Gen Carpenter Retires

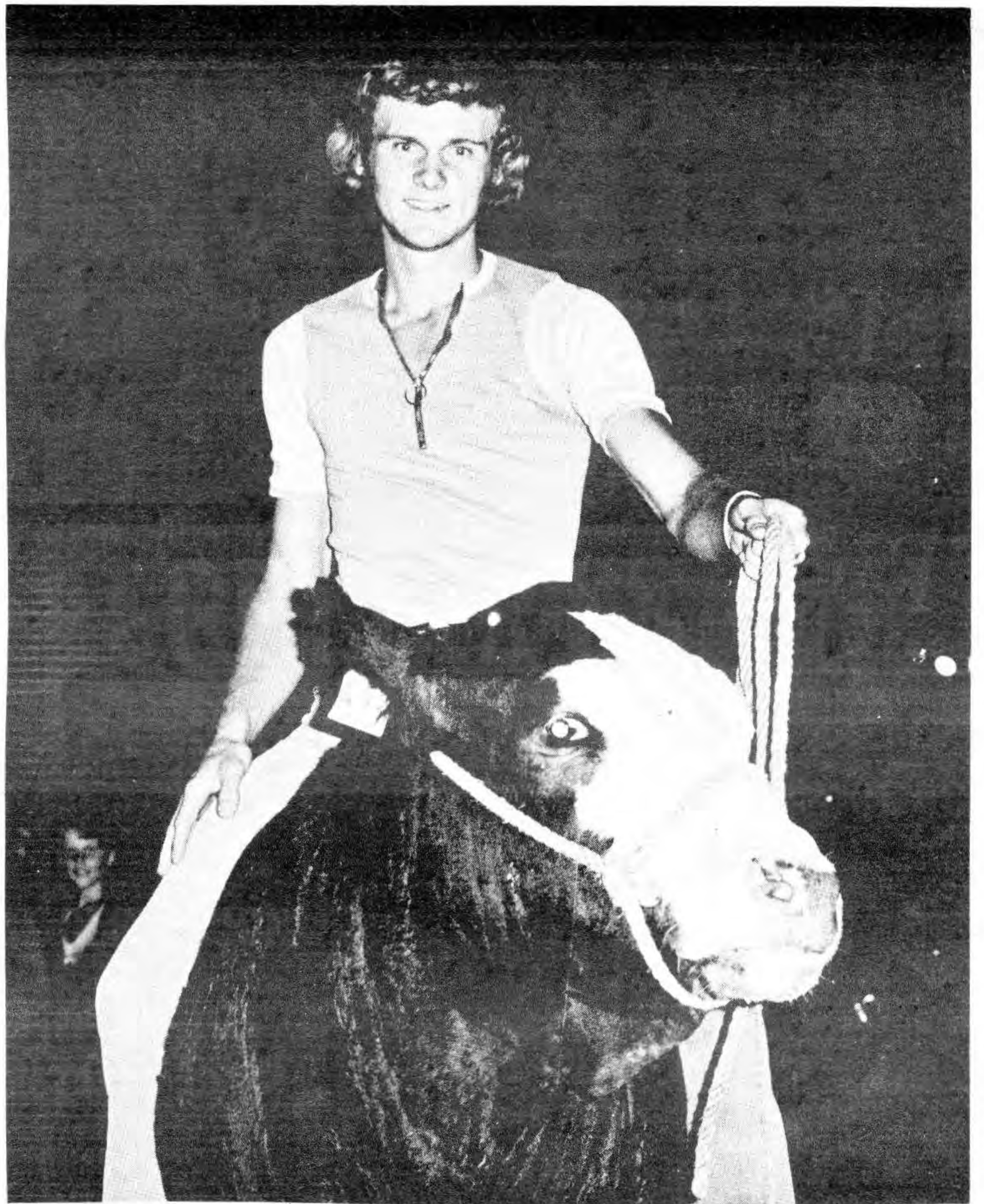
Lt. Gen. John W. Carpenter III, USAF (ret.), announced in a news conference Tuesday his plans to retire as Culver's eighth superintendent, effective June 30, 1974. The decision was announced following earlier discussions with the chairman and the president of The Culver Educational Foundation's board of directors, who are in the process of selecting a Search Committee for a successor.

Citing pressing family business and personal interests, which were difficult to pursue along with the full-time duties at Culver, Gen. Carpenter set a four-year limit on his superintendency. In making the summer announcement, he indicated his wish to provide the Foundation board with sufficient time for a "planned and

reasoned search so there will be no loss of momentum in Culver's forward progress."

In a letter to B.B. Culver, Jr. chairman of the Foundation board, Gen. Carpenter wrote: "You may be certain that my years as superintendent have been interesting and challenging. I have enjoyed thoroughly the cooperative association with the board of directors, the alumni and our patrons. Together, we have commenced some significant changes and innovations, which I believe will stand the test of time."

Receiving news of Gen. Carpenter's decision "with regret for the loss but understanding of the personal sacrifice," B.B. Culver, Jr., chairman of The Culver Educational Foundation's board of directors said, "Gen. Carpenter has demonstrated

his complete dedication to Culver, and we thoroughly understand his desire to take an early retirement to pursue his personal interests.

"Recent years have subjected private schools to unusual stresses and strains, and Culver is fortunate to have gained in strength during this turbulence. The whole Culver community is immensely grateful for the leadership Gen. Carpenter furnished during a critical period in the life of Culver."

"Since Gen. Carpenter's arrival in August of 1970, Culver has seen the addition of the Culver Academy for Girls, founding of the new Aviation Education Program and dedication of Fleet Field, creation of the Summer School of Aviation and the Special Camps program, initiation of the second capital funds campaign in Culver's history and an endowment increase of over \$3 million, establishment of a dean of students office and the Culver Council, completion of the new CAG dormitory and renovation projects in South Barracks, the Recreation Building, the Swimming Pool and the Culver Inn. Perhaps most significant of all is the increased enrollment response motivated by the developments achieved during the first three years of the Carpenter Era."

School Registration Schedule

Plans have been announced for the opening of the 1973-74 academic year of the Culver Community Schools Corporation, by the school administrative officials. Registration for all students K-8 will be held at the Culver Elementary and Junior High building, the Monterey Elementary and Junior High building and the Aubenaubee Elementary and Junior High building on August 22, 23 and 24. The Elementary and Junior High buildings will be opened from 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. on these dates. The students will receive class and teacher assignments, pay book rent, receive school calendars, receive insurance forms and school lunch information. Students who will be attending school for the first time must present a birth certificate as proof of age. To be eligible for kindergarten a child must be 5 years of age prior to Sept 1, 1973, and for first grade a child must be 6 years old prior to September 1, 1973.

For the Culver Community High School, special pre-enrollment sessions will be held for all grade levels beginning with seniors on Monday, August 20; juniors on Tuesday, August 21; sophomores on Wednesday, August 22; freshman on

Thursday, August 23. Students are to report to the school auditorium for all sessions which will begin promptly at 9:00 A.M. on the dates scheduled.

Students who have an orientation session at the pre-enrollment times, will have an opportunity to pay book rent, get locker assignments and daily class schedules. The orientation sessions will last approximately one hour.

Although the pre-enrollment sessions are not required, those who do attend will have the advantage of completing registration in a much shorter time and of avoiding longer lines. Those who miss the pre-registration sessions and all late enrollees, should plan on attending a registration session at 9:00 a.m. on August 24.

School busses will operate for the first time on Monday, August 27. Busses will pick up students in time to deliver to their respective schools at 1:00 p.m. The first full day of school and the first day for the operation of the school lunch program, will be Tuesday, August 28. The school days will be full day sessions thereafter, as indicated on the school calendar. Busses will travel their respective routes

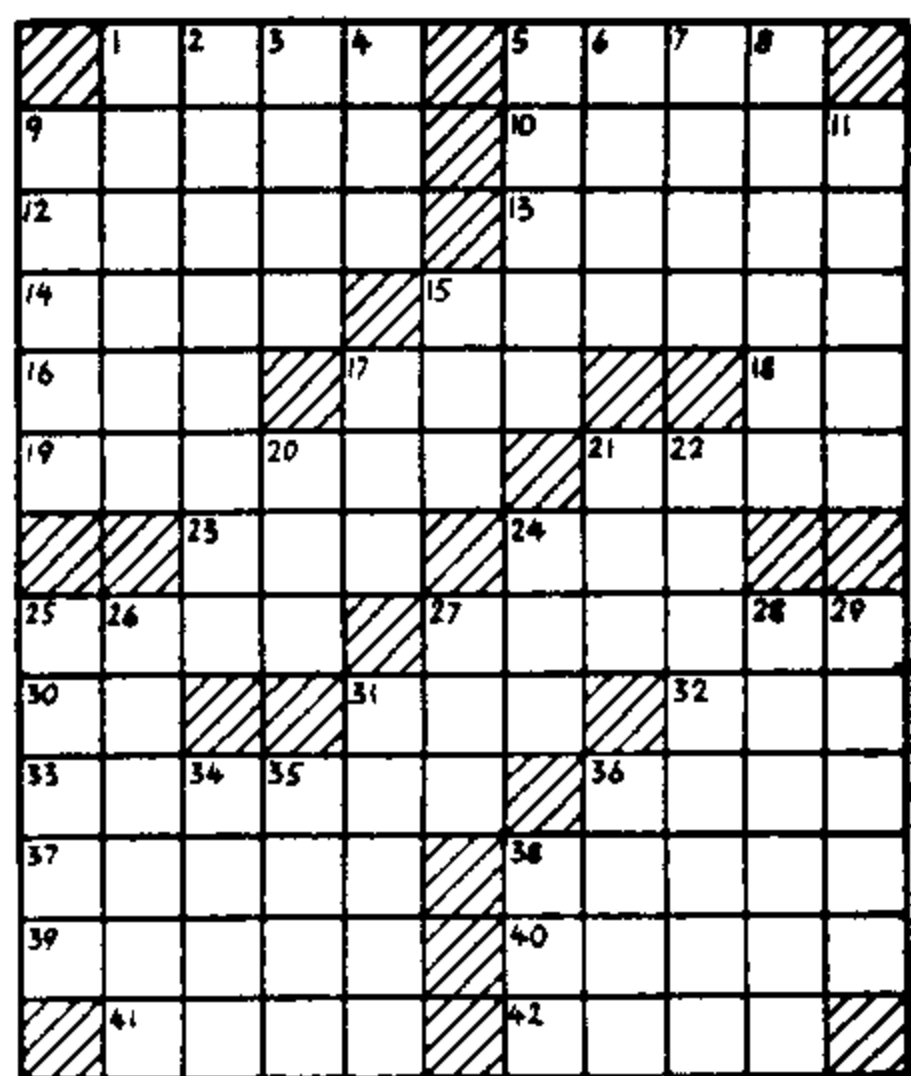

Render Unto Caesar

Editor's Note—This column has been promised, on an irregular, albeit frequent, basis by Michael L. Henn. Mike, a certified public accountant and a tax supervisor with Coopers & Lybrand, South Bend, Indiana, has agreed to submit articles which may be of value in your personal planning. Tax Dollars can be saved by making a gift of appreciated securities?

If you purchased a marketable security (stocks, bonds, etc.) some years ago and have watched that asset rise in value, you probably have been reluctant to sell it because of the specter of the capital gain and the related income tax on that gain. So, the very next time you are asked to contribute to your church, your alma mater, your favorite charity or you wish to do more for the Girl Scouts than buy cookies, consider the following:

You purchased AT&T ten years ago; 25 shares for \$600. These shares are now worth \$2,000. If you sell these shares,

one-half of the gain of \$1,400 or \$700, will be taxed at ordinary income rates (subject to the alternative tax provision of a maximum of 25-35 percent).

So, what happens if you give that stock to a qualified recipient organization? Briefly, you avoid the tax on the gain—and secure a tax deduction for the value of the stock, \$2,000. To illustrate; let's compare the gift of the stock to the situation of selling the stock and making a gift of the \$2,000 you receive on the sale (we are ignoring commissions, etc.).

Such gifts of appreciated capital gain property are deductible only to the extent of 30 percent of your adjusted groww income.

In both instances you have reduced your assets by \$2,000, cash or stock. And, if you don't have the ready cash and are forced to dispose of a security to meet your pledge, you can see the tax saving of con-

tributing the security is \$252 (\$5,600 tax as opposed to \$5,912).

Of course, if your securities have decreased in value, you should sell them (taking the deductible tax loss on your return) and contribute the proceeds. This allows you a deduction for what you've given up; the present worth of the security, and the paper loss incurred to date.

Because of our graduated income tax, the tax savings illustrated above would be greater if your taxable income is higher.

Further, a gift of cash to a qualified educational institution permits a maximum credit of \$100 against your Indiana income tax. This credit actually reduces your Indiana tax liability, the cash gift is deductible for Federal income tax purposes, and, in proper circumstance, this procedure can generate a tax profit in the year of the gift.

Reflecting on his 31-year career in the Air Force, Carpenter said he had grown accustomed to accomplishing a job during the usual three or four-year tours, concluding that four years at Culver would permit him to consolidate the major developments with which he had been most involved.

In setting goals for his final year at Culver, Carpenter said, "I believe we have turned the corner in winter and summer enrollment, which is a great encouragement to continue to improve on our record. Re-enrollment will be well above percent this coming year, which is another sign of progress. The Culver Academy for Girls will have its largest enrollment ever this fall, filled to capacity after moving into its new dormitory, and I want to see CAG continue to move forward on solid footing. We know an extensive market exists for Culver's special educational benefits, and we plan continued emphasis on Culver's traditional citizenship and leadership training.

"While there may be no perfect time for leaving, my overriding desire is to see Culver go forward in strength, not only because of my inherited affection for the school but also because of my belief in the value and importance of this kind of education, both now and for the future. Throughout the recent changes Culver has reinforced its historical commitment to Scholarship-Leadership-Citizenship, as well as to a variety of sports and extra-curricular activities that add scope to life. The time seems right for new leadership, which can bring fresh energy and approaches to educational, plant and endowment needs of the 1970's."

at basically the same time as last year. School officials have announced that due to the increase in food costs, there will be an increase of 5c per lunch throughout the corporation. This will make the price of lunches for students in grades 1-4, 35c; grades 5-8, 40c; grades 9-12, 45c. Lunch tickets will be sold on a weekly basis.

School Board

The Culver Community Schools Corporation Board of School Trustees met in joint session with the members of the School Building Holding Corporation for a discussion on completing various phases of work at the grounds of the new High School Building, which the Holding Corporation has agreed to finance. It is hoped that the High School Athletic Field will be properly graded and sodded before fall and that the new tennis courts will be finished and also approximately one-half of the parking lot blacktopped.

Mr. Kenneth Haas, varsity basketball coach and Mr. John Nelson, athletic director were present and reported on the summer basketball clinic. A total of 89 boys participated in the clinic at one time or another from Culver, Aubbeenaubee and Monterey. Awards were given and Mr. Haas had stressed to each boy who participated about the need for strong discipline and responsibility. This is to be two of his very strong requirements from all boys who participate in basketball this coming year.

Following Mr. Haas review of the basketball clinic, Mr. Nelson, athletic director, discussed the condition of the High School baseball diamond. It was agreed to make a further survey and study of the athletic field before any actual work would be approved.

The athletic director also expressed some concern about the difficulties he has encountered with athletic insurance for students participating in athletics. After a valuable consideration of the situation, the Board unanimously re-affirmed its policy that requires all students participating in

Book rental rates for the coming 1973-74 school year were discussed and it was decided by the Board that most additional fees to the book rental rates be eliminated this year. The book rental rates will be Kindergarten-\$9.00; grade 1-\$17.50; grade 2-\$16.00; grade 3-\$17.50; grade 4-\$15.00; grade 5-\$15.00; grade 6-\$14.00; grade 7-\$14.00; grade 8-\$14.00. The High School book rental will vary according to the courses taken.

A letter of resignation from Mr. William Harris, elementary assistant principle and bus supervisor, was read to the Board. It was decided to obtain a replacement for Mr. Harris as

soon as possible.

The Board was presented with a thank you letter from Mrs. William Young, secretary of the Leiters Ford Strawberry Festival, for use of the Aubbeenaubee School Building in connection with the festival this year.

A joint seminar on collective bargaining sponsored by the ISBA and the LAPSS at the Plymouth Lincoln High School Auditorium on Wednesday, August 22 is to be attended by the Board Members, Superintendent and Principals of the corporation.

ORDINANCE NO. 224

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING ORDINANCE NUMBER 162 COMMONLY KNOWN AS THE "ZONING ORDINANCE" OF THE TOWN OF CULVER, INDIANA.

WHEREAS, the Culver Plan Commission has heretofore received a petition of Edward G. Pinder et ux, asking that the real estate hereinafter described be zoned from Residential to Commercial use and after due notice by publication in the Culver Citizen did at its meeting held on June 26, 1973, pass a resolution by a unanimous vote to recommend to the Board of Trustees of the Town of Culver that said petition be granted.

NOW, THEREFORE, be it ordained by the Board of Trustees of the Town of Culver, Ind., that:

Section 1. Ordinance Number 162 adopted by the Board of Trustees of the Town of Culver, Indiana, commonly known as the "Zoning Ordinance", be and the same is hereby amended as follows:

Lot Nine (9) in Barnhisel's Addition to Marmont now called Culver City, Marshall County, Indiana, and Lot Number Ten (10) of Barnhisel's Addition to the Town of Marmont, now called Culver City, Marshall County, State of Indiana, except 16 feet of Uniform width off the entire South side thereof.

Shall hereafter be within and part of that District in and by said Ordinance known and designated as Commercial instead of within and part of the District known as Residential.

Section 2. If any section or provision or parts thereof in this ordinance shall be adjudged invalid and unconstitutional, such validity and unconstitutionality shall not affect the validity of the Ordinance as a whole or any other section or provision or part thereof.

Section 3. The Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and due attestation.

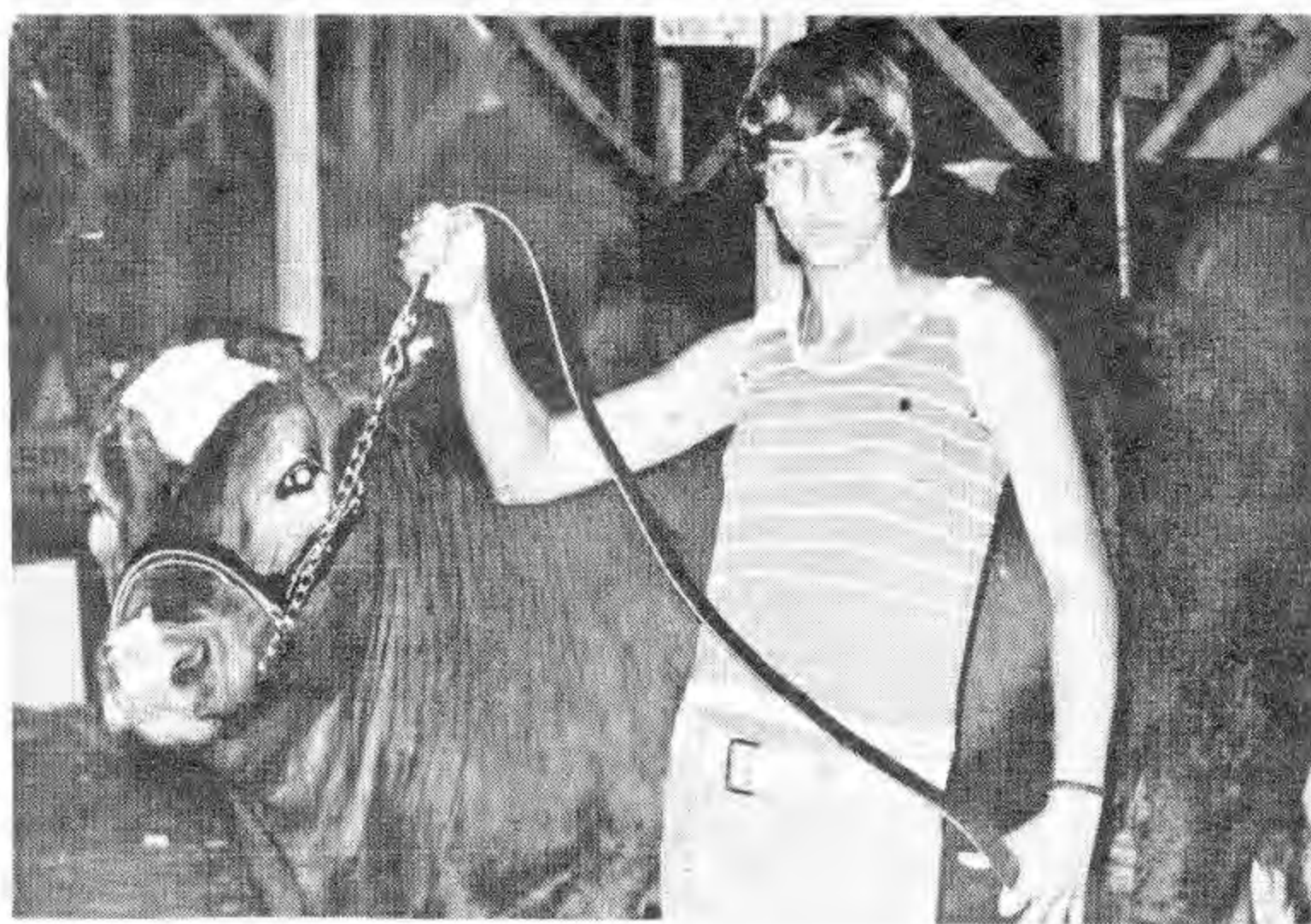
