## THE VAN GILDER COLLECTION OPEN

The Van Gilder Collection, a gallery of original graphic art for purchase, is now open in Plymouth, Indiana. Caron and Lynn Van Gilder show this array of intaglio, relief and serigraph prints in their apartment at 300 West Madison Street by appointment.

The diverse collection boasts of Old Masters to the hard edge artists. Those included are well known such as Renoir soft ground etchings; Chagall lithographs; Rouault wood engravings and aquatints; sculptural studies by Moore, Maillol, and Arp; a Whistler etching; Picasso's from the Vollard Suite and Ovid's Metamorphoses; a Matisse lithograph; and many other well established names such as Calder, Indiana, Toulouse-Lautrec, Manet, Mucha, Goya, Buffet, Dufy, Piranesi, Van Ostade, Callot, Max, Miro, Chernet, Van Dyke, Bolotowsky, Baskin and many, many others.

For the not so heavy collector there are also illuminated manuscripts, hand-tinted florals and botanical engravings, Audobon lithographs, colored Japanese woodcuts, and many representational as well as non-representational works by modern artists from New York, London, Paris, Rome and Japan. The collection also includes a few silk screened posters by famous artists.

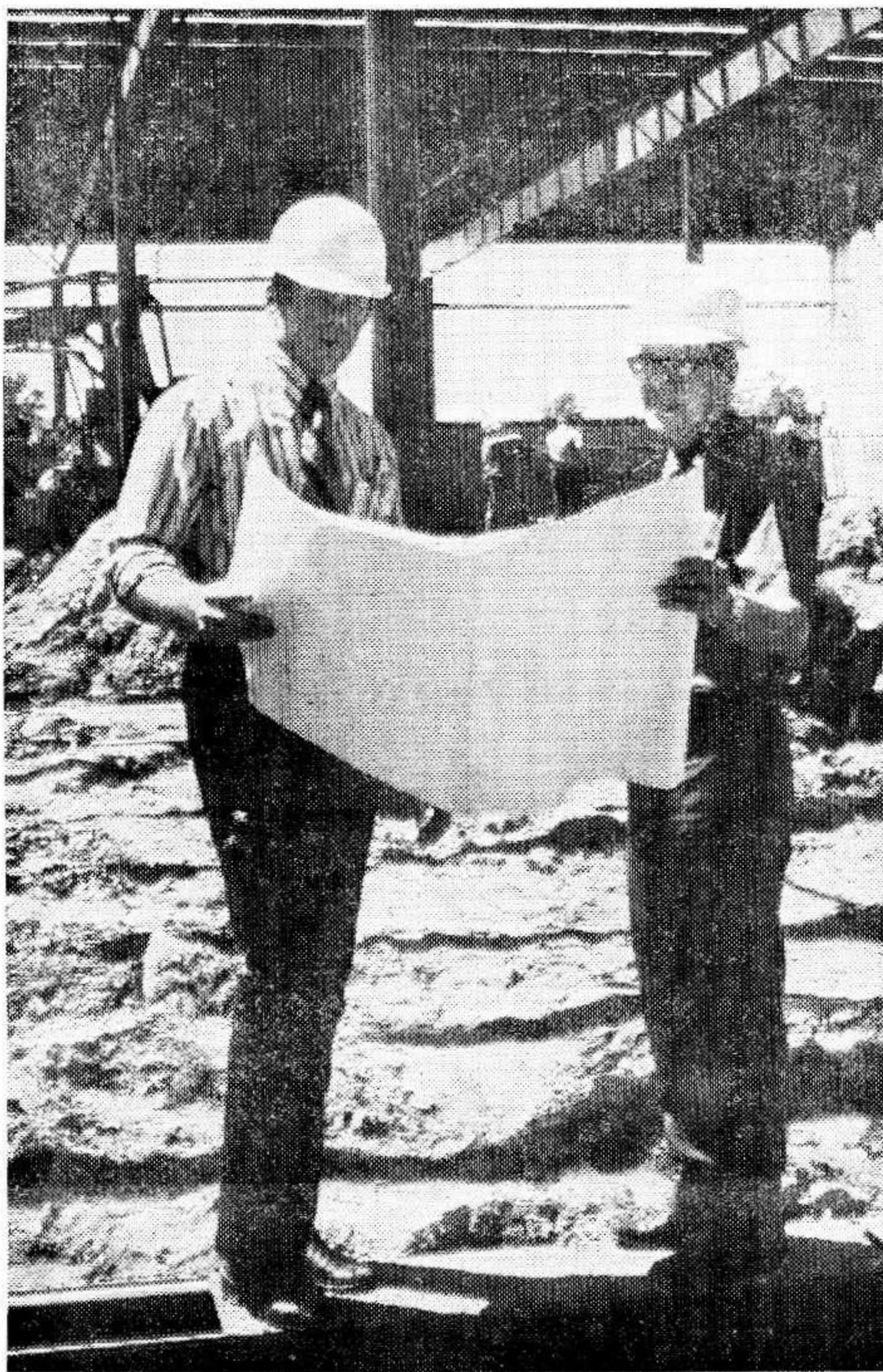

## WORK AT MCGILL UNDERWAY



Steel work has been completed on the 67,500 square foot addition to the Culver Plant of McGill Manufacturing Company, Inc., Bearing Division, on Indiana Highway 17. General manager, Donald Hamilton, (right) and James Heffernan, manager, production and planning, are checking prints while contractor Tonn & Blank crews begin adding the steel sidewalls and roof sections.

The present 220 x 300 square foot plant built in 1966 is being doubled with another 220 foot addition being added to the east. New machinery will be added as needed to accommodate a gradually increased work force of up to 300 people required to satisfy the increasing demand for McGill CAMROL roller bearings.

Work is on schedule with completion planned for the Mill Street plant addition in early September. The Culver Plant is part of the Bearing Division manufacturing precision ball and roller bearings for industrial machinery since 1925. Total corporate sales exceed 35 million with employment currently at over 1325.

## "40 X '80" Soybean Yield Goal Deserves Congressional Support

Soybeans are now America's number one cash crop. Last year, the crop was worth over \$4 billion to American farmers, and this year's crop will be worth still more. And the contribution to the U.S. balance of payments from export sales is running well over \$2 billion a year.

With both domestic and overseas demand running strong, you might think that the U.S. government would be giving major emphasis to soybeans in its research programs designed to improve agricultural yields and reduce farmers' costs per bushel. After all, how many farm crops are there of which this country can sell all it produces, at prices well above government support levels?

Yet the truth is that the government commitment to soybean production research is disgracefully small—less than one-twentieth of one percent of the value of the crop. And, according to Robert Judd, director of the National Soybean Crop Improvement Council, this limited effort remains primarily defensive—protecting the crop from disease, insects, weeds, and nematodes.

This lack of attention to basic production research is the main reason why improvements in soybean yields have been a mere ten percent in the last ten years. Other crops with a greater research commitment have shown far higher yield improvements—such as peanuts, with a yield increase of 73 percent during this same period, barley at 40 percent, and even hay, at 19 percent.

The National Soybean Crop Improvement Council has set a goal of "40 x '80"—average national soybean yields of 40 bushels per acre by 1980. This goal deserves the support of our representatives in the Congress.

Everyone would benefit from the lowered production costs that would come from higher yields and improved efficiency. The soybean farmer's profit per bushel would go up, and the American soybean crop could continue to undersell its potential overseas competitors.

There is, of course, another side to the decision. If we do not maintain efficient production and competitive prices, we could be undersold by Brazilian soybeans, Canadian rape-seed, Far Eastern palm oil, or by synthetics.

We must act now. With substantially increased investment in soybean production research, we can reduce growers' costs per bushel and meet the growing world protein demand. Let us hope our Congress recognizes this opportunity and acts accordingly.

Total gasoline consumption for both highway and non-highway uses in Indiana amounted to 2,767,014,000 gallons in 1972, according to the Indiana Petroleum Council. David R. Davis, executive secretary of the Council, noted that the figures represented a 5.8 per cent increase over the previous year. This compared with a 6.5 per cent rise nationwide.

The gasoline shortage may be a blessing in disguise, noted an official of the National Automobile Association. Among the measures being considered to slow the flow of gasoline is a reduction in speed limits.

If every motorist drove from five to ten miles per hour slower than his usual rate, gasoline usage would be reduced by millions of gallons, and as a beneficial side effect, the savings in lives undoubtedly would run into the thousands. Thirty-three per cent of all automobile accident fatalities are caused by "speed too fast." This is interpreted to be: speed beyond posted limits, speed too fast for weather conditions and speed too fast for road conditions.

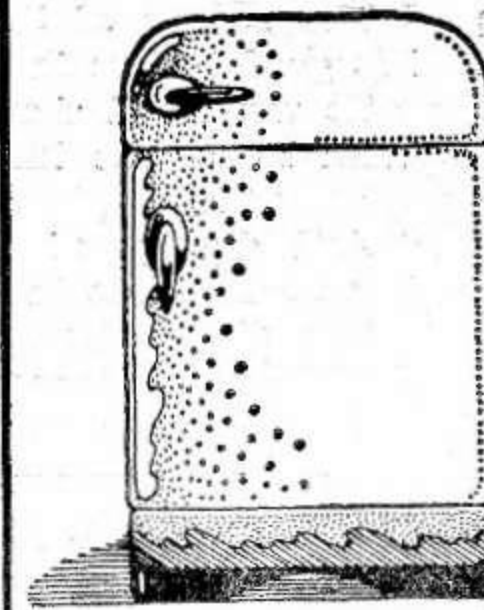

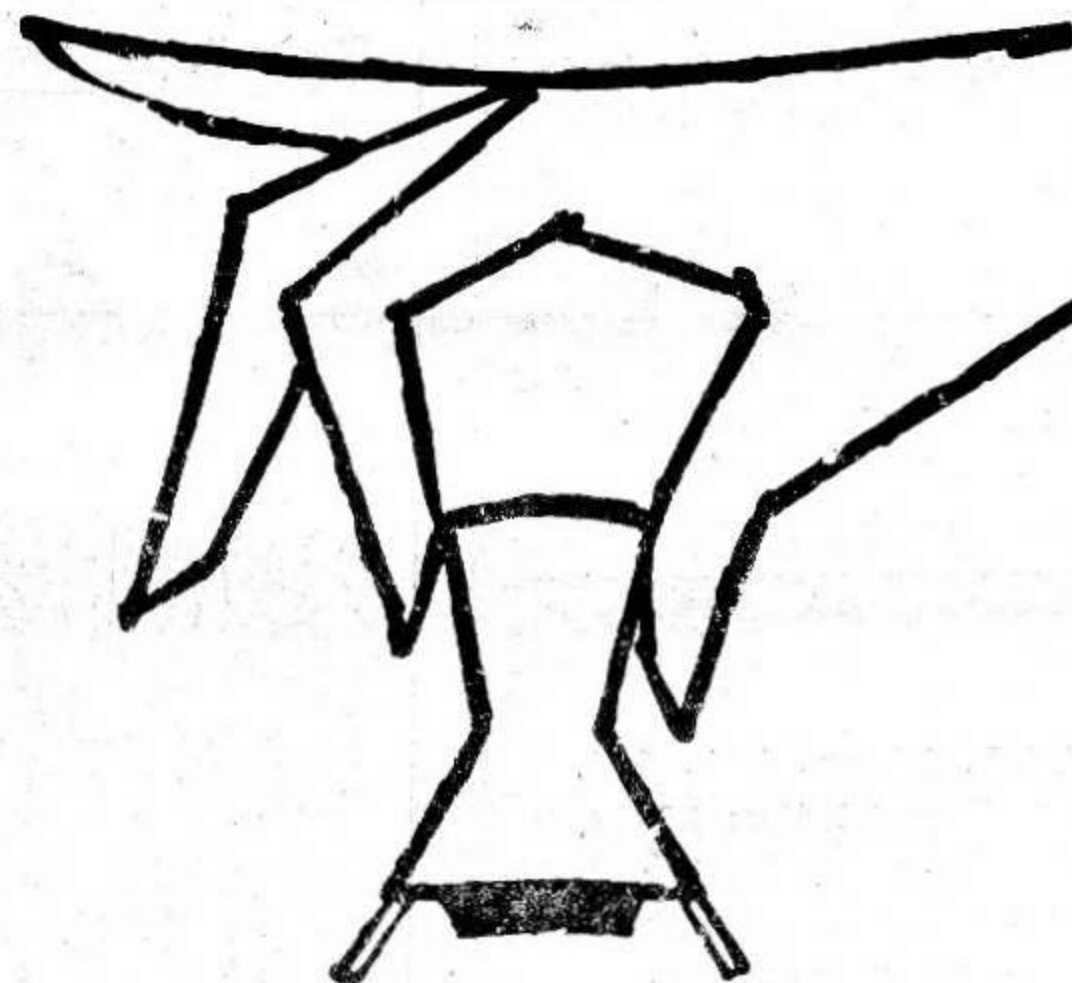

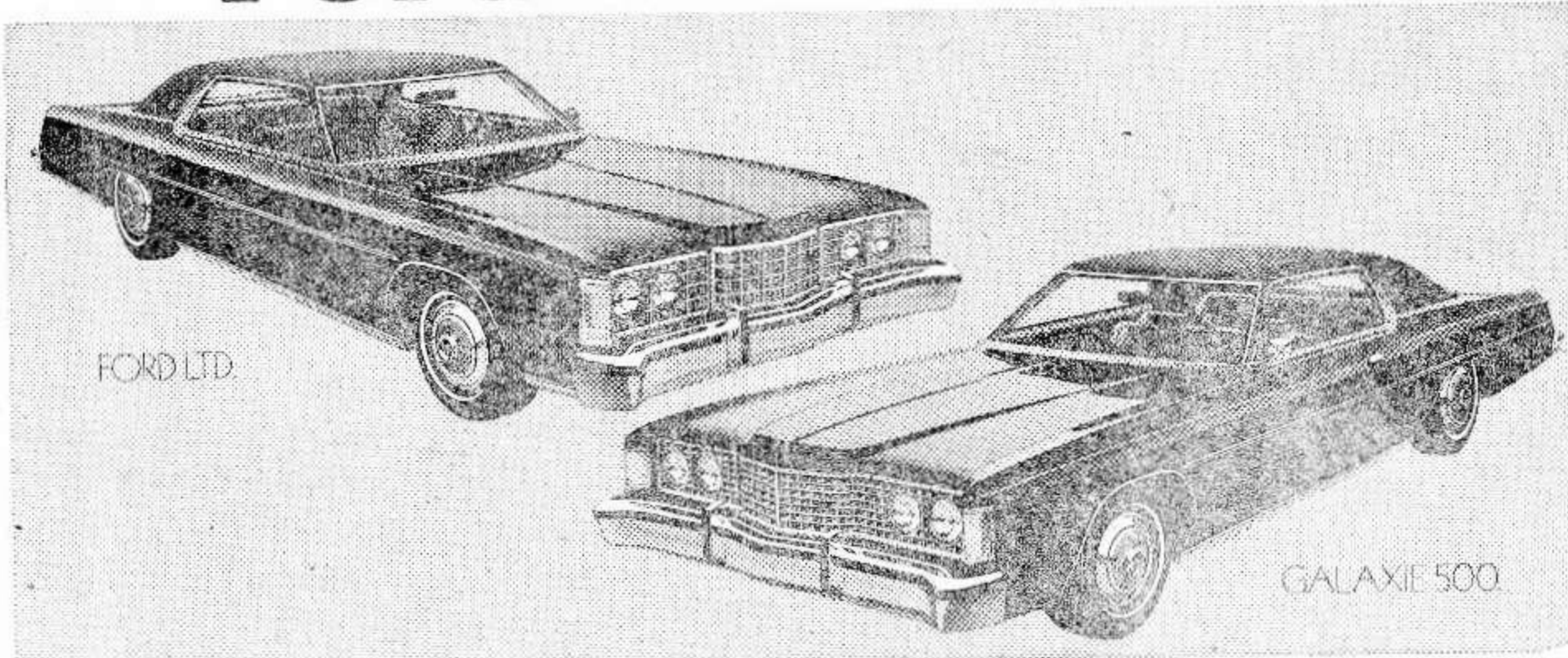

Willard Hissong, 48 years of age, suffered a sudden mental breakdown Saturday evening.

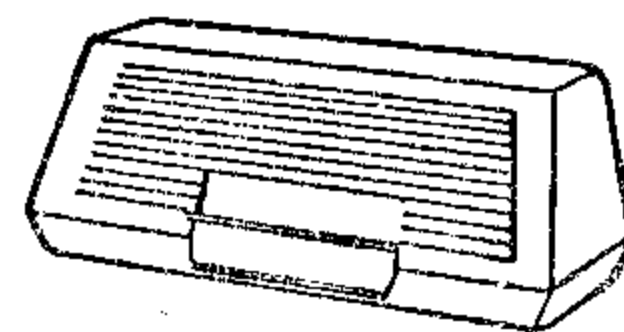
