





Henry Kreig

Henry Boyd Kreig, 54, 215 W. Washington St., Culver, died sometime Monday of a self\_inflicted gunshot wound. Kneig's body was found about 11:30 p.m. at the Culver Military Academy bird sanctuary by a Fulton Coun\_ ty Police officer who was one of several officers searching for the missing man. Marshall County Police, Maxinkuckee Lake Patron, Culver Police and Indiana State Police were also included in the search. Kreig was last seen about 9:00 a.m. Monday.

County Police said Kreig used a forked twig to prop up a .12 gauge shotgun. He died of a head wound. Marshall County coroner George Deaton joined police officers in the investigation and ruled Kreig's death a suicide.

Kreig reportedly had been in






