Academy Board Names Barone

CMA's Ninth Superintendent

The Culver Educational Foundation's board of directors has announced the appointment of Col. Ben A. Barone, USAF, as Culver's ninth superintendent, effective July 1.

Col. Barone will succeed Lt. Gen. John W. Carpenter III, USAF (ret.), who announced plans last summer to retire after his fourth year as superintendent effective June 30, 1974. Col. Barone, who is 47, is in the process of retiring early from active duty in the Air Force after 24 years of commissioned service in order to become Culver's superintendent.

The selection of Col. Barone is the culmination of a seven-month effort by a search committee headed by H. Harrison Culver, '35, president of The Culver Educational Foundation; Britton L. Gordon, '29; James A. Henderson, '52; and John R. Mars, a Culver faculty member. The search committee consulted a cross section of the faculty and the heads of Culver's alumni and parent organizations in drafting detailed specifications for General Carpenter's successor.

"The qualifications for the next superintendent," said Mr. Culver, "were not specific as to type of background but were specific as to the types of experience and traits desired. As a consequence, we searched every field, from private college and secondary education and public schools to business, government service and the military."

"We believe Col. Barone brings a record of accomplishment as a man of rare leadership, sound judgment, aggressiveness in pursuing needed courses of action and exceptional abilities with people. We are fortunate to have gained the services of a man whose qualifications and interests virtually matched our specifications. Col. Barone will provide a special capacity to move Culver ahead toward all the goals established for our school."

Col. Barone developed his administrative abilities during 24 years of commissioned service in the Air Force, with assignments in the Strategic Air Command (SAC), Viet Nam and most recently as assistant deputy director for plans and policy for national security and as chief of the Operational Intelligence Division at Air Force headquarters in the Pentagon.

With a strong background in flying, including combat in World War II and Viet Nam, Col. Barone first enlisted in the Army Air Corps

in 1944. Finishing his enlistment in 1946, he worked as a commercial pilot until he joined the Air Force in 1949 as an aviation cadet. He rose to his present rank primarily in educational, plans, operations and intelligence positions.

Upon commissioning in 1950, he spent two and a half years as an officer training instructor and tactical officer to aviation cadets and student officers and an additional 18 months as an instructor for 240 officers preparing to become TAC officers. He then served three years in the 7330th Flying Training Wing, in Furstenfeldbruck, Germany—becoming wing training officer. This special NATO School trained pilots from Turkey, Iran, the Netherlands, England, Italy, Denmark, Spain and Germany.

After three years as a B-47 aircraft commander in the Strategic Air Command, Col. Barone was assigned as a SAC Exchange Officer with the Air Training Command, 3500th Pilot Training Wing, Reese Air Force Base, Lubbock, Texas. In his three years there, he became director of academics with responsibility for academic training as well as determining requirements for academic personnel. During this period, among other accomplishments, he was personally responsible for the first "all officer" class to enter pilot training as the aviation cadet program was phased out; he formulated a Training Officers Guide and the summer AFROTC Program, and he established a Programmed Learning Branch.

He also has served as executive to the assistant deputy chief of staff for plans and operations in the Pentagon and in 1972-73 as assistant deputy director for joint and National Security Council matters, also in the Pentagon. In this assignment, Col. Barone supervised over 75 plans and policy action officers and was responsible for the development of the Air Force position on over 50 percent of the papers considered by the Joint Chiefs of Staff.

Col. Barone holds a bachelor's degree in general education from the University of Omaha and a master's degree in education from the University of Southern California.

In his recent assignments, Col. Barone has served primarily in Air Force Intelligence. He is currently serving in the Pentagon as chief of the Operational Intelligence Division, at U.S. Air Force headquarters. From June, 1971 until June, 1972, Col. Barone served as wing director of operations, Task

Col. Barone will take early retirement from the Air Force to assume his new post this summer.

Cruelty Behind Bars

Block Thirteen in a certain state prison was known as the "hell hole." Inmates were kept—sometimes for years—in dark, 6' x 9' cells. Once a day they were allowed outside for 15 minutes, during which time they had to bathe, wash their clothes, and exercise.

But when these conditions were called to the attention of a federal judge, he ordered changes made at once. He said the situation was a form of "cruel and unusual punishment," forbidden by the United States Constitution.



Traditionally, courts have maintained a "hands-off" policy toward the administration of our prisons. They have felt that conditions behind bars were generally outside of their jurisdiction.

But in recent years, that attitude has been changing. Repeatedly, prisoners have won cases based on the "cruel and unusual" clause of the Constitution.

A broad spectrum of complaints has come under closer judicial scrutiny—corporal punishment, forced labor, restrictions on mail, restrictions on visitors, inadequate food, faulty sanitation, insufficient medical supplies or personnel.

Courts are still wary, however, of getting too deeply involved in the day-to-day problems of running a penal institution. Thus, one prisoner failed to establish "cruel and unusual" punishment merely because he had been deprived of the right to wear his civilian shoes. And in another case, a court found no constitutional problem when a prisoner's long hair was cut to standard length.

The court said: "A man in jail is not a free man. His right to wear long hair is outweighed by the interests of the state in maintaining sanitary conditions and discipline. The Eighth Amendment expresses the revulsion of civilized man against barbarous acts. The prohibition of long hair is not barbarous."

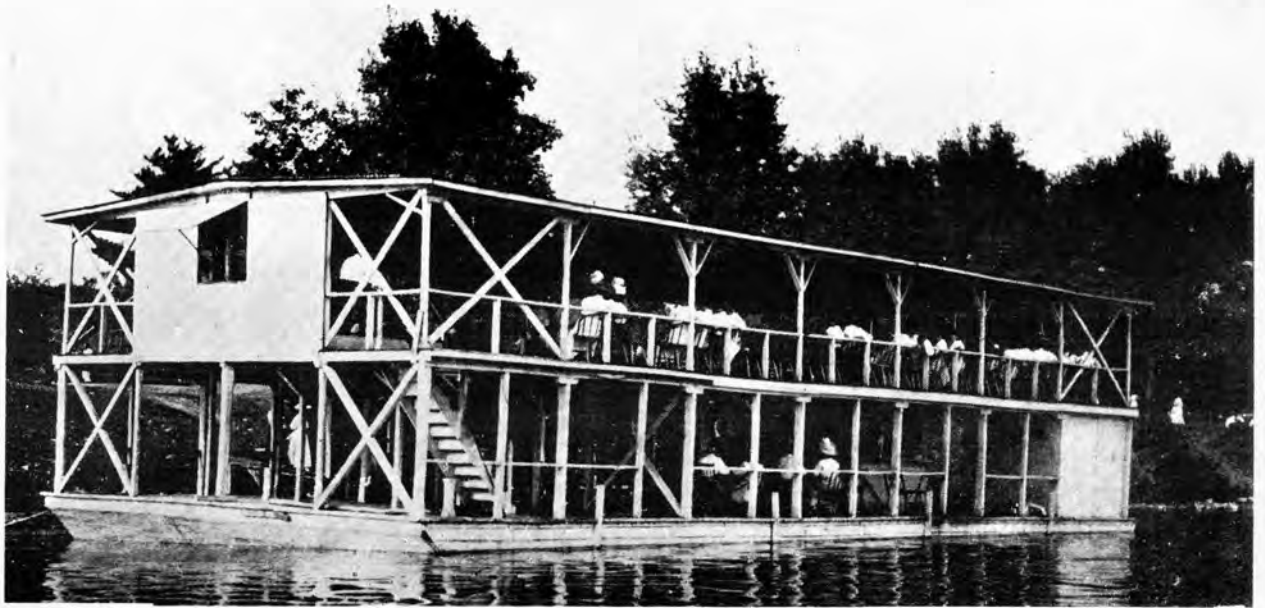

SAILBOAT MARKET APPEARS STRONG FOR 1974; SEVERAL NEW BOATS ARE FROM TOP DESIGNERS

Sailboat popularity was at its peak in 1973, when the industry totaled dollar shipments 23 percent higher than in 1972, and it appears there is no slowdown in the upward climb.

Manufacturers of sailboats are bullish about the 1974 market. Some have made improvements in late entries brought out last summer, but others have brand new models from the boards of well-known designers.

Two California builders for example, each have a 45-footer. Columbia, of Costa Mesa, Cal., has the 45-foot Motor Sailer designed by Bill Tripp. She sleeps eight in three separate cabins, is sloop-rigged and sells for \$51,995 with a 4-107 diesel as standard power. Sail area is 694 square feet, and there's also a shoal-draft keel rig available as options.

Also designed by Bill Tripp is the new Coronado 45, built by Coronado Yachts, Costa Mesa, Cal., with sloop rig, long trunk cabin and graceful deck sheer. She sleeps eight and sells for \$48,995. Her dimensions are 45'3" overall with a beam of 12'4". A spacious cruiser, she carries 810 sq. ft. of sail, affording her good racing potential.

Pearson Yachts, of Portsmouth, R.I. offers a new design from its company president, Bill Shaw. It's called the Pearson 10M, and the specs show a classic design:

generous beam carried well aft on the 33-foot hull, short fin keel and separate skeg-mounted rudder. Inside, she has settee berths rather than a convertible dinette, and optional upper berths which increase her sleeping capacity of six or seven.

The 10M has a waterline measurement of 29' 2" and an 11-foot beam. She carries 524 square feet of sail, draws 5' 11" and has an excellent ballast-to-displacement ratio, with 5,445 pounds of ballast against a total displacement of 12,441 pounds. Power is provided by a 30-hp. Atomic Four, and the list price is \$23,975 without sails.

For those sailors with a eye for the traditional, nicely blended with the modern, Nowak and Williams is introducing the Herreshoff Eagle, a new design from the pen of Halsey W. Herreshoff. A classic catboat hull, the Eagle has a graceful clipper bow, wheel steering, a 6-hp. outboard and trim cuddy cabin with v-berths and enclosed head. Where she departs from the traditional is in her sloop rig, and gaff topsail. She's made of fiberglass, has aluminum spars and sells for \$7,990, including sails. Dimensions are 26' LOA, 18' LWL, and 8'2" beam. She carries 320 sq. ft. of sail and draws just 1' 10" with her centerboard up. The company is located in Bristol, R.I.

Cape Dory, of West Bridgewater, Mass., has redesigned its Cape 25 fiberglass sloop to provide more storage space, an improved galley and two settee berths in place of a dinette. The boat has a conventional full keel and a flush-top trunk cabin. Her price tag is \$7,699, including sails and considerable equipment. Also redesigned for 1974 is the Erickson 29, a popular MORC racer-cruiser which is now available with a redesigned cockpit layout and new cabin appointments.

Optional Wheel

This fiberglass racer-cruiser now has a thwartships cockpit bridge which separates the helmsman, at the rear end of the cockpit, from the rest of the crew. If he chooses the optional pedestal wheel, the skipper can control the boat in splendid isolation both cruising and racing. The new bridge also allows the main-sheet traveler to be attached to its forward side for more efficient sheeting for the mainsail, especially with the new IOR rig.

Below, the head compartment has been enlarged to allow for a stainless wash basin and vanity, the hanging locker design has been improved and the drop leaf table now folds against the starboard side of the main bilthead. There also are two new teak-framed, lucite hatch covers for better light and ventilation.
