Dear School Patrons:

We're very excited this month about one of the more significant additions to the Instructional Center at the Culver Community High School. I'm talking specifically about the new Audio and Visual Laboratory. Up to now the Instructional Center contained thousands of written materials but practically nothing in the way of film strips, records, tapes and other materials. We are pleased with the expansion that is taking place and wanted you to know about it. Can you imagine sitting in on an interview with Pearl Buck; hearing Grandma Moses tell about her art work; hearing baseball's notorious "lip" Leo Durocher discuss his version of an exciting argument or perhaps listening to some great New Orleans jazz; perhaps the student is doing an assignment on Mahatma Gandhi... well all of these plus hundreds of others are now available on tape. Also available to our students are personal cassette machines and booths where they can go to listen and perhaps watch on the screen a subject of their choosing. It's very difficult to accurately evaluate all of the ramifications of these new teaching facilities in our school and we of course have only the beginning of our collection, but the important fact is that we now have begun. All of us are thankful to have this approach for our students and we want to share the good news with you. The next time you're in the high school, stop in the Instructional Center and look through the catalog at what's available these days. We think you'll be impressed. These new additions are not at the cost of the books and periodicals either for we fully realize that the printed page remains the most needed and used resource for most students, but we do not want our students limited in the resources offered by our school.

February is the month of sectional tourneys and although we often associate sectional with basketball or perhaps wrestling,

here in Culver we're well aware that it also includes music. This month we play host here in our school to the sectional music instrumental competition and that means well over 1000 students, teachers and parents come into our school and community to display their accomplishments. The Culver School Corporation will itself have over 100 students participating in this big affair and it's quite an achievement (and a great deal of work) to assist in the sponsorship of this particular activity. Our own Band Booster organization puts in a great deal of effort to serve food and refreshments to the large numbers coming to town. The fact that the school has continued now for three consecutive years to attract the music sectional is a compliment to band director Charles Byfield and others involved in the local program.

We conclude by saying that all of us wish not only our talented young musicians but all of our athletes the greatest of success in their sectional activities during this busy month.

Funeral Home in Wabash.

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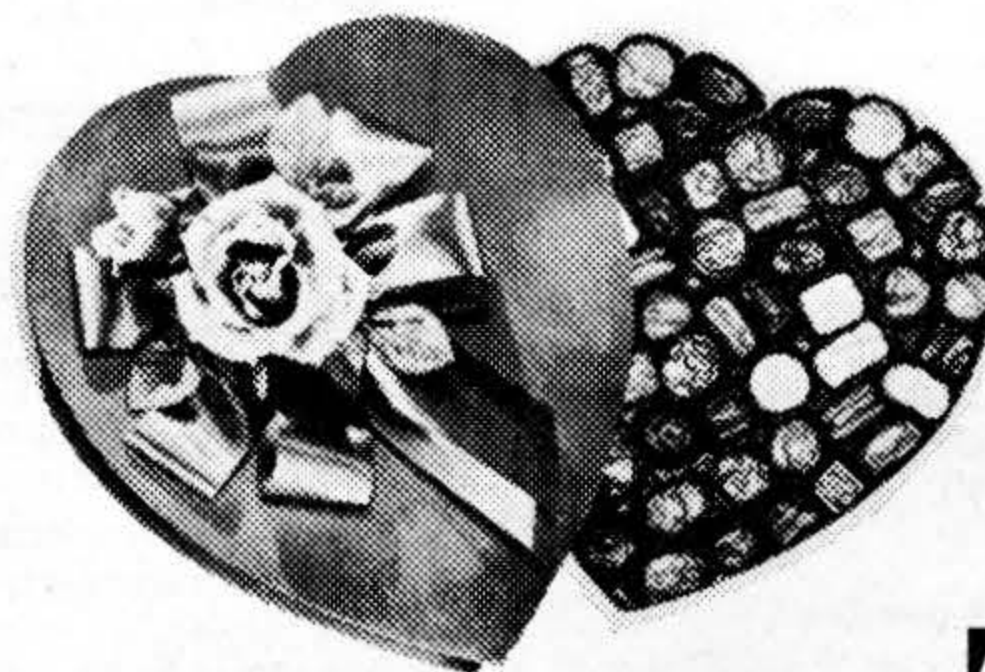

ISU ANNOUNCES HONOR ROLL

Indiana State University has released the fall semester honor roll which includes several Culver students who achieved academic distinction in their first semester of the 1973-74 year.

There are 1,132 honor students in all. Grades are computed on a 4.0 scale. A total of 494 students who earned a grade point average of 3.76 or above were named to the Distinguished Honor Roll while 638 students with an average of 3.50 to 3.75 are listed on the Honor Roll.

The honor listing is prepared for students carrying 12 or more semester hours (pass-fail courses are not computed) and it does not include those who were involved in student teaching during the term.

Peter Paul Kellogg and supervisor of music James H. Fassett.

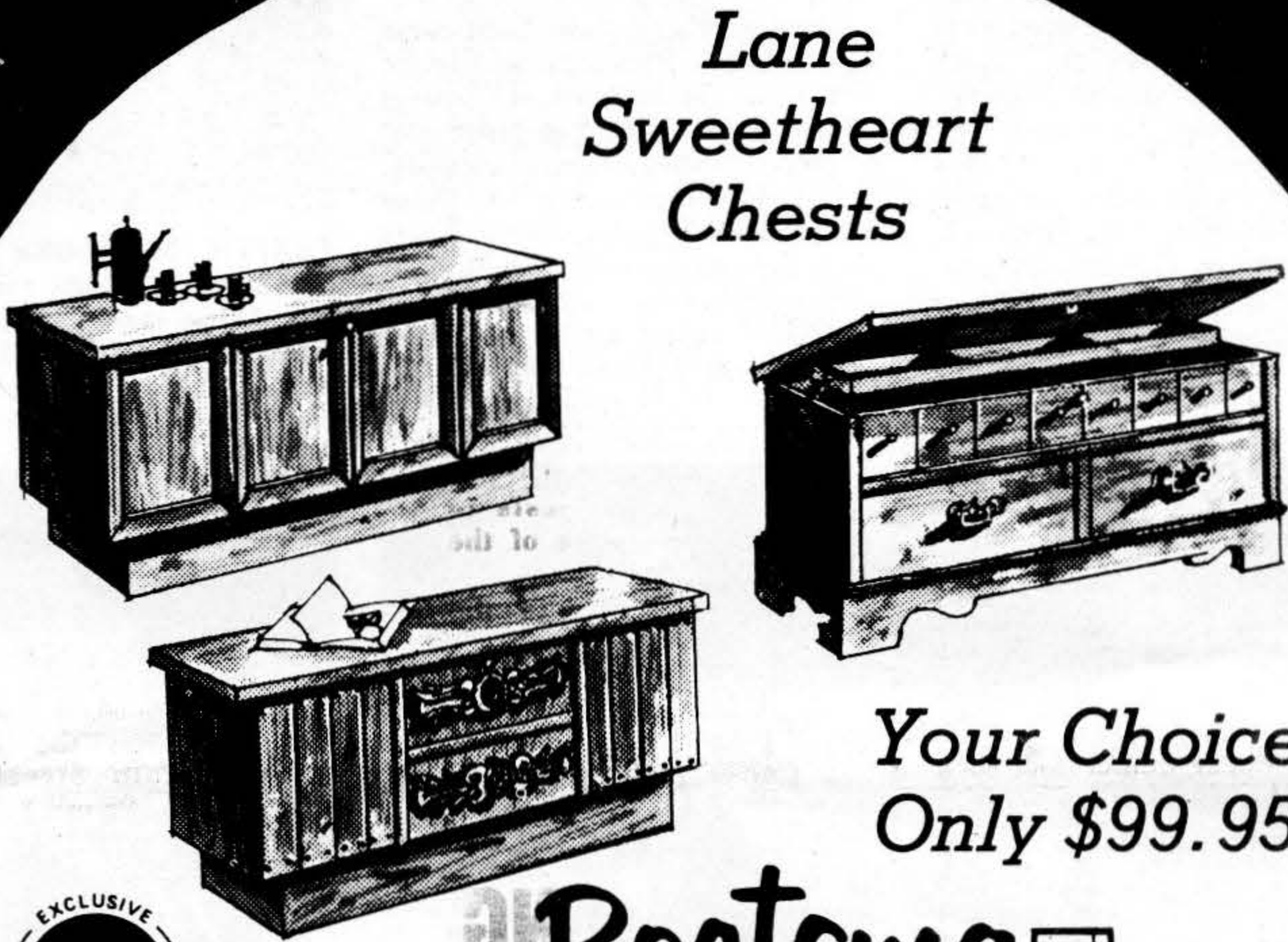

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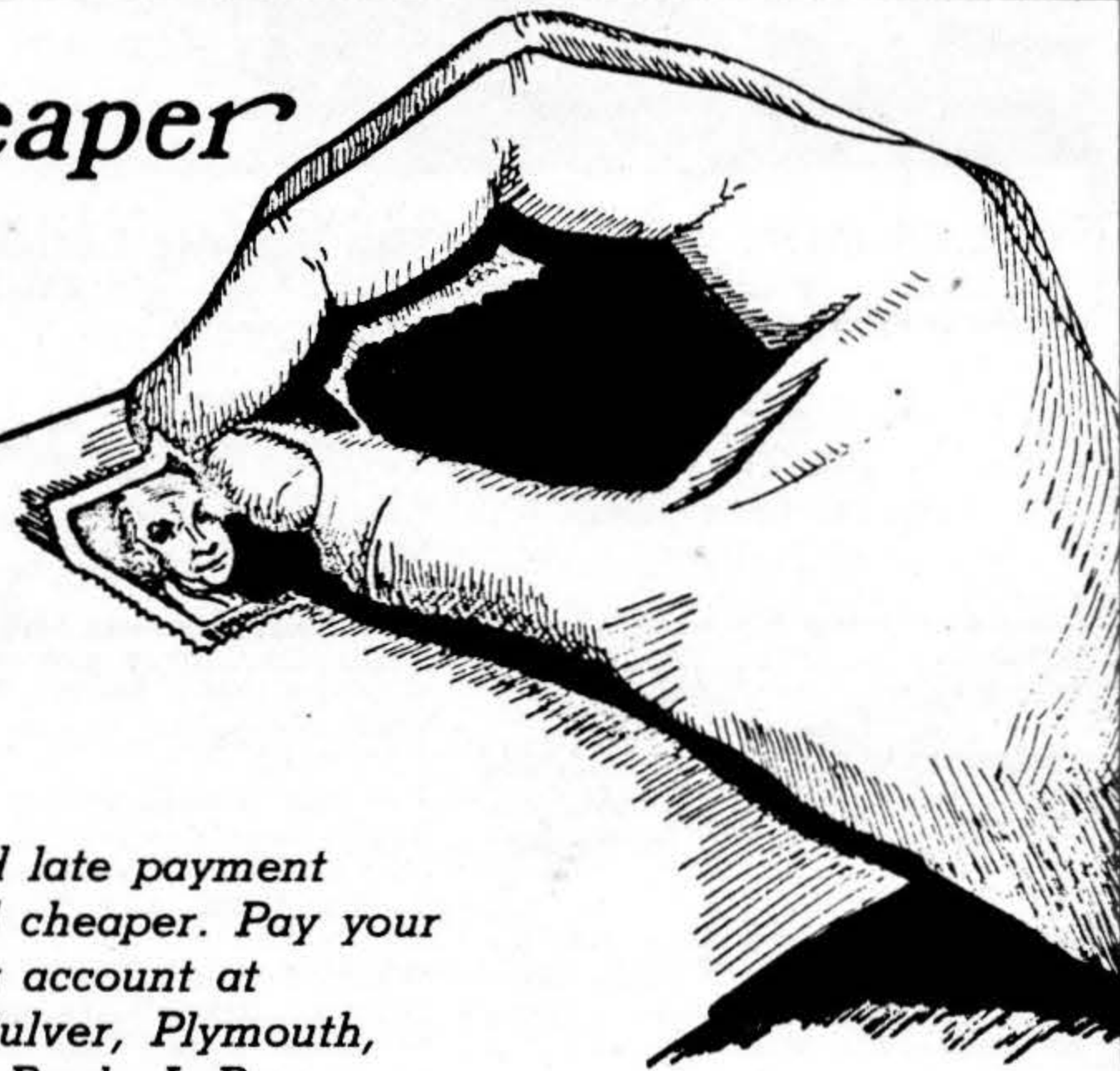
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THE CITIZEN VISITS WNIT'S NEW STUDIO FACILITIES

A TOUR FOR CITIZEN READERS

Standing amidst a clutter of new color broadcasting equipment that is awaiting installation, Gary Weinstein, WNIT's new Program Director, jokes that his biggest problem may be that some area viewers do not realize all TVs can receive the new station's programming.

"Channel 34 is on every TV dial," he says, "and you don't have to take a cable service to receive our transmissions."

In fact, tests have been received "loud and clear" in Culver this week, as the station implemented a week of test programming that will continue for the next few weeks at about five hours per day, five days a week.

The regular schedule will contain all sorts of programs, running from 9:00 a.m. through 10:00 p.m., five days a week, and from 6:00 p.m. through 10:00 p.m. on Sunday.

The CITIZEN visited the WNIT studios last week to give readers an idea of the facilities and people behind the new public television station.

After meeting Tom Brubaker, General Manager, we were shown through the offices and studios by Gary Weinstein, Program Director.

Gary, a South Bend native, is in charge of establishing the program schedule and getting the program

materials (tapes and films) on the air.

Other members of the station staff were also present, and are shown at their jobs in the accompanying photos.

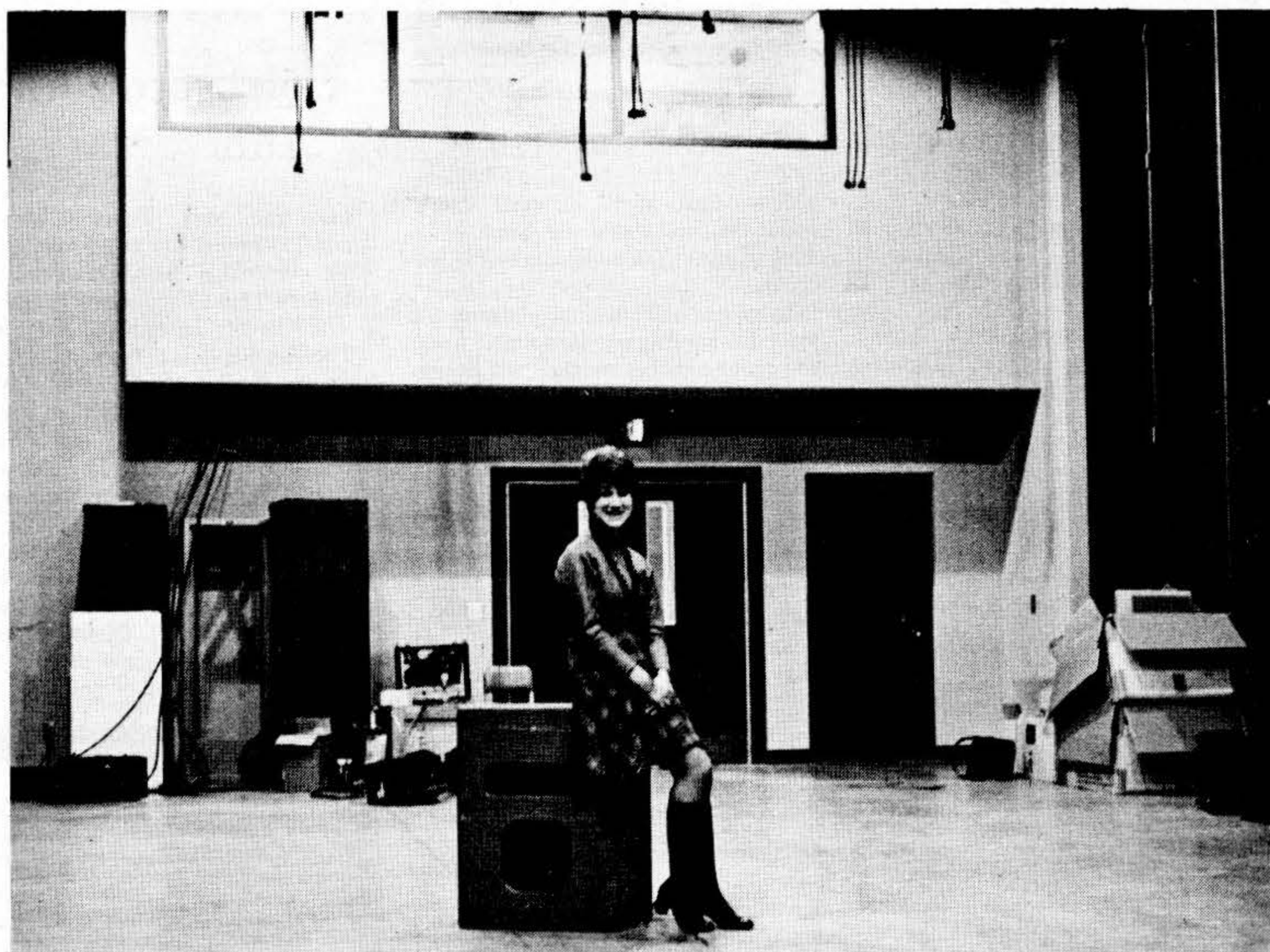
A listing of the proposed program schedule, as well as a description of the new shows, will appear in a future issue. Until then, readers are urged to test reception of Channel 34 on their sets by tuning to that number (it's just past WSJV-Channel 28) on their UHF dial.

Briefly, there will be children's programming in the morning (9:00 a.m. to Noon) and in the afternoon (3:30 p.m. to 7:00 p.m.), including "Sesame Street," "Zoom," "Electric Company," and "Mr. Rogers' Neighborhood."

At other times of the day, adult programs will range from "Know Your Antiques" and "Artists in America" to "Masterpiece Theatre" and "Evening at the Boston Pops."

Many of these shows will come via the Public Broadcasting Service (PBS), but the facilities of Channel 34 will be supported in large part from local contributions of viewers.

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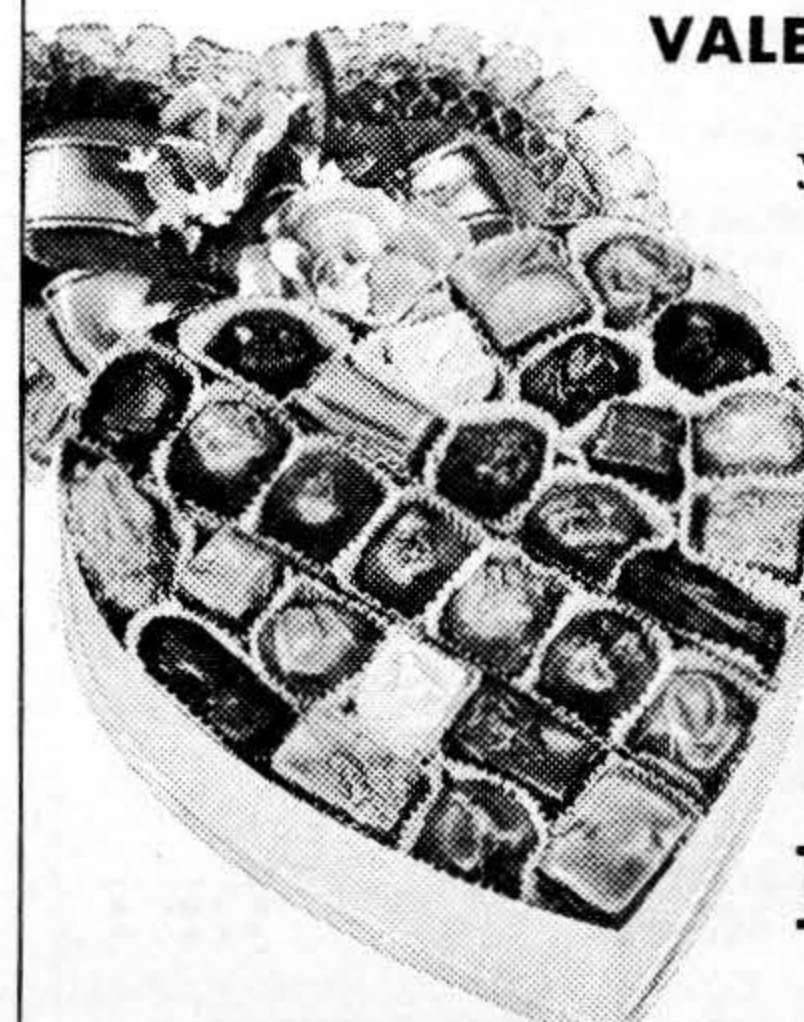
The International Society of Santa Claus would like to hear from everyone in the Culver area who plays the role of Santa Claus at Christmas.

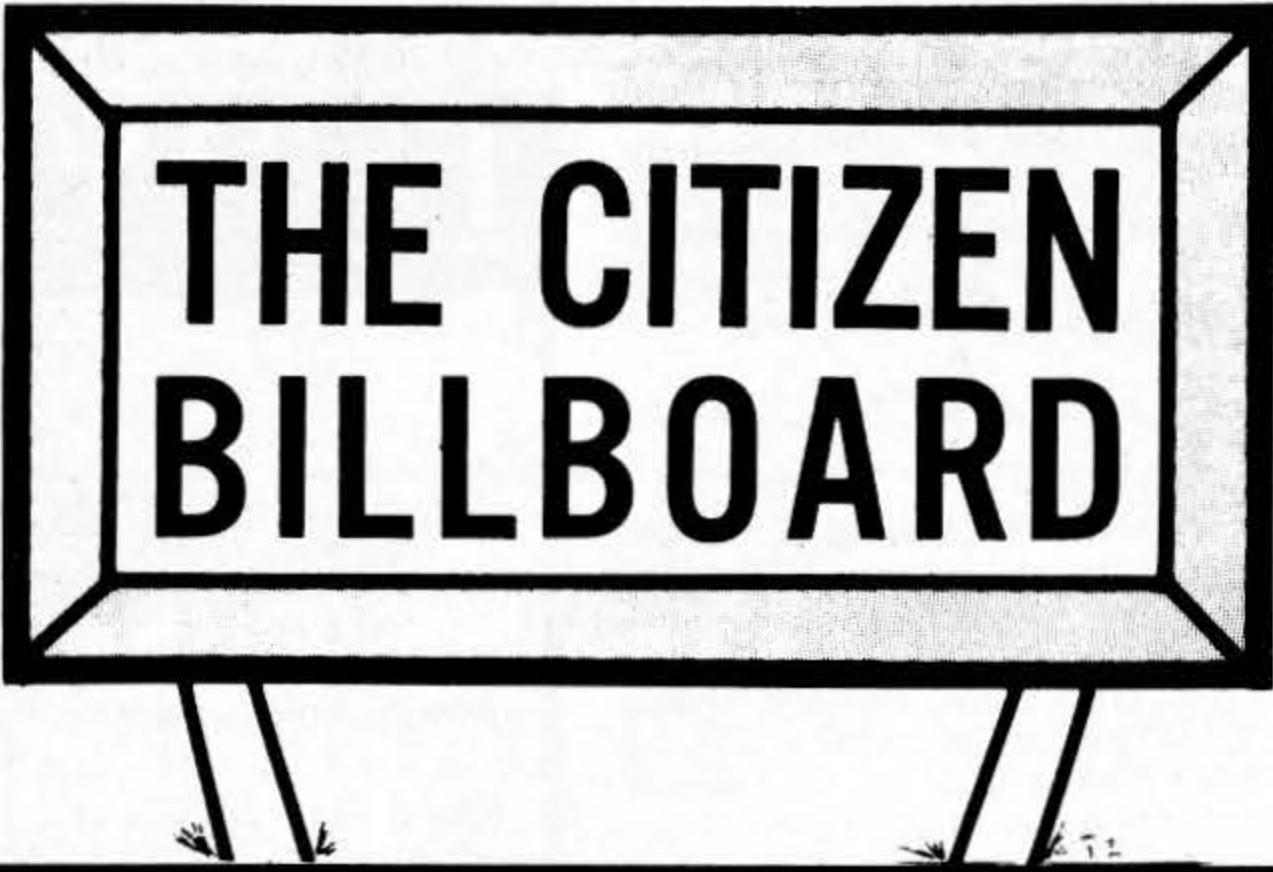
19 seniors at C.C.H.S. are finished for the year. What are they are going to do with their futures is as varied as the persons.
