OBITUARIES

CHARLES A. BYRD

Mr. Charles A. Byrd, 85, of 215 Hawkins Court, Culver, died Wednesday, December 12, 1973, at 1:00 p.m. in the St. Joseph Hospital, South Bend. He had been ill for three years.

Mr. Byrd was born March 24, 1889, at Cassopolis, Michigan, to James and Cornelia (Harper) Byrd. He had lived in Culver since 1905, and had retired from the Culver Military Academy in 1967.

He was married May 26, 1915 in Culver to Elsie L. Miller, who survives.

Survivors in addition to Mrs. Byrd are two sisters, Mrs. Charles (Lela) Dickerson, Culver, and Mrs. Leander (Grace) Vaughn of Cassopolis. Services were conducted at the Bonine Funeral Home in Culver at 2:00 p.m. Saturday, December 15th, with Rev. Maurice Kessler, pastor of Emmanuel United Methodist Church officiating. Burial was in Culver Masonic Cemetery.

ROLLO EWING HUTCHISON

Mr. Rollo Ewing Hutchison, a resident of Culver from 1902 to 1911, was buried in the Culver Masonic Cemetery on November 12, 1973. He died on November 9th in Chicago where he had lived since 1921.

He was born at Clarence, Illinois, on August 12, 1884, and after attending the local public school and Grand Prairie Seminary at Onarga, Illinois, came to Culver in 1902 to be secretary to Colonel Fleet, then commandant at the Academy. He progressed to be a member of the faculty in 1906 and in the same year he married Margaret Koontz, daughter of John H. Koontz, founder and for many years publisher of The Culver Citizen.

In 1911 the Hutchisons moved to Philadelphia where Mr. Hutchison had joined the staff of N.W. Ayer and Son, a then nationally prominent advertising agency. Later, in 1921, he was transferred to their Chicago office.

He left the Ayer interests in 1928 to form his own company to act as a publisher's representative. He was active in Chicago advertising and business circles until his retirement in 1960.

Numerous relatives survive him in the Chicago area and downstate Illinois. And, of the Koontz family, the following: Mrs. John V. (Margaret) Leonard, Mrs. Floyd (Frances) Wall, nieces; Lieutenant Colonel Thomas G. Koontz, nephew, all in Asheville, North Carolina, and Mrs. Genevieve McRae, niece, in Decatur, Georgia.

A graveside service was held by the Rev. John Krueger of the Grace United Church of Christ in Culver, and local arrangements were by the Bonine Funeral Home. The commander and the chaplain of North Shore Post #21 of the American Legion in Chicago, of which Mr. Hutchison was a loyal and active member, accompanied the cortege to Culver, and as a final act of respect presented to the Hutchison family the flag which had draped the casket throughout the ceremonies.

CLIFTON BODEY

Mr. Clifton Bodey, 72, of 313 North Main Street, Culver, passed away at 6:30 p.m. Monday, December 17, 1973, at his home. He had been ill for six weeks.

Mr. Bodey was born November 4, 1901, in Argos, to Harry and Leora (Snyder) Bodey. He had lived in Culver since 1938, coming from Argos. He retired from the Marshall County Co-Operative in 1966, and was a member of Wesley United Methodist Church in Culver and the Maxinkuckee I.O.O.F. Lodge #373.

He was married December 10, 1938, in South Bend, to Ruth M. LaMunion, who survives.

Surviving in addition to Mrs. Bodey are one daughter, Mrs. Jack (Linda) Rich, Peru; one brother, Elton Bodey, also of Peru; and three grandchildren. One brother and two sisters preceded him in death.

Services will be conducted today, Thursday, December 20th, at the Bonine Funeral Home, with Rev. Earl W. Sharp, pastor of Wesley United Methodist Church, officiating. Burial will follow in Culver Masonic Cemetery.

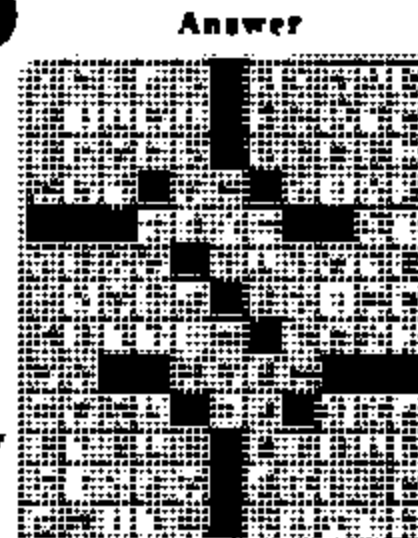
