Funeral Services Held Today For Arthur E. Guise

Arthur E. Guise, 70, of 209 South Chimax St., Culver, died at 3 p.m. Monday at the Harris Nursing Home, Argos, following an illness of eight months.

A retired carpenter, Mr. Guise was a member of the Zion Gospel Chapel Church and a former member of the Hammond Presbyterian Church where he served as a teacher and choir director for 25 years.

Born on Nov. 21, 1892, in the Bruce Lake community, Fulton County, he was the son of Frank and Ida Decher Guise. Mr. Guise had lived the greater part of his life in Hammond coming to Culver in 1941. On Dec. 25, 1935, in Pulaski County, he was married to Rosa M. Miller, who survives.

Also surviving are two sisters, Mrs. George (Edith) Wilhelm, Route 1, Culver and Mrs. John (Hazel) Lockridge, Knox.

Funeral services were held at 2 p.m. today at the Zion Gospel Chapel Church, southwest of Culver, with the Rev. Donald Miller, of Winona Lake, officiating.

Burial was in the Zion Reformed cemetery west of Culver. The Grossman Funeral Home at Argos was in charge of arrangements.

C. L. White Elected To School Post

Cedric L. White of North Bend Township was elected president of the newly created Culver Community Schools at a meeting Thursday in The State Exchange Bank at Culver.

Judd T. Stinebaugh, Culver, was elected vice-president; Donald Taylor, North Bend Township, secretary, and Eugene Bendiet, Union Township, treasurer. Vernie Bowen is the fifth member of the board.

The Culver Community Schools is a consolidation of the school townships of Union in Marshall County, Aubbeensubee of Fulton County and North Bend of Starke County. Trustees of the three townships were authorized to continue to carry on routine school matters.

Resolution Passed

The board passed a resolution providing that until a superintendent is selected and a budget and additional appropriations secured and approved, the trustees and advisory boards of the respective townships are to continue to pay all current obligations and to carry out the existing contracts, as well as to purchase school supplies.

The board also selected a room, to be designated later, in Culver High School to be the principal office of the new corporation.

A meeting was scheduled for Wednesday, Jan. 2 at the new office and the trustees of the three townships next year will be Glenn Overmyer of Union Township, Eldon Davis of Aubbeensubee Township and Donald Taylor of North Bend.

About 50 persons attended the meeting, including George Stevens, attorney for the school corporation; County Superintendent of Schools Frank McLane; the outgoing and incoming trustees and advisory boards of the three townships; and several members of the Culver Town Board.

The new corporation was formed two years ago under 1947 school consolidation laws, but at that time, the State School Reorganization Commission did not give its approval to the consolidation. The state reorganization did not grant its approval until last week.

Taylor was appointed to the board by officials of North Bend Township. He is an official of

Nickel Plate Road Plans To Remove Two Trains

The Nickel Plate Road has announced plans to discontinue operation of two daily passenger trains between Buffalo, N. Y., and Chicago, Ill., on which patronage has constantly declined since construction of the new highway system. The trains are losing more than \$1,000 a day.

Notices have been posted that The Westerner (Train No. 7) and The New Yorker (Train No. 8) will make their final runs on Sunday, January 6.

The trains serve the following principal intermediate points: Erie, Pa.; Conneaut, Ashtabula, Cleveland, Lorain, Bellevue and Fosteria, Ohio; and Fort Wayne, Argos, Hubbard, Knox and Hammond, Ind.

Patronage of the trains has dropped 87 per cent since 1959. Out-of-pocket losses for the two trains were \$376,787 in 1959, \$422,995 in 1961 and \$186,796 during the first six months of 1962.

In recent years the NKP route between Buffalo and Chicago has been paralleled by a through system of new highways, including the New York Thruway, Interstate Route 90 in Pennsylvania and across Ohio to Cleveland, the Ohio and Indiana Turnpikes and the Calumet Skyway which leads into the heart of Chicago. Today 90 per cent of all intercity travel is by private automobile. According to the U. S. Bureau of Public Roads, there is approximately one motor vehicle for every 2.6 persons in the five states through which the Nickel Plate operates.

Nickel Plate will continue to operate the City of Chicago (Train No. 5) and the City of Cleveland (Train No. 6) between Buffalo and Chicago.

Nellie G. Kerr Dies At Age 75; Services Today

Mrs. Nellie Garrison Kerr, 75, Culver, died at Parkview Hospital in Plymouth at 10 p.m. Saturday following an illness of four weeks.

Mrs. Kerr was born in Paoli on March 20, 1887, and came to this area from Paoli in 1908. In South Bend she married Delbert L. Garrison in 1915, who died in 1940. She later married Raymond H. Kerr in 1947 and he died in 1952.

Mrs. Kerr was a member of the ladies auxiliary of the V.F.W., Post 6919 of Culver and the American Legion Auxiliary of Culver.

The Walkerton-Culver basketball game of Dec. 21, played in the Culver Community Building provided the enthusiastic setting for the Culver High School Homecoming Festivities.

Shortly before the varsity game the starting members of the two squads lined up, facing each other, in front of the stage forming an aisle. With the Pep Band playing a march the candidates for queen were escorted through the line of boys to the stage.

The candidates and their escorts in order of appearance were Carol Overmyer, senior, escorted by Rex Cramp; Diane Davis, freshman, escorted by Larry Miller; Pam Toulpa, junior, with John Van Horn as escort; Carolee Easterday, senior, escorted by Bob White; and Susannah Spencer, sophomore, Danny Haenes as escort. They were followed by Lonnie Christopher carrying the ball to be used in the game and Beth Adams carrying the queen's crown.

After all were on the stage, Carol Overmyer was called forward to be crowned Homecoming Queen for 1962. Miss Overmyer received her crown and a kiss from Larry Miller, president of the senior class. Miss Overmyer threw the ball out onto the floor and then took her seat on the white throne where she received a bouquet of long-stemmed red roses.

The queen and her court remained seated on the stage during the first half of the ball game. The stage was decorated in pale blue and white by a committee headed by Carmen Greter.

The program was tied together with a clever narration. Santa also appeared throwing candy to those in the cheering section.

The activities were sponsored entirely by the Pep Block.

It is hoped that the Homecoming Festivities will become an annual affair.

No Passing Signs Erected By State Highway

The Indiana State Highway Commission has doubled up its defenses to protect motorists from the dangers of passing on hills and curves where sight distances are inadequate.

Thousands of no-passing signs, which will warn motorists of hazardous curves and hills even when snow obscures the yellow lines, have been erected throughout the state by the Indiana State Highway Commission.

Yellow lines have for years been the only indication to motorists of hazardous no-passing zones, and the onset of the snow season each year has often deprived drivers of their only means of warning.

The Indiana State Highway Commission has erected "Do Not Pass" signs at the beginning of restricted passing zones, while "Pass With Care" signs signal the beginning of safe passing zones.

In all previous winters when snow or ice gathered along the center lines of highways, the motorist on a strange road was left with only his judgement to guide him in passing. With the yellow lines obscured, and winter haze and glaze hindering vision, hidden curves and rises have contributed to many a traffic accident.

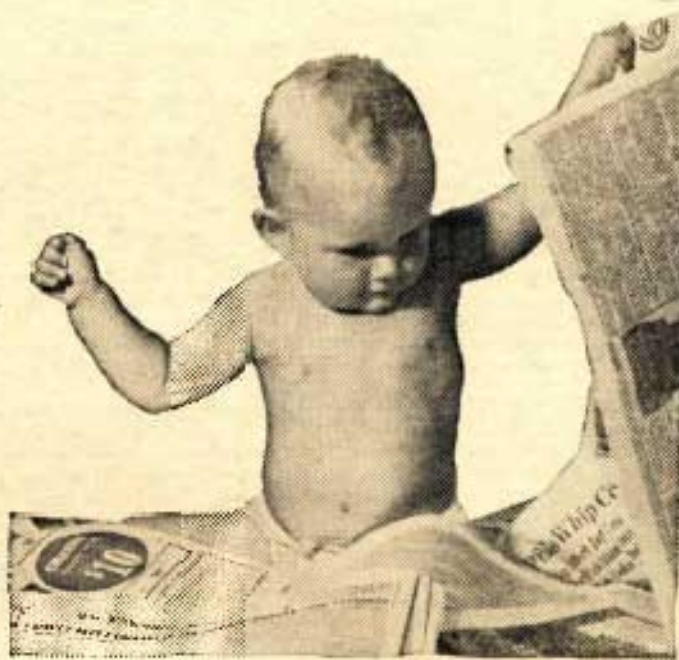
