SCHOOL BOARD

The Culver Community Schools Corporation Board of Trustees met in regular session at the central office on Tuesday, June 19, at 8:00 p.m. with all officers and members present. Following the formal opening and approval of the minutes of the June 6 meeting, the Board opened sealed bids for gasoline, fuel oil, lubricating oil, and tires. The following bids were received:

The Board agreed to purchase a stove for the Monterey cafeteria.

The superintendent advised the Board that he had been approached concerning the fencing of the elementary school playground at the Culver Elementary and Junior High building.

The Board authorized the Superintendent to advertise for a general maintenance man for the corporation. It was agreed that this position would be as a worker at general maintenance and would not involve supervisory responsibility or authority.

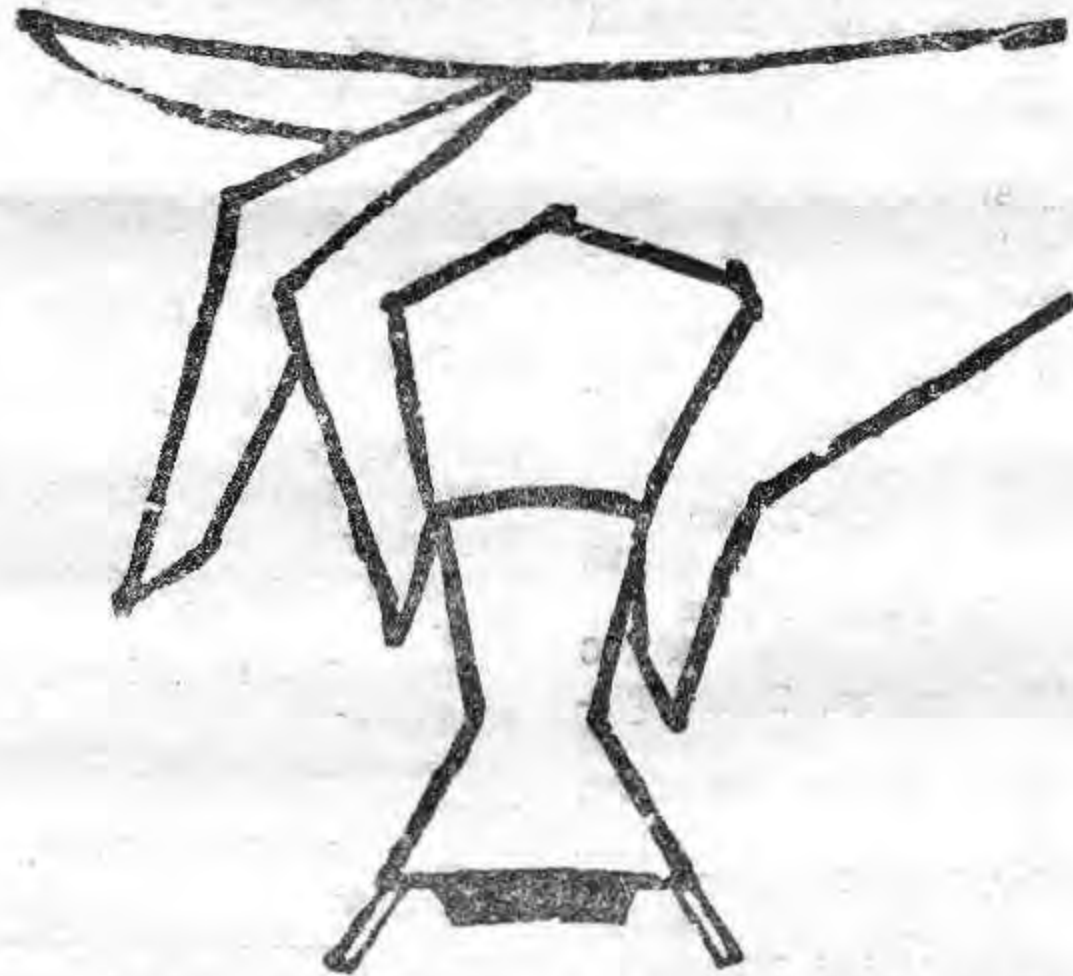

July 3, 1963

Enrollment in the Culver Summer Schools soared to a record figure of 1,660 today with classes officially underway in the 61st annual session.

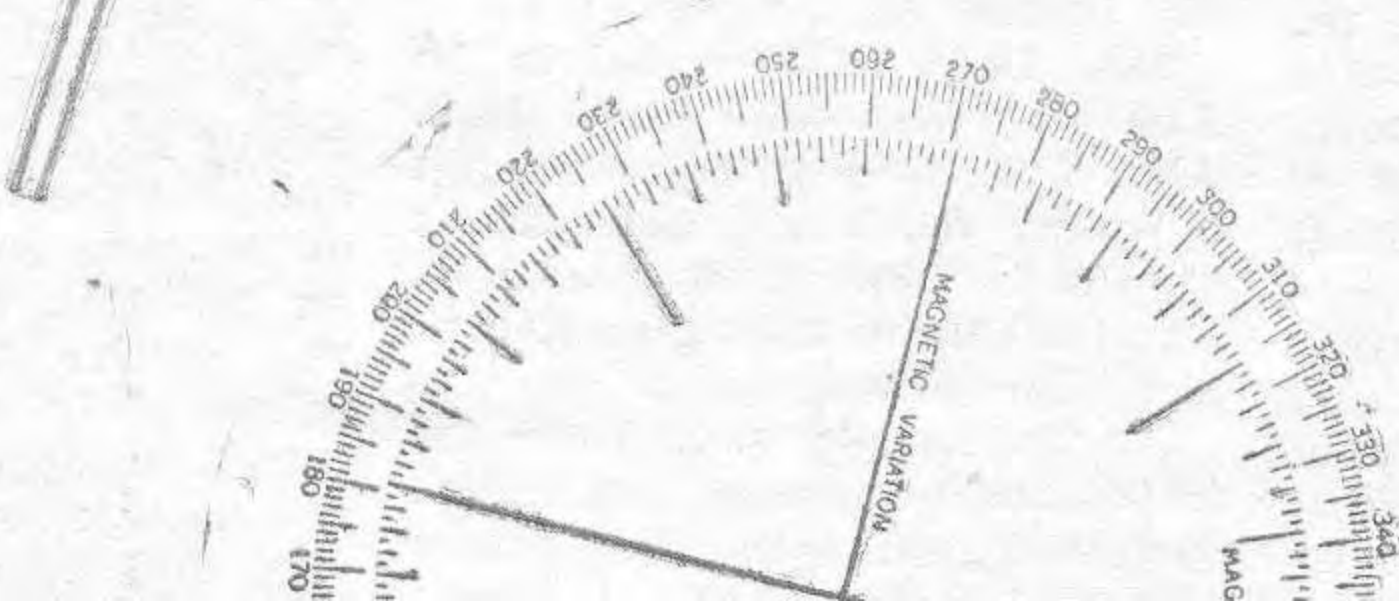

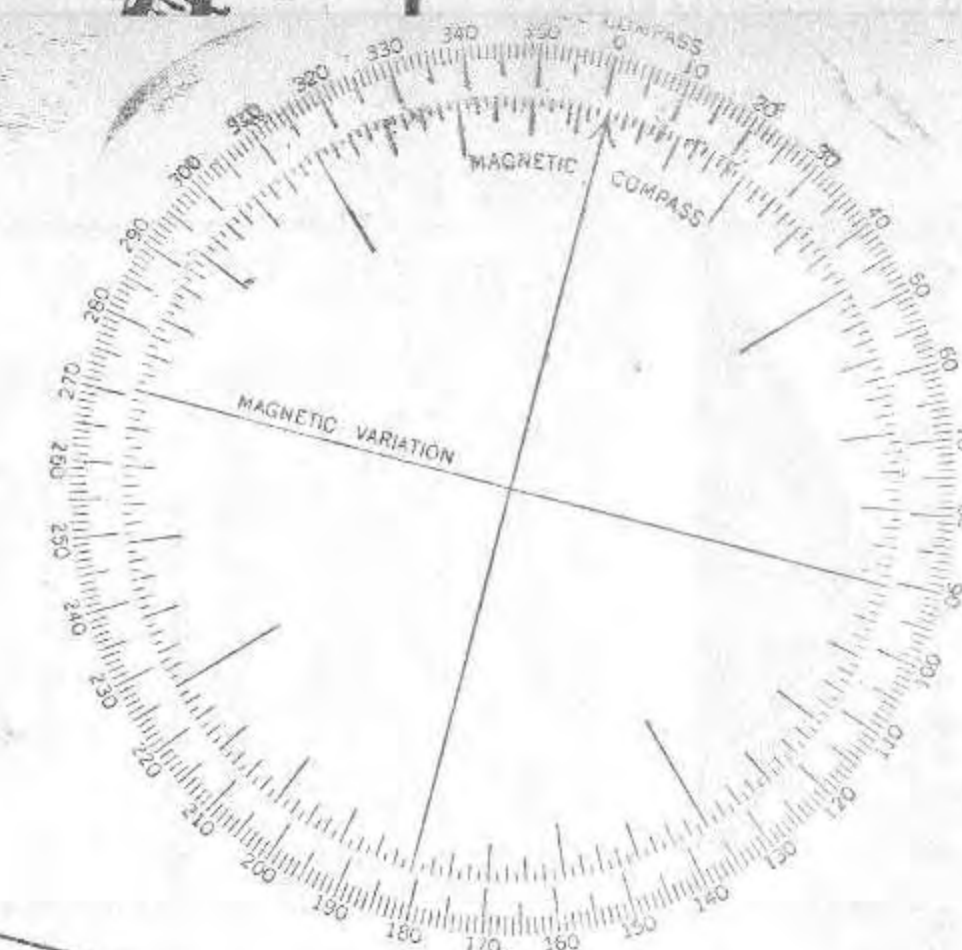

Henry Kreig

Henry Boyd Kreig, 54, 215 W. Washington St., Culver, died sometime Monday of a self-inflicted gunshot wound. Kreig's body was found about 11:30 p.m. at the Culver Military Academy bird sanctuary by a Fulton County Police officer who was one of several officers searching for the missing man. Marshall County Police, Maxinkuckee Lake Patrol, Culver Police and Indiana State Police were also included in the search. Kreig was last seen about 9:00 a.m. Monday.

County Police said Kreig used a forked twig to prop up a .12 gauge shotgun. He died of a head wound. Marshall County coroner George Deaton joined police officers in the investigation and ruled Kreig's death a suicide. Kreig reportedly had been in

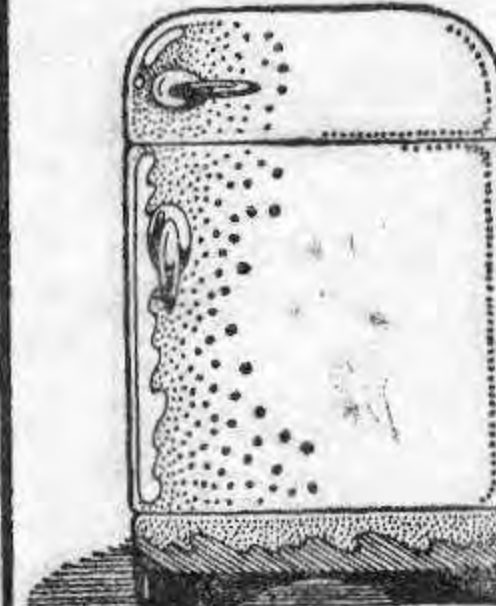
failing health for the past six months and had been hospitalized several times.

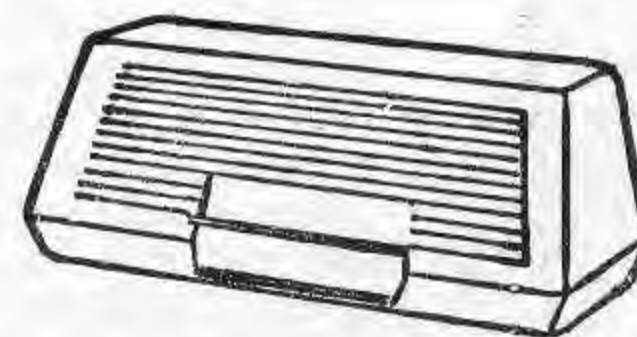

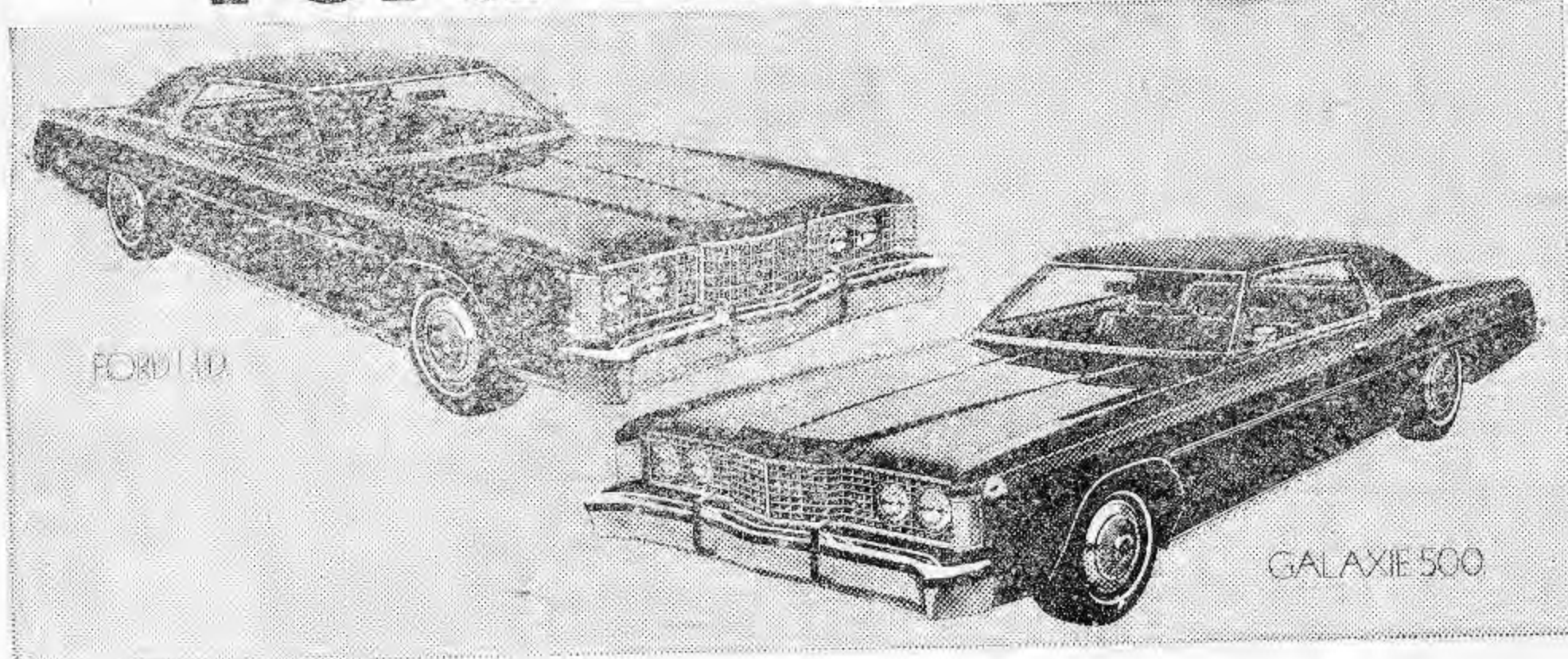
