New hardware store planned in Culver

Culver has been without a local option for hardware goods since the fall of 2013, when its more than 100-yearold hardware store on Main Street closed its doors.

All of that seems likely to change following a thumbs up from the Culver plan commission to a proposal for construction of a new Ace Hardware store on State Road 10, at the former site of Culver's Dairy Queen restaurant.

The building which housed that business since the 1980s would be razed under a proposal presented by Tricia Small, whose family operates a handful of hardware stores in the area, the closest located in Syracuse, Indiana. A site plan review for the Culver project was presented at the Feb. 16 meeting of Culver's plan commission, which approved moving forward with the plan with the caveat that representatives of the business must come back with information on size, location, and other details regarding of their signage before it can be installed at the site.

Leading up to the proposal, the Culver town council had already approved running municipal storm water lines to the site, with jetting of the storm sewer at the Forest Place Apartments in exchange for an easement on a small portion of the latter's property to allow new pipes to be run to accommodate the new hardware business.

The Culver Pro Hardware closed its doors in October of 2013, having operated on South Main Street since the late 19th century. The property was purchased at the time by Robert Hollender and Whitney Alvis, who planned to develop it as store front property for retail use. A new business venture is currently being planned and the property being developed towards that end (see accompanying article in this issue).

News of a new hardware will likely be welcome not only to local residents in general, but entities such as area contractors working on the See Hardware page 2 lake and in the town of Cul-

Culver's empty store fronts: a closer look

There are some exciting developments in terms of filling empty store fronts in Culver's retail areas, but the community still faces the challenges common to many small towns across the Midwest and the country, such as how to maintain a vibrant local economy in the face of stiff competition from the Internet and "big box" brick and mortar retail

stores. Culver town manager Jonathan Leist and Culver's town council, far from being disinterested in the issue, have taken steps towards plans and actions in encouraging new businesses

to locate in Culver. "The good news on these is that they are not absentee landlords just letting their buildings fall apart," says Leist, "but they are older buildings that do require

Fate of Lake Fest 2016 may depend on community volunteers By Jeff Kenney

The fate of the 2016 Culver Lake Fest may largely be in the hands of the community.

The annual event, for the past 32 years a staple of the community's summertime activities, has reached something of a critical juncture, says Mike Overmyer, active with the event since its inception and a principle organizer for the past decade-plus.

"We're calling for help to do the Lake Fest," he explains, adding that some members of the longtime committee are "burned out" and need more help to make the festival hap-

"If we don't get it, it may be a struggle to pull it (this year's Lake Fest) off."

The above sentiment is actually an improvement from the "word on the street" last fall, when rumor had it the committee had officially decided to call the event quits after many years of immense labor spread between a comparatively small band of volunteers.

The committee -- which has seen Overmyer's daughterin-law, Jean E. Overmyer, heading up the event for the past two years -- met last week and walked away with the official decision that there was willingness to carry on with the 2016 Culver Lake Fest, but that to some extent, it's going to take a village, to coin a phrase.

For his part, Overmyer recalls the early years of the fes-

tival, when food vending was almost entirely local. "It was all local organizations doing the food," he says. "The firemen had a barbecue, the churches did food, the

Lions Club -- we didn't have outside food vendors then." Overmyer also says longtime committee members always assumed someone else would take it over -- perhaps transitioning the event to a Chamber of Commerce-based 'Summer Fest," or similar shift.

In years past, festival staples have included the parade, fun run, bicycle ride, entertainment offerings, kids'





some updates and renovations, which can be a long and expensive process, and it can take time to find the right person interested in doing so." Lesist says he's particularly interested in what other

cities and towns in the state or area are doing to try to combat empty storefronts and create vibrant and active downtowns. "We are clearly not the only small town in Indiana who

would like to see more commercial developments in their historic downtown area," he notes, "and we are all looking for ways to encourage that development." Specifically, Leist and the council are working along-

side Culver's Redevelopment Commission in two specific directions: a retail recruitment plan and a rent abatement program for empty storefronts.

"The rent abatement program in Kokomo has been very successful at filling storefronts," explains Leist, "and I spoke with the county councilman in Kokomo who administers the program and I believe he said in five years that have had 22 abatements awarded, and 18 of those businesses are still open and in the downtown area...needless to say they have been very happy with the results of the program in Kokomo.'

The retail recruitment program, he adds, came out of recommendations from Culver's downtown merchants and the town is looking at it as an option as well, but still

doesn't know the costs and scope of services that would be involved.

"I have reached out to a few consulting companies that specialize in this but have not received a cost estimate and proposal yet," he says.

A third option, Leist explains, could be expansion of the CRC-sponsored façade program to include roof or structural work for downtown buildings.

"I have an inquiry into the TIF attorney as to whether or not this could be a possibility as well. I know of a few communities where roof repairs are eligible for façade programs, but I am not sure if that is TIF dollars or other funding."

Restaurant opportunities particularly prominent

Perhaps not surprisingly in a community which over the past few decades earned a reputation as a dining destination, several of Culver's empty store fronts have been developed and/or used for eateries.

Certainly the highest profile of these buildings are those which housed the former Corndance Cafe, at 117 South Main Street in downtown Culver, and the former Evil Czech Brewery and Pub at 530 S. Ohio Street.

Both are for sale and include all kitchen equipment and tables and chairs, presenting an ideal "turnkey" opportunity for a potential restaurateur interested in filling

a ready-made business niche in a dining-friendly commu-

nity, notes Leist.

Other former or potential eatery spaces for sale include 103 South Main, which had been developed as a bakery in recent years, but which is poised to go up for sale in the near future, according to Lindsey Pick, a real estate agent with Re/Max Oak Crest of Culver; and the former Hansen's Restaurant at 614 Lake Shore Drive, which underwent considerable renovation and improvement in recent years.

Of course there are others available, and some businesses presently unused, but in the stages of being developed. These include Culver's movie theater on Lake Shore Drive, the former site of Dairy Queen on State Road 10 (poised to become an Ace Hardware store -- see article this issue), and the former hardware store at 120 South Main Street, which is currently being renovated towards a business venture later this year.

Some existing businesses, such as Lakefront Auto Supply, are still up and going, but for sale.

"I think there are some great opportunities for individuals looking to start a business in Culver," says Leist, "and I think we will see new commercial activity in many of these buildings in the very near future.'







Davis had the same issue with Culp on the mats at Bankers Life Fieldhouse.







Local student among recipients of national academic recognition

A Culver residents was one of six Culver Academies seniors/first classmen have been recognized on a national level for academic excellence. Academic Dean Kevin MacNeil made the announcement during the academic convocation on Feb. 10.

Eleanor Ericson of Culver and five other students – Catherine Bevil (Omaha, Neb.), Dhruva Mehta (Bourbonnais, Ill.), Michael Noronha (Lake Forest, Ill.), and Suraag Srinivas (Chelmsford, Mass.) – have been named National Merit Scholarship finalists.

Senior Julia Hernandez (Pueblo, Colo.) has been designated by The College Board as a National Hispanic Scholar, an academic designation used by colleges to identify exceptional Hispanic students.

The National Merit Scholarship program honors individual students for their exceptional scholastic potential, as measured by the National Merit Qualifying Test, the PSAT. The qualifying score was 218, which corresponds roughly to a 2,200 on the SAT, MacNeil said. Culver Academies students are selected from a pool of boarding

school students covering a 10-state region.

Every year, approximately 1.4 million high school juniors in more than 22,000 high schools take the PSAT/ NMSQT. The 15,000 finalists represent less than one percent of the total population who took the initial exam.

Finalists are eligible for one of approximately 7,400 National Merit Scholarships worth more than \$32 million. The awards include National Merit Scholarships of \$2,500, corporate-sponsored Merit Scholarships, and college-sponsored Merit Scholarships.

Scholarship winners are selected based on their academic records, information about the school's curricula and grading system, two sets of test scores, high school officials' written recommendations, information of the student's activities and leadership, and each finalist's own

National Merit Scholarship winners will be announced starting in March and conclude by mid-June. The National Merit Scholarship Corporation has been in operation since 1955. It is a not-for-profit organization that operates without government assistance.
