucepan heat bacon grease, add flour and salt and cook 1 minute. Mix in the milk and cook until the sauce becomes very thick and pulls away from the sides of the pan. Remove from heat and add 1 egg yolk at a time beating vigorously after each addition; mix in the banana. Whip egg whites until soft peaks form. Add about 1 cup of the whipped whites to the sauce mixture and fold in with a rubber scraper, using an up and over motion. Gently fold the remaining whites into the mixture. Scrape into an ungreased 1 quart souffle dish. Bake in a preheated 350° oven for 30 to 35 minutes until golden brown. Makes about 4 servings.

PANCAKES A LA PUNT
1 egg 1 cup all-purpose flour
1 medium Chiquita banana, mashed 1 Tbsp. sugar
1 cup buttermilk 1 tsp. baking powder
2 Tbsps. salad oil or 1/2 tsp. soda
shortening, melted 1/2 tsp. salt
1/2 cup, Wheaties, crushed
Beat egg; add remaining ingredients except cereal in order listed. Beat with rotary beater until smooth. Fold in cereal. Grease heated griddle if necessary. To test griddle, sprinkle with few drops water. If bubbles skitter around, heat is just right. Pour batter from tip of large spoon or from pitcher onto hot griddle. Turn pancakes as soon as they are puffed and full of bubbles but before bubbles break. Bake other side until golden brown. Makes about ten 4-inch pancakes.


With all the help of all persons in Aubbeenaubee Township the evening is lots of fun and pro-
